The directors present their first annual report and financial statements for the period 3 January 2006 to 31 March 2007

Chairman's Report to Members

This has been an important year in the history of the Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society and has seen it change from being an unincorporated body into a company limited by guarantee The new company, GLIAS, was formed on 3 January 2006 and on 1 April 2006 took over the assets and undertaking, as well as the name, of the former Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society ('GLIAS') which had been operating since 1968

As an educational charity GLIAS has continued its policy of providing a programme of free public lectures and walks. Since I April 2006 there have been lectures on Engineering in the Royal Dockyards, given by Edward Sargeant, Thomas Telford, Civil Engineer, given by Dr. Denis Smith, London's Markets and Exchanges, given by Prof. David Perrett, and London's Cast Iron Bridges, given by Malcolm Tucker

In addition, there have been three research walks on summer evenings, and five Saturday walks

For the coming year the Board has decided to re-arrange the winter series of lectures so that these will start in January and continue each month until May. In the summer months starting in June there will be guided evening walks as well as Saturday research walks, and towards the end of the year there will be a training session on the effective use of archives. By this new programme we plan to make available to members an organised event for each month of the year. So that members are kept informed of GLIAS activities, a Newsletter has been published six times during the year.

Where appropriate, GLIAS, when so requested, has responded to technical and planning enquiries and, insofar as it is able due to the constraints on the free time of members, has provided information to researchers and others who wish to know more about London's industrial archaeology. Our Website is widely used and has provided to a world-wide audience a growing amount of information on industrial archaeology.

No organisation such as GLIAS could continue without the support of its members and I am grateful to everyone who becomes a member and thereby supports the work we do In addition, I wish to thank all those members who volunteer to act as directors to ensure the effective running of our organisation, and to all those people who make a significant contribution of their time, often at considerable personal expense, to organise lectures, lead walks, build the database, produce the Newsletter, maintain the Website, edit the Journal, respond to planning and technical enquiries, and undertake the myriad other tasks that are necessary to ensure the continuing success of GLIAS
