Chairman's Report to Members

The Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society ('GLIAS') has completed yet another successful year and has continued to develop its educational work in the field of London's industrial history

As an educational charity GLIAS has continued to provide a programme of free public lectures and guided walks. In the year from 1 April 2007 there were lectures on

Sea Forts of the Thames and Medway

given by Frank Turner,

William Webster, Builder of Crossness and the Thames Embankments

given by Neil Rhind,

The History of the Kodak Works in Harrow Sir William Fairbairn

given by Tony Earle, and given by Brian James-Strong

In addition, on summer Saturdays there were guided walks in Alperton, Crayford, Brentford, Victoria and Hoxton

In October 2007, as part of our policy to provide training in specialist skills, there was a recording visit to Camberwell, in November a training session on recording buildings and machinery was held at the Kirkaldy Teating Museum, and in December there was a training visit to the City of Westminster Archive at Victoria

As well as its direct educational work, GLIAS responded to planning and conservation enquiries where these were related to London's industrial past, and also, where possible, provided information in response to enquiries received from researchers and members of the public Such work, of course, was dependent upon the amount of time our volunteers were able to devote to these matters. In addition to direct responses to enquiries, GLIAS has continued to develop its website which provides a wealth of information to anyone with access to a computer. In order that members were kept advised of GLIAS activities, as well as publicising other aspects of London's industrial history, a Newsletter was published six times during the year.

I should like to thank all those members who, often at considerable personal expense, volunteer their time, knowledge and skill to ensure the effective running of our organisation. I should also like to thank everyone who becomes a member of GLIAS and by so doing supports its work.
