The directors present their third annual report and financial statements for the period 1 April 2008 to 31 March 2009.

## Chairman's Report to Members

Last year, 2008, marked the fortieth anniversary of the founding of the Greater London Industrial Archaeoogy Society and I am proud to have been associated with the running of that society since its inception. During these forty years GLIAS has built up an enviable reputation as the country's leading regional industrial archaeology society and it is now one of the first organisations researchers contact when studying London's industrial past.

During the past year GLIAS, as an educational charity, has continued to provide a programme of free public lectures and guided walks.

In the year from 1 April 2008 there were lectures on:

John Penn & Sons, Engineers of Greenwich Some Unusual Railways The End of the Pier Say Sarson's Not Vinegar Stationary Steam, Still Running Still Sweet given by Richard Hartree; given by Dr. Mark Hows; given by Michael Bussell; given by Tim Smith; and given by John Porter.

In addition, on summer Saturdays there were guided walks around Lewisham, Greenford, Walthamstow and Camden. In October there was a special self-guided walk around the Hatton Garden area; in November there was a recording walk around Islington and in December this was followed up by a research training visit to Islington Local History Library.

In addition to its direct involvement in education, GLIAS has responded to planning and conservation enquiries where these relate to London's industrial heritage, and also, when the free time of volunteers permits, has researched and responded to general enquiries from members of the public. As well as responding directly to enquiries, GLIAS has continued to develop its website which allows researchers free access to the growing amount of information on the site.

To ensure that members are kept advised of GLIAS activities, as well as providing short articles on subjects relevant to London's industrial past, a Newsletter has been published six times during the year: this is also available to the general public via the GLIAS website. In addition, a further edition of the GLIAS Journal, which contains much original research, was published in May 2008.

Organisations such as GLIAS can only continue with the support of their members and those who volunteer their time, knowledge and skills: I should therefore like to thank everyone who becomes a member of GLIAS.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting Convention

These accounts have been prepared on the basis of historic cost.

b) Depreciation

Fixed assets are at cost less depreciation which has been provided in annual installments over the estimated life of the asset as follows:

Computer and Office Equipment: 33.33% straight line

c) Stock

Stock is valued at cost

d) Taxation

The Company is a registered charity and is not subject to taxation.

# 2. LIABILITY OF MEMBERS

The Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society is a Company Limited by Guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society being wound up the members will be liable for the payment of its debts and liabilities and the costs, charges and expenses of winding-up: each member is liable for such amounts as may be required not exceeding £1 (one pound).

#### **PUBLIC BENEFIT**

The Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society was set up in 1968 as an unincorporated body and in 2006 became a company limited by guarantee. Throughout its existence the primary objective of GLIAS has been to encourage the study and understanding of London's industrial past and to this end each year it arranges a series of free public lectures and walks. In addition, the results of research by members and others is published in its occasional journal and other information is distributed via the GLIAS Newsletter which is published six times each year.

GLIAS also maintains a website which, at no charge to the user, provides information on many aspects of London's industrial heritage.

Although all work in running GLIAS is undertaken by volunteers, wherever possible enquiries from members of the public which are relevant to GLIAS are researched and this work is undertaken without charge to the enquirer.
