Chairman's Report to Members

This is my fourth full year as Chairman of GLIAS and I am pleased to report that the financial year 2014-2015 has been another successful one for the Society. The slow decline in the total number of members has continued, but our finances have been carefully managed and remain in good order: GLIAS has sufficient funds to meet all its known and anticipated liabilities.

During the past year GLIAS, as an educational charity, has provided a programme of free public lectures and guided walks. In the year from 1 April 2014 there were lectures on:

Each month from June to October there were guided industrial heritage walks and these were around Greenwich Riverside; Tower Gateway; Charing Cross; the City Fringe and Woolwich. In November there was a 'pub evening' at which members met informally and were able to present the results of their recent research.

Last year we were saddened to learn of the death of Paul Calvocoressi, a long-standing member of our Society. In his will Paul made a substantial bequest to GLIAS, details of which appear in this year's accounts.

GLIAS is a member of the South East Region Industrial Archaeology Conference ('SERIAC') and in April 2014 took its turn in organising a successful conference in Croydon.

When the free time of our volunteers permits, GLIAS responds to enquiries which relate to London's industrial past, and also researches and responds to planning, listing, conservation and other matters of public interest. In addition, GLIAS has continued to develop its website which allows the public free access to the growing amount of information available on the site. During the past year a further volume of the GLIAS Journal was published and distributed to members. In addition, the GLIAS Newsletter was published six times during the year to provide members with information about the Society's activities as well as providing short articles on subjects relevant to London's industrial past.

GLIAS is a grouping of people who care about London's industrial heritage and I thank everyone who becomes a member, and especially those who willingly give their time and knowledge to help run the Society, and also those who research and respond to enquiries received from the public and other bodies.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting Convention

These accounts have been prepared on the basis of historic cost in accordance with the FRSSE.

b) Depreciation

Fixed assets are at cost less depreciation which has been provided in annual instalments over the estimated life of the asset as follows:

Computer and Office Equipment: 33.33% straight line

c) Stock

Stock is valued at cost

d) Taxation

The Company is a registered charity and is not subject to taxation.

2. LIABILITY OF MEMBERS

The Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society is a Company Limited by Guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society being wound up the members will be liable for the payment of its debts and liabilities and the costs, charges and expenses of winding-up: each member is liable for such amounts as may be required not exceeding £1 (one pound).

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society was set up in 1968 as an unincorporated body and in 2006 became a company limited by guarantee. Throughout its existence the primary objective of GLIAS has been to encourage the study and understanding of London's industrial past and to this end each year it arranges a series of free public lectures and guided walks. In addition, the results of research by members and others is published in its occasional journal, and other information is distributed via the GLIAS Newsletter which is published six times each year.

GLIAS also maintains a website which, at no charge to the user, not only provides information on many aspects of London's industrial heritage but also gives access to current and past Newsletters.

Although all work in running GLIAS is undertaken by unpaid volunteers, whenever possible enquiries from members of the public which are relevant to GLIAS are researched and this work is undertaken without charge to the enquirer.
