The directors present their thirteenth annual report and financial statements for the period 1 April 2018 to 31 March 2019.

Chairman's Report to Members

I am pleased to report that the financial year 2018-2019 has been another successful one for the Society, not only in continuing to provide activities for members but also in dealing with many planning and listing applications. The Society's Calvocoressi Fund is currently supporting research into the nineteenth century printing industry in London and is also supporting the design and production of a new publication for the The House Mill. In 2019 GLIAS will be celebrating its fiftieth anniversary and to mark this several events for members have been planned.

As an educational charity GLIAS has provided a programme of free public lectures and guided walks. In the year from 1 April 2018 there were lectures on:

Each month from June to October 2018 there were guided industrial heritage walks and these were: Around Euston; Deptford; Mile End to Tower Hill; Old Oak Common/Park Royal and Bermondsey. There was also an organised visit to Morden College at Blackheath and in November there was an informal meeting at which some members presented the results of their recent research.

I am pleased to report that our finances are in good order and GLIAS has sufficient funds to meet all its known and anticipated liabilities. There are, however, continuing concerns such as declining membership numbers and increasing costs of running the Society.

GLIAS continues to research and respond to enquiries from the public which relate to London's industrial past, and also responds to planning, listing, conservation and other matters of public interest. 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting Convention

These accounts have been prepared on the basis of historic cost in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities.

b) Depreciation

Fixed assets are at cost less depreciation which has been provided in annual instalments over the estimated life of the asset as follows:

Computer and Office Equipment: 33.33% straight line

c) Stock

Stock is valued at cost

d) Taxation

The Company is a registered charity and is not subject to taxation.

2. LIABILITY OF MEMBERS

The Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society is a Company Limited by Guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society being wound up the members will be liable for the payment of its debts and liabilities and the costs, charges and expenses of winding-up: each member is liable for such amounts as may be required not exceeding £1 (one pound).

3. CONTROLLING PARTY

The Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society is controlled by its members: each paid-up member has one vote.

4. PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Greater London Industrial Archaeology Society was set up in 1968 as an unincorporated body and in 2006 became a company limited by guarantee. Throughout its existence the primary objective of GLIAS has been to encourage the study and understanding of London's industrial past and to this end each year it arranges a series of free public lectures and guided walks. In addition, the results of research by members and others is published in its occasional journal 'London's Industrial Archaeology', and other information is distributed via the GLIAS Newsletter which is published six times each year.

GLIAS also maintains a website which, at no charge to the user, not only provides information on many aspects of London's industrial heritage but also gives access to current and past Newsletters.

Although all work in running GLIAS is undertaken by unpaid volunteers, whenever possible enquiries from members of the public which are relevant to GLIAS are researched and this work is undertaken without charge to the enquirer.
