STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The School was founded and endowed at the beginning of the sixteenth century by Thomas Horsley who was, more than once, the Lord Mayor of Newcastle upon Tyne. By virtue of a Charter granted in 1600 by Queen Elizabeth it became "The Free Grammar School of Queen Elizabeth in Newcastle upon Tyne". It subsequently assumed the title "The Newcastle upon Tyne Royal Grammar School". Prior to the 2006/07 year, the School was regulated by a 1909 Scheme made by the Board of Education under the Charitable Trust Acts 1853 to 1894 and a 1975 Scheme made by the Charity Commissioners with subsequent amendments. The membership of the Governing Body was subsequently amended by a resolution of the Governors dated 1 January 1997.

On 1 August 2007, the assets, liabilities and undertaking of the School were transferred to a charitable company and its associated Property Trust under a Scheme approved by the Charity Commissioners on 12 July 2006. The new charitable company is registered with the Charity Commissioners, number 1114424 and is a company limited by guarantee, number 5664801.

Objects

The objects are set out in the School's Memorandum of Association as follows:

"The objects for which the Charity is established are for the public benefit:

- The education of children and young persons in the North East of England;
- To provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for the education, recreation or other leisure facilities (including but not limited to the arts) of the public at large with a view to improving the conditions of life in Newcastle upon Tyne and the North East of England."

The School accepts day pupils from the age of 7. The School's aim is to attain the highest academic levels as well as providing a wide range of extra- curricular and sporting activities.

Introduction

- 1. The academic year 2007-8 was yet another one of remarkable achievement for the Royal Grammar School. It was also remarkable for the retirement of the Headmaster James Miller after 14 years at the helm. James took the School through a period of tremendous change, not at least in the development of a wide range of new facilities, the introduction of co-education and the overall growth of the School. Tributes have been paid to James elsewhere, but the Governors would like to put on record their thanks and appreciation for his tremendous contribution to the development of the School and its continued excellence in performance across the curriculum and a wide range of extra-curricular activities. The Governors would also like to record their great pleasure at the arrival of Dr Bernard Trafford to succeed James Miller as Headmaster, and look forward to many years of further progress for the School under his leadership.
- 2. One of the most significant changes to the School during James Miller's period as Headmaster was the introduction of co-education. Girls having joined the Sixth Form from 2001 onwards and lower years from 2006 onwards, they now play a full and highly successful part in the life of the School. In September 2007, there were 208 girls in the School, of whom 81 were in the Sixth Form and 38 in the Junior School. Having made such a successful transformation to a co-educational school, Governors now feel that the introduction of co-education need no longer be identified as a separate objective.

Academic

3. A level results were the second best achieved. The all-important A/B percentage – the proportion of students who achieved grades A or B – was 87.1%, very slightly down on 2007 but nevertheless higher than any other last year since the new exams were introduced. The GCSE results were the best ever, as measured by the percentage of A* grades. Candidates achieved 41.7% of all their GCSE grades at this top level. Nineteen students achieved the perfect 10 A* grades: a further 29 passed all their GCSEs at grades A* or A.

 As usual, students entered the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Mathematics Challenges. 35 won gold at Junior level, 16 Intermediate and five Senior. One sixth former, Jian He, qualified for the British Mathematical Olympiad.

Junior School

- 5. Junior School pupils achieved another very high set of scores in the Key Stage 2 tests (SATs). 100% achieved level 5 in science, whilst in both maths and English 94% of students attained the highest standard available. The aggregate score of 288 equalled the best-ever result of the year before. That previous year's results were recognised during this year by the Sunday Times which announced the Junior School as its nominated top independent primary school in the country. This was based not only on the SATs results but also on the richness of educational opportunity balanced against the fee level which is modest in national terms. It was a very significant accolade.
- 6. Following an unprecedented level of applications to Year 5, a third form was added in that year in September 2007, so that from September 2008 there were three rather than two forms in each of Years 5 and 6. Governors regarded this as a very healthy sign, as these children will hopefully enjoy nine years at RGS.

Public Benefit

- 7. Over the year the school continued to make a very significant contribution to public benefit. The major contribution remained the school's passionate and effective commitment to providing means-tested bursaries during the school year at a total cost to the school of 3685,473 of which £474,884 was contributed by the Bursary Campaign and other funds controlled by the RGS Education Trust. The average level of fee help was 81.5% of fees, indicating that the majority came from homes with very low family incomes. 52 students received bursaries of 90% or 100% of school fees, indicating that their family incomes will have been somewhat below £20,000 per annum.
- 8. The school continued its range of outreach activities. Once again it hosted the Newcastle Science Enrichment Programme (NSEP) series of Saturday morning science sessions for children from local schools who were working towards Crest silver awards: two RGS teachers, an RGS technician and several RGS sixth formers were involved in teaching and running this course, working with two teachers from a local school. The school provided facilities for many other outside activities: in particular the Performing Arts Centre hosted stage shows for Newcastle Preparatory, for West Jesmond Primary, Heaton Manor and St Thomas More Schools and concerts for local amateur orchestras and the St Paul's Youth Orchestra.
- 9. Around 90 RGS Sixth Formers went out each week to help in the wider community, many of them visiting more than one placement. In many cases, the placements were in institutions with which the school has had links over several year and in which the staff have become friends as well as professional associates.
- 10. The Sixth Formers worked in homes for the elderly, charity shops, hospices, training centres and schools for the disabled, but mostly in schools in less privileged parts of the city, where they worked with younger children on a one-to-one basis, typically helping to improve their literacy and numeracy. This Inner-City Partnership now involves eight schools, including the RGS, and over sixty Sixth Formers. The association of many years with the Percy Hedley Foundation continued, with students helping both adults and children with special needs.
- 11. Another important part of the RGS students' work was with the elderly, in particular the residents of Pilgrim Court, (nearby sheltered accommodation) where the students provided a daily shopping service.
- 12. Fund raising also remained an important element of the Voluntary Service Group's work and this year RGS students raised over £11,000 for good causes, through the annual Charities Week and other occasional year-group campaigns.

Arts

13. RGS students were busy in the performing arts during the year. Amongst a host of musical and dramatic events, performing included a staggeringly lavish production of the Arthurian musical Pendragon and the school's Symphony Orchestra performing Beethoven's 5th Symphony. The Senior Choir toured Paris and Brussels, singing (amongst other venues) in La Madeleine Church in Central Paris.

Debating

14. Debating was as lively as ever with heavy involvement in internal, local and regional events. Kit Mercer and Jamie Robson won the ESU Scotland competition: another pair made the quarter finals and it is believed that the successes made the RGS team the top Junior Debating Society in the UK. At Senior level, Hugo Wallis and Andrew Bellis finished fourth out of 100 teams in the Durham Union Schools Debating Competition. Richard Coates and Andrew Bellis became Northern Champions in the ESU Mace Competition and made it to the national final, beating over 500 teams to get there.

Outdoor Education

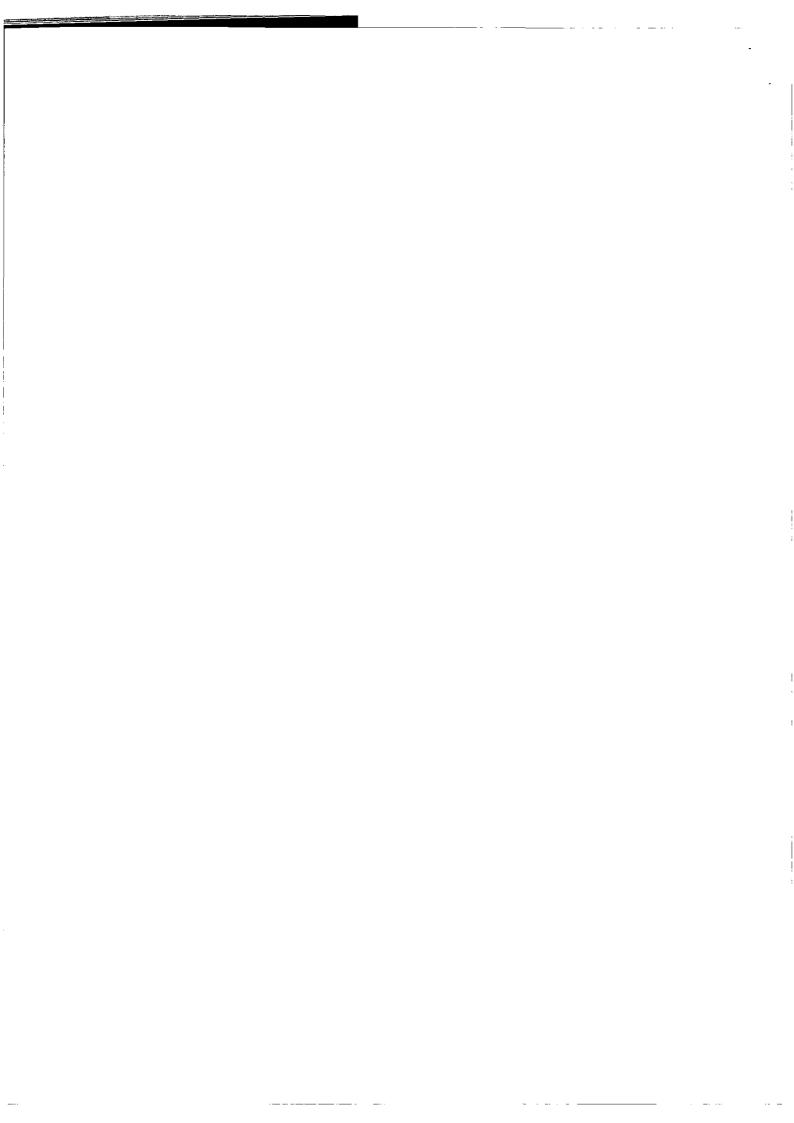
15. In outdoor education, students from Year 10 and above pursued a wide variety of exhibitions. There was a steady stream of awards gained at the Duke of Edinburgh Gold, Silver and Bronze levels, following a variety of expeditions and other activities. Ten students undertook a two week challenge trekking expedition to Morocco. Two senior teams made a World Challenge expedition to Kyrgyzstan. Less arduously, 67 students went on a Greek trip which included Delphi, Athens, Corinth and Epidaurus. Younger students has a summer camp (Year 7); a Latin trip to Hadrian's Wall (Year 9); a trip to Germany (Years 7-9); and one to Cantabria in Spain (Years 9 and 10).

Sport'

16. The RGS sporting life was busy as always. Boys played rugby at all ages: the Senior School regularly put out 11 Rugby teams for Saturday fixtures. RGS rugby players think big, and it was no surprise that 67 boys made a summer tour of New Zealand and the Cook Islands, playing 17 matches and winning 11. Boys and girls alike made their mark in athletics and hockey. Football, basketball, badminton and judo carried on as ever, as did netball, swimming, and squash. The fencing squad gained in excess of 13 individual medals in competitions across Britain: six RGS fencers represented the North East region at the British Young Championships where Matt Henderson (Year 10) won bronze. He also won silver in the Public Schools Fencing Championships. In the British Schools Team Championships the girls' team came third; the Year 10 boy's team became British Schools Team U15 Epée Champions. The senior running team won the Tyneside Road Relays and the Tyneside Cross Country Championships. The senior boys' tennis team became Northern Champions for the third year in a row and narrowly missed a place in the All England Finals.

Structure, governance and management

17. At a General Meeting Governors approved amendments to the Articles of Association of the charitable company with regard to arrangements for meetings and for the appointment of Governors. Governors also carried out a self-assessment exercise: while this indicated general satisfaction with present arrangements for meetings and the exchange of information between Governors and the School, a number of initiatives will be taken to help Governors have a greater awareness of what is happening in the School and have the opportunity to meet with staff on a more regular basis. Health and Safety management in the School was also reviewed by Governors in the light of new corporate manslaughter legislation.



GOVERNORS' REPORT - CONTINUED

- 18. Governors carried out their annual review of risks facing the School and identified the state of the economy as the greatest current risk. This was addressed through a range of measures, including those outlined in paragraphs 6 and 19 in particular.
- 19. During the year Governors continued to pay close regard to the financial management of the School, in particular with regard to ensuring the financial security of the School and value for money in terms of the opportunities which the School offers to students and the results which they achieve compared with the level of tuition fees paid by their parents. The School also registered for VAT with effect from 1 February 2008.
- 20. Governors noted a range of positive performance indicators for the School, including the following:
 - the cashflow prior to scheduled loan repayments was positive and in line with the Business Plan;
 - student numbers increased from 1,218 to 1,249;
 - expenditure per student increased from £8,309 to £8,699;
 - the number of bursaries provided increased from 87 to 94:
 - expenditure on bursaries increased from £523,891 to £685,473;
 - · academic results, as reported above, were highly satisfactory; and
 - staff turnover during the year was exceptionally low.
- 21. Having operated successfully as a charitable company for two financial years, Governors felt that the successful transformation to incorporation need no longer be a specific objective.
- 22. The School's subsidiary, RGS Trading Ltd, continued to operate the school's tuck shops, vending machines and licensed bars. The amounts show a turnover for the Company during the year of £82,686, and a trading loss of £5,424. The Directors of the Company reviewed the range of trading activities and will further review these in the light of the trading loss.
- 23. A number of new staffing appointments were made to strengthen the School's administrative and medical support and the School's Support Staff Pension Plan underwent a full review, including the provision of a new Deed and Rules.
- 24. On the property front, the School disposed of it Boathouse and boats, carried out alterations to the Main Building to provide additional office space and refurbished various other areas; following the grant of a new 21 year lease, major improvements were made to the Mooracres playing fields.
- 25. Looking ahead, plans are in hand for the provision of two additional classrooms to accommodate permanently the additional forms in Years 5 and 6 and potentially to refurbish the School's Library facilities: the construction work for these facilities will take place over summer 2009.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The governors continue to take steps to review their reserves policy. Their intention is to continue to develop the School facilities whilst at the same time containing increases in tuition fees to a reasonable level.

Principal funding

The School's day to day charitable activities are self funding. The recent capital development programme undertaken by the School has initially been funded by a bank loan, repayable out of future income generated by the School.

Investment powers, policy and performance

The Trustees' investment powers are governed by the Trust Deed. The Governors have delegated the management of the investment portfolios to Brewin Dolphin Limited, but appraise their performance at regular intervals; the Governors' policy is to maintain income to fund bursaries, while preserving the market value of the investments. The total return on all investments was:-

J.R. Howarth Bequest and Bursary Fund. Decrease in market value 12.9% and gross income yield 4.4% Peter Taylor Fund and Bursary Fund. Decrease in market value 13.2% and gross income yield 4.6%

Decreases in market value compare with the FTSE All - share index benchmark decrease of 16.4%.

Reserves

Notes 23 and 24 to the financial statements show the assets and liabilities attributable to the various funds by type, describe the various funds and summarise the movements on each fund. Unrestricted funds in total amounted to £17,458,239 of which £3,459,671 is a revaluation reserve held as a designated fund. Funds held as fixed assets totalled £26,138,573 leaving a deficit of free reserves at the year end of £8,680,334 a decrease in deficit of £891,476 over that shown last year in the accounts of the School

The School's freehold land and buildings on the Jesmond site are shown in the financial statements at an independent financial valuation of £25,800,000 (based on a depreciated replacement cost basis as at 18 December 2006), together with the cost of subsequent additions. Whilst the market value of the site is not readily ascertainable due to the covenants and other restrictions on the use of the premises, the Governors are confident that the current value of these assets is not overstated compared with the amounts shown in the financial statements.

Risk management

The Governors examine the major risks that the School faces each year, in the course of reviewing their strategic planning for the development of the School. The charitable company has developed systems to monitor and control these risks in order to mitigate any impact which they may have on the School in the future.

Grant making policy

In this period, the School awarded 94 bursaries amounting to £685,473 including amounts granted from the RGS Educational Trust for this purpose. The Governors' policy is to award means tested financial assistance for the duration of a pupil's education at the school on the basis of educational ability to enable pupils to attend or remain at the School in situations where the financial circumstances of their parent(s) or guardian(s) would not otherwise make that possible.

Asset cover for funds

Notes 23 and 24 to the financial statements set out an analysis of the assets attributable to the various funds together with a brief description of them. It is considered that the assets are sufficient to meet the School's obligations on a fund by fund basis.

The School's tangible assets are held for use by the School. The Governors believe that their value shown in the financial statements is fair and reasonable, being based on a professional valuation undertaken in December 2006. Investments are held to provide income and growth to match the liabilities set down by the donors of the capital.

Accounting and reporting responsibilities

Company and charity law applicable in England and Wales requires the Governors, as the trustees of the charitable company, to prepare financial statements for each financial period, which give a true and fair view of the charitable company's financial activities during the period and of its financial position at the end of the period.

In preparing the financial statements the Governors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- follow applicable accounting standards and the Charities SORP disclosing and explaining any departure in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue.

The Governors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which are such as to disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the charitable company at any time and to enable them as trustees to ensure that the financial statements comply with Charity Law. The Governors are also responsible for safeguarding the charitable company's assets and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

So far as each of the Governors is aware at the time the report is approved there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware and the Governors have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

These financial statements comply with all relevant statutory requirements, the governing documents, and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2006.

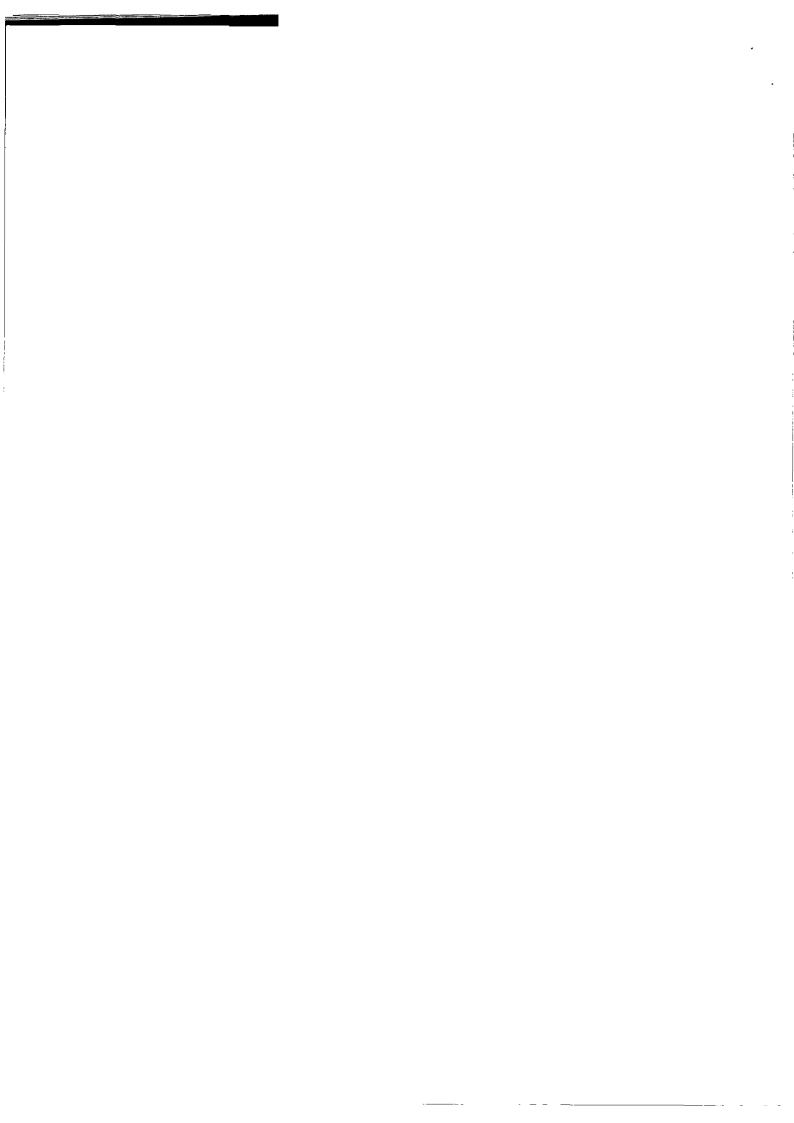

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2008

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Group financial statements

The financial statements consolidate the accounts of The Newcastle upon Tyne Royal Grammar School, (including its Property Trust, charity reference number 1114424-1) and its wholly owned subsidiary, RGS Trading Limited, on a line by line basis. RGS Trading Limited covenants taxable profits to The Newcastle upon Tyne Royal Grammar School.

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP) issued in March 2005 and with applicable accounting standards, under the historical cost accounting basis, except for the revaluation of freehold land and buildings and the inclusion of investment assets at market value.

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. The group balance sheet shows net current liabilities of £3,415,577 as a result of construction costs of £9.7 million incurred which it is anticipated will result in increased revenues in future years. Liabilities are covered by long term finance and are in line with the School's business plan.

Fees and similar income

Fees receivable and charges for services and use of premises are accounted for in the period in which the service is provided. Fees receivable are stated after deducting allowances, scholarships and other remissions granted by the School from its unrestricted funds, but include contributions received from Restricted Funds for Scholarships, Bursaries and other grants.

Voluntary income and fund accounting

Voluntary income is received by way of grants and donations and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable.

The School receives a grant from the Hospital of St Mary the Virgin charity and recognises all grants receivable from that charity including amounts not yet paid by 31 July 2008 but which under the terms of that charity's trust deed it must pay over in due course to the School

Grants and donations received for the general purposes of the charitable company are included as unrestricted funds. Grants and donations for activities restricted by the wishes of the donor are taken to "restricted funds" if these wishes are legally binding on the Governors. Donations required to be retained as capital in accordance with the donor's wishes are accounted for as "endowments" – permanent or not, according to the nature of the restriction.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2008

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - CONTINUED

Resources expended

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot directly be attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources. The allocation method used has been to apportion all costs on the basis of the estimate of full time equivalent staff numbers employed on each activity.

Governance costs

Governance costs are those costs associated with constitutional and statutory requirements of the school.

Investment and investment income

Investments are included at closing mid-market value at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss on revaluation is taken to the Statement of Financial Activities. Investment income is accounted for in the period in which the charity is entitled to receipt. Incoming resources from endowment funds are restricted.

Grants and bursaries

Grants and bursaries are included as expenditure in the period for which the award is given.

Tangible fixed assets

All freehold land and buildings are included in the financial statements based on the latest independent valuation of their value to the School plus the cost of subsequent major additions. Replacements and minor improvements to the fabric of the School are written off in the Statement of Financial Activities as they are incurred.

Assets under construction

Work carried out prior to the design stage of a development project is expensed in the period in which the expenditure is incurred. Expenditure incurred during design and construction phases is capitalised and included in assets under construction. The assets are transferred to freehold land and buildings on the earlier of completion of the project or occupancy by the School.

Depreciation

Freehold land is not depreciated.

Assets under construction are not depreciated on the grounds that they have not yet been brought into use. The cost of other fixed assets is depreciated by equal annual instalments over their expected useful lives as follows:

Motor vehicles - 4 years
Plant and equipment - 3 – 10 years
All Weather Pitch - 20 years
Freehold buildings - 50 years

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

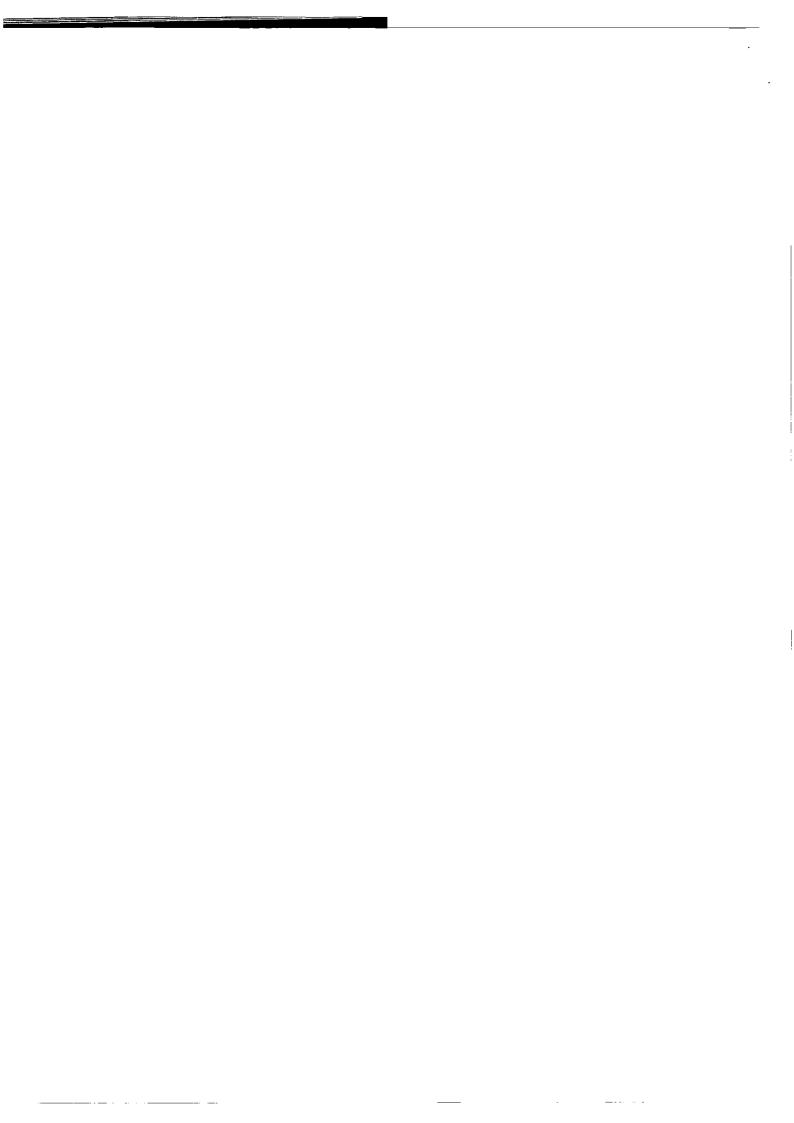
Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowances for any obsolete or slow moving items.

Pension costs

The School operates two main schemes:

The School participates in the Teachers' Pension Scheme, which is a defined benefit scheme for teaching staff only.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2008

1. **ACCOUNTING POLICIES - CONTINUED**

Contributions to the scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities so as to spread the cost of the pensions over employees' working lives with the School in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by a qualified actuary on the basis of quinquennial valuations, using a prospective benefit method.

The School also operates a defined contribution scheme for non-teaching staff. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the School in an independently administered fund. The charge to the Statement of Financial Activities is the amount payable in the period.

NET INCOME OF TRADING SUBSIDIARY 2.

The charitable company has one wholly owned trading subsidiary which is incorporated in the UK. RGS Trading Limited, which provides refreshments and confectionery through the school's tuck shops, covenants taxable profits to The Newcastle upon Tyne Royal Grammar School. Donations are credited to the appropriate fund and the impact of market valuation and investment transactions are also included. Investment income and expenditure is treated within the restricted funds.

The funds are all permanent.

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The original bequest of £121,132 from James Ronald Howarth was provided to give assistance to able boys attending the Royal Grammar School, for scholarships and bursaries. If, at any time, the Royal Grammar School loses its independence, as defined by the Governors of the School, the whole sum shall be paid to the Rector and Fellows of Exeter College, Oxford, to be used at their discretion for the benefit of the college.

The prize investment fund comprises many small donations made for various reasons to provide a variety of school prizes. The funds have been managed by COIF Charities Investment Fund.

In 1998 the family of the late Lord Taylor of Gosforth set up a Bursary Fund to assist with the tuition fees of pupils entering the 6th form of the RGS who, for financial reasons, might not otherwise be able to attend the school.

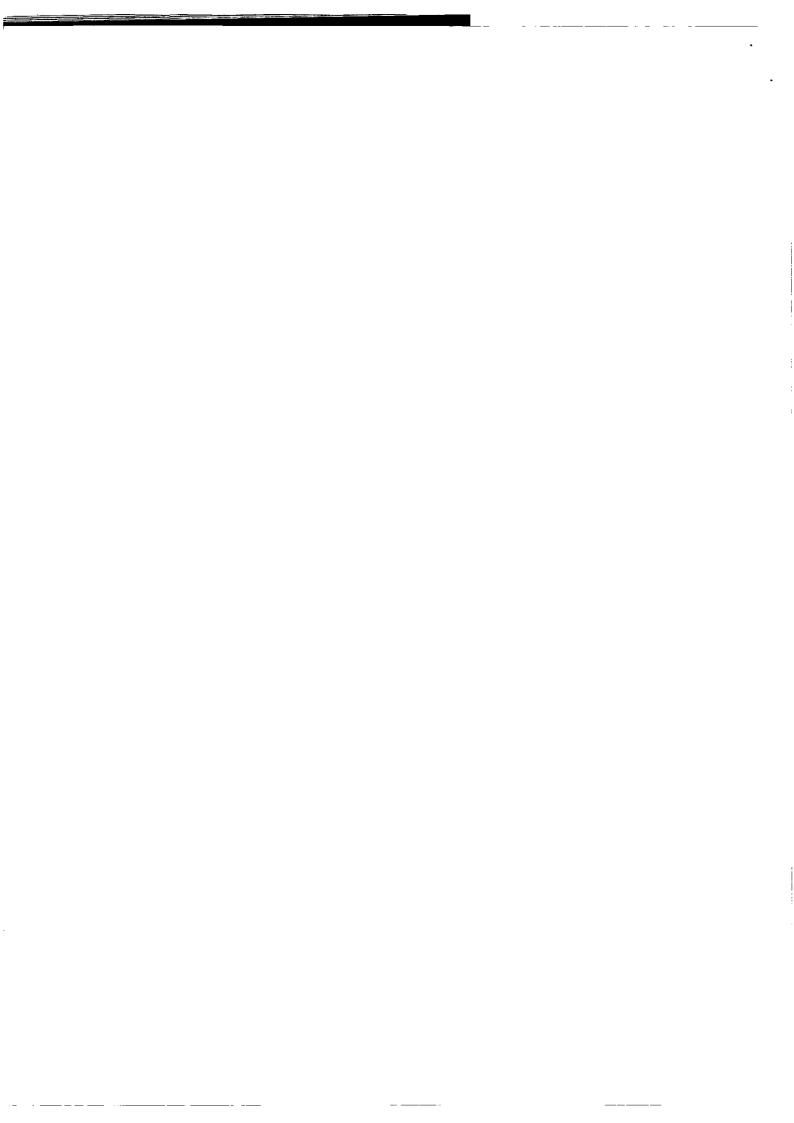

The Teachers' Pension Scheme

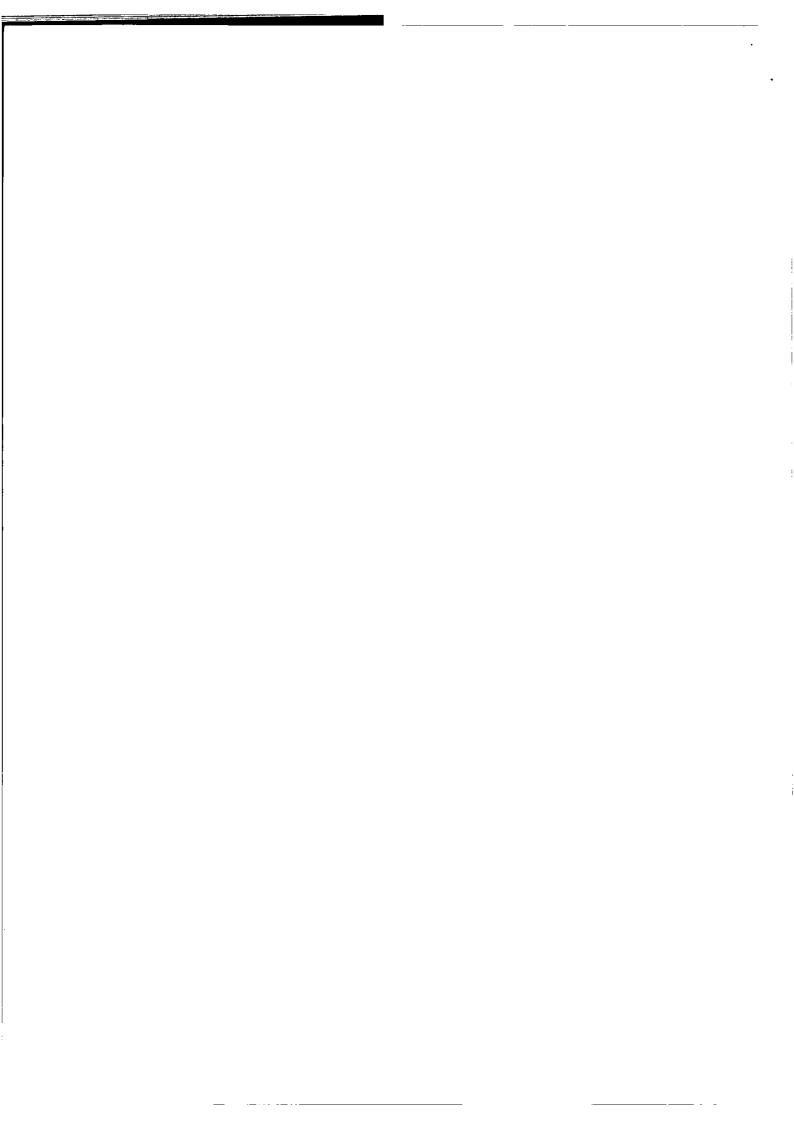
The school participates in the Teachers' Pension Scheme (England and Wales) ("the Scheme"), for its teaching staff. This is a multi-employer defined benefits pension scheme and it is not possible or appropriate to identify the assets and liabilities of the Scheme which are attributable to the School.

The latest actuarial valuation of the Scheme by the Government Actuary issued in October 2006 relating to the period 1 April 2001 to 31 March 2004 revealed that the total liabilities of the Scheme (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) exceeded the value of the Scheme's assets (estimated future contributions together with the proceeds from the notional investments held at the valuation date) by 2.0%.

From 1 January 2007, and as part of the cost-sharing agreement between employers' and teachers' representatives, the standard contribution has been assessed at 19.75%, with a supplementary contribution of 0.75% to balance the Scheme's assets and liabilities within 15 years as required by the regulations. This translates into an employer contribution rate of 14.1% and an employee contribution rate of 6.4%. The cost-sharing agreement has also introduced – effective for the first time from the 2008 valuation – a 14% cap on employer contributions payable.

The RGS Non-Academic Staff Pension Scheme

The RGS Non-Academic Staff Pension Scheme is a fully insured money purchase scheme for all permanent RGS staff who are not entitled to join the Teachers Pension Scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company in an independently administered fund.

28. RELATED PARTIES

The School shares some trustees with the RGS Educational Trust, a charity the main purpose of which is to provide income towards bursaries for some pupils of the school. The School maintains a bank account on behalf of the Trust in respect of donations towards the Trust's campaign appeal and the school has met the Trust's campaign appeal costs totalling £31,877 (2007: £61,537). The contribution towards bursaries by the Trust this year amounted to £474,884 (2007: £288,080).

As at 31 July 2008, £5,418 (2007: £2,608) is included within debtors in respect of accountancy and audit fees paid by the school on behalf of the Trust.

29. REGISTERED CHARITY AND TRADING SUBSIDIARY

The Newcastle upon Tyne Royal Grammar School is a charitable company limited by guarantee, company number 5664801 and is registered with the Charity Commission with a registration number 1114424.
