# **DIRECTORS' REPORT**

# FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

The directors present their annual report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020.

### Principal activities

The principal activity of the company is the provision of loan stock to Bristol PFI Limited, a company whose principal activities are the provision of design, construction, finance and facilities management services to Bristol City Council in relation to four schools over a contract period of 28 years.

# Going concern

The directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies in the notes to the financial statements.

# COVID-19 risk

The company acts as a financing vehicle for its parent company IIC Bristol Infrastructure Limited. As such, the company does not generate any turnover or have any costs other than financing costs, which are on-loaned to Bristol PFI Limited. The company would therefore only be impacted by the coronavirus outbreak insofar as this impacted the ability of Bristol PFI Limited to service its debt obligations to the company. The impact of the coronavirus outbreak on Bristol PFI Limited is detailed in the Director's report of that company's annual financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020. There is expected to be no impact on the cashflows of Bristol PFI Limited and therefore the Directors consider that Bristol PFI Limited will be able to service its debt obligations to the company as they fall due. Consequently, the Directors consider that the company will be able to meet its own debt obligations in turn.

The directors therefore consider that the COVID-19 outbreak will have no impact on the financial statements, or on the ability of the Company to continue as a going concern.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

### 1 Accounting policies

# **Company information**

Bristol PFI Debt Co 1 Limited is a private company limited by shares incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 8 White Oak Square, London Road, Swanley, Kent, BR8 7AG.

#### 1.1 Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 as applicable to companies subject to the small companies regime. The disclosure requirements of section 1A of FRS 102 have been applied other than where additional disclosure is required to show a true and fair view.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £'000.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

In these financial statements, the Company is considered to be a qualifying entity for the purposes of FRS 102 (for the purposes of FRS) and has applied the exemptions available under FRS 102 in respect of the following disclosures:

Section 7 'Statement of Cash Flows': Presentation of a statement of cash flow and related notes and disclosures;

Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instrument Issues': Interest income/expense and net gains/losses for each category of financial instrument; basis of determining fair values; details of collateral, loan defaults or breaches, details of hedges, hedging fair value changes recognised in profit or loss and in other comprehensive income;

Section 33 'Related Party Disclosures': Compensation for key management personnel.

# 1.2 Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which the directors consider to be appropriate for the following reasons.

The company acts as a financing vehicle for its parent company IIC Bristol Infrastructure Limited. As such, the company does not generate any turnover or have any costs other than financing costs, which are onloaned to Bristol PFI Limited. The company would therefore only be impacted by the coronavirus outbreak insofar as this impacted the ability of Bristol PFI Limited to service its debt obligations to the company. The impact of the coronavirus outbreak on Bristol PFI Limited is detailed in the Director's report of that company's annual financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020. There is expected to be no impact on the cashflows of Bristol PFI Limited and therefore the director's consider that Bristol PFI Limited will be able to service its debt obligations to the company as they fall due. Consequently, the director's consider that the company will be able to meet its own debt obligations in turn.

Consequently, the directors at the time of approving the financial statements have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

# 1.3 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are basic financial assets and include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

#### 1.4 Financial instruments

The company has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the company's balance sheet when the company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

### Classification of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.

# Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors, bank loans, loans from fellow group companies and preference shares that are classified as debt, are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

# 1.5 Equity instruments

Equity instruments issued by the company are recorded at the proceeds received, net of transaction costs. Dividends payable on equity instruments are recognised as liabilities once they are no longer at the discretion of the company.

#### 1.6 Taxation

The tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

#### Current tax

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from net profit as reported in the statement of comprehensive income because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The company's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting end date.

# 2 Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

There are no critical accounting judgements in applying the company's accounting policies.

8 Taxation (Continued)

For the year ended 31 December 2020, the UK Corporation tax rate of 19% (2019: 19%) is applied.

The Finance Act 2016 reduced the corporation tax rate to 17% with effect from 1 April 2020 and so this rate was used in the December 2019 deferred tax calculations. In the Budget of 11 March 2020, the Chancellor of the Exchequer announced that the planned rate reduction to 17% would no longer be taking effect. The changes announced during the Budget of 11 March 2020 were substantively enacted as at the 2020 balance sheet date, therefore, all opening deferred taxation balances have been remeasured at 19% with an adjustment recognised in the 2020 total tax charge.

Skanska TAM Limited had a 100% shareholding in Bristol PFI Debt Co 1 Limited up to the 27th of October 2020, at which point Skanska TAM Limited sold these shareholdings to IIC Bristol Infrastructure Limited. No money had been paid to Skanska TAM Limited in 2020 from Bristol PFI Debt Co 1 Limited. The rights to all amounts due to Skanska TAM Limited at the 27 October 2020 from Bristol PFI Debt Co 1 Limited, were transferred to IIC Bristol Infrastructure Limited.

Bristol PFI Debt Co 1 Limited holds loan notes of £3,737,788 (2019: £3,832,837) issued by Bristol PFI Limited. At the year end, total interest accrued on this loan amounts to £117,766 (2019: £123,854). Bristol PFI Debt Co 1 Limited is related to Bristol PFI Limited by virtue of being under common influence of IIC Bristol Infrastructure Limited.

# 14 Ultimate controlling party

The company's immediate parent is IIC Bristol Infrastructure Limited, a company incorporated in England and Wales.

The directors consider there to be no ultimate controlling party.

The results of the company are not consolidated in any other financial statement.
