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The directors present their strategic report of the company for the year ended 31 December 2022.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND BUSINESS REVIEW

The company is a special purpose entity which was set up for the Ministry of Defence's (MoD) Allenby and Connaught project. The project is a 35 year concession, which began in 2006, to maintain the estates in Aldershot and the Salisbury Plain areas under the Government's Private Finance Initiative ("PFI"). The company is providing a broad range of services through delivery sub-contractors - Aspire Defence Services Limited ("ADSL"), that provides management services, maintenance services, and a range of soft services comprising security services, other support services, stores services and transport services, MUJV (a multi-utility joint venture) that provides utilities services and Sodexo that provides retail and accommodation services, including cleaning and catering. These activities are delivered through the Aspire Defence Services ("ADS") unincorporated joint venture, which is a 50/50 joint venture between the company and KBR (Aspire Services Ventures) Limited.

During the year ended 31 December 2022, the ADS Joint Venture between the company and KBR (Aspire Services Ventures) Limited has continued to provide services as described above to the ultimate customer the MOD and to continue to deliver project work to MOD and ADL. The financial stability of the company as a trading entity is secure, underwritten by a contract running until 2041.

RESULTS

The profit for the year, after taxation, amounted to £2,484,000 (2021: profit after tax £3,730,000). The net assets at the end of the year totalled £3,088,000 (2021: net assets £3,864,000).

Performance against key metrics is covered within the Strategic Report sections concerning Financial Performance, Key Performance Indicators, Health and Safety Performance.

The Directors of the Joint Venture exercise their authority through ongoing review of the performance of ADS, including a bi-monthly Board Meeting, which covers ADS, ADSL and Aspire Defence Capital Works (ADCW) but reviews the full scope of activities from financial and health & safety performance, operational performance, human resources and staffing issues, commercial and an update on the status of capital projects. The transaction approval

matrix defines transaction values and specific activities where Board approval is required, providing additional governance. In addition, there is ongoing dialogue concerning significant business issues and active involvement in managing health & safety, including the performance of leadership visits through which Board members visit operational facilities, assess the health & safety climate but also engage with the workforce.

Through the Board meetings the Directors are appraised of any customer issues or concerns and the contractual and health & safety performance of ADS' sub-contractors. Through customer surveys the Directors have visibility of customer perceptions of the services being provided. They recognise the obligations ADS has towards its customer and encourage ADS to focus upon satisfying the customer and reflecting appropriate business behaviours.

Business Model

ADS holds the contract placed by ADL for the delivery of services under the project to the UK Ministry of Defence ("MOD") and outsources these services through a number of sub-contracts. In addition, ADSL delivers project work within the project framework on behalf of ADS.

All performance obligations flow through ADS to the delivery sub-contractors, with ADSL assuming responsibility for its own performance but also for managing MUJV and Sodexo. ADS is managed by the Senior Leadership Team of ADSL with contractual and financial reporting being exercised through ADSL and reports issued to a Services Board comprising KBR executives which covers both ADS and ADSL.

Under the terms of the project, ADS have a 35-year contract running until 2041, with the hard facilities management contracts to ADSL and MUJV having a similar duration. The other sub-contracts to ADSL and Sodexo are of 7 years duration, the contracts expired in July 2023, and therefore a benchmarking review has been performed. The process has concluded and customer agreement reached to extend contracts with all the existing service providers. Please see further comments under the going concern section of this report.

In this context, the strategy of ADS is to ensure contractual obligations are satisfied.

Business Review

The ADS Joint Venture commenced operations on 5 January 2004. The principal activities through to July 2006 were the set up and establishment of the Joint Venture's organisation and associated facilities, and the development of the contract management systems and contract mobilisation activity. Service Commencement marked the Joint Venture taking responsibility for the delivery of services under its contract in July 2006.

During 2022, the ADS Joint Venture between KBR (Aspire Services) Limited and KBR (Aspire Services Ventures) Limited has continued to provide services as described above to the ultimate customer, the MOD and to continue to deliver project work to MOD and ADL. The financial stability of ADS as a trading entity is secure, underwritten by a contract running for a further 19 years underpinned by KBR Parent Company guarantees.

FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risks of the business revolve around the sub-contractors' ability to satisfy their contractual obligations. Throughout the year ended 31 December 2022, the mitigation of the operational risks was robustly addressed, without impact on the business.

In respect of 2022, ADS' financial performance has not been significantly impacted by restrictions imposed by the government and the company continued to deliver services and projects. No contractual adjustments were necessary as the company has delivered against the full range of services managed through the full contractual KPI provisions.

The economic uncertainty that the war in Ukraine, COVID-19 pandemic and BREXIT, combined with political uncertainty, has had an impact on material supplies and fuel prices. Due to the PFI contractual framework, ADS passes operational and financial risks directly through to the service providers, ADSL, Sodexo and MUJV, in which context the Directors do not consider there to be any other principal risks or uncertainties that are material to the company.

The performance, risks and uncertainties relating to ADS directly translate to the company as it has no other operations or activities.

Key performance indicators

The board monitors the performance of the company through the use of key performance indicators, which are related to financial performance, health and safety performance and a number of operational metrics. In addition, the contract requires detailed reporting to the client (MoD) with respect to performance measures covering a number of areas. In respect of the year ended 31 December 2022, the company's performance against these measures was satisfactory.

Financial Performance

The Joint Venture develops detailed annual budgets and forecasts providing a 3-year outlook which are reviewed regularly.

For the year ended 31 December 2022 the Company's profit for the financial year amounted to £2,484,000 (2021; £3,730,000) which was slightly above the expectations of shareholders.

In addition, the cash position exceeded the budget targets, with cash being paid as dividends totalling to £3,260,000 (2021 - £4,650,000).

The financial performance is driven by the contractual framework through which the Main Contract performance reflects the contract price and sub-contractual costs, both of which are contractually defined, and project work which flows through ADS without any margin being taken. Therefore, the profit for the financial year is predictable and the 2022 financial performance broadly met the expectations of the Directors.

In addition, cash management is reported to senior members of the finance team on a weekly basis to provide effective cash management. The company's balance sheet is relatively simple, and as the contractual arrangements for invoicing the customer and paying sub-contractors are clearly defined cash forecasting is straightforward, with distributions paid to Shareholders based on monthly net profit performance. These arrangements operated effectively throughout the year ended 2022.

Health and Safety performance

The Joint Venture is committed to providing a safe environment for its employees and those impacted by its activities. The Joint Venture monitors actual performance in relation to RIDDOR (Reporting of Injuries, Diseases and Dangerous Occurrences Regulations), discussing these at the monthly Board Meetings which also considers any specific incidents reported in month.

In addition, metrics are provided concerning leadership visits performed by senior managers (including Board members), safety conversations held with staff and courage to care reports received (a mechanism through which staff are encouraged to report any Health & Safety concerns).

In respect of the year ended 31 December 2022, the Company's performance against targets set was satisfactory, with four reportable incidents being incurred so that the recordable incident rate of reportable incidents per 200,000 worked hours (RIR) of 0.14 was slightly worse than the target of 0.12 set by the Directors.

Dividends

During 2022, the directors recommended and paid a dividend of £3,260,000 (2021 - £4,650,000).

Events after the end of the reporting period

There were no events after the balance sheet date that impact the profit and loss account or balance sheet.

Suppliers, customers and other business relationships

The company through ADS and ADSL has an extensive Supply Chain reflecting the diversity of its serviced and project obligations. The relationship with Sodexo and MUJV, which operates due to ADSL managing the performance of those suppliers on behalf of ADS, is very effective, reflecting the integrated nature of the service provision. This is evidenced by working together on health & safety initiatives and in engagement with the customer concerning service delivery and any contract changes under engagement. There are also strong relationships with strategic suppliers whether delivering defined services or with regular projects sub-contractors.

The relationship with our ultimate customer is very strong extending beyond the contractual obligations such that we work with the customer to help provide solutions to their problems. Internal surveys that we carry out amongst our staff highlight the genuine pride in working to support the soldiers and the understanding of the military requirements exhibited by our staff and sub-contractors is a key source of strength.

In addition, the company works closely with ADL, who place the contract on ADS.

ADS's contract places an obligation to undertake customer surveys which evidence the positive relationships we have developed and reputation we have secured whilst also identifying any areas where our performance is causing concerns.

Energy and Carbon Reporting Disclosure

KBR (Aspire Services) Limited is committed to minimising any adverse environmental effects resulting from the operations of its JV's business and engage in environmental audits to demonstrate compliance to our environmental requirements. We ensure that this policy is communicated and understood by our subcontractors. We work in partnership with the MoD and our supply chain to promote best practice environmental management.

We ensure that our core environmental principles are implemented through our business processes as part of the management system. Our management system complies with the requirements of BS EN ISO14001. The company is a subsidiary of Kellogg Brown & Root Holdings Limited which prepares consolidated accounts containing the Energy and Carbon Reporting Disclosure in its Director's Report.

The Company does not employ any staff and all work is carried out through subcontractors.

Political donations

There were no political donations made during the year (2021 - £Nil).

Future outlook

The directors continue to evaluate new and existing markets to pursue any opportunities which will improve the performance and value of the company to its shareholders.

Financial instruments

Aspire Defence Services (JV) are fully funded by normal trading operations, have no credit facilities and face limited business risk due to operating a long-term government contract underwritten by Parent Company Guarantees. In addition, performance obligations are contractually flowed down to the service providers, ADSL, MUJV and Sodexo.

Going concern

The Directors have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis which they consider appropriate for the following reasons.

At the balance sheet date, the company was in a net current asset position of £3,088,000 (including cash at bank and in hand of £5,310,000), a net asset position of £3,088,000 and is the holder (via its ADS JV) of a long-term facilities management contract running until 2041, as part of a private finance initiative (the ultimate customer being the UK Ministry of Defence).

Contractual arrangements entitle ADS to make a contractual margin on sub-contracted activities and as performance risk flows through to their sub-contractors the profitability of ADS is secured. In addition, the payment terms embedded in the contract protect ADS's liquidity.

As noted under the Business Model section of the strategic report, the soft services elements of the subcontracts to ADSL and Sodexo are subject to market testing and benchmarking on a periodic basis. The last review concluded July 2023 having been substantially performed during 2022, with agreed price changes to be implemented from 1st July 2023. The impact of the benchmarking is a minor reduction in price for some elements of the contract however the soft services contracts remain profitable.

Consequently, the directors are confident that the company will have sufficient funds to continue to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least 12 months from the date of approval of the financial statements and therefore have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis.

Opinion

Explanation as to what extent the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. Owing to the inherent limitations of an audit, there is an unavoidable risk that material misstatement in the financial statements may not be detected, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with the ISAs (UK). The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

Based on our understanding of the company and industry, we identified that the principal risks of non-compliance with laws and regulations related to compliance with Data Privacy law, Employment Law, Environmental Regulations, and Health & Safety, and we considered the extent to which non-compliance might have a material effect on the financial statements. We also considered those laws and regulations that have a direct impact on the preparation of the financial statements such as the Companies Act 2006 and local tax legislation. We evaluated management's incentives and opportunities for fraudulent manipulation of the financial statements (including the management risk of override of controls), and determined that the principal risks were related to posting inappropriate journal entries to manipulate financial performance and management bias through judgements and assumptions in significant accounting estimates, in particular in relation to significant one-off or unusual transactions. We apply professional scepticism through the audit to consider potential deliberate omission or concealment of significant transactions, or incomplete/inaccurate disclosures in the financial statements.

- inspection and review of minutes of board meetings during the year to corroborate enquiries made;
- gaining an understanding of the internal controls established to mitigate risk related to fraud;
- discussion amongst the engagement team in relation to the identified laws and regulations and regarding the risk of fraud, and remaining alert to any indications of non-compliance or opportunities for fraudulent manipulation of financial statements throughout the audit;
- performance of journal entry testing by specific risk criteria, with a focus on manual journals and journals indicating large or unusual transactions based on our understanding of the Company's business;
- designing audit procedures to incorporate unpredictability around the nature, timing or extent of our testing;
- challenging assumptions and judgements made by management in their significant accounting estimates; and
- review of the financial statement disclosures to underlying supporting documentation and inquiries of management.

The primary responsibility for the prevention and detection of irregularities including fraud rests with those charged with governance and management. As with any audit, there remains a risk of non-detection or irregularities, as these may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations or override of internal controls.

The purpose of our audit work and to whom we owe our responsibilities

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with chapter 3 of Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006. 1. General information

The company is a private company limited by shares and is incorporated and domiciled in the United Kingdom, and registered in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Hill Park Court, Springfield Drive, Leatherhead, Surrey. KT22 7NL, United Kingdom.

2. Principal activity

The company is a special purpose entity which was set up for the Ministry of Defence's (MoD) Allenby and Connaught project. The project is a 35 year concession, which began in 2006, to maintain the estates in Aldershot and the Salisbury Plain areas under the Government's Private Finance Initiative ("PFI"). The company is providing a broad range of services through delivery sub-contractors - Aspire Defence Services Limited, that provides management services, maintenance services, and a range of soft services comprising security services, other support services, stores services and transport services, MUJV (a multi-utility joint venture) that provides utilities services and Sodexo that provides retail and accommodation services, including cleaning and catering. These activities are delivered through the Aspire Defence Services ("ADS") unincorporated joint venture, which is a 50/50 joint venture between the company and KBR (Aspire Services Ventures) Limited.

3. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', and the Companies Act 2006.

4. Accounting policies

4.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling (£), which is the functional currency of the entity.

The entity satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined in FRS 102.

The entity's financial statements are consolidated into the financial statements of KBR, Inc. (incorporated in the state of Delaware, U.S.A.) which can be obtained from the Public Relations Department, Hill Park Court, Springfield Drive, Leatherhead, Surrey KT22 7NL, United Kingdom.

The entity's financial statements are also consolidated into the financial statements of Kellogg Brown & Root Holdings Limited (incorporated in England & Wales) which can be obtained from the Public Relations Department, Hill Park Court, Springfield Drive, Leatherhead, Surrey KT22 7NL.

As such, advantage has been taken of the following disclosure exemptions available under FRS 102 in respect of the following disclosures:

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirements of Section 3 Financial Statement Presentation paragraph 3.17(d);
- the requirements of Section 11 Financial Instruments paragraphs 11.42, 11.44 to 11.45, 11.47, 11.48(a) (iii), 11.48(a)(iv), 11.48(b), 11.48(c); and
- the requirements of Section 12 Other Financial Instruments paragraphs 12.26 to 12.27, 12.29(a), 12.29(b), and 12.29A.

4. Accounting policies (continued)

4.2 Going concern

The Directors have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis which they consider appropriate for the following reasons.

At the balance sheet date, the company was in a net current asset position of £3,088,000 (including cash at bank and in hand of £5,310,000), a net asset position of £3,088,000 and is the holder (via its ADS JV) of a long-term facilities management contract running until 2041, as part of a private finance initiative (the ultimate customer being the UK Ministry of Defence).

Contractual arrangements entitle ADS to make a contractual margin on sub-contracted activities and as performance risk flows through to their sub-contractors the profitability of ADS is secured. In addition, the payment terms embedded in the contract protect ADS's liquidity.

As noted under the Business Model section of the strategic report, the soft services elements of the subcontracts to ADSL and Sodexo are subject to market testing and benchmarking on a periodic basis. The last review concluded July 2023 having been substantially performed during 2022, with agreed price changes to be implemented from 1st July 2023. The impact of the benchmarking is a minor reduction in price for some elements of the contract however the soft services contracts remain profitable.

Consequently, the directors are confident that the company will have sufficient funds to continue to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least 12 months from the date of approval of the financial statements and therefore have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis.

4.3 Interests in joint ventures

In respect of its interest in a jointly controlled asset, the Company recognises in its financial statements:

- a. its share of the jointly controlled assets, classified according to the nature of the assets;
- b. any liabilities that it has incurred;
- c. its share of any liabilities incurred jointly with the other venturers in relation to the joint venture;
- d. any income from the sale or use of its share of the output of the joint venture, together with its share of any expenses incurred by the joint venture; and
- e. any expenses that it has incurred in respect of its interest in the joint venture.

All such amounts are measured in proportion to the Company's interest in the joint asset.

4.4 Basic financial instruments

Trade and other debtors are recognised initially at transaction price less attributable transaction costs. Trade and other creditors are recognised initially at transaction price plus attributable transaction costs.

Construction contract debtors represent the gross unbilled amount for contract work performed to date. They are measured at cost plus profit recognised to date less a provision for foreseeable losses and less progress billings. Variations are included in contract revenue when they are reliably measurable and it is probable that the customer will approve the variation itself and the revenue arising from the variation. Claims are included in contract revenue only when they are reliably measurable and negotiations have reached an advanced stage such that it is probable that the customer will accept the claim. Cost includes all expenditure related directly to specific projects and an allocation of fixed and variable overheads incurred in the Company's contract activities based on normal operating capacity.

4. Accounting policies (continued)

4.4 Basic financial instruments

Construction contract debtors are presented as part of debtors in the balance sheet. If payments received from customers exceed the income recognised, then the difference is presented as accruals and deferred income in the balance sheet.

Interest-bearing borrowings are recognised initially at the present value of future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Subsequent to initial recognition, interest-bearing borrowings are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise bank balances and call deposits.

4.5 Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Directors to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses.

The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the relevant circumstances. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed by the Directors on an on-going basis.

The income and sub-contract costs are contractually defined, and due to the contractual framework surrounding ADS any performance issues flow down to the service providers, Aspire Defence Services Limited, Sodexo and MUJV.

The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are addressed below.

· Revenue Recognition on Project Work

To apply the percentage of Completion method of Revenue Recognition on project work, margin and revenue has been assessed on an individual project basis. A judgement has been applied in recognition of Lifecycle Gainshare revenue encompassing the reasonable certainty over the a collection of payment in accordance with payment terms of the Services contract.

4.6 Turnover

Turnover represents the value of work performed for customers (net of value added tax and other sales taxes). Turnover in respect of services is recognised as the Joint Venture fulfils its contractual obligations in respect of those services and in line with the fair value of the consideration receivable in respect of those services.

For Services, Turnover is recognised based on amounts invoiced to the Customer as services are delivered in accordance with the contractual terms and conditions.

For Projects, Turnover is recognised when the risks and rewards have transferred to the Customer, reflecting project or milestone completion, with an adjustment to reflect part completed projects to align turnover recognition with the percentage completion method.

Revenue from the rendering of services is measured by reference to the stage of completion of the service transaction at the end of the reporting period provided that the outcome can be reliably estimated. When the outcome cannot be reliably estimated, revenue is recognised only to the extent that it is probable the expenses recognised will be recovered.

4. Accounting policies (continued)

4.6 Turnover (continued)

ADS has an entitlement to Lifecycle Gainshare revenue in accordance with the payment terms of the Services Contract, which outlines the basis of calculation and payment conditions. Revenue is recognised when it is considered reasonably certain that right over payment is established.

4.7 Income tax

The taxation expense represents the aggregate amount of current and deferred tax recognised in the reporting period. Tax is recognised in profit or loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, tax is recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Current tax is recognised on taxable profit for the current and past periods. Current tax is measured at the amounts of tax expected to pay or recover using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences at the reporting date. Unrelieved tax losses and other deferred assets are recognised to the extent it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits. Deferred tax is measured using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date that are expected to apply to the reversal of the timing difference.

4.8 Foreign currencies

Monetary foreign currency denominated assets and liabilities are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange prevailing at the year end. The results of foreign currency operations are translated at average rates of exchange during the year. All gains and losses arising on translation are included in other operating expenses in the profit and loss account. Monetary foreign currency denominated assets and liabilities are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange prevailing at the year end. The results of foreign currency operations are translated at average rates of exchange during the year. All gains and losses arising on translation are included in administrative expenses in the profit and loss account.

4.9 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event, it is probable that the entity will be required to transfer economic benefits in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be estimated reliably. Provisions are recognised as a liability in the statement of financial position and the amount of the provision as an expense.

Provisions are initially measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date and subsequently reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate of the amount that would be required to settle the obligation. Any adjustments to the amounts previously recognised are recognised in profit or loss unless the provision was originally recognised as part of the cost of an asset. When a provision is measured at the present value of the amount expected to be required to settle the obligation, the unwinding of the discount is recognised as a finance cost in profit or loss in the period it arises.

4.10 Contingencies

Contingent liabilities are not recognised, except those acquired in a business combination. Contingent liabilities arise as a result of past events when (i) it is not probable that there will be an outflow of resources or that the amount cannot be reliably measured at the reporting date or (ii) when the existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of uncertain future events not wholly within the group's control. Contingent liabilities are disclosed in the financial statements unless the probability of an outflow of resources is remote.

4.10 Contingencies

Contingent assets are not recognised. Contingent assets are disclosed in the financial statements when an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

4.11 VAT

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of value added tax (VAT), except where the amount of VAT incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In these circumstances, the VAT is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or part of the expense.

Debtors and creditors are stated with the amount of VAT included.

The net amount of VAT recoverable from, or payable to, the the taxation authority is included within current debtors or creditors in the Statement of Financial Position.
