### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 December 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and activities

The charity's activities are to support young people with a learning disability to live life as independently as they can. We aim to achieve this by supporting them to engage in meaningful education and learning activities, gain meaningful employment, live independently in homes they choose, build a social network and ultimately become an integral part of their community.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake. Two trustees attended safeguarding training in 2014.

#### Significant activities

The principal activity of the charity in the year under review was to provide benefit to young people with a disability in the Surrey area and surrounds.

The halow project is a registered charity dedicated to creating opportunities and supporting young people aged 16-35 with a learning disability so that they are able to live independent, meaningful, fulfilled lives and become more involved in their local community.

The young people we work with want the opportunity to:

- Build relationships
- Become part of the community
- Find meaningful employment
- Have a home of their own

halow project is a registered charity providing opportunities and support for young people to access social activities, community based learning and work like experiences. Our work is funded through a mixed model of fees, fundraising and enterprise.

Our social enterprise, halow care, is a not-for-profit community interest company which runs alongside the halow project. halow care provides 1:1 support for young people through our halow Buddy Service and Supported Living Service. We aim that any surplus from these services should support our charitable activities.

#### Public benefit

The charity's trustees have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, they have considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities halow project business priorities for 2016

As reported previously, 2015 saw good progress on a number of strategic priorities. 2016 saw an increased focus on development of programmes and quality of services as well as further investment on infrastructure especially our recruitment, training and staff welfare. As part of this work Trustees and managers reviewed the last strategic plan and developed a new plan for 2017-2019 through a Staff Away Day and Trustee Away Day and follow up meetings. The strategic review in 2014 identified five priorities for the next three years, namely to;

- 1. Reach out to more young people between 16-19 years old bridging out from school and college into the community, and develop a deeper engagement with parents.
- 2. Develop our programmes Building Futures and A Reason To Get Up, building on the successes and learnings of the last few years.
- 3. Embed seeking and matching young people with meaningful employment opportunities across all our programmes.
- 4. Continue to develop our social enterprise, halow care, increasing the turnover of our halow Buddy and halow Supported Living services, to support our charitable work. (Please see halow care accounts for this report)
- 5. Improve our impact by investing in our infrastructure, systems and support for our staff and volunteers.

The Trustees are pleased to report progress in all areas identified in 2016. In particular the key areas of focus were items 2 and 5.

### 1. Reach out to more young people between 16-19 years old bridging out from school and college into the community and develop a deeper engagement with parents

Closer relationships with schools and regular communications with schools and their SENCO were further developed through email updates and visits by our Social Activities team. halow was represented at two Transition Events in Surrey and at parent conferences and were invited to speak at other provider meetings in Surrey. The offer of free taster sessions, assemblies and working proactively internally and externally to support young people to access funds for social activities where possible further improved this goal.

Across 2016 over 100 young people took part in halow's Social Activities programme, across our varied day time, evening and weekend sessions and trips.

Across the year the development of our Fit for Life programme, encouraging young people to engage in active fun activities to benefit their physical and mental health and wellbeing, secured funding for an increased programme of a weekly sports group, sports tasters sessions and sports coaching partnerships with Harlequins Foundation, Surrey Wheels 4 All and Guildford Archery. This Sport for Life programme funded by Sport England had been accessed by 40 young people by the end of 2016.

We are very grateful to all our funders who support this vital element of our core provision for young people. Special thanks go to Surrey Short Breaks and Sport England for their funding in support of the Social Activities to ensure a lively and engaging social programme throughout the year for all ages.

### 2. Develop our programmes Building Futures and A Reason To Get Up, building on the successes and learnings of the last few years.

#### **Building Futures**

At the beginning of 2016 a recruitment plan for a new Building Futures Manager was put into place to recruit a manager to oversee the development of this one year course (our community based life skills and personal development course) into a three year rolling programme which would provide the opportunity for young people to enjoy an intensive three year programme to develop their independence skills and move them on to longer term opportunities. This allows young people to develop with the programme at their own pace and either to join at different years or move on from one to the other as required.

#### Charitable activities

In May the new manager was in place and the curriculum written. Twenty young people were recruited for Year A and Year B to start in September 2016. To support the programme Year Leaders and Support/Project workers for each group were also recruited.

New community delivery partners were identified to link the programme into community organisations to support the programme. These included Wild Learning and Barclays Lifeskills who we are delighted to add to our range of local partners working with our young people.

The curriculum remained based around the focus on key session themes to enable young people to share, learn and explore their own talents and strengths and work together to move themselves forward in all areas to enable them to create their own person centred plans. The personalised approach to ongoing planning across the year and use of small peer groups continues to allow the programme to make excellent progress for young people.

#### A Reason To Get Up

For young people who are no longer in full time education there is a need for meaningful daytime activities. halow's A Reason To Get Up fulfils this need whilst also working with young people on their own personal goals which can include becoming ready for work and applying for jobs. In 2016 A Reason To Get Up provided activities focusing on health and fitness, horticulture, IT skills and arts and crafts. In 2016 there was a review of the content of the sessions and a move to see a change of community partners to help deliver these. A new programme was put together to be delivered from 2017.

The engagement pathways for this programme focus on the model of meaningful activities with shared team goals and individual goals, tangible results with opportunities for showcasing talents linking in with the Fundraising & Communications team for opportunities with local organisations/businesses.

The sessions are small group sessions and across 2016 between 30 and 40 young people accessed A Reason to Get Up developing their confidence, independence, creative and IT skills. Several young people had interviews for paid work, developed their CV's or moved into their own home.

### 3. Embed seeking and matching young people with meaningful employment opportunities across all our programmes

In March 2016 we launched our Disability Works campaign with an event at the House of Commons hosted by Anne Milton MP. Working with Citigroup we announced our Disability Works campaign which would work across our programmes to help young people get ready to work whilst engaging with local businesses to forge opportunities for work place visits, work experience and paid work for young people with a learning disability.

We recognise that our work across all programmes develops Employability skills for young people including confidence, teamwork, leadership as well as building stamina for regular work and discussing expectations of employers. For those young people who want to work we can work towards this within their personal goals and aim to create opportunities for them through our supporter network.

During 2016 we also joined the Steering Group for the SEND Employment Project - a joint project run by Surrey Youth Forum and Surrey Chamber of Commerce aiming to increase employment for young people with learning disabilities in Surrey. This initiative is currently exploring how providers and employers in Surrey can work together on this.

Through this initiative Waitrose Guildford put on a work experience placement for eligible young people. Two young people had a part time placement with Waitrose, learning a vast array of skills and learning about the expectations of employers and how to work in a team. Following the completion of this work placement both young people went on to successfully apply for and secure paid work. We are indebted to Waitrose for this valuable experience and support given to the young people involved. We continue to seek partnerships with local employers to create opportunities for young people.

4. Continue to develop our social enterprise, halow care, increasing the volume of our halow Buddy and halow Supported Living services, to support our charitable work

The details of progress in this area are presented in the 2016 accounts for halow care.

5. Improve our impact by investing in our infrastructure, systems and support for our staff and volunteers.

In 2016 we continued with our three priorities within this area namely

- 1) Recruitment and HR
- 2) Quality of delivery and Outcomes for young people
- 3) Financial management and development of the governance of the organisation

#### Recruitment and HR

Staff across both halow project and its sister organisation, halow care, were affected by the various challenges in halow care due to care sector wide contractual issues, impacting staff morale and financial requirements. In January 2016, with the new post of Head of Business Support and Development and with the aid on an external consultant, a review of HR and Recruitment took place which led to a new improved recruitment process, induction and training plan for new recruits as well as an organisation-wide training plan being put into place. In addition the Staff Welfare agenda sought to ensure we improved retention of staff researching possible staff benefit schemes, planning for the auto-enrolment pension and arranging a Staff Away Day and staff socials. We also reviewed our IT support and infrastructure and developed a project to develop this in early 2017.

#### **Quality and Outcomes:**

Recognising that our staff are our primary asset in delivering our quality services, our commitment to their training, supervision and development was renewed.

With an impending CQC inspection we took the opportunity to have an CQC Audit carried out by an independent adviser to ensure that our regulated services continue to be on target for our inspection. This commitment to continuous improvement was commended by our inspector when the visit took place in November in 2016 giving an overall rating of GOOD. (See more details in our halow care accounts)

#### Financial Management:

The focus on robust accounting systems and business centre analysis for the Trustees governance continued throughout 2016, bringing in house the ability to produce our own management accounts and begin to look at future business models for our services. The board of Trustees introduced a Finance Sub Committee meeting quarterly to review remuneration, budgets, tracking and business analysis. This Sub Committee also reviews the management accounts prior to the full Trustee Meeting.

#### Governance:

2016 also saw a Governance Audit carried out by an external adviser and an action plan to ensure the organisation (and its sister organisation halow care) would be ready for the changes coming up in charity legislation and governance best practice. A review of Memorandum and Articles took place during 2016, as well as a board Trustee recruitment strategy to be actioned in 2017.

In 2016 across the charity we provided 12,900 hours of activities, care and support for young people accessing our programmes.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Feedback from young people and families on halow staff continues to be good, remarking on the positive relationships formed, the progress made towards their goals and the safety and happiness of young people accessing halow project services. Quotes from young people and parents from 2016 include:

We are grateful to all those who have been a part of this charity and we hope you will continue to join us in meeting meet the ongoing challenges of nurturing and enabling independence in young people with a learning disability in Surrey and surrounds.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Financial review

The financial accounts for the year ended December 2016 show net outgoing resources of £35,535 (2015: net incoming resources of £104,050) as shown on the Statement of Financial Activities on Page 9.

Income decreased by £63,972 (12%) over 2015. It was derived from several sources including charitable activities, trusts and grants. Main fundraising activities during the year included halow's annual bike ride raising in excess of £70K, a Houses of Parliament dinner hosted by Anne Milton MP raising over £30k and the annual karting event which raised approximately £20K. halow also continued to engage with more grant making trusts and companies as part of its fundraising activities.

The charity was pleased to donate £35k to halow care to underwrite the set-up costs of opening two new supported living houses in 2016.

#### Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 19 May 2006 and registered as a charity. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which defined the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee. The Trustees are not subject to retirement by rotation. The Trustees are formally elected to the Board of Trustees at a full meeting of the Trustees.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Current Trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity. Prior to the appointment as a new Trustee, the candidate is met by individual Trustees and officers of the charity to ensure that he/she is fully aware of the requirements and the statutory duties of a Trustee, and to ensure that the person is suitable to hold such an appointment.

#### Organisational structure

halow project has a management team that met approximately every 6 weeks in 2014. It is responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the committee has 6 members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility rests with the Director. The Directors are responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and has responsibility for day to day operational management.

#### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The Management Committee regularly discusses the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Systems and procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. A strategic fundraising plan developed in 2014 focuses on diversity of funding and activities to mitigate these risks, should they occur. Internal cost control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for overseeing and authorising major transactions and projects.

### INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF HALOW PROJECT

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2016 set out on pages nine to nineteen.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under Section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act)) and that an independent examination is required. #### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the income can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Donations, gifts and legacies are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Legacies are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to them.

Investment income is included when received.

Income from charitable activities and activities for generating funds include fundraising event income and grants receivable. Fundraising event income is recognised when received, whilst grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which the charity becomes entitled to them.

#### Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure is inclusive of VAT.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting donations and legacies and the cost of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such services and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% straight line

All assets costing more than £100 are capitalised.

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside at the discretion of the trustees to be used for a specific purpose.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Fund accounting - continued

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

#### **Debtors**

Other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due.

#### Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any discounts due.

#### Transition to FRS 102

No accounting policies have changed as a result of the adoption of the new Charities SORP FRS 102. The implementation of FRS 102 has had no other effect on the financial statements.

#### **Key Judgements and Accounting Estimates**

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates.

The main judgement and accounting estimates included in the accounts are:

- Deferral of grant income Income is recognised when halow project is entitled to the income and this will be based on the work being completed and there is no requirement to repay the grant.
- Provisions Management has made estimates and established provisions in respect of potential liabilities as at the balance sheet date.

#### Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

#### **Employee benefits**
