REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Principal activities

The principal activity of the charity in the year under review was to provide benefit to young people with a disability in Surrey and the surrounds.

The **halow project** is a registered charity dedicated to creating opportunities and supporting young people aged 16-35 with a learning disability so that they are able to live independent, meaningful, fulfilled lives and become more involved in their local community.

The young people we work with want the opportunity to:

- Build relationships
- · Become part of the community
- Find meaningful employment
- Have a home of their own

halow project is a registered charity providing opportunities and support for young people to access social activities, community-based learning and work like experiences. Our work is funded through a mixed model of fees, fundraising and enterprise.

During 2018 halow project supported 200 young people and their families across our services and activities; Social Activities, A Reason To Get Up and Building Futures.

In total halow project provided 36,695 of care during 2018.

Our social enterprise, halow care, is a not-for-profit community interest company which runs alongside the halow project. halow care provides 1:1 support for young people through our halow Buddy Service and Supported Living Service. We aim that any surplus from these services should support our charitable activities.

halow project business priorities for 2018

Our Mission for 2018 - 2020 is

To develop innovative and responsive services across both organisations, led by a skilled, supported and committed workforce, to meet the needs of young people with a learning disability to live, learn, socialise and work in the community.

Our business objectives for 2018 were

- 1. all services to continue to be high quality, innovative, person-centred and to exceed expectations of the young people themselves, families, commissioners and the local community.
- 2. To ensure the Social Activities programme is suitable for all age groups with over 100 participants
- 3. To achieve a fully subscribed 3 year rolling Building Futures programme with excellent outcomes for all
- 4. To ensure a long-term meaningful daytime delivery through A Reason To Get Up to include opportunities to access work experience, placement and paid roles as appropriate through our "Disability Works" campaign
- 5. To ensure a staff team, volunteers and governance board with identified skills to support the delivery of the business plan
- 6. To ensure a well-equipped and modern work space for our staff and visiting stakeholders

The Trustee Directors are pleased to report progress in all areas identified in 2018.

The delivery of halow's quality services and programmes for people with a learning disability in Surrey in 2018 has been financially complex due to a combination of internal restructuring required for our Fundraising Team, and also severe financial restrictions on commissioning from Surrey County Council. However, it is a credit to our teams that we were able to deliver services for more young people than in previous years and to end the year in a much-improved financial position.

All services to continue to be high quality, innovative, person centred and to exceed expectations of the young people themselves, families, commissioners and the local community.

In 2018 the quality drive and values work continued across all areas. The Quality, Values and Standards Sub Committee continued to monitor audits and action plans in each service in halow project. Staff were consulted and received further reflective training in the halow Values at the Staff Away Days in April and October.

Managers led the actions for improvement and reporting to the Quality Sub Committee, and received training on Supervision (including performance management) and Coaching.

Surveys were undertaken in all areas to gain feedback from young people and families on the range of services.

Mental Health Awareness training and Mental Health First Aid training was implemented for staff to strengthen the skills base of our staff.

To ensure the Social Activities programme is suitable for all age groups with over 100 participants

The Social Activities programme had a visible presence in schools, colleges, residential settings and at transition events across the county in 2018 and a range of activities for 16-19yr olds, 20+ group and all ages. We also saw an increase in take up in our activities with 137 young people accessing Social Activities in 2018.

For the first 6 months of the year we focussed on our activities and marketing. A change in staffing in the Summer meant that we reduced activities by one fortnightly session but began working with our trusts fundraiser on exploring new funding for further expansion.

The quality audits of the service continued to provide good feedback on our existing offer especially around the range of activities, particularly in holiday times, and the value of a regular structure of social activities for young people to take part in and to provide respite for parents.

Volunteers are vital in the delivery of these services and throughout the year we have maintained required volunteer levels and good longstanding relationships with many of our volunteers. We are grateful to them all for the many hours of support they provide.

Social Activities continues to be a well regarded and for some young people a lifeline connecting them to other support as and when needed. Our Social Activities team were able to offer support in a number of areas of crisis for young people outside the delivery of activities through the engagement of young people in this programme.

To achieve a fully subscribed 3 year rolling Building Futures programme with excellent outcomes for all

2018 saw the end of the first pilot Year C for Building Futures. Surrey Commissioners were very impressed with the outcomes of all years of the programme, and representatives attended our End of Year Award Ceremony in July. September 2018 saw the first time we had a three-year programme commissioned by Surrey County Council. We are pleased to welcome young people from across Surrey onto this course, from London Borough of Sutton and also from Hampshire for the first time. In particular, Year C allows us to further develop outcomes for young people around employability skills and moving on into paid part time jobs.

2017-2018 programme year saw 26 young people benefit from the Building Futures programme.

We worked with commissioners, social work teams, brokers, schools and colleges to ensure families would be aware of this programme for 2018 and beyond.

Partnerships with community organisations are vital for this programme as for our other work and we are grateful to the many venues, services and local charities that work with us to help deliver the programme.

To ensure a long term meaningful day time delivery through A Reason To Get Up groups - to include opportunities to access work experience, placement and paid roles as appropriate through our "Disability Works" campaign

The day time activity groups - IT Crowd, Fit Club, Crafty Creations and Cook & Grow – continue to develop, linking in with local venues, partners and services. Numbers grew across our daytime activities to a point whereby we have established a waiting list until we are able to recruit in 2019. There were 55 young people accessing daytime activities in 2018.

Working on individual and group goals in the sessions, these groups provide an excellent range of focused daytime activities which young people can access on an ad hoc or regular basis to help them lead fun and active lives. Rolling programmes have been established so that the groups grow and develop through a changing plan for activities within the groups across the year.

In 2018 Young people have produced blogs, developed games, built a website; achieved personal fitness and wellbeing goals; produced an excellent range of arts and crafts some of which have featured in exhibitions at Watts Gallery and The Lightbox, as well as our Christmas craft markets; grown vegetables managing a local kitchen garden for a nursing home and learned to cook an array of chutneys and dishes.

In November 2018 we were able to hold a celebration event for our Disability Works campaign which is now two years old and has in that time helped 55 young people develop CVs, interview skills and attend work taster days. 8 young people have held work experience placements and several young people have achieved paid part time work. Our main partners Waitrose Guildford and Philips continue to support the campaign, act as Ambassadors for this campaign and currently employ young people through this campaign. This celebration event was held at the House of Parliament and was hosted by Anne Milton MP.

We are now in discussions with two other companies about partnerships for 2019.

During 2018 the Values work mentioned earlier has been very much part of this work. Our continued commitment to training saw the implementation of some of our new training plans.

Our HR/Staff Welfare & Recruitment Sub Committee met to monitor the working-through of various contractual consultations and updates to our service for staff. We accessed training for line managers in Supervision and Coaching as well as arranging Staff Away Days in April and October for staff updates and training.

The Trustees met in February 2018 for governance refresher training, service updates and to consider the Big Vision for halow over the next ten years. As a result of these discussions a development of the management structure was put in place to prepare the organisation for growth. Late in the year the posts of Deputy Director and Building Futures Assistant Manager were added to the team.

In early 2018 the trustees co-opted Chris Evans to join the board as an adviser with a view to becoming a Trustee Director for halow project. Chris undertook many visits and full induction into the Board and services. Board development and recruitment continues in 2019.

Volunteering remains a core part of our work, and we are always pleased to work with corporate CSR volunteering.

To ensure a well-equipped and modern work space for our staff and visiting stakeholders

2018 saw continued efforts to ensure a comfortable work space greatly added to by our partners Gidden Place who provided a number of branded signage items which greatly improved our work space for staff and visitors alike.

We have been able to use our reception area for recruitment fairs and parents' coffee mornings also, inviting more visitors in to use this space and get to know the charity.

Feedback from young people and families on halow staff continues to be good, remarking on the positive relationships formed, the progress made towards their goals and the safety and happiness of young people accessing halow project services.

Thank you to all our young people, families, staff, volunteers, commissioners, funders and supporters for your support for our work this year.

Each year this report is a chance to reflect on the many achievements our young people and the charity has seen in that time. We are grateful to all those who have been a part of this charity and we hope you will

continue to join us in meeting the ongoing challenges of nurturing and enabling independence in young people with a learning disability in Surrey and surrounding districts.

Public benefit

The charity's trustees have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, they have considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

Financial review

The financial accounts for the year ended December 2018 show a net surplus of £9,490 (2017: £48,656) as shown on the Statement of Financial Activities on Page 11.

The cash flow statement shows an increase in cash and cash equivalents of £119,429 during the year which in large part reflects repayment of the debt from an interested party of £104,172 being paid over in the year.

Income overall increased by £8,948 (2%) over 2017. This increase was largely derived from the further planned expansion of our flagship Building Futures programme, and planned increases in the A Reason to Get Up programme. Fundraising income was less strong than in some previous years as a result of staff turnover. Main fundraising activities during the year included **halow's** annual bike ride raising in excess of £77,000, a dinner at the House of Commons and the annual karting event which raised approximately £22,000. **halow** also continued to engage with more grant making trusts and companies as part of its fundraising activities, and overall this generated £83,471 versus the 2017 figure of £28,518.

Expenditure on raising funds was £54,402 lower than in 2017. As income from fundraising activities reduced by only £19,702, this reflects a pleasing increase in margins on fundraising activity, with the cost to income ratio falling from 50% to 34%. Because organised fundraising events are a major part of our fundraising activities, our underlying cost to income ratio will always be higher than some charities are able to achieve.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 19 May 2006 and registered as a charity. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which defined the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee. The Trustees are not subject to retirement by rotation. The Trustees are formally elected to the Board of Trustees at a full meeting of the Trustees.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Current Trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity. Prior to the appointment as a new Trustee, the candidate is met by individual Trustees and officers of the charity to ensure that he/she is fully aware of the requirements and the statutory duties of a Trustee, and to ensure that the person is suitable to hold such an appointment.

Organisational structure

halow project has a management team that met every two months in 2018. It is responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the committee has 7 members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. A number of sub-committees and a scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility rests with the Director. The Trustee Directors are responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and has responsibility for day to day operational management.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The Management Committee regularly discusses the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Systems and procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. A strategic fundraising plan developed in 2014 focuses on diversity of funding and activities to mitigate these risks, should they occur. This strategy is regularly reviewed and updated in line with targets, performance and external climate. Internal cost control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for overseeing and authorising major transactions and projects.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Halow Project ('the Charitable Company')

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the income can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Donations, gifts and legacies are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Legacies are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to them.

Investment income is included when received.

Income from charitable activities and activities for generating funds include fundraising event income and grants receivable. Fundraising event income is recognised when received, whilst grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which the charity becomes entitled to them.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure is inclusive of VAT.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting donations and legacies and the cost of trading for fundraising purposes.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such services and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 33% on cost

All assets costing more than £100 are capitalised.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Debtors

Other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due.

Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any discounts due.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Key Judgements and Accounting Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates.

The main judgement and accounting estimates included in the accounts are:

- Deferral of grant income Income is recognised when halow project is entitled to the income and this will be based on the work being completed and there is no requirement to repay the grant.
