The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2010

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and its governing documents therefore are its Memorandum and Articles of Association

The trustees, who are also the directors for the purpose of company law, and who served during the year were

it is not currently the intention of the trustees of the charity to appoint new trustees

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

There is no specific policy in place for the induction and training of trustees

The affairs of the charity are governed by the Executive Committee comprising the Board of Trustees, the Chairman of which is Mr Ovadia. The Executive Committee is responsible for setting the strategic direction of the charity, consideration of reserves, risk management, performance review and setting general organisational policy.

The Executive Committee meet regularly and delegate the day to day operation of the organisation to its Management Committee, which reports directly to the Board of Trustees. From time to time the Management Committee involves experienced volunteers from the business community in a variety of areas in order to establish best practice in the organisation's activities. The Management Committee operate the charity along departmental lines with Education, Tikun Olam and Central Service departments.

The trustees has assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

Objectives and activities

The charity's objects, as set out in its Memorandum and Articles of Association are,

- The advancement and furtherance of the Jewish religion and Jewish religious education and the alleviation of poverty among the Jewish community throughout the world
- . Other charitable activities that the trustees may from time to time determine

During the last reporting period the trustees considered the feasibility in forming a separate charity to reflect and take on any charitable work that was not within the intended breadth or scope of its current objectives. No further formal progress on this issue can be reported at this time.

The policies adopted in furtherance of these objects are detailed below and there has been no change in these during the year

The charity achieves its current objectives through the work of the Education and Tikun Olam departmental areas

Education

The Education department has in the reporting period been split into 2 overlapping areas. Tikun Hamidos (meaning Character Improvement) and Tikun Hanefesh (Spiritual Improvement)

Tikun Hamidos teaches people the art of personal growth, and how to develop to lead a happier, healthier life from a personal growth based Jewish perspective. Jewish wisdom has tremendous insight and an inherent ability to improve an individual's quality of life, whatever they choose to take from it.

Tikun Hanefesh helps guide people towards a deeper understanding of spiritual well-being by showing people a set of 3 universal innate principles that depict the relationship between thinking and experience Also known as Innate Health, it recognises the creative process that generates thinking is the key to health and stability and as a result people are able to navigate life's ups and downs more gracefully. It is therefore a foundation for a healthy Jewish Life

During the period under review the educational activities covered a wide range of different events and environments with the beneficiaries coming from a wide age range. Examples of the events include weekly classes, social gatherings and evening meals. The education department's goals involved teaching the following key messages,

- · Independence think and decide for yourself
- Pleasure Judaism and life as a whole should be a pleasure, not a chore
- . Be a representative of God and goodness a role model for others
- Tikun Hamidos Improving ones character traits for the good is everything
- · Tikun Olam Improve the world, it is our responsibility
- Tikun Hanefesh Improving your spiritual wellbeing is the key to achieving happiness, meaning and emotional stability

Tikun Olam

The Tikun Olam department is built on the foundation of the Education department and its focus is on getting people to put the theory into practice, being good and taking responsibility

The Tikun Olam department develops and carries out a number of different activities that encourage people to take responsibility for the world and to try and help others on a voluntary basis. These activities have involved participants in activities such as feeding the homeless in soup kitchens or shelters and visiting the elderly or sick in Care Homes and Hospitals. The idea of teaching people to be role models is deeply rooted in the ethos of the education.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

Achievements and performance

The Trustees consider that the performance and achievement of the Charity during this period has been above expectation. The Trustees recognise the valuable service it provides to its beneficiaries would not be possible without the support and competency of its staff. The financial results of the Company's activities are fully reflected in the attached Financial Statements together with the Notes thereon. The immediate sections below deal with the day to day activities of the Charity.

Premises

The charity is permanently based at 1117 Finchley Road, Temple Fortune, London

Education

The reporting period has been an exciting and eventful one, with growth being achieved in all activities and events. The Trustees are happy to report an expansion of Weekly Jewish Wisdom Classes covering both day and evening sessions. This increase in demand has led to the need for a new Educator to take on education of the increased demand. More will be reported on this in the next period.

Another expansion within the Education department was the new design of our website in September 2010 Tikun colub has expanded its activity by publishing more content and therefore reaching a wider audience. This has in turn lead to more demand for our 'in the flesh' activities and an increase in our student base. One set of statistics for the period show over 3000 people have visited the site and watched over 300 hours of class video.

The other highlight for 2010 was the Innate Health conference the Tikun Hanefesh department held in the Tikun centre over 2 days this summer. Attracting over 180 attendees with another 20 watching online was a big achievement. The trustees hope to build upon its success next year.

Tıkun Olam

Although smaller in size and cost to the Education department, the Tikun Olam department was also able to show successful achievement during this period. The Trustees feel that improving the world can be achieved one step at a time by getting individuals involved in volunteer activities and events. Activities generally consist of organising group activities, although significant progress has been made to encourage individuals to volunteer on an individual basis.

The highlight of this year was the Hope for Heroism Music Concert. This project which was led by volunteers involved the visit of 9 Israeli young men injured either physically or mentally through combat in Israel. These men have formed a band called 9 lives, and the centrepiece of their visit was a benefit concert. They entertained a large crowd at the Supper Club London and connected to the crowd with their touching music.

Financial review

For the charity financially 2010 was a good year. At the end of the year there was around £60,000 in working capital to carry forward into 2011, which is around 6 weeks of the charity's outgoings. However, 2011 is expected to me a much more challenging year financially due to supporters reducing or withdrawing support entirely. As of writing (July 2011) this has proven to be the case and the surplus from last year has been a very necessary buffer during what we are expecting to be very difficult times ahead. There is a lot of work to be done simply to maintain the current budget in 2011 and if this is not successful, the charity will need to consider cutting back in 2012.

There were also more restricted funds raised in 2010 due to the charity assisting in raising money for a program to help in the rehabilitation of injured Israeli soldiers

Plans for the future

As mentioned in the previous section, the charity is cautious about the future. We aim to maintain the same budget for 2011 as 2010, but that may have to change in 2012. The economic outlook remains very challenging and the charity may have to reduce accordingly depending upon the remainder of 2011. The directors very much hope that this will not be necessary.

Resources are now working at full capacity so there is no room for expansion of activity within the existing budget

Having said all that, Tikun has expanded rapidly year on year since its inception and we feel that, at the current level of activity, it comfortably meets its objectives, as anticipated by its supporters. A great deal is being accomplished and the directors are undeterred by the present financially challenging environment.
