

Trustees Report

The Trustees (who are also directors for the purposes of company law) present their report and the financial statements of the Academy of Medial Educators for the year ended 30 September 2016. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in 2014 to be compliant with Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102, and which is applicable for reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2015.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 14 and 15, and comply with the applicable law, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the requirements of the Charities SORP (FRS 102).

Comparative figures in the financial statements for the previous year to 30 September 2015 have been restated, where applicable, to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP (FRS 102).

Objects and activities

Under its Articles of Association, the objects for which the Academy is established are the advancement of medical education for the public benefit in particular by:

- a) the development of a curriculum and qualification system;
- b) undertaking research for the continuing development of professional medical education; and
- c) the promotion and dissemination of best practice in medical education.

The Academy of Medical Educators is the professional organisation, working nationally and internationally, for all those involved in medical education – the education and training of students and practitioners in medicine, dentistry, and veterinary science. It aims to provide leadership, promote standards and support all those involved in the academic discipline of medical education. Through its Professional Standards, which serve as a guide to curriculum development, the Academy provides a recognised framework so that those in education can demonstrate expertise and achievements in medical education through accreditation as a medical teacher to an agreed national standard.

Public benefit statement

The Council, comprising the Trustees of the Academy, has referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing its aims and objectives and in planning the Academy's future activities. In particular, the Council considers how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives it has set.

The Academy is founded on the recognition that the development and improvement of the training of medical practitioners will be to the benefit of the health of the general public. The Academy's activities in furtherance of the objects defined above directly address the maintenance and improvement of standards of medical training and practice, to the direct benefit of patients.

The Academy's activities are open to all who are able to benefit from them. Special rates are offered to students. Council does not consider there to be detriment from its activities or work. More detailed descriptions of the activities and the beneficial outcomes are contained in the Review of Activities in 2015/16 (below).



Structure and governance

The Academy of Medical Educators was founded in October 2006 as the professional standard setting body for medical educators in the United Kingdom. It was instigated at an informal meeting of interested medical educators and leaders held at the Royal College of Physicians in January 2006. The Academy became incorporated as a company limited by guarantee under the Companies Act 1985 on 12 October 2006. Formal elections were held in October 2007 and in December 2007 the first President, Professor John Bligh was elected for three years. The Academy was registered as a charity with the Charity Commission for England on 2 April 2009.

The Academy is run by a Council of Trustees who are also the Directors of the Company. The Council met five times during the year. Members of Council are elected by the members of the Academy, with additional members who may be appointed by Council. From February 2016 Council comprised 23 elected members including the President. Honorary Officers and Chairs of committees and working groups were elected by Council drawn from their number. The Honorary Officers and Council set the strategic direction of the Academy. An Executive Committee (comprising the President, Honorary Officers and Chairs of Standing Committees) is responsible for overseeing the financial and administrative management of the Academy. Five full Council meetings and three Executive meetings were held during 2015/16.

In the elections in October 2015, confirmed at the AGM in April 2016, Aidan Byrne, Alan Denison, Louise Dubras, Adrian Freeman, Andrew Grant, Johnny Lyon-Maris and Gabriel Reedy were elected to Council to serve for three years from February 2016. Council subsequently co-opted Catherine Coelho and Marc Lyall for a period of one year as permitted by the Academy's articles. Council also invited Keith Lawrey and David Russell to attend Council to provide additional professional expertise in legal affairs and as a lay member, respectively.

Council has reviewed the constitution of its four Standing Committees (Professional Standards, Education, Membership and Early Careers) and the other groups reporting to it. A list of the committees and ad hoc groups, with their membership as at 1 January 2016, is given on page 10.

Strategy and the future of the Academy

We continued to advance the Academy's charitable aims this year, undertaking a number of engagement events including conferences to promote medical education within the United Kingdom. Academy staff also attended international events in order to raise the Academy profile further.

The Academy's administration remained within the Wales Deanery and Cardiff Medical School. Paul Yeboah-Afari continued in his role as a full-time administrator on an annually renewable contract, with his salary costs refunded to Cardiff Medical School out of the Academy's accounts. Jodie Burnett-Wren joined the administration team and has been working one day a week to support Paul. Tony Carlisle began in a full time role as Executive Officer in October 2015.

Notwithstanding the need to consolidate our administrative functions, we continued to maintain conformity with our core charitable and financial responsibilities and to pursue our previously published strategic objectives (http://www.medicaleducators.org/index.cfm/about-aome/objectives/) namely:

- 1. Developing and promoting adoption of the professional standards
- 2. Accrediting medical educators and courses
- 3. Providing resources for medical educators
- 4. Supporting the medical education profession
- 5. Securing a sustainable and well managed organisation
- 6. Promoting patient-centred care in medical education

The reports that follow regarding Membership, Professional Standards, Education, Prizes and Awards, Early Careers and External Relations summarise activity in these six strategic areas.



Review of Activities and Achievements 2015/16

Membership

The membership committee met formally at AoMRC in April 2016.

Issues considered by the committee included:

- Recognising Teaching Excellence workshops as a way of promoting the Academy to potential new members. Stand-alone workshops are held throughout the UK and also within national conferences
- Course Accreditation. An increasing number of courses apply for Academy recognition, facilitating a streamlined application for membership (with the removal of the need for a peer review and reflection on a teaching episode. Many new members now come via this route with 38 courses recognised in November 2015 (ranging from short training course to postgraduate certificate programmes)
- Membership services including the new enhanced website
- International membership
- Physician Associate Educators and inclusion of this emerging group within the Academy.

Professional Standards

In May 2016 the Committee agreed a programme of work aligned to 5 key areas:

- To investigate the use of the Professional Framework in Educator Recognition and identify barriers and enablers
- Develop guidance for both for Responsible Officers and appraisees in-line with other colleges and faculties to support revalidation
- To undertake work to agree a communication strategy to promote awareness and use of the standards
- To develop a framework for recognition of 'leaders in Medical Education' (this reflects the fact that
 current standards only apply to the 4 categories of trainers and doesn't reflect the requirements for
 those developing a career in medical education i.e. medical education leader)
- To agree a mentoring strategy.

Subsequent scoping of these work areas refined the work plan with 3 key changes:

- 1. It was agreed that mentoring was being taken forward by numerous other organisations and that the AoME role would be in signposting via development of its website
- 2. Following discussion with the GMC around the barriers and enablers in Educator Recognition it was agreed that a proposal which linked Educator Recognition to a framework for Leaders in Medical Education would be developed. This would be built on the AoME Professional Standards and any guidance documentation would need to reflect this framework
- 3. The communication strategy would need to follow on from the work with the framework development.

Progress to date:

A proposal outlining the development of a single framework to support the continuum of development of the medical educator has been developed with support from Professor Alison Bullock (Cardiff University) and submitted to the GMC. Further progress on development of the proposal has been delayed because of organisational change within the GMC. This is the key focus for the Committee for 2017.



Education

The Education Committee has overall responsibility for the Academy's own conference and educational activity programme as well as input in to other organisations' events.

The Academy was also involved in the following events:

- Developing Excellence in Medical Education Conference (DEMEC), Manchester November 2015 the
 Academy was one of the organising partners, had an exhibition stand and hosted its annual Calman
 lecture, delivered by Sir Terence Stephenson, Chair General Medical Council, and Awards ceremony,
 at which new Members, Fellows and Honorary Fellows received their certificates from the President.
 The Academy has committed to involvement in DEMEC 2017
- The All Wales Medical and Dental Education Conference, Swansea, April 2016 the Academy had an
 information stand and delivered a workshop on Developing Excellence in Education
- Association for the Study of Medical Education (ASME) conference, Belfast, July 2016 the Academy had an information stand and delivered a workshop on Developing Career Pathways in Medical Education
- AMEE (An International Association for Medical Education), Barcelona, August 2016 the Academy had an exhibition stand.
- Recognising Teaching Excellence workshops were held in:
 - Glasgow 2 October 2015
 - Swansea 13 April 2016 as part of the All Wales Medical and Dental Education Conference
 - Belfast 7 July 2016 as part of the ASME conference
 - Newcastle upon Tyne 27 September 2016 as part of the Newcastle MedEd Conference

Prizes and Awards

The President's medal for 2015 was awarded to Julie Browne.



Council was pleased to award Honorary Fellowships to Professor Dame Sue Bailey, Professor Jennifer Cleland, Professor Wendy Reid, and Sir Terence Stephenson.









The Academy is recognised by the Advisory Committee on Clinical Excellence Awards as a specialist society and is pleased to be able to support its Members and Fellows in their applications for Clinical Excellence Awards. In line with other supporting bodies, and in the light of the ACCEA's policy on only awarding to the very highest achievers, the Academy provided a citation for only the very highest ranked individuals in each category: bronze, silver and gold.

Financial Review

The accounts for the year show a deficit of £144 on the year (2015: surplus of £40,762)

Overall membership numbers increased by 10% during the 2015/16 year but membership income decreased to £78,195 (2015: £100,969), as a result of the streamlining of subscription charges. Council recognises the need to ensure membership continues to grow.

The Academy's financial position has stabilised somewhat over the past two years and while Council recognises the need to remain cautious with regard to spending, it has sought to use some of the surplus accumulated in the last period on the furtherance of its aims, including the instigation of The Dame Lesley Southgate Travelling Scholarship in Assessment which offers a total of £4,500 shared amongst up to three recipients, the award(s) to be presented at the EBMA conference in October 2016. In addition the Academy has paid for exhibition stands at the ASME and AMEE conferences, as above. The Academy has spent some funds on enhancements to its website and is in discussion with the web developer to develop a direct debit system, which will streamline membership subscription payments.

Reserves

Overall, fund balances carried forward stand at £179,434 (2015: £179,578). A proportion of the Academy's funds are tied up in fixed assets and, therefore, are not available for normal business activity.

As agreed in 2014, free reserves, (unrestricted funds in excess of amounts invested in fixed assets,) should be held which amount to at least six months expenditure. On this basis there would be a requirement for free reserves of around £65,000. At the year-end total free reserves were £125,896. Again it is anticipated that expenditure will be increased during 2016/17, in line with the Council's strategy for developing the Academy.

Future developments

The Academy has had another year in which membership has continued to grow steadily. Once again influence and awareness have also grown, as evidenced by the participation and partnership activities above. The Academy's physical and financial position are the most secure they have been for some years, meaning it can confidently plan long term strategy beyond 2018.

The Academy's unique identity within medical education and the respect it enjoys as an expert voice and opinion former have secured its ongoing key role in the development of the credential in medical education with the GMC.

Early Careers Group

The Early Careers Group continued work to promote careers in medical education during the last year. This included regular face to face and teleconference meetings with group members and attendance at Academy and external events, including running workshops and delivering presentations. The group also continued to manage the Academy mentoring scheme and attended events to represent the Academy such as at the *Trainees in the Association for the Study of Medical Education* (TASME) away day held at the Royal College of Physicians.

Work has continued on the draft standards for junior doctors supervising junior colleagues and presentation of these standards was planned for the Academy's Conference at the end of 2016. Next year will focus on the development of these standards further.

The Chair of the group (James Read) stood down as Chair in May 2016 to take up the role of Academy Registrar. Dr Neil Patel and Dr Alan Gopal have subsequently taken up the leadership of the group as co-Chairs and will set the strategic direction of the group over the next twelve months.

External Relations

Council recognises the importance of ensuring that the Academy is fully recognised by its different audiences, including by policy bodies and regulators, in order for its views to be known and heeded. The junior doctors' strikes in spring 2016 led to the disruption of some Academy events and in particular to the cancellation of the spring meeting. The terms of booking allowed the conference to be moved later in the year without a financial penalty being incurred.

In addition to the liaison work undertaken by the standing committees and working groups:

The President (ex officio) again took an active role in the Group of 10 Medical Chairs.

The Developing Excellence in Medical Education Conference (DEMEC) in Manchester in November 2015 provided a platform for AoME to raise awareness of its charitable activities and demonstrate how the Academy promotes and encourages standards in medical education. During this meeting Professor Terence Stephenson, Chair of the General Medical Council delivered the Academy's 2015 Calman lecture.

This was preceded by the Awards Ceremony and followed by the President's reception, all of which were attended by both members and non-members.

As detailed in the Education Committee report the Academy is working closely with other bodies whose aims are compatible, such as ASME (*The Association for the Study of Medical Education*), whose conference in



July we attended and took an active part in; AMEE (an International Association for Medical Education), whose conference we attended in August; and various other UK institutions. The Academy was working in partnership with EBMA (*The European Board of Medical Educators*) and other organisations towards an Assessment conference in Exeter in October 2016.



Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also Directors of The Academy of Medical Educators for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.)

Company law requires trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company and of the outgoing resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Council of The Academy of Medical Educators

Independent examiner's report to the Council of The Academy of Medical Educators Ltd

I report on the accounts of the charitable company for the year ended 30th September 2016, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, Balance Sheet and related notes.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. 1 Accounting Policies

ies For the year ended 30th September 2016

Company information

The Academy of Medical Educators is a charity limited by guarantee and incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Neuadd Meirionnydd, Heath Park, Cardiff, CF14 4YS.

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), published on 16 July 2014. The Charitable Company is a public benefit group for the purposes of FRS 102 and therefore the charity also prepared its financial statements in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (The FRS 102 Charities SORP), the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 2011.

FRS 102 has been adopted for the first time when preparing these financial statements. The transition date to FRS 102 was 1 October 2014 and the last financial statements prepared under the previous financial reporting framework were prepared for the year ended 30 September 2015. An explanantion of how the transition has affected the reported financial position and financial performance is provided in note 15 to the financial statements.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest pound.

Going Concern Basis

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Having carried out a detailed review of the Charity's resources and the current economic challenges facing both the Charity and its members the Trustees are satisfied that the Charity has sufficient cash flows to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

In the view of the trustees in applying the accounting policies adopted, no judgements were required that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements, nor do any estimates or assumptions made carry a significant risk of material adjustment in the next financial year.

Incoming resources

Membership fees

Membership fees are renewable annually and are recognised on a receipts basis.

Grants receivable

Grant are recognised when receivable, income is carried forward at the year end, as restricted fund, where amounts have not been fully spent in the year.

Sponsorship and Other income

Sponsorship and Other income is recognised when it is received.

Resources expended

Cost of generating funds are those costs incurred in furthering the name of the charity.

Charitable activities comprises all expenditure directly relating to the objectives of the charity.

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation for payment to be made. Support costs are allocated against direct costs on a staff time basis.

Gifts in kind

Where services are provided to the charity as a donation that would normally be purchased from suppliers, this contribution is included in the financial statements as an estimate based on the value of the contribution to the charity. Donated services and facilities are discussed in note 4.

Intangible assets

The coat of arms costs are not amortised as these are expected to be of continued long term benefit to the organisation.

The website and software costs are stated at cost less amortisation and impairment. Amortisation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of these assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following basis:

Website 33.33% (Straight line over 3 years)
Software 33.33% (Straight line over 3 years)

Tangible Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are capitalised where the item costs exceed £500. Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of the Fixed Assets over their estimated useful lives at the following annual rates:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment 15% (Straight line over 6.67 years)
Computer equipment & website 33.33% (Straight line over 3 years)

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds comprise those funds which the trustees are free to use for any purpose in furtherance of the charitable objects.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor.

Financial Instruments

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash at banks and in hand and short term deposits with a maturity date of three months or less.

Debtors and creditors

Debtors and creditors receivable or payable within one year of the reporting date are carried at their at transaction price. Debtors and creditors that are receivable or payable in more than one year and not subject to a market rate of interest are measured at the present value of the expected future receipts or payment discounted at a market rate of interest.
