The Trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements for the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2018. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The charity's objectives are:

- a. To advance the education of the public in the art of poetry, in particular but not exclusively by translating into English and making available to the public contemporary poetry from non-European countries.
- b. To advance the education of the public in general about issues relating to immigrant communities by introducing the public to immigrant communities' contemporary poetry and by such other means as the trustees see fit.

Organisational Management

During the financial year 2017-18 the following people served as PTC employees:

- Managing Director Erica Jarnes (0.8 FTE, changing to 1.0 FTE from May) title change to Chief Executive Officer (promotion) in December 2017; name change to Erica Hesketh (married) in March 2018
- Communications and Office Manager Bern Roche Farrelly (1.0 FTE) title change to Communications Manager (promotion) in October 2017
- Administrator Madeleine Fogelman (0.2 FTE) from October 2017

PTC Founder and Artistic Director Sarah Maguire died in November 2017.

The PTC continued its intern programme in 2017-18 in order to offer an early-career opportunity for young graduates with a particular interest in translation, poetry or communities work. This position was offered part-time and paid at the London Living Wage rate. The 2017-18 intern was John Akinde.

The PTC workplace pensions scheme (administrated by Aviva) offers employees a match-contribution of up to 5% of gross qualifying earnings.

The PTC was based at 2 Wardrobe Place, London EC4V 5AH for the whole of the year 2017-18, moving to its current address at the Albany in June 2018.

Business Plan

In 2017-18 the PTC worked to the final year of its 2015-18 Business Plan. A new Business Plan was prepared for the period 2018-22, in connection with the PTC's new four-year funding agreement with Arts Council England. The Business Plan covers artistic programme, audience development, resourcing and income generation, and will be reviewed and updated by staff and board once per year. In 2017-18 the PTC had its first Together Day, a full-day gathering of staff and board to look at the successes of the past year, and discuss future plans and overall organisational strategy.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate them. The main risks identified are:

Board - Following a period of high turnover in 2014-17 the board is still small and vulnerable to change. The trustees have agreed a control procedure to mitigate this risk, including board recruitment and training, and succession planning for the Chair role. In 2017-18 two new trustees attended trustee training delivered by the consultancy Cause 4.

Staffing - As the PTC has a small executive team it is vital that there are clear management structures in place, as well as robust procedures in the case of illness or other destabilising forces. New positions were created and recruited for in 2017, with further recruitment to come in 2018-19. We have also agreed review, training and succession planning frameworks.

Fundraising - Core funding remains overly dependent on Arts Council England. During 2016-17 the PTC began developing a new fundraising strategy, to include trusts and foundations, direct income streams, individual giving and crowdfunding. All staff and board are involved with the delivery of the new strategy, which will reduce reliance on Arts Council funding by 2022.

Objectives and aims

The trustees have considered the Charity Commision's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Beneficiaries

The Poetry Translation Centre's main beneficiaries are: diaspora/immigrant communities in the UK and around the world; young people living the UK from BAME and mixed-heritage backgrounds; the English-speaking public in general who encounter poetry; poets and translators who enjoy a professional development benefit through working with the PTC.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Achievements against objectives

In 2017-18 the PTC delivered on our core objectives through our workshop programme, a major publication in partnership with Bloodaxe Books, three other publications, over 30 public events and our continuing online offer. We ran our first ever crowdfunder, raising £1,832. The Artistic Director had to take a step back due to illness, and we had a gap of three months between Managing Directors. Our incoming Managing Director led on the PTC's application to join Arts Council England's National Portfolio for 2018-22 (representing four years of core funding at the current level).

In 2017-18 we brought in £9,532 through charitable activities, compared with £2,015 in 2016-17 and £1,136 in 2015-16.

Our event audience figures, book sales and workshop attendance figures all rose significantly in 2017-18, while our digital reach figures remained steady.

2017-2018 PROGRAMME ACTIVITY

Workshops

Our workshop programme develops talent in literary translation from under-represented languages such as Georgian, Chinese, Somali, Urdu, Persian, Hebrew and Indonesian. In 2017-18 we translated 30 poems from 14 languages in 24 public workshops, with 14 different 'guest' translators and 195 participants. This represents a significant increase in activity compared with 2016-17, when we delivered 15 workshops and attracted 86 participants. 7 of our 24 workshops were delivered outside London, as part of a new strand of touring workshops supported by Arts Council England's Strategic Touring Fund. Our main poet-facilitator during the year was poet Clare Pollard; we also worked with additional poet-facilitators Emily Hasler and Sarah Howe. Highlights from the year include:

- translating young poets such as Legna Rodriguez Iglesias (Cuba) and Adelaide Ivanova (Brazil);
- exploring contemporary 'movements' in poetry such as feminist poetry in Indonesia and the resurgence of tanka in Japan;
- delivering a set of Arabic workshops at the International Agatha Christie Festival in Torquay;
- having a workshop recorded by the BBC as part of a Radio 4 programme about poetry in translation called Mother Tongue (hosted by poet Helen Mort).

Our workshop programme brought in £910 of direct income in 2017-18.

Publications

We published four publications in 2017-18. In June we published 40-page chapbooks by two Turkish poets: Bejan Matur (Kurdish/Turkish) in translation by Jen Hadfield (UK) and Karin Karakasli (Armenian/Turkish) in translation by Sarah Howe (UK). For both chapbooks we worked with Turkish bridge translator Canan Marasligil.

Through the summer of 2017 we ran a crowdfunder on the Indiegogo platform, raising £1,832 towards printing a poem-poster Catastrophe which we published in October. The poem was by Xasan Daahir Ismaaciil Weedhsame (Somaliland), in translation by British poet Daljit Nagra (with bridge translator Martin Orwin).

Also in October we co-published (with Bloodaxe Books) a major poetry collection by Somali poet Asha Lul Mohamud Yusuf, in translation by Clare Pollard (with bridge translators Said Jama Hussein and Maxamed Xasan 'Alto'). This book was the culmination of over 10 years of collaboration and friendship between Yusuf and Pollard. It received a PEN Translates Award from English PEN, was well-reviewed and named The Sunday Times Poetry Book of the Year.

As part of a new publications strategy we raised the price of PTC chapbooks from £4 to £6. At the same time we revamped the design, using a better-quality paper stock and more contemporary cover design.

Direct income from book sales in 2017-18 was £2,210. As a comparison our direct income from book sales in 2016-17 was £670.

Events

In 2017-18 the PTC delivered 30 events in 14 cities. Our events took place in arts venues including literature festivals, but also in community centres, libraries, universities and a bookshop. For our Summer Tour (Turkish poets), 28% of our audience were under 26, while 9% were Turkish speakers. For our October Tour (Somali poets), 64% of our audience were BAME, 20% were under the age of 26, and 32% were native Somali speakers. We reached 1,535 people through live events in 2017-18, which represents an increase of over 400% on 2016-17 (when we reached 305 people).

Immigration issues affected one of our poets, Xasan Daahir Ismaaciil Weedhsame, who was not allowed to enter the UK for his events. This led to the cancellation of two of his eight events, but Weedhsame's bridge translator Martin Orwin represented him well at the others, and the events were well-received.

In December 2017 we hosted our first student event/debate at the University of Westminster. This was the start of a new strand of student-centred programming for the PTC.

In March 2018 we worked with Al-Saddiq Al-Raddi to make an event in memory of PTC Founder Sarah Maguire, together with members of the London Sudanese community.

We worked with 31 different partners for our 2017-18 events, of which 20 were new partners for the PTC.

The PTC's 2017-18 touring was supported by grants from Arts Council England's Strategic Touring Fund and Prince Claus Foundation (Netherlands). We also brought in £4,622 in direct income from venue/promoter fees, and £345 in ticket sales for events.

Community events

Our target 'least engaged' audiences are UK residents from immigrant/diaspora and working-class backgrounds. In 2017-18 we delivered 6 events where the primary target audience was native speakers of the original language, from the relevant diaspora community (Turkish/Kurdish, Somali or Sudanese). We continued our longstanding partnership with Somali arts organisation Kayd Somali Arts and Culture and Cardiff City Council, and developed new partnerships with the Centre for Turkey Studies (London) and the ISRAAC Somali Community Centre (Sheffield, with support from Off the Shelf Festival). We also delivered a pair of events with community arts centre Studio 3 Arts in Barking, east London, which serves a culturally diverse, mostly working-class neighbourhood. In total 305 people attended our 'community' events, of whom approximately 58% were from BAME backgrounds.

2016-17 COMMUNICATIONS AND FUNDRAISING

Digital

The PTC website now boasts over 500 poems by 132 poets in 30 languages.

In 2017-18 we had 301,982 sessions on the PTC website, with visitors from 147 countries. 22,480 sessions lasted 10 minutes or longer, pointing to deep user engagement. We published 18 blog posts, as well as all the poems we translated through the year in three parallel versions - the poem in its original language, the 'bridge' or 'literal' translation, and the 'final' English translation - with accompanying notes.

We released 50 podcast recordings, attracting 21,050 downloads (1,754 per month). We posted 19 Facebook videos, achieving approximately 7,500 views and 4,400 minutes viewed. We published 254 Facebook posts, with a reach of 261,594 people, and 2,110 tweets, achieving over 2.3 million impressions. By March 2018 we had 7,935 Twitter followers, with an average engagement level of 1%. We had a Facebook audience of 7,765 followers, achieving on average 1,385 monthly engagements.

Our mailing list had 2,132 members in March 2018, which represents an increase of 13% compared with the year before. The average open-rate for our emails is 29% (industry average is 26%), and click-rate 5.71% (industry average 2.66%).

Funding/fundraising

In 2017-18 the PTC successfully renewed its status as an Arts Council England National Portfolio Organisation. The new funding period is 2018-22, bringing in core funding of £124,576 per year.

Our 2017-18 non-NPO fundraising target was £68,410. We brought in £32,000 from Arts Council England Strategic Touring Fund, £6,750 from trusts, and £2,350 from direct donations. We also helped our international poets to secure a further 1,350 euros (£1,196) from trusts to support their UK touring (paid directly to the poets). This was a notable improvement on 2016-17, when we brought in virtually no funding apart from our NPO grant, but we still fell short of our target. As outlined above we were also delivering a much-expanded artistic programme and making major changes to our team structure.

In November 2017 the whole team attended fundraising training. Chief executive Erica Hesketh also attended further training through the Management Consultancy.

In 2017-18 we brought in £9,532 through charitable activities, compared with £2,015 in 2016-17 and £1,136 in 2015-16.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The PTC continues to receive significant core revenue support from Arts Council England, largely through its National Portfolio Organisation (NPO) funding programme. During 2017-18 £18,770 was raised from non-statutory funding sources (compared with £2,466 in 2016-17).

Total income was £179,941 with £166,307 expended, resulting in a surplus of £13,634 for the year. The underspend was largely due to the illness of PTC Artistic Director Sarah Maguire, which prevented her from working. As at the balance sheet date, the charity held unrestricted funds of £123,321.

The PTC received £38,750 of restricted income in 2017-18. We are taking forward restricted funds of £9,385 into 2018-19.

Reserves

The PTC recognises the importance of maintaining healthy reserves, to cover emergency expenses such as sudden loss of funding, legal costs or shifting economic conditions. At our quarterly board meetings we analyse our cash flow for seasonal factors, potential opportunities and overall stability. The trustees have agreed a policy about how reserve funds can be used; the process for authorising its use; and how this use is to be reported to the board.

Our aim is to always have cash reserves of 3 months of running costs, approximately £46,500, in addition to any restricted and designated funds. In 2018-19 we plan to use some of our reserves to enable us to grow our core team; this will help us to generate additional direct income from 2019 onwards which will allow us to maintain our reserve at a healthy level while being ambitious for our artistic programme and the growth of the organisation. We will also invest a portion of our reserves in a high-interest account to generate further income.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Poetry Translation Centre Ltd (PTC) is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 16 July 2007 and registered as a charity on 4 March 2008. It has a Memorandum and Articles of Association as its governing document.

The PTC was established by the poet Sarah Maguire in 2004.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association, new directors are approved and appointed by the existing trustees.

The trustees (who are also directors of the Poetry Translation Centre for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Account Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company and charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources (including the income and expenditure) of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities' SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on a going-concern basis, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act, 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.
