Structure, governance and management

Governing document

AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on October 11, 2007 and registered as a charity on February 8, 2008. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association as amended on September 12, 2019. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Appointment of trustees

The trustees who are directors for the purpose of company law and trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report, are set out on page 2. New trustees are appointed upon the recommendation of existing trustees. One third of the trustees must retire at each annual general meeting and offer themselves for re-election.

Risk management

The trustees have identified and considered the main risks to which the Trust is exposed and have taken the necessary steps to mitigate and manage these risks on a regular basis.

Organisational structure

Day to day responsibility for the provision of services rests with the head of the Community Sports Trust, Steve Cuss, a qualified FA and UEFA coach. He is supported by Senior Managers Andrew Battison and Luke Simpson. All administration is undertaken by Anne Cuss.

Objectives and activities for the public benefit

The Trust's objective is the promotion of community participation in healthy recreation, in particular by the provision of facilities for the playing of football. The aim is to help young people, especially but not exclusively through leisure time activities, so as to develop their capabilities that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society. Also, to provide or assist in the provision of sporting and recreational facilities for the public of Bournemouth and surrounding areas without reference to race, religion and belief, sex, disability, nationality, ethnic or national origin or social background, with the object of improving their conditions of life. The trustees confirm that they have had regard to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

The Trust is supported and many of its projects are funded by the Premier League Charitable Fund.

It actively supports both the local community and AFC Bournemouth, providing everyone with the opportunities to get involved in its activities. It uses the power of football to deliver inspirational, progressive and professional initiatives which follow the accessible, stylish and friendly values of the Club and which maximise opportunities for local talent and make a positive, real and lasting difference to that community.

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Year ended 30 November 2019

The Community Sports Trust is the 'charitable arm' of AFC Bournemouth, actively working in the local community across Bournemouth, Poole and Dorset.

It was formed in 2001 from the Football in the Community programme and continues to have a close working relationship with the football club delivering over 100 sessions a week, to a wide variety of children and adults of all ages and abilities and reaching over 4,000 people weekly.

It offers a wide range of football and multi-sport sessions which are designed to meet the needs and requirements of all participants whilst working towards the four main themes: Sports Participation, Health and Well-being, Education and Sports Inclusion.

Strategic report

The following sections for achievements and performance and financial review form the strategic report of the charity.

Achievements and performance

The trustees consider that the charity's achievements and activities have been covered in detail within the following section.

Sports Participation

AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust offers weekly coaching sessions to a variety of different age groups across the local communities of Bournemouth, Poole, Christchurch and Brockenhurst. The sessions engage with young people from one years old, to the over 50s, and offer opportunities for all abilities to get involved. These sessions include:

Mini Cherries

Mini-Cherries is a twice weekly, term-time, toddler football session, which aims to help children learn the basic principles of play such as sharing and communication, together with improving their basic motor skills, balance and coordination. The most important parts of the Mini-Cherries session is the introduction to football for children aged 1-3 years old and enjoyment for learning the game.

Minikickers

Minikickers is one of the more popular weekly sessions, reaching over 200 children a week at the Vitality Stadium alone. The sessions which last an hour invite children to join in and learn new skills through dribbling games, shooting drills and small-sided matches.

Girls Football Sessions

Girls' Football sessions take place weekly at various venues in Bournemouth and Brockenhurst. Sessions cost just £2 per person and are open to girls of all abilities. The Trust also runs weekly FA Wildcats Football sessions at Vitality Stadium for girls aged 5-7 years old who are just starting out in football. Our Girls Football Sessions are supported by Bournemouth University.

During the year groups of girls who attend the sessions were invited to Premier League games at the Vitality Stadium to enjoy the Matchday experience, including a pre kick-off game and a half time penalty shoot-out.

The Premier League Girls Football programme reached its conclusion during the year and in recognition of the growing importance of football for women and girls, AFC Bournemouth has provided funding of £50000 to enable the sessions to develop and expand.

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Year ended 30 November 2019

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Women and Girls Teams

The AFC Bournemouth Girls and Women's teams have continued to be successful throughout the year with the under 10s, 14s and 16s winning their respective Hampshire League Cup competitions.

The Women's Development Squad won the Hampshire Women's cup and completed their league season as unbeaten winners.

During the year a number of tournaments and festivals were held including a Women's World Cup themed football festival for girls aged 7 – 16 years old which was a free 'turn up and play' event.

Premier League Kicks

The Premier League Kicks programme continues to expand, now offering free football sessions in Bournemouth, Poole, Christchurch, Brockenhurst and Verwood. This popular project offers free football and additional opportunities to over 1000 youngsters a year. It encourages young people to get involved in playing sports in the evenings and at weekends, which sees them benefit from a healthier lifestyle, improved well-being and most importantly offers them a safe environment to enjoy themselves and have fun with friends. The Premier League Kicks project offers sessions to mixed groups, as well as a girls only evening session. Sessions for children aged 8-13 years old are coached, whereas sessions for those aged 14+ are tournament style. Since January 2019 the project has been supported by Bournemouth and Poole College.

Some of the sessions have been attended by AFC Bournemouth's first team players who have enjoyed giving motivational talks, coaching pointers and answering questions.

During the year, Kicks teams have taken part in a variety of fixtures and the national Premier League Kicks Cup which is a tournament for 15 - 16 year olds.

Extra-Curricular Coaching and School Clubs

The Trust has a successful long-standing partnership with many schools within the local area to deliver extracurricular sessions for both boys and girls, and provides three main clubs: Breakfast Club, which runs an hour before school, Lunchtime Club that runs during school lunchtimes, and the very popular After School Club. The clubs typically run once a week for the entire term, and include coaching sessions on passing, control, dribbling and shooting, together with fun games, small competitions and small sided matches.

Bournemouth University

Bournemouth University continues to support the Trust, maintaining long established links which began while the football club competed in League 1. In particular it supports the development of girls' football in Dorset as the main partner of the under-10, under-12, under-14 and under-16 AFC Bournemouth girls' teams. It also remains a Junior Cherries partner and members of this popular club for younger fans are invited to attend special events at the university with an educational aspect. The University's men's and women's teams continue to benefit from professional coaching from the Trust.

During the summer, 60 Chinese football coaches spent three months studying at the university as part of the British Council China-UK Football Study Programme. The coaches enjoyed a specially developed programme to improve their skills and knowledge in collaboration with the university and the Trust. The study programme used the UK's expertise and resources to help football coaches from Chinese schools and universities learn more about football management, improve their technical skills and theoretical knowledge and develop their capacity to train young people and increase China's football competitiveness.

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Year ended 30 November 2019

Soccer Schools

The Trust has continued to host popular Soccer School sessions every school holiday across Bournemouth and Christchurch, Purbeck and Blandford. The Bournemouth and Christchurch sessions are supported by CMP Print, Purbeck is sponsored by B. Curtis Ltd and The Italian Kitchen and Blandford sessions are supported by J&G Environmental. The sessions are for boys and girls aged 7-14 years old, not including Minikickers Soccer Schools which are for boys and girls aged 4-6 years old. All sessions are available for children of any ability and include a fun warm up, skills games, penalty competitions and small-sided matches. They are run and delivered by qualified and experienced football coaches who have all completed up to date safeguarding and emergency aid qualifications and are also DBS checked.

Soccer schools have also taken place in Jersey, with St Clements FC and Milton Abbey where the annual residential training camp is held in August for boys and girls aged 7 -14 years old.

Beach weekend

The second annual beach weekend took place in July at Canford Cliffs. The three-day event included Primary Stars PE Lessons, Premier League Kicks, Girls and Disability football festivals. A selection of the Linked Clubs was also invited to take part in different events.

Participants from 'opposition' from Watford, Brighton and Reading were welcomed to some of the events, providing a brilliant opportunity for the young people to interact and meet others, as well as experience the beaches here in the south.

To end the weekend, the AFC Bournemouth Girls and Women's players completed their third pre-season training session on the beach. It was a great event for new players to interact further with their team-mates and for all to continue their new season preparations.

Linked Clubs Initiative

The Trust runs a successful Linked Clubs scheme with a select group of local football clubs. The Linked Club initiative sees AFC Bournemouth Community coaches work alongside the local football clubs to deliver sessions to players, and also invite coaches to receive bespoke Coach Education and Continued Professional Development sessions throughout the season. Teams also have the opportunity to attend sessions and have a tour of the facilities at the Vitality Stadium. Furthermore, the Trust runs specific training sessions for the team and also host Soccer Schools aimed at the Club's players and friends. This is a great opportunity for clubs to add to their current remits of providing football to their local community.

The CPD events held during the year have covered the structure of AFC Bournemouth Academy, the 'better players programme, goalkeeper development and the social corner in female football.

Birthday Parties

The Trust offers birthday parties at the Vitality Stadium on non-matchdays.

Education

Premier League Primary Stars

Premier League Primary Stars uses the power of sport to inspire children to learn, be active and develop important life skills. The Trust's programme offers schools a six-week PE programme which focuses specifically on different areas of football, with all lessons named after Cherries' players. All lessons follow the National Curriculum and also have an underlying tone of respect, as we encourage fairness and equality from all pupils during the lessons. Lesson plans are provided for teachers to aid their understanding of delivering football for PE. The Trust's programme not only provides schools with football themed PE delivery, but the offer is extended to include:

PSHE workshops

Tours of the Vitality Stadium

Football Festivals and Competitions

Opportunities to participate in the Premier League Schools Tournament (Under-11 Age Group)

Teacher Continued Professional Development Opportunities

The programme is currently offered to schools in Bournemouth, Poole and East Dorset, with different levels of

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package available to each school.

In January, the Trust and the FA hosted the FA Primary Teachers Award at the Hamworthy Club. The six-hour event was open to all qualified or those working towards Primary Schools teaching, as well as Higher Level Teaching Assistants. It was designed to provide a basic introduction to the skills required when planning a Key Stage 1 or 2 Physical Education lesson, involving football and other invasion games. The course covered a variety of topics including, movement skills, different types of practices and games which are linked to the National Curriculum as well as how teachers might run school sports teams. The course also touched on how differentiation and assessment for learning can be embedded within PE lessons. Throughout the season pupils from schools taking part in Primary Stars have been invited to a Matchday event which included coaching and skills games, small sided matches, a half time penalty shoot-out and a tour of the ground before watching a match.

Participating schools have also had the opportunity to take part in the Primary Stars Schools Tournament. The project is also supported by Medhurst IT and sessions are regularly attended by AFC Bournemouth's first team players.

Schools Projects

The Trust offers four unique educational workshops to schools in Dorset. The workshops look at key themes, Healthy Lifestyles, Respect, Road and Rail Safety and Internet Safety and can be tailored to be suitable for both Primary and Secondary Schools. Lasting an hour, the educational workshops aim to encourage the children and young people to think about the topic in more depth through an interactive lesson.

Healthy Lifestyles

The main objective of the Healthy Lifestyle workshop is to educate young people on the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle, through diet and exercise. The popular lessons aim to make children and young people more aware of the food they are eating and looks at the Eatwell plate, the five main food groups and also nutrients, minerals and vitamins whilst teaching their role within the human body. The lesson also asks the young people to consider the healthy lifestyle of a professional footballer, and compare their diet to exercise, whilst also asking the young people to design their own meal for a Premier League footballer. The workshops are supported by Trethowans Solicitors.

Respect and citizenship

The Respect workshop embraces young people's love for football and uses examples from the Premier League and AFC Bournemouth to help encourage and promote positive behaviour. The lessons touch on both respectful and disrespectful behaviours in everyday life, before taking a more in-depth look at respect within football, illustrated through presentations and videos. Project sponsor, Goadsby, have also created workshop booklets which are given to Primary School pupils to aid their learning within the subject. The booklets include fun activities and games, whilst also showing examples of how we can show respect in Football. The lesson encourages the pupils to share ideas within small group discussion, whilst inspiring them to demonstrate positive and respectful behaviours within the classroom.

Safer Kids Online - Internet safety

The Safer Kids Online programme is a popular workshop which is delivered to local schools, with the support of ESET UK. It aims to educate young people about how to remain safe whilst using the internet. The indoor classroom-based lesson addresses the children and young people's most common uses of the internet and explores how different applications and websites can be used. This aspect of the lesson touches on privacy, and what should and should not be included in profiles on social media and gaming websites. Discussions are encouraged within small groups, as the children and young people look at the differences between personal and non-personal information and talk about the implications of sharing personal information. The workshops also use a video which looks at the dangers of having an open profile on the internet. To conclude, the lesson looks at prevention methods and privacy settings, and what websites offer within this area.

Soccer Safety School

The Soccer Safety School lessons were designed to help educate children and young people how to be safe when travelling within the local community. The workshops look closely at travelling using a variety of different

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methods, including; buses, cars, cycling and on foot, identifying the do's and don'ts in certain situations. The lesson uses illustrations and videos to help the young people identify hazards, and encourages discussions around this. The lessons are sponsored by Yellow Buses.

Rail Safety

The Trust works in partnership with Network Rail to educate school children around staying safe when using trains, and around train lines. The lessons use group work and small quizzes to encourage the children to think about times when they would have used the train lines and promote positive thinking on rail safety. One section of the lesson focuses on railway signs and signals, and the importance of adhering to these, before finally looking at trespassing on railway lines and the dangers involved in this.

Show Racism the Red Card

The Trust hosted a Show Racism the Red Card event at Vitality Stadium in April.

Year five pupils from St. James' Primary School took part in the workshop, which began with a talk from campaign officer, Ben Holman.

The students were then given booklets to fill in throughout the afternoon, enhancing their education on racism and encouraging them to think up some questions surrounding the topic.

Towards the end of the day, these questions were then put to a very special panel, which included first team defender Nathan Ake, club ambassador Steve Fletcher, and women's player Ayuma Asira.

They were then on hand to share their experiences and teach the children how they can report any racism heard in the local community.

To end the afternoon, the best questions asked by the pupils were rewarded, with footballs and t-shirts given away.

Football Education Programme - College Offer

The Trust, in partnership with SCL, is proud to be offering an alternative education pathway for 16 - 19-year olds. The Football Education Programme is tailored for those looking to enhance their footballing skills whilst developing an outstanding knowledge of sport. The daily course takes place at St. Aldhelms Academy, Poole, where we utilise excellent ICT facilities, a Gym, Sports Hall and grass pitches. Regardless of the previous academic achievements of the student, we provide an outstanding learning environment for all to strive and fulfil their potential.

The aims are:

- To give students the skills and knowledge to start a career in sport or progress to employment within the AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust
- · To prepare students for higher or further education, through full-time or part-time study
- To improve students technical, tactical, psychological and social skills

The objectives of these qualifications are to help students to:

- · Choose a pathway and units that reflect their career or academic aspirations
- Enter employment into the sport and active leisure sector or to progress to higher or further education
- Gain and develop essential skills that are valued by employers and higher and further education institutions
- Develop knowledge and understanding of the vocational sector

This programme offers the opportunity for the successful candidates to not only develop within a professional sporting environment, but also to gain a qualification that provides the opportunity for a career in sport. Alternatively, students can gain enough UCAS points to earn a University place at the end of Year 2. Studying for a BTEC Diploma in Sport provides students with the equivalent of 3 A—Levels. Students are required to meet minimum GSCE requirements to be accepted onto this programme.

The Trust also offers exciting opportunities for young, talented, female football enthusiasts to combine academic studies with a comprehensive Football Development Programme based at Brockenhurst College. The academic curriculum can be tailored to match educational potential with a range of A Levels and a BTEC National Diploma in Sport on offer. If required students can also complete their Maths and English GCSEs.

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Our Female Elite Player Programme provides access to high quality coaching and football education with a range of sessions available each day including team sessions, 1 to 1's and recovery/gym-based sessions. Extra support is provided through massage and strength and conditioning support. Students on the programme will compete in a fixtures schedule on Wednesdays as part of the National College League against other professional clubs and friendly matches throughout the season.

Premier League Enterprise Challenge

The Premier League Enterprise Challenge is an annual business challenge, which the Trust has been delivering over the past four seasons. The PL Enterprise aims to inspire young people to engage positively in education and raise awareness of the world of work and business. The Trust has been able to offer this Challenge to six local secondary schools over the previous three years, as they have worked towards the business challenge set by the Premier League. The Challenge sees the Trust host a Club heat to select a representative team, who then attend one of six regional "play-offs" against other Premier League Clubs. The winners of each play-off then represent their club in the Premier League Enterprise Challenge Final. This year's winners, Avonbourne College finished runners-up in the regional heat.

Apprenticeships

The Trust offers a unique opportunity for 16-18-year olds to gain coaching experience and participate in an 'Activity Leadership Apprenticeship'. During the year- long apprenticeship, as well as working within the local community alongside the coaches within the Community Sports Trust, apprentices are required to complete assignments, working towards a City & Guilds/NVQ in Active Leadership. A successful first year on the apprenticeship scheme provides the opportunity to progress onto a second year, then future jobs with the Community Sports Trust.

Health and Well-being

Care South

The Trust and Care South have been working in partnership successfully for over 6 seasons. The partnership encompasses two main activities: The Extra Time project and Walking Football. The Extra Time project involves Trust coaches visiting the various Care South care home across Bournemouth, Poole, Christchurch and other Dorset locations. As part of the interaction with the residents the coaches take part in various activities; including sharing AFC Bournemouth memories through photos and various other items of memorabilia. A crucial part of the Trust's visit to the homes is the Chair Football activity. The coaches also lead the sessions through encouraging the participants to pass the ball around the room, whilst remaining seated. To build on the session, obstacles and goals are added, which also replicates more common football practises.

Walking Football

The Trust runs weekly Walking Football coaching sessions in partnership with Care South. Walking Football is a version of the popular sport, with a few small rule changes. One of the most important changes being that it must be played at a walking pace. These sessions are offered to both men and women aged 50+ and encourages them to keep fit and healthy without playing an especially competitive or demanding sport.

Goals - The Cherries Fit Challenge

The Trust has continued with male and female fitness sessions throughout the year.

The Cherries Fit Challenge for men aged 35+ includes sport-based activities at Vitality Stadium on a Thursday evening.

The Women's Cherries Fit Challenge is new for 2019 and also takes place on a Thursday evening at Vitality Stadium.

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Female Goals

The Trust also hosts weekly fitness sessions for all girls and women aged 16+. The weekly sessions take place The Bourne Academy School, inside the sports hall, and offer girls and women aged 16+ the chance to get fit and workout under the guidance of Star Performance.

MENTalk Group

Since November, the Trust in partnership with Wessex Cancer Trust, has been holding a monthly MENTalk group at the football club to support local men living with cancer.

The initiative encourages men of any age who either have cancer themselves or are supporting someone through it to visit the club, enjoy a stadium tour and find out more about MENTalk.

The monthly groups are held on the first Thursday of the month between 7pm and 8.30pm.

MENTalk is designed to enable men to come together to share knowledge and experiences whilst encouraging and supporting each other. They will also be able to learn skills to help them deal with stress and adjust to their changing situation.

Additionally, it will provide a safe place to talk openly about feelings and fears, and will be led by a trained facilitator and attended by cancer specialists.

Wessex Cancer Trust already runs well-attended MENTalk groups at its Support Centres in Cosham and Waterside, Hythe.

Wessex Cancer Trust is a charity which was set up specifically to provide emotional and practical support to anyone living with cancer in the Wessex region, but men make up just 22% of clients accessing their support services. This is despite them being 16% more likely to receive a cancer diagnosis and 40% more likely to die from the disease.

Social Inclusion

Disability Football

The Trust is committed to ensuring that everybody has the opportunity to play football and attend a session designed to meet their needs. Thanks to the Premier League and BT disability fund, a disability programme has been developed which offers a range of competitive and recreational sport opportunities as well as ensuring that all programmes run by the Trust are accessible and inclusive for all.

Turn up and play

There are plenty of turn up and play opportunities for both adults and children with disabilities, throughout the week in Bournemouth and Poole:

Reach - Mental Health
Downs Syndrome specific
Hearing impaired
Pan disabilities
Disability kicks
Cerebral palsy specific
Frame football
Power chair

Schools

The Partnered Schools Scheme provides six weeks free coaching in schools. The offer covers PE lessons, lunch clubs or after school clubs, free of charge to main-stream schools with SEND pupils or SEND specialist schools. It also offers additional resources alongside CPD opportunities for teaching staff.

Teams

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FA Talent Hub - The Talent Hub teams are part of the FA Pathway, and offer talented individuals with Hearing Impairments, Cerebral Palsy or Visual Impairments the opportunity to play football at an elite level. Powerchair - There are two Powerchair Football teams, who represent AFC Bournemouth in their respective competitions. One team plays in the South East Regional Powerchair Football League, whilst the other plays in the WFA National Championships and both teams compete in the WFA Cup.

Ability Counts - Ability Counts Senior and Youth teams compete in the Saints Foundation Pan-Disability Leagues. Representing AFC Bournemouth in competitive and participation leagues, are teams at aged Under-12, Under-16 and Senior Level. All Ability Counts teams are supported by Cathedral City. The programme sees us work closely with a variety of key partners in the community such as the local authority and specialist schools to develop and implement a specifically designed programme of impairment specific and pan disability sport to get as many people as possible engaged in sport.

DS

In November the Cherries Down Syndrome team hosted their first friendly fixture at Vitality Stadium, welcoming their guests from Dorset Abilities Group in Weymouth.

Starting the fixture with a tour of the stadium, both sets of players enjoyed looking around the home and away changing rooms, walking out of the tunnel and visiting the TV rooms for a post-match interview.

From here, the sides changed into their team colours and made their way round to the 3G pitches, where they took part in a warm-up and range of shooting games together, before moving into their small-sided fixtures. During the match, both teams played some excellent football especially the two goalkeepers who made fantastic saves and the strikers who netted no less than 12 goals throughout the game.

On their debut, playing in the AFC Bournemouth colours, the Down Syndrome team played some nice football, with every outfield player marking their first appearance with a goal, whilst the 'keeper and captain Jake made some brilliant saves.

The Cherries DS team now looks forward to a successful future.

Summer schools

During the Easter and summer school holidays the Trust hosted eight disability soccer schools in Bournemouth and Purbeck.

Ability Counts sessions took place at the Littledown Centre and enabled children aged 5-18 years old with all physical and learning difficulties the opportunity to play in a five-hour football session.

Powerchair soccer schools took place at the Purbeck Sports Centre and were open to Powerchair users of all ages.

There were also Down Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy and hearing-impaired soccer schools for young people aged 5-18 years old at the Littledown Centre on selected dates.

Powerchair

In their first season the Powerchair South East Regional Team completed their fixtures with two excellent wins which ensured that they won the Division Two title. The last weekend meet-up of the season saw the Warriors gain promotion to the Muscular Dystrophy UK Premiership, both of which equals a very successful season for the AFC Bournemouth Squads.

Tours

Trust coaches visited South Africa in March for a five-day community project. Working specifically with the Kick4Life Project and the Premier League, they delivered coach education sessions to the project's coaches on differentiation, specifically working with visually impaired players, and inclusion within sessions. Throughout their stay, the coaches worked with locals at the Kick4Life Project's facilities, visited a local school to see them in action, worked with the Kick4Life Academy at the Lesotho National Stadium and delivered a practical session to the pupils at the St Bernadette's Resource Centre for the visually impaired.

In April, Trust coaches visited Brisbane, Australia for a week long coaching trip.

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Working in partnership with Gregory Terrace, St Joseph's College, the coaches worked with over 100 young people in soccer school style coaching sessions at the Tennyson football fields.

Whilst in Brisbane, they also worked with Brisbane City Football Club, offering coach education sessions for the Brisbane City coaching staff.

This is the second trip to Australia made by the Trust as part of the partnership with the college, who will next year visit Bournemouth with a number of students on a football tour.

Plans for Future Periods

Half term Soccer Camps – the addition of pre and post camp sessions will provide extra football, fun coaching games and other sports for two hours before or after the sessions.

Internet Safety Workshops – the Trust will be working in partnership with Dorset Police Safe school to deliver workshops to over 300 children.

ESSA – In December the Trust will entertain a group of under-16 girls from Elite Soccer Skills Academy as part of their UK tour. Elite Soccer Skills Academy is a player development platform from Florida, headed by ex-AFC Bournemouth director Adam Murray. The team are travelling to the UK for a ten-day tour, which includes fixtures against AFC Bournemouth, QPR and Yeovil Town.

The ten-day tour is packed with games, coaching, visits and presentations which it is hoped all the players will enjoy and will be a benefit as they continue their studies and careers.

5-a-side - The Trust is delighted to offer a weekly five-a-side football session at Slade's Park 3G for adults beginning in March. The session will provide the opportunity for anyone aged 35+ to play small-sided football and keep fit.

NCS - From 2020, the Trust will engage thousands of young people aged 16 and 17 by delivering the National Citizen Service (NCS), a four-week programme funded by the Government.

NCS is one of the fastest growing youth programmes engaging 500,000 young people since piloting in 2009. The NCS experience will give young people a clearer idea of what they want from their future. They will take on fresh challenges, get a taste of independence and be given a platform to have their voices heard and deliver a social action project that will positively impact their local area.

Through the EFL Trust, over 1.8 million hours of voluntary work has been delivered addressing local and national issues which young people are passionate about such as mental health, the environment and plastic waste.

The Trust won the contract to deliver NCS from 2020 onwards joining 65 delivery partners that will be managed by the EFL Trust.

Covid-19

Further to the outbreak of coronavirus (COVID-19) and in accordance with the regulations and advice from the Government, FA and Premier League, the Trust had to suspend most of its activities during March.

Work began behind the scenes immediately to develop methods and resources to enable the Trust to stay in regular contact with everyone during this time of unprecedented change and a wide range of videos, Zoom meetings, online activities and activity packs were quickly developed. These included:

Regular Mini Kickers skill sessions on video
Home workout sessions for both adults and children on video
Powerchair Zoom meetings
Walking Football Zoom meetings
CPD sessions for coaches covering a range of topics including Safeguarding and Staffing
A Safer Kids online education session

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Participation in the PL Stay at Home Cup for the young people involved in Kicks Virtual players meetings for the Girls teams
Activity Packs for Primary and Secondary schoolchildren including Maths and Writing skills A Zoom meeting with partners and students in South Africa

Wellbeing – the Trust and Dorset Health Care are joining forces to support the physical and mental health of their social media followers and their families.

The coronavirus outbreak and lockdown has affected everyone's lives differently, so the Trust together with the football club and the county's provider of mental health and community physical health services have teamed up to kick-off the month-long 'Wellbeing: We're On Your Side' campaign.

Followers will be able to find and share ideas ranging from keeping active, feeding the family during lockdown, sleeping better and where to find professional help.

Please stay safe and well during this time.

Financial review

The net income for the year amounted to £203,246 which together with the accumulated funds brought forward leave funds of £669,712 to be carried forward.

Reserves

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds to the level required to provide sufficient funds to cover administration costs.

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is 61 Macrae Road, Pill, Bristol, BS20 0DD.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift,
 receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor
 part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Tangible assets (continued)

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Fixtures and fittings -

25% reducing balance

Motor vehicles

25% reducing balance

Equipment

- 25% reducing balance

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The Trust is a Company Limited by Guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up the limit in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10.
