STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on October 11, 2007 and registered as a charity on February 8, 2008. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Appointment of trustees

The trustees who are directors for the purpose of company law and trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report, are set out on page 2. New trustees are appointed upon the recommendation of existing trustees. One third of the trustees must retire at each annual general meeting and offer themselves for re-election.

Risk management

The trustees have identified and considered the main risks to which the Trust is exposed and have taken the necessary steps to mitigate and manage these risks.

Organisational structure

Day to day responsibility for the provision of services rests with the head of the Community Sports Trust, Steve Cuss, a qualified FA and UEFA coach. He is supported by Senior Managers Andrew Battison and Luke Simpson. All administration is undertaken by Anne Cuss.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Trust's objective is the promotion of community participation in healthy recreation, in particular by the provision of facilities for the playing of football. The aim is to help young people, especially but not exclusively through leisure time activities, so as to develop their capabilities that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society. Also, to provide or assist in the provision of sporting and recreational facilities for the public of Bournemouth and surrounding areas without reference to race, religion and belief, sex, disability, nationality, ethnic or national origin or social background, with the object of improving their conditions of life.

The trustees confirm that they have had regard to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

The Trust is now supported and many of its projects are funded by the Premier League Charitable Fund. Funding has also been received from the PLCF for Continuous Improvement which has enabled the Trust to upgrade its administration function.

The Trust actively supports both the community and AFC Bournemouth, providing everyone within the opportunities to get involved in its activities. It uses the power of football to deliver inspirational, progressive and professional initiatives that follow the accessible, stylish and friendly values of the Club,

which maximise the opportunities for local talent, and make a positive, real and lasting difference to the community within which the Club operates.

The Community Sports Trust is the charitable arm of AFC Bournemouth, actively working in the local community across Bournemouth, Poole and Dorset, and is the number one deliverer of sport development across Dorset and Hampshire. Formed in 2001 from AFC Bournemouth Football in the Community, the Community Sports Trust continues a charitable working partnership AFC Bournemouth and delivers over 100 sessions a week, to a wide variety of children and adults of all ages and abilities within the local communities of Bournemouth, Poole and Christchurch, reaching over 4,000 people weekly. The Trust works to offer a wide range of football and multi-sport sessions to people of all abilities with the vision to help people achieve their goals through the delivery of quality sports sessions. In 2008, AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust gained Charitable Status (Charity Number: 1122693). The Trust has a huge impact upon the local community through increasing individuals' involvement in sport, and works towards four main themes: Sports Participation, Health and Well-being, Education and Sports Inclusion.

Sports Participation

The Trust offers weekly coaching sessions to a variety of different age groups. The sessions cover children from as young as 1, to adults over the age of 50. Sessions are run in several locations across Bournemouth, Poole and the wider areas.

Mini Cherries

Mini-Cherries is aimed at preschool children at ages 1-4. These sessions help children learn the basic principles of play, such as sharing and communication, along with improving their basic motor skills, balance and co-ordination. Most importantly, our Mini- Cherries sessions are designed for young children to have a taste of football and enjoy learning the game.

Minikickers

Minikickers is one the most popular sessions, reaching over 200 children a week at the AFC Bournemouth Vitality Stadium. The sessions invite children to join in with ball and skill drills, along with shooting games, before finishing with small sided matches. Run over two consecutive hours, the sessions are aimed at children of different ages throughout the morning.

AFC Bournemouth Girls' programme and AFC Bournemouth Ladies

The AFC Bournemouth Girls' programme offers girls aged 8-16 years old the opportunity to play for AFC Bournemouth in the Winchester and District League. The newly-formed Cherries Girls sides train twice a week, and play weekly matches. In addition, the girls will also play in a Premier League and Football League Elite League throughout school holidays.

The Trust continues to run the AFC Bournemouth Ladies teams, and following the successes of previous seasons, is pleased to be offering competitive opportunities to both girls and women in six squads.

Girls Development Sessions

The Trust is committed to improving the confidence and development of female footballers, and offers weekly Girls Development sessions. The sessions take place on the astro-pitches at the AFC Bournemouth Vitality Stadium. The girls take part in sessions which are aimed at learning new skills, match related plays and small-sided games.

Premier League Girls

This Premier League funded project aims to encourage girls to get into playing football in a fun and safe environment. There are three sessions per week at the Vitality Stadium and the Bourne Academy for girls aged 7-16 years old.

Premier League Kicks

The Premier League Kicks programme continued to expand during the year and is fully funded by the Premier League. The Kicks project offers sessions to mixed groups, as well as girls' only evenings, with coached sessions for those aged 8-13 years old and tournament-style sessions for those aged 14+. It encourages young people to get involved in playing sports in the evenings, which sees them benefit from a healthier lifestyle, improved well-being and most importantly offers them a safe environment to enjoy themselves.

Extra-Curricular Coaching and School Clubs

The Trust has a successful long-standing partnership with many schools within the local area to deliver extra-curricular sessions aimed at both boys and girls, and hosts three main clubs: Breakfast Club, which runs an hour before school, Lunchtime Club that runs during school lunchtimes, and the very popular After School Club. The clubs typically run once a week for the entire term, and include coaching sessions on passing, control, dribbling and shooting, which are combined with fun games, small competitions and small sided matches.

Bournemouth University

The Trust has been working in partnership with Bournemouth University for the past two years. This partnership has involved Community coaches leading the training and management of the four university men's and one ladies football teams, who play in the BUCS Sport league.

Soccer Schools

The Trust runs popular Soccer Schools during school holidays throughout the year across Bournemouth, Purbeck and Blandford, aimed at boys and girls aged 4-14. Sessions are for children of any ability and include a fun warm up and skills games, penalty competitions and small-sided matches. Popular sessions include full day courses aimed at children aged 7-14, and our shorter courses aimed at children aged 4, 5 and 6

All Soccer Schools are run and delivered by qualified and experienced football coaches who have all completed up to date safeguarding and emergency aid qualifications. All staff are also DBS checked.

Linked Clubs Initiative

The Trust runs a successful Linked Clubs scheme with a select group of local football clubs. The Linked Club initiative sees AFC Bournemouth Community coaches work alongside the local football clubs to deliver sessions to players, and also invite coaches to receive bespoke Coach Education and Continued Professional Development sessions throughout the season. Teams also have the opportunity to attend sessions and have a tour of the facilities at the Vitality Stadium. Furthermore, the Trust runs specific training sessions for the team and also host Soccer Schools aimed at the Club's players and friends. This is a great opportunity for clubs to add to their current remits of providing football to their local community.

Birthday Parties

The Trust offers birthday parties at the Vitality Stadium on non-matchdays.

Education

Respect

The Respect workshop embraces young people's love for football along with AFC Bournemouth and the Premier League to help encourage and promote good and positive behaviours, and discourage the young people from acting disrespectfully within the local community.

The lessons touch on both respectful and disrespectful behaviours in everyday life, before taking a more in depth look at the role of respect within sport and football.

The lesson uses a variety of resources including videos to illustrate respectful and disrespectful behaviours. The pupils also receive booklets provided by sponsor Goadsby, which include fun activities surrounding respect and also examples of how we can show respect within football.

The lesson encourages the pupils into discussions, and sharing ideas and thoughts on good behaviours, whilst also inspiring them to demonstrate positive respectful behaviours in the classroom.

To end the lesson, the Community Sports Trust asks the children to design a poster based around respect, this is then entered into a competition.

Football Education Programme

Students aged 16-19 who are passionate about football can study, train and also represent AFC Bournemouth with the Football Education Programme.

The BTEC based education programme is delivered by our Partners SCL, an approved BTEC Centre. AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust delivers the sports training.

The full-time programme, based at St Aldhelm's Academy, allows the students to work towards either a (BTEC) Level 2 or 3. Long-term the course provides opportunities for the students to progress into further education and study and full-time employment.

The course allows the students to train every day, with the sessions run by FA qualified coaches, who work for the Trust. The players then represent AFC Bournemouth in both the SCL Football League and also the National Football Youth League (U19) where they will get the opportunity to play against other Premier League and Football league clubs throughout the country.

Premier League Primary Stars

Premier League Primary Stars uses the power of the Premier League to inspire children to learn, be active and develop important life skills. AFC Bournemouth's Premier League Primary Stars project consists of a 10 week PE programme, which is free to Year 5 and 6 children in Bournemouth Schools.

The 10 week programme focuses specifically on different areas of football, with all the lessons named after Cherries' players, for instance the 'Turn Like Marc Pugh' Lesson or 'Score Goals like Benik Afobe'. To add to this core theme, each lesson also has an underlying tone of respect, as the Community Sports Trust coaches encourage fairness and equality from all the pupils within the lessons.

The lessons not only provide the young people with coaching from a Premier League Football Club, but the teachers also receive a school pack containing lesson plans for continued use throughout the school.

Connect with Care

The Connect with Care, Internet Safety lesson is a one hour workshop, which looks to educate young people on how to remain safe whilst using the internet.

The indoor, classroom based lessons look at what young people might use the internet for; gaming, social media, etc. It develops to look at how we use these different applications and websites, and what information we include within our profiles on gaming websites and the various social media.

Using small groups and classroom discussions, the young people look at the difference between personal and non-personal information and talk about why we should not share certain pieces of information about ourselves. The workshop also uses video to look at the dangers of having an open profile about ourselves on the internet.

Lastly, the lesson covers prevention methods, and looks at methods we can use to keep ourselves safe when using the internet.

Soccer Safety School

The Soccer Safety School lesson was designed to help educate children about how to play safely within the community and looks closely at being safe when travelling in buses and cars, cycling and on foot. The lesson uses illustrations and videos to help the young people identify hazards and encourages the children to discuss not only why these are hazards, but also how we can deal with them to stop anything from happening and what we could do to not be put in a dangerous position from the start.

Healthy Lifestyles

The main objective of the Healthy Lifestyle workshop is to educate young people on the importance on a healthy diet and lifestyle. The lessons aim to make children more aware of the food that they are eating. The lesson looks at the Eatwell Plate, the five main food groups and also nutrients, minerals and vitamins whilst also teaching the children their role within the human body. The lesson also touches on exercise

and the importance of completing regular exercise to keep ourselves healthy.

Each workshop lasts one hour in duration. 45 minutes is spent inside the classroom discussing the above points, whilst the final 15 minutes take place in the school playground, where the children take part in fun activities which help to demonstrate not only how to eat healthy but also how they can exercise in a fun way.

Apprenticeships

The Trust offers a unique opportunity for 16-18 year olds to gain coaching experience and participate in an 'Activity Leadership Apprenticeship'. During the year- long apprenticeship, as well as working within the local community alongside the coaches within the Community Sports Trust, apprentices are required to complete assignments, working towards a City & Guilds/NVQ in Active Leadership. A successful first year on the apprenticeship scheme provides the opportunity to progress onto a second year, then future jobs with the Community Sports Trust.

Europartner

The Trust has been successfully running a unique football coaching programme for German Exchange students when they visit Bournemouth for over 5 years, and annually sees approximately 350 young German students. The programme consists of English lessons, with football coaching alongside. Typically the students are between 12 and 17 years old and will take part in two weeks' worth of coaching sessions.

Bournemouth and Poole College Coaching

The Trust in partnership with Bournemouth and Poole College offer the chance to gain national recognized qualification in football coaching at the Vitality Stadium.

Health and Well-being

AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust is in its third season working in partnership with Care South. The partnership encompasses two main activities: the Extra Time Project and Walking Football.

Extra Time

The Extra Time project involves visiting the various Care South care homes across Bournemouth, Poole and other Dorset locations. As part of their interaction with the residents, the Community coaches take part in various activities including sharing memories of AFC Bournemouth through photos and different items of memorabilia, and chair football activities.

Walking Football

AFC Bournemouth runs weekly Walking Football sessions in partnership with Care South. These sessions are offered to both men and women aged 50+, and encourage them to keep fit and healthy, without playing an especially competitive or demanding sport.

Sports Inclusion

Disability Football

At AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust we are committed to ensuring that everybody has the opportunity to play football and attend a session designed to meet their needs.

Thanks to the Premier league and BT disability fund we have developed the disability programme to offer a range of competitive and recreational sport opportunities as well as ensuring that all programmes run by the Community Sports Trust are accessible and inclusive for all.

The programme sees us work closely with a variety of key partners in the community such as the local authority and specialist schools to develop and implement a specifically designed programme of impairment specific and pan disability sport to get as many people as possible engaged in sport.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The net income for the year amounted to £266,710 which together with the accumulated funds brought forward leave funds of £433,072 to be carried forward.

Reserves

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds to the level required to provide sufficient funds to cover administration costs.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The focus for the Trust for 2017/2018 will be to continue to deliver its core activities and extend the range of projects, made possible by the funding received from the Premier League Charitable Fund.

Goals - The Cherries Fit Challenge a new diet and exercise programme is being launched for men over the age of 35.

1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2016) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

b) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

c) Financial instruments

The trust only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

d) Pensions

All employees have been assessed and where applicable have been enrolled into a company pension scheme.

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Investment income is included when receivable
- Income from charitable activities is accounted for when earned
- Income from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, is accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of a charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

Motor vehicles

25% reducing balance

Equipment

25% reducing balance

Furniture and fittings

25% reducing balance

Pupils on the project carry out Maths and English tasks in an interactive, practical way that is based on learning about how a football club operates as a business.

PL/BT Disability

A programme to create possibilities for disabled people through sport.

Mitre Group

Funding received to provide apprenticeships.

Floodlights

Funding was received from Sport England to acquire mobile floodlights used during evening sessions of social inclusion projects.
