### Structure, governance and management

### **Governing document**

AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on October 11, 2007 and registered as a charity on February 8, 2008. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

### **Appointment of trustees**

The trustees who are directors for the purpose of company law and trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report, are set out on page 2. New trustees are appointed upon the recommendation of existing trustees. One third of the trustees must retire at each annual general meeting and offer themselves for re-election.

### Risk management

The trustees have identified and considered the main risks to which the Trust is exposed and have taken the necessary steps to mitigate and manage these risks on a regular basis.

### Organisational structure

Day to day responsibility for the provision of services rests with the head of the Community Sports Trust, Steve Cuss, a qualified FA and UEFA coach. He is supported by Senior Managers Andrew Battison and Luke Simpson. All administration is undertaken by Anne Cuss.

### Year ended 30 November 2022

### Objectives and activities for the public benefit

The Trust's objective is the promotion of community participation in healthy recreation, in particular by the provision of facilities for the playing of football. The aim is to help young people, especially but not exclusively through leisure time activities, so as to develop their capabilities that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society. Also, to provide or assist in the provision of sporting and recreational facilities for the public of Bournemouth and surrounding areas without reference to race, religion and belief, sex, disability, nationality, ethnic or national origin or social background, with the object of improving their conditions of life. The trustees confirm that they have had regard to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

The Community Sports Trust is the charitable arm of AFC Bournemouth, actively working in the local community across Bournemouth, Poole and surrounding areas within four main strands of work:

Education – Health – Participation – Inclusion

The team of 44 full time staff deliver over 150 coaching and teaching sessions and engage with 4,000 people, from ages 1 to 101, a week, working in partnership with schools, organisations and businesses.

The Trust's vision is to provide opportunities for all, through project delivery, meeting the needs of the local community and delivering a mixture of active sessions along with education and support groups. A key aim is to help individuals reach their potential with pathways in place from recreational activities through to teams and there are currently 28 registered teams across the community from the Girls & Women's programme, Disability, College and Walking football.

The AFC Bournemouth Community Sports Trust was formed in 2001 from the Football in the Community programme and has continued its charitable working partnership with AFC Bournemouth. In 2008 it gained charitable status and continues to be a self-funding, non-profit organisation which has a huge impact upon the local community through increasing involvement in sport.

The Trust is supported and many of its projects are funded by the Premier League Charitable Fund.

### Strategic report

The following sections covering the achievements, performance and financial review form the strategic report of the charity.

### Community

During April, the EFL launched its first ever Week of Action and the Trust played its part along with the other 71 clubs by showcasing plenty of activity throughout the week, highlighting girls and women's football at the club especially.

The EFL Week of Action was an opportunity to highlight the work done by the Trust and demonstrate the difference it makes to its community.

### Hope for Food charity

The Trust continued to show its support for the Hope for Food charity, based in West Howe. The organisation was set up in 2012 and is run entirely by volunteers, with the aim of providing life's basic essentials on a daily basis to people in need of help due to the current economic climate.

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### Year ended 30 November 2022

Hope for Food's mission is to assist men, women and children in Bournemouth and the surrounding areas, who are either homeless or living in poverty, by providing fresh food at the soup kitchens and hampers of food, as well as good quality clothing, bedding and household goods where needed. The charity helps anyone who reaches out to them and serves those who do without judgement. During April, a donation point was set up at the Slades Park Soccer Camp for the second year in a row.

### Ringwood development

During August, the Trust, Ringwood Town Council and Ringwood Town Football Club announced the start of construction on the new multi-million-pound re-development at Long Lane, Ringwood. The first phase of the development, involved a full-size floodlight 3G artificial turf pitch (ATP). Further developments, including new clubhouse and infrastructure will follow in early 2023. The £3.2 million project has been boosted by funding from the Football Foundation, New Forest District Council and Ringwood & District Round Table.

The significant investment into the Long Lane development represents an opportunity to develop an excellent sporting and social facility for the town of Ringwood and the surrounding area, where the site will continue to be the home of all teams associated to Ringwood Town and enable AFC Bournemouth's Community Sports Trust to run a number of community programmes during the next decade to transform the grassroots game.

### **Sports Participation**

The Trust offers weekly coaching sessions and activities to a variety of different age groups and abilities across the local community.

### Mini Cherries

Mini Cherries is a twice weekly toddler football session, which aims to help children learn the basic principles of play such as sharing and communication, along with improving their basic motor skills, balance and coordination

The most important parts of a Mini Cherries session are the introduction to football and the enjoyment of learning the game.

### Minikickers

Minikickers is one of the more popular weekly sessions, reaching over 200 children a week at the Vitality Stadium alone. The sessions which last an hour invite children to join in and learn new skills through dribbling games, shooting drills and small-sided matches.

### Women and Girls Football

The Trust continues to run the AFC Bournemouth Girls and Womens teams, and following the successes of previous seasons, is pleased to be offering competitive opportunities to both girls and women in six squads. The successful girls-only football coaching programme has been running for over three seasons at the Vitality Stadium, Slades Park and Brockenhurst College.

Over 350 women and girls participated in the programme during the year, with the entire programme supported by Bournemouth University which included:

Wildcats for girls aged 5-11

Premier League Kicks for girls aged 12-16

Emerging Talent Centre for U9s, U11s and U13s

AFC Bournemouth Girls' Team for U10s, U12s, U14s and U16s

Female Football Education Programme for girls aged 16-19 and based at Brockenhurst College

Women's Senior Teams (first team and development squad) for women over the age of 16

During the year the Trust was awarded a License from the FA/Premier League to run an Emerging Talent Centre (ETC) for the next three years.

The awarding of this license will allow the Trust to further their existing work within the girls' and women's game, offering specific focus on the younger age groups.

The ETC will focus on the under-9s, under-11s and under-13s age groups, with players receiving weekly coaching sessions to complement their existing club commitments.

This then links to the club's existing girls' academy sides for the under-10s, under-12s, under-14s and under-16s age groups.

In July, the two youngest girls' teams visited Bournemouth University's Talbot Campus for a student-led workshop.

Throughout the season, the age groups take part in various workshops exploring topics including healthy lifestyles, internet safety and football-specific position-based workshops.

The first session of the year saw two of the teams partake in a nutrition workshop. The opening part was a classroom-based activity where the girls learnt about the importance of a balanced diet and how they can fuel up for football.

The second part to their session was a practical activity, which saw the girls in the kitchen making pizzas using tortilla wraps. Each of the players made their own pizzas, complete with lots of vegetables and a protein source.

During October, Lewis Manning one of the Trust's partners hosted their second annual Candles on the Lake event, in Poole Park.

The event saw the local community come together to reflect, celebrate and remember people they love and care about to raise vital funds for the charity.

The Lewis Manning team were joined by several players from the under-18s, alongside Head of Education and Player Care Dawn Roach. Women's team players were also present and joined by their manager Steve Cuss.

### **Premier League Kicks**

The Premier League Kicks programmes continue to expand and now offer free football sessions in Bournemouth, Poole and Verwood. This popular project offers free football and additional opportunities to over 1000 local young people a year. The project encourages young people to get involved in playing sports in the evenings and at weekends, which sees them benefit from a healthier lifestyle, improved well-being and most importantly offers them a safe environment to enjoy themselves and have fun with friends.

The project offers sessions to mixed groups, as well as a girls only evening session. Sessions for children aged 8-13 years old are coached sessions, whereas sessions for those aged 14+ are tournament style sessions.

During October the Trust joined forces with the BOLD group from J.P. Morgan to talk about Black History Month, with young people at a Premier League Kicks session.

The BOLD group joined the Community Coaches at the Monday evening PL Kicks session based at Vitality Stadium, and alongside their usual football activities the group took part in a session with the BOLD group and activities from the Community Outreach Van.

The young people learnt more about the significance of Black History Month, awareness of discrimination and discussed what they can do to make a change within their local communities.

During November, the Trust delivered Anti-Bullying Week projects in support of the national campaign.

To kick off the week, young people and adults who participate in the Monday evening Ability Counts and Premier League Kicks sessions supported the Anti-Bullying Alliance Campaign by wearing odd socks to their sessions, and made a monetary donation to further show their support.

In schools, the Trust's coaches delivered workshops to pupils in both Primary and Secondary. Over 20 workshops were delivered over the five-days to three local Primary Schools and over 40 young people from the Premier League Inspires programme.

To finish the week, young people from the Friday evening Premier League Kicks sessions took part in an active workshop alongside their usual weekly football session.

The workshops activities looked specifically at how to respect one-another, and what actions the young people can take to target bullying and help prevent such behaviour at their sessions.

#### Soccer Camps

The Trust hosts Soccer Camps every school holiday across Bournemouth, Purbeck and Blandford. The sessions are for boys and girls aged 7-14 years old, not including Minikickers Soccer Camps which are for boys and girls aged 4-6 years old and are available for children of any ability. They include a fun warm up, skill games, penalty competitions and small-sided matches. All Soccer Camps are run and delivered by qualified and experienced football coaches who have all completed up to date safeguarding and emergency aid qualifications. All staff are also DBS checked.

### **Extra-Curricular Coaching and School Clubs**

The Trust has a successful long-standing partnership with many schools in the local area delivering extra-curricular sessions for both boys and girls, and hosts three main clubs: Breakfast Club, which runs an hour before school, Lunchtime Club that runs during school lunchtimes, and the very popular After School Club. Typically, the clubs run once a week for the entire term, and include coaching sessions on passing, control, dribbling and shooting, combined with fun games, small competitions and small sided matches.

### **Bournemouth University**

Bournemouth University continues to support the Trust, maintaining long established links which began while the football club competed in League 1. In particular it supports the development of girls' football in Dorset as the main partner of the under-10, under-12, under-14 and under-16 AFC Bournemouth girls' teams. It also remains a Junior Cherries partner and members of this popular club for younger fans are invited to attend special events at the university with an educational aspect. The University's men's and women's teams continue to benefit from professional coaching from the Trust.

### **Birthday Parties**

The Trust offers birthday parties at the Vitality Stadium on non-matchdays.

### **Education**

Premier League Primary Stars

Premier League Primary Stars uses the power of professional football, and sport to inspire children to learn, be active and develop important life skills.

The programme provides all primary schools with the opportunity to be involved in a variety of sessions and events, with the aim of creating a positive and long-lasting sporting, education and health impact, for the local community.

It also includes PE delivery and CPD events for teachers and school staff. These sessions see coaches visiting local schools delivering sporting activities, which provides teachers and HLTA's with additional provision to enhance their own learning, as well as aiming to improve in skills, confidence and knowledge for delivering PE and school sport.

The Community Sports Trust's Primary Stars programme not only provides schools with football themed PE delivery, but the offer is extended to include:

- PSHE workshops (Individual lessons).
- PSHE Targeted Interventions (working with specific groups, for six consecutive lessons).
- Targeted Active Numeracy Programme (working with under achieving students, for six consecutive sessions).
- Targeted Reading Programme (working with under achieving students, for six consecutive sessions).
- Social Action projects- focusing on making an impact in the specific school or in the local community.
- Teacher Continued Professional Development Opportunities
- Inter school festivals (KS2 age groups)
- U11 Primary Schools Tournament

In March, the Trust donated 300 books to seven local primary schools in and around the Bournemouth area as part of World Book Day.

In addition, £250 worth of World Book Day vouchers were donated for teachers to share with students at their school.

### **Schools Projects**

The Trust offers a range of different school project lessons, delivered to local schools across the Dorset and Hampshire regions.

The workshops look at important themes throughout every-day life, Healthy Lifestyles, Respect and Citizenship, Safer Kids Online, Equality, Diversity and Inclusion and Road Soccer Safety. Each lesson is free of charge and can be tailored for different age ranges in Primary and Secondary Schools. In each lesson, there are PowerPoint presentations, group discussions and/ or individual/ small group tasks, as well as activity sheets and tasks to complete at various points during the lessons.

### Healthy Lifestyles

The Healthy Lifestyle workshop focuses on educating young people on the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle, through diet and exercise, as well as looking at hydration levels and the importance of sleep.

The lesson starts by looking at the Eatwell plate and then moves on to the breakdown of the main food groups including nutrients, minerals and vitamins and their importance.

The importance of taking part in regular exercise to keep healthy, and why it is important to keep hydrated whilst exercising is then covered.

Throughout the lesson, the participants complete different tasks and activities, such as creating healthy meals for AFC Bournemouth players, specifically linking to the different times of a match day.

### Respect and citizenship

The Respect and Citizenship workshop looks at how children's love for sport and football and AFC Bournemouth can be linked to help encourage positive behaviour.

The lesson touches on both respectful and disrespectful behaviours in everyday life, before taking a more in-depth look at respect within football, illustrated through presentations and videos.

Project sponsor, Goadsby, has also created workshop booklets which are given to Primary School pupils to aid their learning. These include fun activities and games, whilst also showing examples of how we can show respect in Football.

The lesson encourages the pupils to share ideas in small group discussions, whilst inspiring them to demonstrate positive and respectful behaviours in the classroom.

The final task for the children is to create a poster, demonstrating why respectful behaviour is important in everyday life, with key messages and examples included on their poster.

Safer Kids Online - Internet safety

### Year ended 30 November 2022

The Safer Kids Online programme is a popular workshop delivered to local schools. The lesson, supported by ESET UK, educates young people on how to remain safe whilst using the internet. The classroom-based lesson addresses the children's most common uses of the internet and develops on the safety features and age ranges for each of these different applications and websites. This lesson touches on keeping profiles secure, as well as what content should be kept private and not shared with others online.

Towards the end of the lesson, the children look at different scenarios which they may face online and how they would deal with each individual situation.

Finally, the children complete worksheets with some top tips on privacy settings and a Helping Hand task, which focuses on who they can speak to when they are worried online.

### **Money Management**

Money Management is a programme that is designed to support pupils in secondary schools across Dorset. The workshops, supported by Strategic Solutions, highlight the importance of promoting sensible finance and enhancing the knowledge and financial well-being of students and their futures. The programme will bring the schools maths curriculum to life by giving an introduction to financial literacy, educating pupils on tax, bank accounts, budgeting and understanding credit. The workshops also provide students with information on how to access additional support on financial areas and products outside the sessions.

### **Show Racism the Red Card**

During April the Trust visited local schools promoting the Show Racism the Red Card campaign. Year 5 and 6 pupils from two local schools were involved and listened to a guest speaker, who spoke about all kinds of discrimination, specifically racism and stereotypes.

The children learned about what they can do to stop racism and how to make a difference in their local community through the interactive workshop. Partners, J.P. Morgan, supported the event with volunteers from their BOLD group.

### Mental health and well-being

The Trust provides support to both primary and secondary schools across Dorset to help educational leaders raise awareness of a subject that has never been so high on the public agenda. The programme is designed to encourage the younger generation to talk openly about mental health and to be able to understand the struggles that are associated with mental health. It helps pupils explore emotions, how to recognise change in behaviour and how to keep a positive mindset whilst setting goals for the future. The programme combines theory, participation and physical activity.

### **Premier League Inspires**

Premier League Inspires is a Secondary School education programme that uses the reach and appeal of the Premier League and AFC Bournemouth to support those aged between 11-25 in educational settings who are at risk of not reaching their potential.

The Premier League Inspires programme is available to any secondary establishment, alternative provision or SEND specific school in the Bournemouth, Christchurch, and Poole region as well as further afield upon request.

Through Premier League Inspires, the Premier League and the Trust will:

- Support young people to improve their well-being
- Develop character and life skills
- Help schools/academies keep students present and committed
- Provide access to more opportunities
- . Enable young people to plan for the future and to be work ready

The Trust began its Premier League Inspires delivery in 2019 and since then has supported 502 young people through over 700 sessions in 19 local schools.

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### Year ended 30 November 2022

In March, local children from the Blandford School and the Grange School in Christchurch worked with the Trust on a sustainability project as part of the Premier League Inspires challenge project. The kids, aged between 13 and 14, took part in a bottle swap initiative in the Fan Zone before the match and, alongside the Community Sports Trust and Coca Cola, cleaned up the stadium after the game with the club's Green Team.

In June, unused bikes that previously belonged to the first team were donated back into the local community as part of the Premier League Inspires project, helping out local schools and their pupils, with different schools using them in different ways, either as rewards towards the end of the academic year, or handing them out to pupils to help them get to school.

### Football Education Programme - College Offer

The Trust, in partnership with SCL, is proud to be offering an alternative education pathway for 16 - 19-year-olds. The Football Education Programme is tailored for those looking to enhance their footballing skills whilst developing an outstanding knowledge of sport. The daily course takes place at Oak Academy, where we utilise excellent ICT facilities, a Gym, Sports Hall and grass pitches. Regardless of the previous academic achievements of the student, we provide an outstanding learning environment for all to strive and fulfil their potential. Aims:

"Enter employment into the sport and active leisure sector or to progress to higher or further education" Gain and develop essential skills that are valued by employers and higher and further education institutions "Develop knowledge and understanding of the vocational sector

### Football provision

Our players train or play every day during the week by using the following structure:

Monday: Strength and conditioning

Tuesday: Shape and Pattern/ position specific work

Wednesday: Gameday

Thursday: Technical practice/recovery

Friday: Futsal

On Wednesdays players are involved in matches against teams from the National Football Youth League (NFYL), representing AFC Bournemouth and playing against other Premier League and Football league clubs throughout the country.

### Brokenhurst College.

The Trust also offers exciting opportunities for young, talented, female football enthusiasts to combine academic studies with a comprehensive Football Development Programme based at Brockenhurst College. The academic curriculum can be tailored to match educational potential with a range of A Levels and a BTEC National Diploma in Sport on offer. If required students can also complete their Maths and English GCSEs.

Our Female Elite Player Programme provides access to high quality coaching and football education with a range of sessions available each day including team sessions, 1 to 1's and recovery/gym-based sessions. Extra support is provided through massage and strength and conditioning support. Students on the programme will compete in a fixtures schedule on Wednesdays as part of the National College League against other professional clubs and friendly matches throughout the season.

### **Apprenticeships**

The Trust offers a unique opportunity for 16-18-year-olds to gain coaching experience and participate in an 'Activity Leadership Apprenticeship'. During the year- long apprenticeship, as well as working in the local community alongside the Trust's coaches, apprentices are required to complete assignments, working towards a City & Guilds/NVQ in Active Leadership. A successful first year on the scheme provides the opportunity to progress onto a second year, then future jobs with the Community Sports Trust.

### Health and Well-being

The Trust supports many individuals with Autism in both their mainstream and disability specific football sessions and through the Premier League Inspires project, it has forged a new partnership with Autism Unlimited offering work experience placements to four students from Portfield School for ten weeks, enabling them to complete an AQA educational qualification.

The students volunteer at weekly community sessions such as Walking Football, Mini Cherries and assist coaching sessions with a local SEND school.

In April, the Trust showed its support for World Autism Awareness Day with a host of activities taking place and special guests invited to watch and to mark the day, the club invited those students from Portfield School, working with the Trust.

Ahead of the weekend, the club was proud to relaunch two initiatives to help autistic supporters who visit Vitality Stadium.

AFC Bournemouth Superstore Sensory Hour: recognises that accessing shops can be incredibly stressful for people with autism and their families. Music and television screens are be turned off and background noise reduced for a dedicated hour.

In addition, retail and ticketing staff have received additional training so they are able to provide the best service and support possible to every visitor.

AFC Bournemouth Sensory Packs: these provide sensory packs that have been designed for supporters, particularly those with Autism, who attend matches by helping to make the matchday experience more accessible, comfortable and enjoyable.

The items come complete with an AFC Bournemouth drawstring bag and include the following:

- Club branded mini soft footballs.
- Autism awareness card which can be shown to matchday staff and stewards to ask for assistance when in the ground.
- · Club-branded noise cancelling headphones.

### **Care South**

The partnership between Care South and the Trust is now in its eighth year. The partnership encompasses two main activities: The Extra Time project and Chair Football. The Extra Time project involves Trust coaches visiting the various Care South care homes across Bournemouth, Poole, Christchurch and other Dorset locations. As part of the interaction with the residents the coaches take part in various activities; including sharing AFC Bournemouth memories through photos and various other items of memorabilia. A crucial part of the Trust's visit to the homes is the Chair Football activity. The coaches also lead the sessions through encouraging the participants to pass the ball around the room, whilst remaining seated. To build on the session, obstacles and goals are added, which also replicates more common football practises.

During April, 35 members of staff from Care South were welcomed to Vitality Stadium for an exclusive tour of the ground as a reward for their loyalty and hard work over the last two years.

### **Walking Football**

The Trust runs weekly Walking Football coaching sessions in partnership with Care South. Walking Football is a version of the popular sport, with a few small rule changes. One of the most important changes being that it must be played at a walking pace.

These sessions are offered to both men and women aged 50+ and encourage them to keep fit and healthy without playing an especially competitive or demanding sport.

During the year, three players from the Walking Football programme were selected to play for England in the IWFF World Championships in the over 50s and over 70s teams, in Italy.

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### Year ended 30 November 2022

As well as the hosts, the England teams faced opposition from France, Sweden, India, Algeria, Indonesia and Australia in a four-day tournament.

In September, a walking football tournament was held which saw the under-18s and women's team take part and with the mix of generations getting stuck in, plenty of fun was had by all.

The Trust's walking football partner, Care South, was also in attendance to show their support at the event, which showcased the superb community feel amongst the club.

During October, the Trust joined forces with McCarthy Stone to deliver competitive Walking Football opportunities.

There are now teams in three age groups taking part in fixtures, both locally and across the country. In addition to the recreational options, the teams train weekly, which provide further opportunity to improve people's physical and mental wellbeing.

### Goals

This is a weight management session targeting those who want to get in shape. It's a mixed circuits class at Vitality Stadium on Thursdays between 7pm and 8pm.

There is also a men's five-a-side for those who want to get fit through football. These take place on the 3G pitches at Vitality Stadium on Thursdays between 8pm and 9pm.

In addition, during November the Trust together with Healthy Us at Wiltshire Council started a free 12-week weight loss and fitness programme open for anyone living in the Salisbury area, aged 35 or over, with a body mass index (BMI) of 30 or above.

The sessions involved exercises that are suitable for all and a half hour interactive session with a health improvement coach, covering topics on nutrition, portion sizes, eating out, behaviour change and how to maintain healthy habits for life.

Participants were supported to improve their diets, to exercise safely and improve their overall health and wellbeing.

### Mental health

In May, Dorset Mind and the Trust hosted a one-off event at Vitality Stadium for 18-24 years olds as part of Mental Health Awareness Week.

An important date in the mental health diary, the theme this year was loneliness. Loneliness is an issue that most people associate with older people. However, recent stats from the Office of National Statistics about children and young people, report that 9.8% of young people aged 16-25 feel lonely 'often.'

To help tackle loneliness, Dorset Mind and the Trust invited young people to take part in a 30–45-minute fun physical activity session at the stadium with the aim of encouraging them to step out of their comfort zones, socialise and learn something new. This session was delivered by the Trust coaches.

After the activity, a short wellbeing workshop was hosted by Dorset Mind's expert training team. The objective was to get young people to better know their minds as well as their bodies. Covering topics such as the 'Five Ways to Wellbeing' and the link between physical and mental health, the workshop was supported by members of the AFC Bournemouth Women's team, who spoke about their experiences of how football and physical activity has improved their mental wellbeing. Dorset Mind delivers mental health education, training, and one-to-one and group support for adults and young people across Dorset.

During October, the Trust once again supported World Mental Health Day by staging a special event for 60 young people from across six local secondary schools at Vitality Stadium in partnership with J.P. Morgan and Tru Talent.

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### Year ended 30 November 2022

The event consisted of a workshop, to educate the students on the subject, looking for signs and symptoms in themselves, family and friends, and also looking at what they can do to keep a positive state of mind.

In addition to the school event at the stadium, there were also 30 mental health workshops delivered to pupils in local schools across the week and the next.

Supporting positive mental health and wellbeing is delivered throughout the year by the Trust with projects supporting both children and adults.

In November, Head of Community Steve Cuss attended the Dorset Mind conference, Courageous Conversations.

The event, which supported International Men's Day and Men's Mental Health Month, looked to promote the importance and power of talking, specifically about our mental health.

Steve was amongst a variety of speakers. Some shared their own experiences whilst others highlighted the resources and training available to all.

Illustrating projects and programmes available at AFC Bournemouth and the Trust, Steve shared the initiatives and partnerships in place, which can support individuals who are having a difficult time or looking to reintegrate into everyday activities, along with his career pathway and 20 years in his role as Head of Community at AFC Bournemouth.

### **Talking Cherries**

Talking Cherries is a fan-led initiative who give their time to support other Cherries supporters. The group host fortnightly online drop-in sessions, for anyone to join, to talk about any subject from football to mental health and anything in between.

In addition to the sessions and activities listed above, the Trust has several staff who are trained mental health first-aiders. These staff cover delivery across all areas of work within the Trust and are on hand to offer support to those in need.

### **Sport and Social**

Sport and Social sessions are delivered in partnership with Dorset Mental Health Forum, on the 3G pitches at Vitality Stadium. The sessions are designed for those aged 16 and over who have experienced any form of mental health difficulty and offer an hour-long football event, to help those taking part to socialise and reintegrate back into organised activities.

### Mentalk

MENTalk is a cancer support group held in partnership with Wessex Cancer Trust. The Trust offers online support sessions three times a week for men who have been affected by cancer to come together and talk and share their experiences.

### **MYTIME**

MYTIME is the only charity in Dorset working specifically to support young carers, and the organisation makes an enormous difference to this incredibly deserving community by bringing young carers together to enjoy fun activities and much-needed breaks from their caring responsibilities, MYTIME helps to reduce feelings of loneliness and stress among young carers.

By working with schools to improve the quality of provision made for young carers in education, and by offering an Employability Programme designed to support young adult carers into further study and employment, MYTIME supports young carers to thrive and achieve their full potential. Ultimately, MYTIME exists to level the playing field for young carers by providing them with the support, opportunities and friendship that every child needs and deserves.

The partnership between the Trust and MYTIME provides monthly sessions with 15-20 young people regularly attending Vitality Stadium. The sessions invite young people to celebrate something that they have achieved followed by multi sports and activities which take place on the stadiums football pitches

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A group of young carers visited Vitality Stadium for a special matchday experience on Tuesday 15th March when AFC Bournemouth hosted Reading. They were taken pitch side as the players warmed up and watched the match from their seats in the Vitality Main Stand.

The visit took place ahead of Young Carers Action Day on Wednesday 16th March 2022.

During August, a selection of young carers donned their chef hats in a bid to create a cook book. Prior to visiting Vitality Stadium, the young people had spent time with MYTIME staff planning their favourite meals ready to make.

Over two days, the youngsters worked with catering operations supervisor Vernon Howard, who showed them around the kitchen and helped to bring their creations to life.

They were joined by AFC Bournemouth academy scholars, who worked in groups to assist with the preparation, cooking and presentation of recipes.

The cook book was on sale in the build up to Christmas and will help to raise vital funds for MYTIME.

#### **Bounce Back**

In February, the Trust, JPMorgan Chase and Bournemouth Churches Housing Association (BCHA) joined forces to deliver an initiative called 'Bounce Back'.

The scheme supports local disadvantaged and vulnerable adults in achieving independent sustained living via a combination of classroom and practical learning activities.

The first part of the sessions is spent on education - helping to deliver personal development, physical and mental well-being, money management, healthy eating and lifestyles and considering what the next steps in life might look like and this is followed by a football session with kit provided by the Trust.

### **Twinning Project**

During September, the Trust announced the launch of the first Twinning Project delivery at Guys Marsh Prison.

The Trust will visit the prison weekly to work with 16 participants, with the aim of gaining two FA qualifications. The first is the Developing Leadership through Football award, followed by the Developing Leadership through Futsal Award.

Launched in October 2018 and supported by the UK's leading clubs and footballing bodies, the Twinning Project aims to support prisoners whilst in custody and on release to help prepare them to find work outside of prison and reduce the likelihood of reoffending.

### **Social Inclusion**

### **Disability Football**

The Trust is committed to ensuring that everybody has the opportunity to play football and attend a session designed to meet their needs. Thanks to the Premier league, a disability programme has been developed which offers a range of competitive and recreational sport opportunities as well as ensuring that all programmes run by the Trust are accessible and inclusive for all.

At the beginning of December 2021, the Trust was involved with the International Day of Persons with Disabilities.

It was the opportunity to highlight the sessions that take place in the Bournemouth and Poole area which enable disabled individuals to play and enjoy the game in a safe environment.

Every week, the Trust coaches over 100 individuals who have a disability, not only giving them an opportunity to train and play as part of the club, but also to watch the first team at Vitality Stadium at various points throughout the season.

### Impairment specific sessions

These are weekly advanced training sessions for players with the same impairment. They are suitable for any player over the age of 16 with Cerebral Palsy, Down's Syndrome or a hearing impairment.

The sessions are split up into the three disabilities, so that individuals can play with those who have the same condition.

In May, the Trust welcomed the captain of England and Great Britain Deaf teams, Jamie Clarke, to Vitality Stadium ahead of Deaf Awareness Week (DAW).

Speaking to the club's disability team and a young Cherries side, Clarke shed some light on his experiences as a deaf footballer on the international stage.

His discussions included the trials and tribulations of his own career, whilst reinforcing the need for self-belief amongst people with disabilities.

He explained: "I'm here to try and inspire the next generation of people who have disabilities and to help them believe in themselves more, also to show they can go on to represent their countries and achieve their dreams.

With 11 million people that are deaf or hard of hearing in the UK and just over 150,000 British Sign Language (BSL) users, the England captain felt that the awareness raised over DAW is vital.

### **Ability Counts**

These are weekly football sessions for any player over the age of five with any form of physical, learning or behaviour difficulty.

The sessions provide an opportunity for players to train and play competitive football or follow a recreational pathway.

There are under-12 and under-16 teams that compete locally, sometimes even travelling further afield for tournaments.

There are also two senior teams representing AFC Bournemouth who play fixtures in the official club kit.

#### Work in schools

The community coaches are often present in schools, both mainstream and those that specialise in educational needs and disabilities.

They help run PE lessons and ensure education is always fun, teaching the children to enjoy exercise in a safe environment.

### Next Gen.

The Next Gen project works with local grassroots coaches and volunteers on community programmes. The project helps to up-skill these coaches and volunteers, whilst also offering opportunities to local grassroots teams.

Some of the young individuals with learning difficulties start to volunteer with the Trust as they get older.

### Powerchair

The club launched its first Powerchair football team ahead of the 2018/19 season and during this year AFC Bournemouth Warriors' powerchair players achieved promotion to the Premiership for the 2022/23 campaign.

During the final week of fixtures, the Warriors faced a five-match day with the ability to jump up a division on the line.

An emphatic display saw the Cherries win all five matches, scoring 11 goals without a reply from the opposition sides in the process.

Success continued when two players from the Powerchair squad were recognised with awards. Attending the WFA End of Season awards evening, Regan Kemp was named the 2021/22 Championship Young Player of the Season.

### South Africa

In June, the Trust coaches travelled to South Africa to work on a football project in both Johannesburg and Durban.

The trip was in partnership with Switched On Christian School, with coaches also given the opportunity to visit local community projects in the areas they visited.

Having landed in Johannesburg first, staff worked with teachers at Destiny Christian School and looked at what makes an effective coach.

They then put on sessions with students at Rabboni Christian School and Saints Christian School, involving player development classes on and off the training ground.

Away from the schools, they then visited a local project, with one man following in the footsteps of his mother by baking fresh bread and preparing food parcels for young children attending school. It resembled a foodbank and coaches were keen to get stuck in and help, making bread on the day they visited.

Following the community visit, the coaches visited Zenzele Community School and The Kings School, playing games and football with the younger children, before handing out football kit to the older punils

After some fantastic work in Johannesburg, the staff went onto Durban, visiting the local high school for coaching and then taking sessions with the players at Stella FC.

CPD sessions were carried out for the coaches at Richard Bay Christian School, while Howick High School and Ashton College saw their students benefit from more Bournemouth expertise. Local club, Young Chiefs, were also paid a visit, with match kits handed out for them to wear in upcoming games.

### Plans for future periods

### **Ringwood Community Hub**

The Trust confirmed the completion of the Ringwood Community Hub 3G pitch in March 2023. The new facility was opened with a soft launch event in February with AFC Bournemouth under-16 girls, Ringwood Town under-8s and the over-60 walking footballers among the first to train on the new surface.

Speaking at the launch event, Head of Community Steve Cuss said

"As a Community Sports Trust we look to work with as many individuals and community groups as we can, and for a period of time we have always had to go and hire different facilities, but having our own facility here will really expand those opportunities and provide greater engagement across the community."

"I would like to say thank you to all the partners that have been involved in this development, particularly the Football Foundation who have been very supportive from day one of the proposal all the way through to the final build."

The build of this 3G pitch is the first phase of a wider project at Ringwood Community Hub. Throughout the rest of the year, further developments will include a new club house pavilion and improved parking facilities.

### **Bring Your Boots Campaign**

The boot recycling scheme, supported by club partners Vitality and MSP Capital, provides a vital service within the local community during such difficult financial times and allows for individuals to clear out their old footwear in order to help others.

The shoes have been collected from a number of first team players, supporter donations on matchdays, community participants and from staff at the Vitality offices in the middle of town and the Trust has been helping distribute the boots and trainers across the Bournemouth, Poole and Christchurch area.

From the footwear collected, we have been able to support many individuals and families through the following community projects:

- The Twinning Project

- The South Africa Community Project
  - Boots sent to our international project in order to help schoolchildren in South Africa.
     We're looking forward to welcoming two touring groups from South Africa in March and April, where more boots and trainers will be donated.
- Ukraine Relief
  - Footwear donated and transported to children in Ukraine.

### Financial review

The net income for the year amounted to £122,569 which together with the accumulated funds brought forward leave funds of £1,477,560 to be carried forward.

#### Reserves

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds to the level required to provide sufficient funds to cover administration costs.

### 1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is 61 Macrae Road, Pill, Bristol, BS20 0DD.

### 2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

### 3. Accounting policies

### **Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

### Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

### Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. We can confirm that there are no such critical estimates and judgements.

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is
  impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor
  or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the
  accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for
  the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the
  contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual
  requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case
  it may be regarded as restricted.

### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
  activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
  support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
  activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

### **Operating leases**

Lease payments are recognised as an expense over the lease term on a straight-line basis. The aggregate benefit of lease incentives is recognised as a reduction to expense over the lease term, on a straight-line basis.

### **Tangible assets**

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Fixtures and fittings

25% reducing balance

Motor vehicles

25% reducing balance

Equipment - 25% reducing balance

### Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

### Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

### Defined contribution plans (continued)

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

### 4. Limited by guarantee

The Trust is a Company Limited by Guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up the limit in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10.

Funding was received from Sport England to acquire mobile floodlights used during evening sessions of social inclusion projects.

### AFC Bournemouth local projects

Funding received from the football club to provide a range of community benefit projects.
