Trustees' report for the year ended 31st December 2013

The trustees present their report together with the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31st December 2013.

#### Principal activity

The principal activity of the charity during the year under review was the promotion of nutrition for good health.

## **Objectives**

The European Nutrition for Health Alliance was established in 2005 to raise awareness of the importance and urgency of malnutrition and appropriate nutritional care as well as to build an agenda for action in Europe. The Alliance is formed from a group of European organisations committed to tackling malnutrition.

#### **Public benefit**

The charity's objectives for the public benefit are to promote, preserve and protect good health, nutrition and metabolism and to prevent, treat and relieve poor health and malnutrition, and to advance education for the benefit of the public in all areas relating to nutrition and metabolism throughout Europe and the rest of the world.

#### Performance and achievements

The Alliance continued its work on malnutrition in Europe, successfully presenting our aims work and vision at several key conferences and EU events. We continue to nurture our alliance with EU patient groups, the European Patients' Forum (EPF) and the European Genetic Alliances' Network (EGAN). We also continue to develop our relationships with the European Commission and WHO Euro, raising both our profile and that of malnutrition in Europe.

In May 2013, in collaboration with the patient groups and international nutrition experts, we produced a booklet "Patient Perspectives on Nutrition" which explored nutrition from a relatively new angle: it demonstrated that nutrition has a key role to play in the management of diseases, to improve health outcomes and quality of life of patients. It also provided an overview of medical nutrition options for when normal food intake is impaired or impossible, and raised the potential impact that nutrition can have on patient outcomes. The booklet sent a powerful message that patients are part of the solution. Joining forces with other stakeholders (i.e. governments, policy makers, healthcare professionals, patients and carers), we continue to raise awareness of the importance of nutrition and bring forward a more holistic approach to care. This will, in turn, contribute towards better healthcare and quality of life for Europe's patients.

Also in May 2013, we were involved in a conference organised by the European Patients' Forum (EPF), the Patient Network for Medical Research and Health (EGAN) and Irish patient organisations in cooperation with the Irish EU Presidency. The conference called on Irish and other European Governments to take action to prevent older people and patients with chronic diseases become malnourished.

In July 2013 ENHA attended, in an observer capacity, the WHO EURO Ministerial Conference on Nutrition and Non Communicable Diseases in the Context of Health 2020. The objective of the meeting was to define and agree a Declaration that will be delivered to all 53 WHO EURO Member States, to be adopted at the WHO EURO Executive Committee in September, as well as providing WHO EURO the political mandate to define and later implement the future Food and Nutrition Plan 2014-2020. ENHA delivered extensive input into the plan, promoting the need for inclusion of under nutrition as a priority, and an agenda of nutritional assessment, interventions, counselling and care.

#### Performance and achievements (continued)

In addition to these various activities, we worked with key stakeholders to improve nutrional care across Europe as part of the European Innovation Programme (EIP) on Active & Healthy Ageing (AHA).

We coordinated the Group on Undernutrition for the A3 Action Group of the EIP AHA supporting all organisations working on projects involving nutrition, hydration and associated activities including IT, supplementation and research. We were also involved as overall coordinator of the screening group, working across the A3 group and linking nutrition and frailty projects through their combined efforts to ensure adequate screening.

In 2014, in partnership with its member organisations, we will launch a programme of work on Implementation of Nutritional Screening and Care across Europe. This work will build on the excellent campaigns already underway in many countries and will aim to share best practice with 4 countries on achieving "Optimal Nutritional Care for All", the theme of an Autumn conference where national representatives from participating countries can plan to drive forward implementation of nutritional screening and care.

### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Nominations for new trustees are discussed at the European Nutrition for Health Alliance meetings which occur at least twice a year. New trustees are approached with the agreement of the chair and the board of existing trustees. Trustees are clear about who cannot, in law, be appointed as a trustee before new trustees are approached and appointed.

#### Governance of the Alliance

The Alliance undertook a review of governance arrangements in order to make some minor practical changes to adapt to a growing membership. It was agreed that henceforth a distinction would be made between members who are trustees (members) and members who are not trustees (partners) and Alliance meetings would henceforth be split into two parts, the first for trustees only and the second for trustees and partners. In the interests of transparency, an additional section entitled "governance" explaining the functioning of the association including decision making processes was added to the Alliance website.

#### Audit

The charity is exempt from having its accounts audited under Companies Act 2006.

# Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31st December 2013

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP) issued by the Charity Commissioner in 2005 and in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 and applicable accounting standards.

#### **Incoming resources**

Income is generated from secretariat fees, activity funding and a release of an unspent prepayment relating to the burden of illness project in 2010. The prepayment was used in the 2012 implementation plan of the project.

#### Resources expended

- Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

#### Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

### Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

#### Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities in Euros are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date of £0.810901 to £1. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.
