Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and was formed on 3 December 2007. It is governed by a memorandum and articles of association. The liability of the members in the event of the company being wound up is limited to a sum not exceeding £1.

The trustees of the charity are also the directors for the purposes of company law and are appointed by the members at the AGM.

Objectives and activities

The charity's objects

HALE aims in all it does to promote the physical, social and mental health wellbeing of the general public by the provision of training, one to one support, exercise, nutritional advice and other activities to those who need them by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, financial hardship or social circumstances, with the overall object of improving their conditions of life and the social fabric of the community in which they live.

Objectives and activities

The charity's main activities

Hale is a Healthy Living Project, delivering community based health improvement activities in Shipley and surrounding areas since 2003. We work with people of all ages, concentrating our efforts in the areas of deprivation and health inequalities where there is greatest need, working around the key themes of Mental Health and Wellbeing, Alcohol Awareness, Sexual Health and Nutrition.

Public benefit statement

In setting our objectives and planning our activities our trustees have given serious consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular the advancement of health.

Achievements and performance

Chair's report

During this year we were delighted to be nominated alongside 13 other local charities for a Sovereign Healthcare Good All Round Award, which we were awarded £7,500 – money which enables us to respond to need where it is greatest.

We have been very grateful for donations from Baildon Runners, Natasha Thomas's Great North Swim, Andrew Brown's Longest and Highest Challenge, and Safa Ahmed's skydive, in addition to donations made by individuals who value and wish to support our work.

This year has seen the departure of a number of staff and Management Committee members. We are always sad to say goodbye to a friend and colleague, and we would like to thank all who have supported HALE this far. We now have 53 regular volunteers and we are extremely grateful to every one of them. I would like to say a particular thanks to members of the Management Committee, whose time, energy and support is vital to the governance of HALE.

Here are a few of the highlights of our work:

We have worked closely with residents in the Crosley Wood and Crag Road areas, in partnership with InCommunities, Shipley and Bingley Voluntary Services, the Kirkgate Centre, Trinity 5 Rise Children's Centre and the Bingley Ward Officer

hEat Well Courses ran in 15 Children's Centres, providing guidance and advice on Fat, Salt and Sugar intake, as well as portion size and budgeting for families. Centre staff also received training to be able to share the information.

Working with the Self-Care Lead for Bradford & District to promote the national campaign. We produced four self-care packs for people living with asthma, COPD, heart failure and dementia.

We have seen a real growth in our diabetes work this year, mostly in the Manningham area.

This year we also were successful in getting Big Lottery Funding for our Befriending and Advocacy scheme for older people.

In a period of unprecedented change in the health and social care environment, and at a time when the need for organisations like HALE could not be higher, I am incredibly proud of these innovative projects that change lives. They are only possible through the talent and commitment of both staff and volunteers.

Financial review

The net income for the year was £42,615, including net income of £9,831 on unrestricted funds and net income of £32,784 on restricted funds after transfers.

Reserves policy

The charity's free reserves, excluding fixed assets, at the year end were £114,004

A reserves policy was agreed by the trustees on 24 September 2009. It is the view that we should have sufficient funds to enable HALE to exist for a period of time (three months), to enable the development of alternative funding streams.

This equates to £ 83,233. Anticipated shortfall of £ 18,857 has been identified for the 2014/2015 Budget. Surplus funds to be used for Continuation of Current Projects and Development Work, as identified by the Board of Trustees.

Funds held as custodian trustee on behalf of others

£595 is held on behalf of Health Impact CIC (Consortium) and detailed in note 9.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

Notes to the accounts

for the year ended 31 March 2014

1 Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005), the Companies Act 2006 and Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

There has been no change to the accounting policies since last year.

No changes have been made to the accounts for previous years.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the charity becomes entitled to the resources, the trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Where grants are related to performance and specific deliverables, they are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

Expenditure and liabilities

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out the resources.

Taxation

As a charity the organisation benefits from rates relief and is generally exempt from income tax and capital gains tax but not from VAT. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of those items to which it relates

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition. Gifted assets are shown at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives as follows:

Project and office equipment: over 1 year

Computer equipment: over 1 year Motor vehicles: over 4 years

Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme for the benefit of its employees. The costs of contributions are recognised in the year they are payable.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the accounts.
