REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the year ended 31 March 2023

Aims and Objectives

We are an equal opportunities organisation, our aim is to assist vulnerable people to achieve their rights as citizens and to be valued members of the community, irrespective of their ethnic background, age, gender, sexual orientation or disability. We see the person not the label. Individuals can draw support from any or all of our projects according to their needs and our cross-cutting teamwork approach ensures the person is at the centre of our services. In order to achieve our aims we will:

- provide a service dedicated to ensuring that their voices are heard and their wishes are acted on.
- provide information, assistance and advocacy to support vulnerable people to obtain their full rights and privileges as citizens.
- foster a culture of rights of service users amongst service providers
- actively promote equal opportunities for vulnerable people.
- build bridges within the community for vulnerable people who are or have been in long term residential care.
- promote positive images of vulnerable people.
- promote the protection of vulnerable people from abuse
- recruit and train specialist crisis and issue based advocates to act to support individuals faced with urgent and serious problems requiring immediate action.
- recruit, train and support volunteers to work on a long term basis to enable vulnerable people to participate fully in the life of the community in which they live and to ensure that their voice is heard.
- identify and obtain additional sources of funding to allow the continuing provision of a consistent and high quality service.

Charity's Activities

Our mission statement is: "BCA aims through independent advocacy to empower people with a learning disability to live their lives as valued, responsible and enriched citizens".

Since 1995, BCA has provided a range of advocacy services supporting people in times of crisis or with a particular issue in their lives, long term advocacy for individuals who are socially isolated and need long term support, high support and non-instructed advocacy for people with complex needs. This work is undertaken by paid advocates and volunteers. Advocacy is a way of ensuring that people's voices are heard and have an input into decisions about their lives. Other projects include Powys People First which supports self-advocacy groups to meet to discuss issues important to them, campaign groups for members interested in bringing issues to the attention of local authorities and politicians, The Theatr Wildcats inclusive drama group devise productions based on their own experiences, the Healthy Lives project aims to extend the knowledge of adults with a learning disability about health issues, give opportunities for outdoor activities, expand social networks and boost self-esteem and well-being and Choir Cats is a singing group where people with learning disabilities meet up, choose music and songs they enjoy and sing and dance together.

Covid-19 Pandemic

This year started as most Covid restrictions were eased and our clients and members with a learning disability were pleased to return to meeting up in groups and resuming normal activities. Project staff have continued to host some Zoom activities to keep up online skills and to include people from a wider area without access to transport or appropriate support, but members report how much they appreciate face-to-face contact.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Charity is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 19 February 2008.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association, the number of trustees shall be not less than three, but it shall not be subject to any maximum. The Charity may appoint a Trustee by ordinary resolution. New Trustees are provided with an induction pack and all Trustees have the opportunity to attend Trustee training courses offered by Powys Association of Voluntary Organisations (PAVO). All trustees are either re-elected or elected at the Annual General Meeting.

Chairman's report

It hardly seems possible that a year ago, advocacy took place by telephone, online and by distanced visits. Restrictions were still being observed. Nonetheless, disabled people suffered more from COVID than the general population, making the work of BCA even more important than ever.

This year has seen fewer Zoom activities and much more meeting up in person. BCA advocates still attend online meetings with professionals, but can meet clients face-to-face in their homes or in the community. All BCA projects and advocates have worked together with clients and members to host a great combination of old and new activities throughout the year. Powys People First and the new Confident Connected Citizens project have run self-advocacy meetings in community venues, social evenings, art & craft activities, a newsletter group and together with the Healthy Lives have put on picnics, gone bowling and had a wonderful trip to Caswel Bay to celebrate World Ocean Day. The Healthy Lives project have started a Mentor Scheme where project members are paid to plan and facilitate a session including Nordic Walking, a talk on Brecon Mountain Railway, walks in Brecon and Builth Wells, a Poppy art session and Christmas card making. A series of Ready Steady Cook sessions have been held in Brecon, Ystradgynlias and Builth Wells making cooking simple economical meals more accessible to our members and the added bonus of sitting down to eat a delicious meal together at the end of each session. Other activities include a series of Canal Walks with Bannau Brycheiniog National Park, the accessible White Swans walking group and more challenging Red Kites walking group. Theatr Wildcats continues to thrive with old and new members preparing a performance of "How to be Happy" in Theatr Brycheiniog on 5th April, which was originally intended to be performed in April 2020 and included some new content filmed during Covid restrictions. Thanks to the Monmouthshire Building Society who sponsored the performance T shirts. The Choir Cats inclusive singing group meet weekly and is available on Zoom as well as face to face giving more people the opportunity to be involved.

The range and frequency of activities is thanks to the commitment, inventiveness and tireless enthusiasm of the BCA team.

This year, BCA has engaged with more people with a learning disability than ever.

We are grateful to our funders: the National Lottery, Powys County Council Covid Recovery Fund, the Garfield Weston Foundation, PAVO, Community Foundation Wales and the Co-op. However, securing core funding remains our biggest challenge. The quest continues.

The year ahead presents a stark challenge. Without further funding in addition to our existing sources, difficult decisions will have to be made.

The whole purpose of BCA is its members. However, thanks are due to the loyal staff team led by Libby and our wonderful volunteers who continue to sustain BCA and its services under straitened conditions.

Finally, I should like to thank the BCA Directors, whose past and continued support of BCA is essential to its future.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (Continued) for the year ended 31 March 2023

Public Benefit

All our charitable activities focus on the provision of advocacy, information and support to vulnerable adults in Powys and the surrounding areas and are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for public benefit. The Trustees accept the need to have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

I am confident that the organisation fulfils the stated remit and delivers high quality independent advocacy to those people with a learning disability that need support. The organisation also provides excellent opportunities for clients to find their own voice and to have the confidence to speak up for themselves.

Financial Review

Treasurer's Report

The past year has seen some welcome new funding from the National Lottery for the Confident Connected Citizens project, £8,353 from the Powys County Council Covid Recovery Fund and a grant of £10,000 from the Garfield Weston Foundation towards core funding. BCA staff continue to come up with new and creative ways to support our clients and members with a learning disability and ideas for new projects, but securing ongoing core funding remains a challenge. This year has resulted in a deficit of £13,533 leaving £59,486 in unrestricted reserves. BCA has a reserves policy of holding an operational reserve equal to nine months operating costs; this level of reserves amounts to five and a half months operating costs. As the quest for core funding continues, the Board of Directors of BCA will keep the financial situation and staffing under review.

BCA is grateful to all our funders who have supported us during this year: in addition to the funders already mentioned, we have received grants from the PAVO Social Value Fund, Community Foundation Wales, Monmouthshire Building Society and the Co-op Community Fund.

Reserves policy:

The Directors have established a policy whereby BCA holds an operational reserve equal to nine months operating costs.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 March 2023

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

BCA Independent Advocacy Services meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The charity has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not include a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest \pounds .

Incoming resources

Voluntary income including donations, gifts and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Such income is only deferred when:

- The donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods; or
- The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities includes income received under contract or, where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions, is recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided). Grant income included in this category provides funding to support activities and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Income is deferred when grants are received in advance of the event to which they relate.

Volunteers and donated services and facilities

The value of services provided by volunteers is not incorporated into these financial statements.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for an accruals basis. Contractual arrangements and performance related grants are recognised as goods or services supplied. Other grant payments are recognised when a constructive obligation arises that results in the payment being unavoidable.

- Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.
- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the provision of advocacy services and include both the direct costs and support costs relating to this activity.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets, and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 March 2023

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rate in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life: -

Office equipment

20% on cost

Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to profit and loss account as incurred.

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:

Unrestricted general funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds – these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Designated funds – these are funds set aside by the trustees out of unrestricted general funds for specific future purposes or projects.

Going concern

This year BCA incurred a deficit of £13,533 on the unrestricted fund and a subsequent reduction in unrestricted reserves. We were awarded a £10,000 grant from the Garfield Weston Foundation to support our core work, but have not been successful in securing other long-term core funding. We have met with Powys County Council officers and cabinet members to consider new ways of working to involve people with learning disabilities in the design of services in the future, however there is no certainty of availability of funding for this work. In the coming year, we will seek further funding to continue the work of the National Lottery funded Healthy Lives project, the Theatr Wildcats drama group and other ideas for new projects being developed in consultation with our members. We will have to consider whether the provision of one-to-one advocacy will be possible if core funding cannot be secured. Before the end of the year the Directors of BCA will review how many staff posts can be sustained and how the structure of BCA may change in order to support existing projects.

Restricted funds represent grants received for specific purposes. When the expenditure to which these grants relate is incurred it is charged to the fund in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The Powys People First Self Advocacy fund was funded by Powys County Council until the end of March 2019, but now holds income generated from facilitation fees, various small grants and money raised from Powys People First events.

Powys County Council General Advocacy fund is a one year grant to fund citizen advocacy, volunteer advocacy, self advocacy and peer advocacy.

The Big Lottery Powys People First Fund funded the salary and associated costs of the Powys People First Support Workers, one in North Powys and three in South Powys, who support the development of self-advocacy groups. This funding ended in October 2016.

The Santander Foundation outdoor fund was for a project to inform adults with a learning disability about the benefits of a healthy lifestyle with opportunities for exercise and outdoor activities.

The Healthy Lives fund is a 5 year project funded by the National Lottery Community fund and Lloyds Bank Foundation for management, staff and running costs of the Healthy Lives Project which aims to extend the knowledge of adults with a learning disability about health issues, give opportunities for outdoor activities, expand social networks and boost self-esteem and well-being.

The Theatr Wildcats fund is funded by grants from the Ashley Family Foundation, the Audrey Tyler Trust, Powys Integrated Care Fund and proceeds from performances by the Theatr Wildcats inclusive drama group which is based in Brecon.

The Powys Association of Voluntary Organisations Small Health Fund was a grant to fund additional elements of the Healthy Lives Project. A further grant was secured in the current year to help fund the Choir Cats singing group.

The Powys Association of Voluntary Organisation Social Value Fund grant was to fund a "Building New Links" project to facilitate meetings, social activities both in "real life" and via Zoom.

16. RESTRICTED FUNDS (continued)

The Community Foundations Wales Choir Cats grant was awarded in March 2022 to partly fund the Choir Cats singing group in 2022/23.

The National Lottery Confident Connected Citizens Fund is a 3 year project to build on work started during the Covid 19 lockdowns to build confidence, make new connections and enable people with learning disabilities to become better informed more active citizens.

The Postcode Lottery Fund is a grant to fund a new project entitled "Life after Covid" to expand and enhance the Powys Peoples First Self-Advocacy project.

The PAVO Social Value Brecon Gig Buddies Fund is a project to recruit and train volunteer "buddies" to support people with learning disabilities to attend gigs, concerts and other events.

The Lloyds Bank Foundation fund is to support the salary and costs of an advocate to provide support around housing and support issues.
