The directors submit their report and the consolidated financial statements of Liverpool Vision Limited for the year ended 31 March 2011

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the group is to promote and facilitate the economic development and regeneration of Liverpool

REVIEW OF BUSINESS

During the year the company continued to drive and support the positive momentum which has been built in the city over the last decade, focusing activity of the Board on the established "Strategic Ambitions" which promote the achievement of the Economic Prospectus for the City

In April 2008 Liverpool Land Development Company Limited ("LLDC") became a subsidiary of Liverpool Vision Limited. It is involved in the physical and economic regeneration in the Strategic Investment Areas (SIAs) in Speke, Halewood, Atlantic Gateway, Approach 580 and Eastern Approaches.

Operating Context and Governance

Throughout 2010/11 the company maintained the strong support of its Members Liverpool City Council, Northwest Regional Development Agency ("NWDA") and the Homes and Communities Agency ("HCA") Members have maintained an active, shared commitment to the business and ethos of the company and to the continuing economic regeneration of the City of Liverpool Our fully committed Board have continued to be very actively engaged in the work of the company through a programme of Board Workshops and the Sub-Committees of the Board

The need to reduce public spending resulted in the decision by both HCA and NWDA in the year to end their funding contribution to the operation of the company at 31 March 2011. Both organisations have made a considerable contribution to the transformation of Liverpool over recent years. The company had anticipated the loss of operational funding, and made plans to reduce operational costs to reflect the reduced income position.

The very difficult economic conditions, particularly for Commercial Development, and tightening Public Sector funding environment continued through 2010/11 Despite this, the company has continued to contribute to the positive momentum which has built in Liverpool over recent years Liverpool is growing in confidence, has an increasingly positive national and international image, and vastly improved business environment

The economic conditions should encourage partners to work even more closely to achieve shared objectives and whilst conditions have been difficult, there have been some notable successes 2010/11 was a watershed for Liverpool Vision It was the year in which we showcased Liverpool to the world at the Shanghai Expo, reestablishing Liverpool as a global player

Liverpool City Council has demonstrated its strong commitment to the company by its very considerable financial commitment and its positive, high level representation on the Board The company's Business Plan (2009/10 – 2011/12) had been approved by its Executive Board in April 2009 Ongoing liaison and scrutiny by the City Council had continued through the year by its Regeneration Select Committee The City Council have committed both operational and programme funding support for 2011/12

Along with the decision to cease operational funding by HCA and NWDA both organisations informed the company of their intention to retire from Membership of the company Having been agreed by Liverpool City

Council, when the retirement is executed, Liverpool Vision will become a wholly owned subsidiary of Liverpool City Council

The Board of Liverpool Vision remains conscious of the need to reduce public expenditure and maintain strong management of both operational and programme costs

The Board is clear that the ongoing difficult economic conditions, reductions in the level of public funding and pressure for change on each of the Members of the company reinforce the need for and importance of Liverpool Vision to maintain its contribution to the long term economic recovery of the City of Liverpool

Low levels of developer and occupier activity are evident in each of the SIA's in which LLDC has residual projects

Maintaining Momentum

The flat economic conditions continue to be the major influence on the operational context for Liverpool Vision. The City still faces significant structural economic challenges and remains a national priority for economic regeneration. Unemployment and worklessness remain at unacceptably high levels and the development industry remains flat with occupier interest low.

During these exceptionally difficult economic conditions and major change in national and regional policies, institutions and public funding for economic regeneration, Vision delivered some important priorities, aiming to continue the momentum of investment and business growth in the city

Working with the private sector, Universities and the City Council in 2010/11, Vision helped Liverpool to extend its quality physical environment for Business and Culture, to put in train longer terms plans to realise the city's innovation and technology opportunities and – crucially – to support business in creating the jobs and wealth upon which prosperity and wellbeing depend

As the city's Economic Development Company, we have responded to the new and far from easy conditions ahead by reviewing our role with the City Council and making essential organisational changes which will enable Vision to continue to serve and support business. The company has undertaken a particular shift in focus to promote the City's improved visitor and business offer to the world.

The particular challenges and achievements in 2010/11 set out by Strategic Ambitions have been

Strategic Ambition 1 Create a City with an outstanding quality of place for business

Within the limitations of considerably reduced public funding and continuing depressed development market, some momentum has been maintained in the City Centre – particularly with the topping out of Phase 3 of the St Paul's Development – and in the main business Gateway areas, especially the Edge Lane West highways upgrade

Strategic Ambition 2 realise the potential of North Liverpool

With Liverpool City Council, Sefton MBC, the Homes and Communities Agency, Community and Private Sector Partners foundations for the economic regeneration of North Liverpool and South Sefton have been established in the form of a long term vision and ambition, set out in a Strategic Regeneration Framework and three year delivery plan. Government has been engaged as partner in the transformation of this important part of the city region. On the ground, with our partners in Sefton, through the StepClever Local Enterprise and Growth Initiative we have supported new and existing businesses to thrive and to revive the neighbourhood economy.

Strategic Ambition 3 Enable Liverpool to become the number 1 culture and visitor destination city outside London

Liverpool Vision helped to add to the City's culture and visitor economy portfolio by supporting and facilitating new cultural assets most notably the Liverpool Museum, helping to secure the redevelopment of the Everyman

Theatre and the completion of the transformed Waterfront through the Mann Island mixed use development

Facilitated by Vision, the initiation of the Liverpool Plan by a private / public sector partnership will bring together transformational programmes, events and activities and pooled resources for a significant boost in marketing Liverpool's offer in 2011 and beyond

Strategic Ambition 4 Support Liverpool's transformation into a sustainable, low carbon economy

With the University of Liverpool, the Chamber of Commerce and Groundwork, we supported an important knowledge transfer project, the end product of which are key directions to be translated into action in 2011/12 to realise the opportunities of a sustainable, low carbon economy. In North Liverpool, with Partners Liverpool Vision has supported proposals to create a low Carbon Business Hub by the Eldonian Group Ltd.

Strategic Ambition 5 Make Liverpool a beacon for entrepreneurship, business growth and business friendliness

Businesses are the lifeblood of the city In 2010/11 Vision's activities helped to generate 775 new businesses, 1,671 jobs and safeguarded a further 657 jobs

With Partners, Liverpool Vision has also helped to deliver the inaugural "Your Big Year" global entrepreneurship competition, in partnership with Liverpool-based entrepreneur Chris Arnold, which attracted some 45,000 entrants from 168 countries. In addition, Liverpool Vision led a successful bid to secure the Global Entrepreneurship Congress, to be held in Liverpool in 2012, which will raise the profile of entrepreneurship and of Liverpool as an enterprising city

Strategic Ambition 6 Enable Liverpool to realise its potential as an international city of science, creativity and innovation

The foundations for a step change in Liverpool's already significant innovation and knowledge economy were put in place during the year, with Vision's contributing to the city region Knowledge Economy Plan and the completion of an investment framework to enhance Liverpool's Knowledge Quarter We also continued vital support for high value knowledge sectors, principally Creative and Digital business through ACME and the Liverpool Life Sciences Network

Strategic Ambition 7 Establish Liverpool as top international and national investment location with dynamic trade, investment, knowledge and tourism relationships

The Liverpool Pavilion at the 2010 World Expo in Shanghai raised the city's national and international investment and trade profile and enabled business and public sponsors to forge new relationships and contacts with Chinese business and investors 770,000 visitors came to see the Liverpool showcase. The economic benefits are estimated at up to £47 5m over the next 10 years through increased numbers of tourists and students, exports and foreign direct investment. 12% of sponsors secured sales or orders during the Expo and 70% expected sales in the future.

Also in the international arena, Liverpool Software City attracted some 200 industry attendees, helping businesses find funding, share ideas and network. Sound City attracted 35,000 music lovers and 1,700 business delegates from 23 countries, showcasing talented new artists and technicians and helping to secure two major deals for Liverpool music companies.

Strategic Ambition 8 Support Liverpool's drive to become a city of skilled and talented people and of economic opportunity for all

Liverpool Vision continued to support the skills needs of the city's businesses through an enhanced skills brokerage service with partners. For the immediate future we will work with national and local partners to understand and plan for the changing skills needs of business.

The company's organisational arrangements have continued to benefit from the encouragement and support of the Audit and HR Committees and our active Staff Consultative Committee. In the year all staff participated in

an organisational development programme

Liverpool Vision has responded quickly to the new operating conditions to make necessary efficiencies and to reorganise for delivering a difficult challenge, with reduced resources in the years ahead

The consequence of the considerable reduction in funding has been a commensurate reduction in the staff structure, which was achieved through a voluntary redundancy scheme. The number of employees was reduced by some 30% and 17 employees left the company on a managed basis at the end of 2010/11 and the first half of 2011/12

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The economic climate will continue to be difficult and uncertain for some time ahead across the world and in the UK Liverpool's economic and physical renaissance of the last decade, driven by the City Council's leadership and delivery, with a major contribution from Liverpool Vision, provides robust foundations for realising the city's exceptional potential Liverpool Vision, as a private – public collaboration, will be central to the partnerships with business and Government which will promote the city as a centre of investment, culture, creativity and growth

We have re-organised for the key business-facing regeneration activities which the City Council has prioritised for delivery – together with the culture and visitor economy functions which are such an important feature of Liverpool's distinctive offer

For 2011/12 our mission remains to create a world class city for business and culture. The work of the Board will continue to focus upon the established "Strategic Ambitions", with actions set out in a Business Plan for 2011/12 - 2013/14

LLDC will continue to focus its attention on completing a limited number of existing contracts, new physical development activity being the responsibility of Liverpool City Council

KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

Liverpool Vision's core purpose is to drive Liverpool's economy in the direction of faster and more sustainable growth. At a high level we measure our successes against absolute and comparative figures of job growth, business creation and survival, improvements in productivity and growth and in the more active engagement of minority groups and our more disadvantaged communities. During 2010/11 continuing flat economic conditions have continued to drive these measures in the wrong direction.

We measure our direct impact through the outputs generated from the enterprise, business support and development projects in which the company is involved. In the development market, the jobs and commercial outputs generated during 2010/11 were affected adversely by the recession and by a significant reduction in the level of public funding available to support infrastructure and development projects

Enterprise and (in particular) Business Support programmes were similarly affected, the focus of those programmes has continued to shift from growth and expansion to helping businesses to survive

The key performance indicators for LLDC are defined in the agreements related to the limited number of directly funded projects

RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

In 2010/11 NWDA and HCA confirmed that they were no longer able to provide operational funding beyond March 2011 Through the year the company demonstrated its ability to manage a significant reduction in its operational funding. The company continues to manage the funding risk by undertaking rigorous reviews of project costs and funding, maintaining its delivery performance, considering ways to diversify its funding base, working closely with funding partners on monitoring and evaluation to maintain confidence in our ability to 'deliver' and by positioning proposed projects to take advantage of new funding mechanisms such as the

Regional Growth Fund and European JESSICA programme

Liverpool City Council is now the sole operational funder of Liverpool Vision and the Company will become a wholly owned subsidiary of Liverpool City Council The City Council is under continuing, severe financial pressure and whilst the promotion of economic development and local employment are high priorities, Vision must continue to present a robust case for funding to support the achievement of a sustainable economic future for the City

The Board are also very conscious that, despite the recession, Liverpool is in a stronger position now than for decades to promote the City as in investment location Opportunities such as the Global Entrepreneurship Congress are therefore of crucial importance
Liverpool must live up to expectations generated at the Shanghai World Expo and in the support for major projects Failure would represent a significant reputational risk for the City and for the company

The profile of risk management within Vision has been maintained following the work of the Audit Committee A corporate risk register is presented to the Board on a regular basis The overall approach follows established good practice focusing attention on identifying risks, evaluating risks, managing risks and monitoring and review Particular attention is being paid to the risk associated with the loss of capable and experienced staff in key positions

LLDC has maintained a risk register, following the transfer of staff to Liverpool Vision The key risk lies in the managed completion of LLDC existing projects within budget

FINANCING

The Operating costs of the company were met primarily through contributions by Liverpool City Council under a Services Agreement, with additional grant funding contributions from the Northwest Development Agency and the Homes and Communities Agency under a Funding Agreement

POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

Following the year end, the Northwest Development Agency (NWDA) and the Homes and Communities Agency (HCA) resigned as members of Liverpool Vision The Company's only member is Liverpool City Council The representatives of NWDA and HCA have also resigned their positions on the Boards of both Liverpool Vision and Liverpool Land Development Company

GENERAL INFORMATION

Liverpool Vision Limited is a company limited by guarantee incorporated and domiciled in England & Wales (registration number 06580889) The company's registered office address is given on page 1

The principal activity of the group and company is to promote and facilitate economic development and regeneration in Liverpool

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards and IFRIC interpretations as endorsed by the EU ("IFRS") and the requirements of the Companies Act applicable to companies under IFRS

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except as disclosed in the accounting policies set out below

The accounting policies set out below have, unless otherwise stated, been applied consistently to the financial statements

The individual financial statements for each group company are presented in the currency of the primary economic environment in which it operates (its functional currency). For the purpose of the consolidated financial statements, the results and financial position of each group company are expressed in pounds sterling, which is the functional currency of the company, and the presentational currency for the consolidated financial statements

GOING CONCERN

Liverpool Vision has worked with Liverpool City Council to restructure and meet the challenge of reduced income from its sole operational funder. The company has the support and confidence of Liverpool City Council and its income and expenditure position is stable for 2011/12. The position for 2012/13 is anticipated to be determined in January 2012. Liverpool Vision has, however, demonstrated its ability to manage its income position and any liabilities or obligations can be met from existing reserves. Accordingly, the accounts have been prepared on a going-concern basis.

COMPANY STATEMENT OF COMPREHENSIVE INCOME

The company has taken advantage of section 408(1) of the Companies Act 2006 not to publish its own Statement of Comprehensive Income The company's result for the year was a surplus of £1,393,000 (2010 Deficit £394,000)

BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements of the group incorporate the financial statements of the company and entities controlled by the company (its subsidiaries) made up to 31 March each year

Subsidiaries

Subsidiaries are entities over which the group has the power to govern the financial and operating policies to obtain economic benefits from their activities. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the effective date of acquisition or up to the effective date of disposal, as appropriate

Liverpool Vision Limited is the sole member of Liverpool Land Development Company Limited ("LLDC") a company limited by guarantee having no share capital LLDC has been consolidated into the financial statements. Liverpool Vision became the sole member on 30 April 2008 at no cost

Where necessary, adjustments are made to the financial statements of subsidiaries to bring the accounting policies used into line with those used by other members of the group

All intra-group transactions, balances, and unrealised gains on transactions between group companies are eliminated on consolidation. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the asset transferred.

REVENUE RECOGNITION & GOVERNMENT GRANTS

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts for services provided by the group excluding inter-company transactions and Value Added Tax

Programme income

The group recognises programme income in the Statement of Comprehensive Income as the associated costs are incurred. Unspent programme income received in advance is deferred until the associated costs have been incurred. Certain costs are classified as programme costs, but are funded out of operating income, so programme income does not always equal programme costs.

Operating income

Operating income is credited in the period in which it is received

OPERATING SEGMENTS

IFRS 8 provides segmental information for the group on the basis of information reported internally to the chief operating decision maker for decision making purposes. The group considers that the role of chief operating decision maker is performed by the Liverpool Vision Limited's board of directors.

FUNCTIONAL CURRENCY

The presentational and functional currency of the group and company is pounds sterling (\mathfrak{L})

FINANCE INCOME

Finance income relates to interest earned on cash and cash equivalents. Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable.

FINANCE COSTS

Finance costs relate to interest on the defined benefit pension liabilities less the expected return on the defined benefit pension assets

TAXATION

Taxation expense includes the amount of current income tax payable and the charge for the year in respect of deferred taxation

The income tax payable is based on an estimation of the amount due on the taxable profit for the year Taxable profit is different from profit before tax as reported in the statement of comprehensive income because it excludes items of income or expenditure which are not taxable or deductible in the year as a result of either the nature of the item or the fact that it is taxable or deductible in another period. The company's liability for current tax is calculated by using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

Deferred tax is accounted for on the basis of temporary differences arising from the differences between the tax base and accounting base of assets and liabilities

Deferred tax is recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except to the extent where it arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination. Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which temporary differences can be utilised.

TAXATION (continued)

Deferred tax is charged or credited to the statement of comprehensive income, except when it relates to items charged or credited directly to equity, in which case it is dealt with within equity. It is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled

SURPLUS FOR THE FINANCIAL PERIOD

Any surplus generated is carried forward in retained earnings to be used towards achieving the strategic ambitions

PROPERTY PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Liverpool Vision was incorporated in 2008 and the original property lease was entered into, prior to its incorporation, by Liverpool City Council who also paid for the property improvements. The Company is, however, responsible for dilapidations upon exit and has created, for the first time, a provision for their capitalisation and depreciation. Depreciation is charged straight line over 3 years to a break clause

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Classification of financial instruments

Financial instruments are classified as financial assets, financial liabilities or equity instruments

Recognition and valuation of financial assets

Cash and equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand and cash deposits which are readily convertible to a known amount of cash within three months

Trade receivables

Trade receivables are classified as loans and receivables and are initially recognised at fair value. They are subsequently measured at their amortised cost using the effective interest method as reduced by allowances for impairment when there is objective evidence of impairment. A provision for impairment is established when the carrying value of the receivable exceeds the present value of the future cash flow discounted using the original effective interest rate. The carrying value of the receivable is reduced through the use of an allowance account and any impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. The group does not charge interest on outstanding receivable balances.

Investments

Investments in subsidiaries are stated at cost less any provision for impairment. Any impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period they occur

Recognition and valuation of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into

Trade payables

Trade payables are initially recognised at fair value and are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method

RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Defined benefit schemes

The liability recognised in the balance sheet in respect of defined benefit pension plans is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the balance sheet date less the fair value of plan assets, together with adjustments for unrecognised past-service costs. The defined benefit obligation is calculated annually by independent actuaries using the projected unit credit method. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows using interest rates of high-quality corporate bonds that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid, and that have terms to maturity approximating to the terms of the related pension liability.

Actuarial gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are charged or credited to equity in the Statement of Comprehensive Income (SOCI) in the period in which they arise

Past-service costs are recognised immediately in income, unless the changes to the pension plan are conditional on the employees remaining in service for a specified period of time (the vesting period). In this case, the past-service costs are amortised on a straight-line basis over the vesting period.

Gains and losses on curtailments/settlements are recognised when the curtailment/settlement occurs

PROVISIONS AND DILAPIDATIONS

Provisions are recognised when the group has a present obligation as a result of a past event which it is probable will result in an outflow of economic benefits that can be reliably estimated. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of future outflows, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability

During 2010/2011 the company moved within the Capital Building to offices some 20% smaller Liverpool Vision Limited entered into the lease, with Liverpool City Council acting as guarantor. This differed from the original lease which was entered into by Liverpool City Council prior to the incorporation of the company. The company is now responsible for dilapidations upon surrender or expiry of the lease so a provision has been made for this and amortisation is charged over three years to a break-clause. No decision has been made to surrender the lease at this time.

1. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND AREAS OF JUDGEMENT

The group makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are addressed below

Pension benefits

The present value of the pension obligation depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a number of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost / (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions will impact the carrying amount of pension obligations.

The group determines the appropriate discount rate at the end of each year. This is the interest rate that should be used to determine the present value of estimated future cash outflows expected to be required to settle the pension obligations. In determining the appropriate discount rate, the group considers the interest rates of high-quality corporate bonds that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid, and that have terms to maturity approximating the terms of the related pension liability.

Other key assumptions for pension obligations are based in part on current market conditions Additional information is disclosed in note 14

Dilapidations provision

The Company has made an estimate of the likely cost of dilapidations upon exit from its leasehold offices. This has been based on the costs of fit-out of the premises and has been calculated by senior officers to include any inflationary costs at exit.

2. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

All financial instruments held by the group and company, are classified as "Loans and Receivables" (trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents) and "Financial Liabilities Measured at Amortised Cost" (trade and other payables) under IAS 39 'Financial Instruments Recognition and Measurement'

Financial risk factors

The group's operations expose it to a variety of financial risks. The group has in place risk management policies that seek to limit the adverse effects on the financial performance of the group by using various instruments and techniques.

Risk management policies have been set by the Board and applied by the group

(a) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the group will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The group's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it has sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities as they fall due with surplus facilities to cope with any unexpected variances in timing of cash flows. The group maintains an active and ongoing dialogue with its partners to ensure it has sufficient funds to meet its operational expense and programme costs.

The group believes it has sufficient cash facilities to meet its operational commitments. At the year end the group had no un-drawn committed facilities

Liquidity risk (continued)

All of the group's financial assets and financial liabilities fall due within one year and all are denominated in Sterling (\mathfrak{t})

(b) Foreign exchange risk

The group does not trade in overseas countries. There are few transactions in foreign currencies and therefore the group's exposure to foreign exchange risk is considered to be low.

(c) Interest rate risk

The group holds cash or cash equivalents with its bank and whilst exposed to interest rate risk and the recession it monitors and considers the risk of holding that cash

Cash and cash equivalents are subject to floating rates of interest. Trade and other receivables and trade and other payables are non interest bearing.

Sensitivity analysis

The group considers that interest rates in the short to medium term will rise by up to 2 basis points above their current level. An interest rate increase of 2% would generate additional annual interest income of circa £49,000 based on year end cash reserves. There would be an equivalent increase in equity.

(d) Credit risk

The group's financial assets are bank balances and trade and other receivables which represent the group's maximum exposure to credit risk in relation to financial assets

The credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit ratings assigned by international credit rating agencies. The directors consider the carrying amount of cash and cash equivalents approximates to their fair value.

The group's credit risk is primarily attributable to its trade receivables. Management have a credit policy in place and exposure to credit risk is monitored on an on-going basis. Management believe the group has a wide trade receivable profile and therefore does not have any significant concentration of risk. The credit quality of trade receivables that are neither past due nor impaired is considered to be good.

Capital risk management

The group's objectives when managing capital are to safeguard the group's ability to continue as a going concern

The group considers its capital to include retained earnings. The group does not have any externally imposed capital requirements

3. SEGMENTAL INFORMATION
