Free 2 Talk have consistently delivered Youth and Community Work in Northamptonshire, with a focus on disadvantaged communities in Northampton East. The organisation has supported 304 young people and 57 adults. Communities have benefitted through developing community cohesion; increased understanding of social issues and communication between different parts of the community. The organisation has advocated the perspective of the communities in which it works with authorities such as the police and Borough Council. This has supported the strategic direction for which other services can be delivered to meet needs and strengths.

Youth Work

In the last year F2T supported 304 young people, 61 through episodes of mentoring support. On evaluation all young people have identified Free 2 Talk as a safe space for support. Mentoring is delivered mainly on a one to one basis either in school or in a private community space. Some young people prefer access with one or two other supportive friends. Goals within mentoring are co-produced and reflected on to encourage resilience and problem solving.

Mentoring outcomes

- 28 ASB reduction;
- 22 Improved anger management
- 5 Reduced offending behaviour
- 32 Increased protective behaviours
- All young people increased self awareness, self esteem, self efficacy, and improved levels of wellbeing.
- 10 supported back into education, employment or training.

Summary of youth projects:

Over the past year, Free2Talk has delivered 7 youth projects across 5 different estates in the eastern district of Northampton, providing personal and social education and focused activities exploring issues relevant to young people.

The youth projects have seen many young people engage with Free2Talk and the sessions delivered. A total of 404 young people have attended a youth project run by Free2Talk from July 2017 to June 2018.

Over the 12 months there have been key themes that have been evident the separate projects. The teams of youth workers within each youth project consistently reflect and evaluate the youth work they provide for the young people attending the session and reflect upon what is currently happening for young people in society and how that influences the sessions that Free2Talk provide. A clear example of this over the past year has been the increase of awareness and the increased involvement young people have regarding youth violence and particularly knife crime. Recently, Free2Talk have reflected upon the number of young people that have encountered Free2Talk who have attached to them concerns over gang violence and gang related behaviour. There are approximately 51 young people who Free2Talk have these concerns over. In response to this, all 7 youth projects have undergone an intensive focus over the issue of youth violence. Over conversation and through questionnaire, youth workers have been able to gain information and consult the young people about their views to why there has been an increase of youth violence both on a national level and on a more local level. Through these intentional conversations, a group of young people have volunteered to be a part of a group that will look to challenge knife crime and youth violence and spread awareness to various people and organisations about the youth perspective of youth violence and knife crime.

In April 2018 28 young people aged 12-19 years attending our sessions completed a questionnaire on the needs. 57% had experienced something they thought was nasty or worried them online. This included strangers sending nude photos or sexualised messages; people self harming, bullying and threats as well as Russians bombing the UK. Young people experienced this through Instagram, Snapchat and Facebook / Messenger. 25% had shared something they later regretted; 25% worried about using the internet.53% said they knew people who had negative experiences online.

43% had committed a crime, 10% had a YOT worker; 68% knew someone in a gang; 46% had been asked to commit a crime.64% had considered running away from home; 35% had been to an adults' party not connected to friends or family; 17% had been offered substances or alcohol by an adult.14% of young people felt they couldn't say no to something they did not want to do in some situations. The young people that took part were more likely to speak to a friend (54%) than an adult (35%) about topics within our survey. 35% felt they could speak to parents; 43% could speak to a teacher or youth worker.

Being situated in deprived estates, it has been a continuous element of our youth work over the past year to challenge negative behaviours that lead to young people making decisions that have an impact on their own development and/or the development of their peers. This has been a focus with the 3 youth projects that are run for 8-11-year olds. We have identified that a proportion of 8-11 year olds Free2Talk work with struggle to manage their behaviour when interacting with their peers. They display behaviours such as aggression, being unable to win and lose, violence and being unable to manage their anger. Youth workers have seen these behaviours originate from situations that young people encounter daily (difference of opinions, losing games) and will continue to encounter as they mature into adolescence and adulthood.

Targeted Youth Work - Get Real Youth Music

Get Real is targeted, closed group work for young people at risk of exclusion. Young people engage in 6 sessions to develop their expression through urban music production and performance. They experience a professional recording space and performance of their work at the Roadmender (music venue) in Northampton. This is delivered in Pupil Referral Units; Schools and Community Spaces. Young people are offered accreditation through the Arts Award.

The project has worked with 300 young people with a core group of 48. Of the core group 45 are from challenging circumstances (as defined by Youth Music funders). 18 young people achieved their Arts Award. 36 taster sessions were delivered and 63 core sessions.

Young people left the project with a positive level of wellbeing and resilience and felt in control of their lives and were able to state their goals. 49% reported an increase in confidence 47% felt and increase in feeling good about themselves. 47% felt their quality of life had improved. General wellbeing increased by 42%. T. The Agency and Citizenship scale showed a 34% improvement. 35% reported an increased knowledge of where to get help.

Young people developed their skills in communication and positive interaction with others. 61% saw improvement in working well with others; 42% improvement in respecting others and 48% reported improvement in team work. 47% stated they had improved in committing to something.

Young people developed skills in creating and producing music, gain insight into music event management. 42% reported improvement in music skills and 85% had increased access to music and learning.

Community Creators

This project is a community development project which supports people to make changes and connect with others in their local community. It supports people to reflect on the community and become active in creating change for their community. Volunteers are supported by a Free 2 Talk Community Worker to support them to create a development plan, use a small amount of funding to get their idea off the ground and then maintain their progress.

57 people over the project have been part of community events. These have included: a Christmas celebration, Community clean up; Football tournament; Pancake Day. All events have been held is disadvantaged communities in Northampton East. Consultation with the community was a key throughout the events, common issues emerging was the disconnect between young and older people; litter and anti-social behaviour.

The project also supported volunteers to set up a performing arts group for young people; a self defence group and a street champion scheme to represent their neighbours.
