Reference and Administrative Information

The School of Artisan Food is a company limited by guarantee with charitable status.

Reference and administrative information is set out on the previous page and forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015).

Who we are and what we do

The School of Artisan Food (SAF) was founded in 2009 as a not for profit company. It became a registered charity on 31 December 2010. SAF is a unique, open-minded organisation, dedicated to teaching skills for artisan food production. Located on the Welbeck Estate in Nottinghamshire, SAF offers the opportunity for people of all skill levels, regardless of their socioeconomic circumstances, to expand their knowledge and improve their employability through a wide range of courses including: Bread making and Patisserie, Business and Entrepreneurship, Butchery and Charcuterie, Cheese making, Chocolate making, Ice Cream making and Preserving.

At SAF, students are taught by highly skilled practitioners who are able to share their artisan skills, knowledge and expertise; they are passionate about ensuring that the next generation can learn from their experience. In recent years, most skills-based education in the food sector has focussed upon industrial production techniques, standardisation, shelf-life, availability, hygiene rules and price control. It is only recently that government advisors, health professionals and an increasing number of public bodies have begun to realise the cost of this in terms of health, cultural diversity and social cohesion. There is also increasing evidence that an ability to produce in smaller units contributes towards a more varied and resilient food system.

Emphasis on a farm-to-fork philosophy and local sourcing of seasonal, raw materials along with natural, slow fermentation processes are central to SAF's vision for the promotion of health and well-being. SAF recognises cultural, economic and psychological barriers to healthy eating and engages in dialogue and debate about these issues.

Review of the year

The core activities of the School continued to be provision of a one year Advanced Diploma Course in Artisan Bakery alongside a wide range of short courses.



Charitable activities

Notable activities in the year included:

- Bursaries awarded to the 2015/16 cohort were £49,125 compared to £107,000 in the previous year, however we were still able to support 8 of the Advanced Diploma Students, who would otherwise have been unable to attend. Further bursaries were provided to a number of short course attendees.
- Surplus bread produced on the Advance Diploma course is donated to Hope Homeless Help and Support Charity, Food Hall Project, The Real Junk Food Project, The Lighthouse Project and Bestwood and Bulwell Food Bank
- Thanks to funding from the Daylesford Foundation, Level 1-3 artisan bakery qualification development is progressing
- The School has worked with Carlton Youth Club to raise awareness of healthy eating.

Advanced Diploma in Artisan Bakery

The full-time Advanced Diploma in Artisan Baking is the School's flagship qualification and is now accredited at level 4 and 5 by the Food and Drink Qualification/Ofqual Agency (FDQ)

11 students enrolled on the full-time Advanced Diploma to study bread baking, patisserie and viennoiserie, whilst also taking lessons in the science of fermentation, hygiene, the contemporary food system and the anthropology of food. In addition students completed a module entitled *Creating an Artisan Food Business* in which they developed business and marketing plans, learning small business finance and food legislation among other topics.

Many Advanced Diploma students come to SAF with the expressed intention of starting up their own artisan food business. Some wish to diversify an existing business, some wish to convert a hobby into a business and others wish to learn skills so that they can change career. Students visit existing SMEs and take seminars with people who have started their own small businesses, many of whom are graduates of the School. High quality work experience enables students to hone their skills in real-life working environments.

SAF has teachers who are well-respected in their fields and who have superb contacts in the artisan food community, in addition students benefit from an impressive range of guest lecturers, artisans and industry professionals.

Of the 11 students who enrolled, 9 completed the course. SAF has a reputation for assisting its graduates into employment and I'm pleased to say that all 9 subsequently found employment.

Short Courses

In excess of 1600 short course student days were hosted in the year. Baking and Patisserie continue to be SAF's most popular short course subject areas.

Throughout the financial year SAF continued to develop new short courses including advanced sessions and classes for food industry professionals wishing to further enhance their artisan food production knowledge. New courses include: Five Day Advanced Artisan Charcuterie, Introduction to Cheesemaking, Introductory Level Patisserie, Rye and Heritage Grains, An Italian Feast, Historic Pies and Historic Ices.

Bespoke and Tailored Training

SAF continued to grow its bespoke training activity by developing and delivering a range of bespoke training packages promoting the value of artisan food production for large scale, nationally recognised, food producers and retailers.

Fundraising

The School is grateful to individuals and Charitable Trusts including: Barbara Curtis Scholarship Fund, Hugh Matheson, Sakana and Uplands Foundations, Miele and Crispin Odey, who have contributed towards student bursaries and other charitable activities. SAF would particularly like to recognise the ongoing support from The Welbeck Estates Company Limited, and the commitment of a loan facility until 2020.

Future plans

The plan for the forthcoming year is to improve the financial position of the school to ensure a platform for growth and long term sustainability. The Advanced Diploma in Baking will continue as SAF's core activity.

SAF is exploring partnership arrangements with UK, US and Canadian universities. Knowledge transfer partnerships and study tours are being discussed as well as providing enrichment and training modules to existing university courses.

The redevelopment of the dairy training room was completed in August 2016 and will allow a greater diversity of short courses to be hosted in this space.

SAF continues to promote the offer of bespoke courses to producers, manufacturers and retailers for CPD. There is an increased focus on ensuring sales targets and business goals are achieved. SAF intends to host some more intensive short courses of longer duration.

Marketing and Sales

Marketing and sales is integral to the School achieving both its business and charitable objectives. Since the year end a marketing officer has been employed who works closely with the Director in delivering SAF's marketing and sales strategies.

The re-design of the SAF website, www.schoolofartisanfood.org, commenced in January 2016. The development has been problematical with the 'go-live' date postponed from April to August 2016. An active and growing social media presence provides information about the School's activities and allows SAF to engage with existing and new customers. The School continued to receive positive coverage in the local and national media.

Report of the Trustees

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Governance and Management

SAF is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. Its Trustees meet quarterly and more frequently if required. Day to day management is undertaken by a core team which comprised a Director, a Head of Studies and an Operations Manager.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association members of the Board are elected to serve for twelve months after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting.

Trustee Induction and Training

Potential Trustees meet with the Director and Chair of Trustees for a discussion about SAF's work and the interaction between the staff and Trustees. They are invited to join a full Board meeting and to meet with other Trustees. Once Trustees have been invited to join the Board they are provided with a full information pack and monthly updates from the Director comprising management accounts and details of the activity of the school. Regular meetings are held between the Chair of Trustees and Director, and all Trustees are invited regularly to events and presentations.

Risk Management

The Trustees have examined the major risks to which SAF is exposed and confirm that strategic planning and systems have been established to mitigate against these risks. Procedures are also in place to ensure compliance with health and safety regulations for staff, volunteers, students and visitors to the school.

Fundraising Advisory Group

During the previous financial year a Fundraising Advisory Group was formed to assist in fundraising, particularly for Diploma course bursaries, and identifying new revenue streams. The members of the group all come from the corporate sector.

Public Benefit Statement

The Trustees, having regard to the Public Benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission in accordance with section 17 of the Charities Act 2011, consider that the purpose and activities of the company satisfy the requirements of the public benefit test set out in section 4 of the same Act. In particular the school:

- Educates and inspires attendees at its courses
- Promotes access for all by offering bursaries for Diploma courses and ensuring, where possible, that
 places on short courses are available at a range of prices
- Seeks improvement in standards of public use of sustainable food products
- Delivers education and outreach to school children and community groups

Financial Review

Incoming resources of £654,121 (2015 - £777,110) were generated during the year and there was expenditure of £967,898 (2015 - £935,352) resulting in a deficit of £313,777 (2015 - £158,242). Details appear in the subsequent financial statements.

Reserves

Reserves are split between three funds:

- The Bursary fund is a restricted fund as it represents donations reserved strictly for the purposes of subsidising the cost of the diploma course for some students. Where funds are used during the year, there is a reserves transfer to the general fund. Any bursary funds not used in the current year will be carried forward and will be available for allocation in future years.
- The Big Lottery fund (Local Food) is a restricted fund. It represents funds reserved strictly for the use
 of achieving the aims of the Local Food Project. The direct costs associated with the project are
 allocated to the fund. Any funds not used in the current year, along with any profits, operating surplus
 or income generated must be reinvested in the project in future years or returned to the Royal Society
 of Wildlife Trusts.
- The General fund is used for the continuing charitable activities of the company, including supplementing the cost of bursaries. The company is actively seeking new students to attend future courses. It is also seeking further donations to both the Bursary fund (to date £460k has been provided as bursaries to disadvantaged students) and also to fund the company's general charitable activities. This fund is in deficit and the long-term aim is to eliminate this deficit through ongoing operating surpluses.

Responsibilities of the Trustees

The trustees (who, with the exception of Joe Schneider, are also the directors of the company from a company law perspective) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare the financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

So far as each Trustee is aware, there is no relevant information that has not been disclosed to the Company's auditors and each Trustee believes that all steps necessary have been taken that ought to have been taken to make them aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the Company's auditors have been made aware of that information.

Auditors

All of the current trustees have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any information needed by the company's auditors for the purpose of their audit and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information. The trustees are not aware of any relevant audit information of which the auditors are unaware. The trustees are also the directors of the company from a company law perspective.

Dixon Wilson has expressed its willingness to audit these accounts and to continue in office and a resolution to confirm the firm's appointment will be proposed at the next Annual General Meeting.

We have audited the financial statements of The School of Artisan Food for the year ended 31 August 2016 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to Smaller Entities).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Year ended 31 August 2016

1. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and are in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) and the Charities Accounting Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP 2015). Important accounting policies are set out below.

Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at their purchase price, together with any incidental expenses of acquisition, less accumulated depreciation. Provision for depreciation is made so as to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets on a straight line basis over the expected useful economic life of the assets concerned. The principal annual rates used for this purpose are:

Leasehold property improvements - over 25 years
Plant and equipment - over 5 years
Office equipment - over 3 years
Fixtures and fittings - over 5 years
Motor vehicles - over 5 years

Impairments

Impairment reviews are carried out on tangible fixed assets where there are indications that the recoverable amount of the asset is below its net book value.

Government grants

Where government grants in respect of the purchase of tangible fixed assets have conditions attached outside the control of the charity, the grants have been recognised as deferred income when received. This is amortised at rates calculated to write off the deferred grant income evenly over the expected useful life of the assets purchased.

Income and expenditure

Course fees are credited and expenditure is charged to the revenue account on an accruals basis, with the exception of donation and legacy income. Diploma course income is recognised net of bursaries as these are given to diploma students in the form of a reduction in course fees. Donation income is recognised when there is entitlement to the funds and receipt is probable.

Allocation of expenses

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

Funds

Unrestricted funds are held to cover the charity against the continued financing of activities.

Restricted funds represent sums given to charity subject to restrictions as to how the funds can be used.

Going concern

The accounts are prepared on a going concern basis. The company is reliant on loans from The Welbeck Estates Company Limited. They have confirmed they will continue to support the company and the loans are not due for repayment until 30 September 2020, therefore the trustees expect this facility to provide the charity with sufficient working capital for at least the next 12 months.

Reconciliation with previous generally accepted accounting practice

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by the FRSSE and the SORP 2015 the restatement of comparative items was required. No such restatements were required.
