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#### CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

#### YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2015

The past year has shown us that there is a need to continually equip churches to respond to issues at home and abroad. We have seen churches take a lead in their communities to provide aid and relief to refugees. We have also seen how a Faith Action Audit that reported on the extent of social action projects led by churches - churches are serving 48 million beneficiaries with 2 million volunteers (May 2015).

We celebrate this growing confidence in the role that the Church is playing in public life. For our part, Ascension Trust continues to equip thousands of volunteers from churches who serve their communities as rail pastors, prayer pastors, response pastors, school & college pastors and street pastors.

We are proud of the efforts we have made to respond to issues of violent crime through the Word for Weapons initiative and our commitment to investing in young people through our summer Youth Programme. Looking ahead we know that, unfortunately, some old challenges will remain and that some new problems will emerge. But I take great hope in the knowledge that Ascension Trust will continue to equip churches to serve with more impact, with greater depth and always with faith

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Ascension Trust is governed by a board of trustees/directors and by a senior management team. Our trustees ensure that there is good governance in place and that we are working towards all of our stated goals. They are also active in making sure that our reputation is protected.

The Directors submit their annual report and the financial statements of Ascension Trust for the Year End 31 December 2015. The Directors confirm that the annual report and financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the Ascension Trust's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (revised 2005).

The report is prepared in accordance with the small company regime (Section 419(2) of the Companies Act 2006).

#### **Governing Document**

Ascension Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association adopted on the 1st January 2009. It has no share capital and the liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £10. Prior to this, the Ascension Trust was a charitable trust but converted to a Charitable Company limited by guarantee due to the rapid expansion of the Trust.

#### **Governance & Management**

Ascension Trust is now run by a board of directors which comprises ten directors (Trustees). The Trustees are both Trustees of the Charity and Directors of the Company. Where there is a need for new Trustees, these would be identified and appointed by the current Trustees. The chair of Trustees is responsible for the induction of any new Trustee. This involves awareness training of a Trustee's duties and responsibilities, the governing document, administrative procedures, as well as the history and ethos of the charity. A new Trustee will also receive a copy of the previous year's annual report and a copy of the Charity Commission leaflet 'The Essential Trustee: What You Need To Know'. At present, Ascension Trust has nine Trustees from a variety of professional backgrounds, each relevant to the activities of the charity. The day to day management of the organisation is shouldered by a staff team, headed by a Chief Executive Officer (who is also a trustee and Director).

#### **Risks**

The CEO, along with the Directors, routinely examines the business, reputation and operational risks when preparing strategic plans and budgets, and when considering forthcoming projects. In particular, Ascension Trust is aware of the risks involved in working with its various constituencies, including:

- i) Associated projects around the UK
- ii) Vulnerable people including young people
- iii) Individual Street Pastors
- iv) Financial Procedures
- v) International Development

The Ascension Trust is in the process of updating its operational risk register with the generous help of the Police and other stakeholders. When completed, it will be a tailored

framework to further identify, monitor and minimise the risks faced by the organisation.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Statement of purpose

Ascension Trust is a Christian charity that is at the heart of partnerships between churches and communities. Through its initiatives it trains individuals and churches for relevant, informed and pastoral interaction in our society.

#### **Our Aims**

The aims of the charity as set out in the charity's Memorandum of Association are summarised as follows:

For the benefit of the public, to relieve sickness and financial hardship, advance education and training and to promote and preserve good physical, mental and emotional health, particularly but not exclusively, through the provision of counselling and support in such parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the trustees from time to time may think fit.

#### **Our Objectives**

The principal objective of the company concerns the advancement of the community through education, training and outreach. Each year the trustees review the objectives and activities to ensure that they continue to reflect our aims. # Our purpose

We are the governing body for more than 300 charities in the UK.

Ascension Trust is a Christian charity that equips the Church to rise to the challenge of pastoral, practical and informed interaction in our society. By bringing the Church into partnership with other agencies we work for peace, for safer streets, for an investment in the lives of young people and for the invigoration of the Church in our nation.

## Why do we exist?

In 1993 our founder Revd Les Isaac asked himself two questions:

How can I help the Church to be relevant to our changing society?

How can I help Christians to engage effectively with their local community and across cultures?

Ascension Trust was born to mobilise Christians of all ages to reach their communities with the practical as well as the spiritual good news of Jesus Christ.

### What are our beliefs and motivations?

We believe in partnership

Church is doing great work, but we need to keep pace with many challenges and continue to play our part alongside the wider community, the Police and local authorities. Where the Church needs to be equipped and informed in order to do this, we believe we can help.

We believe in participation

We believe that every man is his brother's keeper. Christians should not turn away from society's problems but seek to bring salt and light to troubled people and communities.

We believe in prayer

Through Jesus Christ we believe that we are spiritual beings with a practical purpose. We believe the church must pray as well as act. As we follow Jesus Christ we must continue to make our unique contribution to the strengthening of community life.

#### What have we achieved so far?

- We have developed Word4Weapons knife bins
- We have trained 500 young people for leadership, spiritual maturity and community action through our Urban Youth Programme
- We have provided resources, advice and governance to help our Street Pastors initiatives to operate successfully according to Charity Commission guidelines and best practice.
- We have built relationships with our partners in the Police, local authorities, alcohol retailers and leading nightclub operators
- We have launched the Street Pastors scheme and over 12 years we have seen this grow in 270 locations across the UK
- International Street Pastors Initiatives have been established in Ireland, the Channel Islands,
   USA, West Indies, Gibraltar, Nigeria and Australia
- We have built on the Street Pastors model to develop School & College Pastors, Rail Pastors and Response Pastors
- We have led teams of volunteers on overseas missions in Ghana, the Caribbean, South America, the former East Germany and inner cities in the United States
- Street pastors contribute to reductions in alcohol-related crime and A&E admissions
- Our groundbreaking agreement with the Metropolitan Police for the safety of our volunteers on the streets has provided a template policy for all Police services and Street Pastors teams in the UK

# What do we hope to achieve in the next five years?

#### We want to build on what we have started

We want to train more volunteers from churches to be street and school & college pastors.

We want to take more weapons out of circulation.

We want to mobilise people who will be prayer champions for their towns, cities and regions.

In the light of the global terror threat, we believe that training more response pastors is a priority.

Through Street Pastors we are making a difference to public safety on the high street, but there is still much to be done in relation to hard-to-reach communities and the issue of gang violence.

We are aiming to raise £90,000 to complete our Oyibi Project – to build a multipurpose building for accommodation and training for *kayayei* women and girls in Accra, Ghana.

# **Training**

# Ascension Trust trains individuals for relevant, informed and pastoral interaction in our society

**Young people** are trained and mentored through our Urban Youth Summer Programme, to develop leadership skills vital to the future of churches and wider society

**Street pastors and school & college pastors** prepare to serve their communities through 42 hours of training and observation. We aim to bring together the challenges of a Christian responsibility for our neighbourhoods with the specialised knowledge vital to participation in 21st-century culture

Street pastors can also train to become **response pastors**. 87 street pastors have taken part in this training since the launch of Response Pastors in September 2014 so that they are ready to provide emotional and physical support at a time of crisis.

In Ghana our **Oyibi Project** is establishing a centre for training and accommodation for vulnerable girls and women. We're working with *kayayei* girls who come to Accra from the north to look for work, and often are very vulnerable, sleeping in doorways and marketplaces. We are working with the Kayayei Association and through partnership with them, seeking to **start by housing 10 young women**. **Our long-term vision is to house 300 in a multipurpose building**.

Management teams, trustees and coordinators for all of our local Street Pastors charities meet together for the annual training conference annually. Through our governance and support, we help local initiatives to develop their ability to lead volunteers and stay abreast of legal and policy updates

# We work for safety

"There are two kinds of response that I hear when I talk about gang and gun crime. The first is 'I know it's happening, I understand it, I experience it.' The Church has a unique contribution to make but we have to deal with uncomfortable truths – and the first of these is that we are not ready or informed enough to play our part in helping troubled communities. That's where Ascension Trust comes in."

Mike Smith, project director of our Word4Weapons initiative received an MBE in the New Year's Honours list 2016.

Twice a year we host a 'Gang Summit' to bring church leaders together with practitioners, ex-offenders, chaplains, Police, youth workers and academics from areas that are troubled by gangs. Ascension Trust has created this forum to develop best practice and to support and encourage each other.

# We uphold partnerships

#### We are interdenominational

Every Street Pastors initiative must have the support of at least four local churches. Our volunteers – street, prayer, school & college, rail and response pastors – are drawn from a variety of denominations and churches.

To take one example, street, prayer and school pastors in Plymouth are drawn from a wonderful array of local churches!

Through Ascension Trust 3,285\* churches from all denominations supply volunteers for our initiatives or support their local team, and partner with the Police, local authorities and the night-time economy – for the benefit of public safety.

#### Our work benefits the public purse

The work of our volunteers has a cost-saving for the public purse, by reducing admissions to A&E and freeing the Police and emergency services to attend critical incidents.

#### We are part of partnerships for public safety in the night-time economy

Street Pastors, along with trade schemes like Best Bar None are now well accepted as bringing real results for safer towns and cities and have been an influential part of raising standards through joined-up working in the night-time economy.

- National Pubwatch (NPW) is sponsoring the training of street pastors in Westminster
- Night club managers in Cambridge visited Cambridge Street Pastors in April 2015 and brought boxes of Creme Eggs with them. The eggs were given to people coming into Nightlite, a 'safe place' project, and street pastors also took a large number of eggs out with them.
- Diageo, leading global alcohol retailer, made a 3-minute video on behalf of Belfast Street Pastors.
- National Pubwatch is sponsoring the training of three volunteers in Westminster.

#### Partnership awards

# We encourage prayer

#### National prayer gathering

In July 2015 we hosted a one-day prayer gathering for our prayer pastors and all those who are committed to praying for the Street Pastors movement. We were delighted to be led in reflection by Celia Bowring from CARE.

The Street Pastors network joined together in a national week of prayer from 24–31 October. The week of prayer was led by our national prayer coordinator, Wendy Thomas, who linked towns and cities together on a 'prayer drive' from John O'Groats to Land's End during the week of prayer.

#### The Street Pastors network and prayer for UK towns and cities

The Bible gives us a pattern for how to pray and what to pray for – the Lord's Prayer. In this prayer Jesus prayed for God's kingdom to come and God's will to be done on earth, as it is in heaven.

We all have a part to play in this! In God's strength we can work to bring God's plans into being in the places where we live. As Christians we believe that we can build up and bless our communities, and the national prayer week is a time to rededicate ourselves to this responsibility.

#### We are local

From Abertillery to Yeovil, from Stornoway in the Western Isles to Penzance in Cornwall, the Street Pastors initiative continues to grow in the UK, and is now active in **270** towns and cities. The Street Pastors website has a map on which you can search for teams in your region, as well as stay abreast with international developments – go to www.streetpastors.org/our-network.

There are now **6** countries outside the UK, plus the state of Jersey in the Channel Islands, that are operating the Street Pastors initiative.

Street Pastors has proved to be a strong platform from which to develop other pastoral and practical initiatives. School & College Pastors was the first 'extension', and now there are also retail pastors (in Aberdeen), daytime teams (in Taunton and elsewhere) and rail pastors in Barnet, north London.

There are **26** School & College Pastors initiatives in the UK.

Over **100** response pastors have been trained and are ready for deployment. The first team of response pastors was launched in Bexhill in September. In November a group of 30 response pastors were commissioned at our annual graduation ceremony. This group represented Yeovil, Oxford, Kettering, Hemel Hempstead, Heathfield and 11 boroughs of London.

On Saturday 10 January I went out in Leicester with three friends, after a meal and quite a few drinks, my friend started to become ill. We then called for a lift home, but my friend had started to throw up. Shortly after a pair of street pastors came to ask if there was anything they could do to assist me in taking care of my friend.

They gave her a bottle of water and spent a few minutes making sure that I was ok. I would just like to say to every team that goes out and offers assistance to people who have over done the night out, that you are doing amazing work! I'm sure this can be a very thankless job at times, but it does restore my faith in Christianity.

I want to let the two amazing street pastors in Glasgow that I met tonight know that I got home ok. They approached me on their bikes to inform me that I was being followed by a young man and then also approached him in front of me, asking me if I knew him, which I didn't. After this they then ensured that I got to a taxi rank safely and refused to leave me until I was safely in a taxi.

I cannot even begin to describe how grateful I am to these two street pastors, they told me to Facebook them and let them know that I got home ok, but I couldn't remember their names. I hope this gets back to them in some way!

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Introduction

To be helpful to the readers of the accounts, the following is a summary of the main comparatives for the previous five (5) years:

For 2015, the Ascension Trust income was £475,906 (2014: £607,986). Resources expended were £553,606 (2014: £570,472) resulting in a net deficit of £77,700 (2014: £37,514 surplus). The charity's income has declined, mainly from a reduction (£87,561) in donations and legacies. Whilst donations from individuals remain steady, the charity received no grants in 2015 and donations from churches fell. We would like to thank our individual donors for their faithfulness. Income in 2014, included a one-off insurance claim of £18,723. The charity continues to operate against a backdrop of limited resources and insecurities over funding. Nevertheless the charity, with the aid of sound financial management and the support of its staff, volunteers, Management and Trustees continued to deliver its services at the highest standard in the year 2015.

#### **Principal Funding Sources**

Aside from the income generated by donation, from the public and churches, the principal funding source for the charity are contributions from its various initiatives (including Street Pastors Initiatives) in the form of Licence Fees. The licence fee income, when compared to the previous year, remains static (a small fall). We would like to thank our initiatives, who notwithstanding their stressed financial circumstances, continue to contribute to the central funds, so that The Ascension Trust can maintain its services to the whole network.

In the light of falling income, The Ascension Trust board remains committed to its "Be One in a Million" campaign, which seeks to raise £1 Million, to impact one million people, to show them that in God's eyes they are truly "One in a Million". Over the months, the board plans to relaunch its "Be One in a Million" campaign. Specific actions will include, strengthening and re-orientating the Finance department by the appointment of new Finance Manager. The new Finance Manager will be tasked with updating our communication system with our donors and partners. The board will be seeking funding grants for this post.

In 2015, our Word 4 Weapon initiative, continued its work of helping to make our streets safer by maintaining and increasing the number of weapon bins in London and the West Midlands. The work in the West Midlands continues to be supported by the West Midlands Police. We are very grateful for this development and growing partnership.

We acknowledge and thank all those individuals, churches, and companies, who have supported the work of Ascension Trust in the past years, through their kind donations of funds, advice and time.

#### **Reserve Policy**

The Management and Trustees examined the charity's requirements for reserves in the light of the main risks to the organisation. It has established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charity is not less than 12 months of expenditure. This will allow the Charity to function properly, even if there is a significant downturn in income given the present economic circumstances. Our Projected overhead expenditure for 2016 is £484,588. As at 31 December 2015, Ascension Trust had free reserves, being unrestricted funds not designated for a specific purpose, totalling £87,880 (2014: £172,872). This represents about 2 months of expected overhead expenditure. The Management and Trustees acknowledge the significant shortfall of its target level and plan to continue to build reserves through operating surpluses and targeted funding applications. In the short term, the Management and Trustees have also considered the extent to which existing activities and expenditure could be curtailed, should such circumstances arise.

#### **Funds Designated**

Towards the end of 2009 Ascension Trust purchased a building and the Trustees designated thirty thousand pounds (£30,000) of the current unrestricted funds towards the costs of setting up the premises for use (e.g. office equipment, repairs and improvements, etc.). A balance of £2,860 was brought forward from 2014. A further £Nil was expended on building works in this period and this leaves a balance of £2,860 to be carried forward to 2016 for further repairs and maintenance work planned.

#### **Investment Policy**

To date there has been very little financial headroom to consider any significant long term investment opportunities. The Management and Trustees remain active in exploring ways to improve the returns on cash reserves.

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Ascension Trust intends to maintain and expand its work in the coming years, subject to satisfactory funding outcomes.

#### Looking ahead...

As we pursue our mission and vision, we are confident that the strategic direction we have chosen is sound. We are developing some exciting initiatives and services which are seeking to foster partnerships with the drinks industry and the night club economy. We will continue to remain flexible and innovative for greater impact both in the UK and internationally. In the coming year we will make further progress through developing the Street Pastors and School Pastors initiatives internationally and broadening the vision and operations of W4W, as well continuing our commitment to Urban Youth Mission and Overseas Missions.

In the current economic climate we recognise the need for a lean-based business model enabled by an effective and cost-efficient IT platform and sound leadership. We strive to be as cost-effective as we can possibly be, through improvements in our methods and processes. In conclusion, we made considerable progress, but there is still much to be done to deliver Ascension Trust's full potential. We aim to continue to deliver social dividends to society and contribute to community development and social cohesion. Once again, our achievements in 2015 would not have been possible without the support of our stakeholders, partners and our donors and the sheer dedication of all the staff and various volunteers. On behalf of my colleagues on the Board and Management, I wish to thank our employees for their dedicated efforts. And I would like to thank our valued partners, sponsors, street pastors and other stakeholders, for their continuing support, which we value greatly.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

#### YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2015

#### **Basis of accounting**

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and investments measured at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015), and the requirements of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) (SORP 2015).

#### Consolidation

In the opinion of the Trustees of the committee, the charity and its subsidiary undertakings comprise a small group. The charity has therefore taken advantage of the exemption provided by Section 139 of the Charities Act 2011 not to prepare group accounts.

The charity's subsidiary undertakings consists of Ascension Commercial Limited (Company Registration 07586400). The directors do not consider the cost of preparing consolidated accounts justifiable and note 12 provides adequate details relating to the nature of the trading subsidiary.

#### Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income, any performance related conditions attached have been met or are fully within the control of the charity, the income is considered probable and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Donations and legacy income is received by way of donations, legacies, grants and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Ly entitled to the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity, being the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market.
- Investment income is included when receivable.
- Income from charitable trading activity is accounted for when earned.
- Income from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES** (continued)

#### YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2015

#### **Expenditure**

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Costs of raising funds comprise the costs associated with attracting donations, grants and legacies and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the sofa on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis, as set out in the notes to the accounts.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the purposes of the charity. Unrestricted funds include a revaluation reserve representing the restatement of investment assets at market values.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for specific purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

#### **Fixed assets**

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:
