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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES CatZero: Delivering Lasting Personal Change Charitable Purpose

People of all ages, often with complex underlying issues, are supported to overcome the barriers that prevent them moving into education, training or employment. CatZero's uniqueness comes from how we do things, not just what we do. Our experienced and dedicated team builds trust and confidence in individuals, with programmes of self-analysis, development and challenge. The result is lasting personal change.

Our background

From our bases in Hull and Grimsby, our dedicated team - many who have been with us since inception - lead a variety of different programmes for all ages. Launched in December 2008 to work with NEETS (young people not in education, employment or training), we have now extended our reach to the long-term unemployed, older people with specific needs, service veterans and full families and look to continue this as we move into our 12th year.

Our work in some of the most deprived and challenging areas of East Yorkshire, Hull, North and North East Lincolnshire, supports people to overcome their own personal barriers, using a combination of academic training, teamwork and emotional and practical support. That support is long-term too, as our 'progressions' team engages participants over the months and years ahead: Once CatZero, Always CatZero', is our ethos.

Over the last eleven years, CatZero has provided intensive support to over 2,000 individuals with an average of 60 per cent moving into sustainable education, employment or training. Many more participants have also gone on to complete short term qualifications or into short training courses and / or carried out work experience and short and long-term volunteering. CatZero also helps with issues such as transition from primary to secondary school, school attendance and GCSE exam preparation and attendance and supports families to build positive lives.

It is significant that some of the largest private enterprises and charities locally and nationally support the work we do. We also attract grant-funding from leading organisations that understand how our bespoke programming, unique teambuilding and personal mentoring engages individuals who are willing to change.

Our programme 'sailing' experience, using the 72ft CatZero Challenge yacht, offers participants an intense journey. Held towards the end of our formal programmes, it pulls together everything that is learned - building confidence, teamwork and focus in an intense and challenging environment. There is nowhere to hide on these sails, which can only be truly appreciated if experienced.

It is worth noting too, that our health & safety, safeguarding and governance is outstanding and closely monitored.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Significant Activities A snapshot of 2019:

Programmes

During 2019, CatZero ran 9 innovative and long-term development and support programmes to change the lives of 122 individuals, along with a family programme in Grimsby plus a summer engagement programme for NEET young people in Grimsby.

The year started with the continuation of programmes for the long-term unemployed in Hull, partially funded through the Community Led Local Development funds with match from a private funder, and in June expanded these into Scunthorpe.

A second bespoke programme was run for ex-service veterans from across Humber, funded through ABF Soldiers, the Royal Airforce Benevolent Fund and the JobCentre Plus (JCP).

A further bespoke programme was run at the end of the year aimed at Lone Parents 18 years and over that are not in employment funded through the Community Grants 5, managed by the Humber Learning Consortium (HLC).

We also continued with our three-year Grimsby Full Families Programme supporting children, young people and their families in partnership with CPO Grimsby, funded through the Big Lottery, and secured funding through J Marr Seafoods and the JF Brignall Charitable Trust to commence working with families in Hull.

All contracts were achieved or over achieved against set targets and we received excellent feedback from all funders and from participants. We are also pleased to report that our retention rate remains above 90% for all programmes.

Although 2019 was a difficult year, the Trustees decided to utilise reserves to ensure the continued delivery of support to those in need.

Participants

A total of 122 people of all ages commenced a CatZero core programme during 2019 with over 90 per cent successfully completing the programmes, funded through a range of grants, philanthropic support, corporate and individual fund-raising. In addition, 86 families engaged in the full families programme by the end of Dec 2019, of which we have 119 adults, 11 vulnerable adults and 219 children, with 100% of these families having have shown demonstrable progress to meeting their targets.

The views of our 2019 participants:

"I met two members of staff from CatZero while I was in the Jobcentre and they had a chat with me and gave me a leaflet. I read the leaflet in bed that night and thought 'This will change my life', and I knew it was something I had to do."

"Some of the activities the group were asked to do were a bit intimidating. However, I received such encouragement from both the staff and the team, that I don't think there was anything I didn't do. However, we were never forced or pressured. If there was something we really didn't want to do, we were given other tasks. We were never made to feel like a failure or inadequate in any way."

"The sail was a revelation. I had no idea that I would be able to sail a boat in the middle of the night, on the ocean with no land in sight. It was absolutely incredible."

"I would be dead now if it wasn't for the support I've had here."

"The staff at CatZero are inspirational; they are so unbelievably supportive, and I've made many friends."

"I'm sad that this experience is over. It has changed me as a person - I'm more confident, more upbeat and I'm so proud of what I've achieved; eight certificates in various skills! It's like they held a mirror up to me, so that I could see my potential and I want to achieve whatever I can. I want to do my best and make the most of any opportunities that come my way. I feel that they've helped me set sail and they've given me the support and the skills to reach wherever I want my destination to be."

"Just reflecting on how lucky I was to do this and meet the friends I have this year... hard, exciting but sooo rewarding!!! Catzero gave me the medicine I wasn't able to get on the NHS!!! Feeling very blessed.....What's a life without spirit.... I'm coming back folks!!! Once CatZero always CatZero!!!"

"First thing I want to say about CatZero is that I became happier and more confident about myself, but mostly I am not stressing over every little thing. I've been myself and been happy."

"CatZero has been a real catalyst for change. I am feeling happier, more confident, optimistic and a lot more open with my feelings."

"Thank you for believing in me enough that I now believe in myself."

"The staff will probably never understand how much I have truly changed and what they have given me to move forward."

"I thank all of the wonderful CatZero staff and the team for giving me this opportunity - you changed my life."

"CatZero for me was far more than finding work, it was about my confidence and the ability to truly believe in myself."

"It is not about helping people to have more qualifications, it's about helping people to manage their lives and make them feel that they can be helpful in the community."

"My future has changed to a future I believe in, one I never thought possible or could achieve, I hope through doing this I have made my boys proud."

"When I started CatZero I has nothing and no one, but over 12 weeks I've gained so many things to be proud of, memories to last a lifetime and most importantly, I've gained a family."

"2019 has been one hell of a year for me. I don't usually do soppy things like this but the fact that this year has brought so much new stuff and people into my life, I feel like I should. Nothing major really happened until the summer when I took part in CatZero, making friends that hopefully I will have for life. You've all made a massive improvement on my life. Thanks to CatZero I was able to actually get myself applied to university, where I've met amazing people there as well. I wouldn't change this for the world. Big steps have been made in my life thanks to all of you guys. I love you all so much and I can't wait to see what things we go through together in 2020."

"CatZero is probably the best thing you could ever do. It has really changed my life and I couldn't be more thankful to the staff for everything."

"When I started CatZero I had nothing and no one but over 12 weeks I've gained so many new experiences, things to be proud of, memories to last a lifetime and most importantly I gained my own little family."

As a charity principally working intensively with participants with the aim of moving them into employment, further education or vocational training, the trustees believe this meets the public benefit test as required under charity law.

In addition to achieving the contractual agreements, referred to above, CatZero continues to secure donations and contributions through small grants applications, corporate support and fundraising events, which enable the organisation to meet its objectives.

The Trustees have established a reserves policy, with the long-term objective to build and maintain a level of reserves to cover unexpected and planned additional expenditure and also enable the Charity to ensure the charity continues as a going concern.

STRATEGIC REPORT Financial review FIXED ASSETS

The Trustees are informed that the open market value of CatZero, its Challenge 72 yacht is around £500,000, which is above its net book value in the Financial Statements.

We also work hard to put the yacht into action when not used for programmes with nearly £95,000 being raised during 2019 through corporate and partner days and events, with 256 people taking part in corporate events.

OUR FUTURE

During 2020 we continue to run Community Led Local Development Programmes in Scunthorpe and have funding to run a further four programmes in Scunthorpe in 2021.

The support of the ABF Soldiers charity and the Royal Air Force Benevolent fund continues and we have secured further funding form the Armed Forces Covenant Trust for two bespoke programmes for veterans in 2020 and 2021.

Further funding from The Big Lottery, Hull Community Led Local Development, J Marr (Scafoods) along with the Brignall Family Trust is enabling the continuation of the Full Families Programme in Hull and this continues until at least 2021.

Work continues with families in Grimsby thanks to further funding from the Big Lottery and the Hawerby Family Trust and support of North East Lincolnshire Council.

Support from partners and funding from small grant organisations continues alongside our fundraising, corporate, teambuilding and sailing projects.

Catzero, like most other organisations, has been affected by Covid-19. Catzero has been fortunate enough to receive support during this time, including government grants via the furlough scheme and local authorities, plus other grant awarding organisations.

All staff returned to work September 2020. Our delivery programmes have been adapted to ensure participants are kept safe and we meet Covid-19 restrictions. This is being closely monitored.

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on the basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Vessel - Straight line over 20 years

Computer equipment - 33% on cost

It was deemed appropriate to revalue regularly the yacht CatZero to ensure the carrying amount reported reflected the market value.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Financial instruments

Financial instruments are classified and accounted for, according to the substance of the contractual arrangement, as financial assets, financial liabilities or equity instruments. An equity instrument is any contact that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Financial instruments

Trade and other debtors are recognised initially at transaction price less attributable transactions costs. Trade and other creditors are recognised initially at transaction price plus attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less impairment losses in the case of trade debtors.
