Report of the Trustees

for the Year Ended 31 January 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 January 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects for which the charity was established are:-

- 1 To promote humane behaviour towards animals by providing appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for animals which are in need of care and attention by reason of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage, and to educate the public in matters pertaining to animal welfare in general and the prevention of cruelty and suffering among animals.
- 2 To provide therapeutic experiences for members of the public suffering from stress, bereavement, depression and other mental stress, through contact with and caring for animals.

Public benefit

The trustees have paid due regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The Sanctuary is currently performing in the way in which it was established by the founder, Alexandra Bastedo.

We currently average around 26 equines of varying size (one equine passed away in June), approximately 30 cats, 7 pigs, 7 goats and a variety of birds, all living in our tranquil ten acres.

2016/17 has been a successful year for cat rehoming and we are confident that this trend will continue going forward. Equines and other animals are still difficult to rehome, mainly due to the current financial climate. We have again this year, been regularly asked to take in equines for various reasons.

We continue to offer visits to local schools and children's after school clubs ie. Brownies, Beavers, Scouts etc taking along, where possible an animal and giving talks on animal care and the work that the sanctuary carries out.

We also welcome school visits to the sanctuary as part of their academic programme or to help out as volunteers as part of their year end care in the community projects.

We also visit care homes for the elderly and continue to offer visits to other organisations eg. WI, clubs etc.

We are conscious that a significant number of people suffer from depression, anxiety, bereavement and other forms of mental stress - the problems of which can often be alleviated by contact with, or caring for animals. Examples of these are the Brain Rehabilitation Unit (BIRTS) in Horsham, Independent Lifestyles based in Billingshurst and the YMCA (Downs Link Group) based in Portslade.

We also continue to assist the local community by taking students from Brinsbury, Plumpton and other colleges for work experience and Duke of Edinburgh Awards.

Significant improvements/new build have been made to several stables this year with plans to renew several more next year.

One of the main challenges that the charity continues to face, is that of fundraising. Whilst we have regular quiz nights, our regular annual open day and Christmas Fayre plus other ad hoc fundraising events, we need to be constantly looking at other avenues for fundraising. Next year we will be open to the public on the first Sunday afternoon of the month (June to October), which if successful will be a regular occurrence going forward.

The Trustees' thanks go to the 75 plus unpaid volunteers who give their time unstintingly and without whom the sanctuary would not be able to operate.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 January 2017

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

Overall the charity made a surplus of £162,117 on its unrestricted activities, compared with £916,134 in the prior year which included the recognition of the quantifiable part of the legacy from our founder, Alexandra Garland, amounting to £919,699. In the current year we were fortunate in receiving a legacy in excess of £200,000 without which the charity would have made a deficit for the year.

During the year the charity received a grant of £5,000 towards the cost of providing permanent toilet facilities at the Sanctuary. These funds were not spent during the year and the funds received have therefore been carried forward as restricted funds. The overall increase in funds for the year was £163,617 (2016: £919,634).

At the end of the financial year the retained reserves of the charity were £1,130,515 (2016: £966,898), of which £780,333 (2016: £786,204) was represented by the freehold property and other tangible fixed assets, and £5,000 (2016: £3,500) were restricted. Given the level of free reserves the trustees recognise that our efforts to contain costs and boost fundraising must continue in order to ensure the long term future of the Sanctuary.

We continued with a series of fundraising events and our open days were a success again this year. Regular quiz nights and coffee pop in mornings have also proved popular. The number of Friends and Champions continue to grow and we plan to have new and exciting fund raising activities in the coming year.

The Trustees will continue to increase the appeal of the Sanctuary to the general public by improving the amenities we have. We continue to make the Sanctuary 'user friendly' for a variety of disabled people where the latter have needs of association with animals to improve or assist their particular stress related issues.

We shall continue to take in as many animals as we possibly can but we remain aware of both the financial constraints and land availability.

Reserves policy

The trustees are aiming to attain a position where reserves equivalent to three years of expenditure will be held. This is considered necessary due to the longevity of the animals in the care of the charity and the difficulty in finding homes for some of them. In the longer term the trustees expect that the legacy left to the Sanctuary by Alexandra will help to provide a reserve fund to cover future unexpected fluctuations in income and expenditure. However it is the intention of the trustees to ensure that fundraising activities are maintained at a level where the income received more than covers the day to day running costs.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Alexandra Bastedo (Champions) Animal Sanctuary Limited is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 21 January 2009 and registered as a charity on 27 January 2010. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the charity. In the event of the charity being wound up the members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The day to day management of the affairs of the charity is undertaken by the trustees.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are recruited on the basis of their commitment to the objectives of the charity and the skills that they are able to contribute. Given the nature of the charity's activities no formal induction or training is considered to be required. The trustees are aware of their responsibilities and take advice from the Charity Commission and professional advisers as the need arises.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Alexandra Bastedo (Champions) Animal Sanctuary Limited

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 January 2017 set out on pages six to fourteen.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under Section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act)) and that an independent examination is required. The charity's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination by being a qualified member of The ICAEW.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 January 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Fundraising income and donations are included in the year in which they are received.

Donations in the form of gifts in kind are recognised as incoming resources when distributed with an equivalent amount being included as resources expended. Gifts in kind are valued at an estimate of the market value the charity would have to pay for an equivalent item.

Grants are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Legacies receivable are included in the accounts when it is probable that they will be received and the amount that will be received can be estimated with reasonable accuracy. Receipt is considered to be probable if probate has been granted and the executors are satisfied that there are sufficient assets in the estate, after settling any liabilities, to pay the legacy.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 2% on cost
Improvements to property - 10% on cost
Plant and machinery - 10% on cost
Motor vehicles - 10% on cost

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Financial instruments

The charity has only basic financial instruments which are accounted for at their settlement value.
