#### Year ended 31 January 2015

#### **Trustees' Report**

The trustees are pleased to present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 January 2015.

Alexandra Bastedo (Champions) Animal Sanctuary Limited is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 21 January 2009 and registered as a charity on 27 January 2010. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the charity. In the event of the charity being wound up the members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The day to day management of the affairs of the charity is undertaken by the trustees.

The trustees, who for the purposes of company law are also the directors of the company, who served during the year were:

Mr A Sims (resigned 13 June 2015)
Mr J Williams (resigned 23 June 2015)
Ms C Tofield-Cook
Mrs D G Humphries (appointed 11 February 2014)
Ms G D Harris (appointed 11 February 2014, resigned 11 November 2014)

Given the nature of the charity's activities no formal induction or training is considered to be required. The trustees are aware of their responsibilities and take advice from the Charity Commission and professional advisers as the need arises.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

#### **Objects and strategy**

The objects for which the charity was established are:-

- To promote humane behaviour towards animals by providing appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for animals which are in need of care and attention by reason of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage, and to educate the public in matters pertaining to animal welfare in general and the prevention of cruelty and suffering among animals.
- 2 To provide therapeutic experiences for members of the public suffering from stress, bereavement, depression and other mental stress, through contact with and caring for animals.

The trustees have paid due regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### **Achievements and performance**

Last year we reported our distress at losing our founder and benefactor Alexandra Bastedo. Her loss has left a very large gap in the general functioning of the Sanctuary and, whilst trying to emulate her methods and wishes, the Trustees have had considerable difficulties to overcome. One of the problems was losing her constant presence which meant that any problem, day or night, was attended by her. The Trustees decided to appoint Peter Kirkwood as Caretaker to overcome some of these problems. The Trustees are determined to keep the Sanctuary continuing with similar methods to Alexandra but at the same time improving actions wherever appropriate.

#### **Achievements and performance (continued)**

Sue Jameson, our president, has given an amazing amount of time to the Sanctuary since her appointment and hardly misses any of our activities and events. We are very grateful for her enthusiasm.

Virginia McKenna very kindly entertained us as part of our series "An Evening With......." in November and packed the house at the Chinese restaurant. This together with another Firewalk evening organised by John & Jane Williams meant that our income for November was the best month of the year.

The Cost of a Coffee Club continued to raise funds for specific tasks, one of which was the opening of the Orchard Cattery in August, an event which Alexandra would have loved to attend. It was designated as a memorial to Alexandra.

The Charity has continued the work of running the Sanctuary which began in 2010 and has spent the year rescuing more domestic animals (excluding dogs) which have been ill treated, neglected or abandoned. The object remains to rehome all animals whenever possible in order to find the space to accommodate newcomers. Where it appears to be impossible to rehome an animal through ill health or temperament, the Sanctuary will offer a permanent home.

It is to be noted that we are frequently unable to offer a home, however temporary, to some animals due to constant overcrowding. In these cases we strive to put people in touch with other rescue centres or suitable individuals who are able to help. Equines in particular are notoriously difficult to rehome but we managed to place half a dozen in new surroundings.

We still average about 27 equines of varying size, a fluctuating clowder of cats with droves of pigs and goats. These are all accompanied by ducks and hens who live in our tranquil 10 acres.

We carry on with offers to local schools for groups of local schoolchildren to visit the Sanctuary and we take animals into schools so that the children can learn how they should be treated. We also visit care homes for the elderly. We are conscious that a significant number of people suffer from depression, anxiety, bereavement and other forms of mental stress – the problems of which can often be alleviated by contact with, or caring for, animals. We have an increasing number of such people who join us as volunteers and we see the improvement in their situations as they spend time with us. We continue to assist the local community by taking students for their Duke of Edinburgh awards and others (whose future lies in working with animals) for work experience.

We have improved our procedures throughout the year and the charity has subsequently become more efficient. Rehoming, particularly of cats, has increased considerably and we have had significant successes in finding suitable homes for pigs and some equines.

Throughout the year we have made significant improvements in our stock of accommodation for equines, cats and pigs and, whilst there is some way to go, we are satisfied with this year's progress.

We are totally dependent on our 60 plus unpaid volunteers to whom the Trustees offer their grateful thanks.

Allan Sims and John Williams, who had both been trustees from the early days of the Sanctuary, retired after the end of the year. The trustees would like to express their gratitude for their contribution to the work of the Sanctuary.

#### **Financial review**

The current period continues to prove difficult as many people are abandoning their pets through lack of finance and this gives rise to a particular strain on sanctuaries such as ours.

Although the cost of caring for the animals continues to increase due to increases in feed prices and vet fees, we have made every effort to contain costs and have reduced our expenditure on looking after the animals in our care during the year in spite of having a similar number of animals in residence on average. However, we did incur additional maintenance costs in the year including a significant amount on repairing and replacing the fences to ensure the safety of the animals in our care, so that our overall expenditure on necessary maintenance was £10,618 compared with £3,723 in the prior year. We were fortunate in receiving a generous one off donation of £7,500 towards our running costs which enabled us to carry out this work.

In addition, as referred to above, we now need to employ an onsite caretaker whereas previously our founder, Mrs A Garland, was able to fulfil this role.

Overall the charity made a surplus of £4,111 on its unrestricted activities, compared with £19,667 in the prior year. The trustees are pleased with this result at such a difficult time for all involved with the Sanctuary but recognise that our efforts to contain costs and boost fundraising must continue in order to ensure the long term future of the Sanctuary.

During the year we received a grant of £4,500 towards the cost of purchasing a tractor for the Sanctuary: these funds were spent during the year and the funds received have therefore been transferred to unrestricted funds, leading to an overall increase in funds for the year of £8,611 (2014: £34,167).

Fundraising dinners are now much more difficult to arrange and much of the fundraising will be carried out through smaller events.

We were fortunate with the Open Weekend which, in a very poor summer, remained rain free and generated around £7,500.

We rely, as always, on regular donations from Friends and Champions to provide a significant level of funds for the day to day function of the Sanctuary with fundraising events to cope with the more difficult capital costs. Mud is a constant enemy and is a threat to both animals and volunteers but we believe that a grant may be forthcoming to clear the worst areas.

A cat rehoming day enabled us to rehome a significant number of cats and, at the same time, raise more funds from donations.

The Trustees will continue to increase the appeal of the Sanctuary to the general public by improving the amenities we have. The new Tea Room has made life easier for both volunteers and guests. We intend to pursue the concept that the Sanctuary is equally for the benefit of animals and humans and we have every intention of making the Sanctuary 'user friendly' for a variety of disabled people where the latter have needs of association with animals to improve or assist their particular stress related issues.

#### Reserves

The charity operates on a year by year basis with fundraising increased to cover any unexpected increase in costs. The trustees strive to attain a position where reserves of three to six months will be held to cover fluctuations in both income and expense and the result for the year has assisted with this objective in the short term. In the longer term the trustees expect that the legacy left to the Sanctuary by Alexandra will help to provide a reserve fund to cover future unexpected fluctuations in income and expenditure although it is our intention to ensure that fundraising activities are maintained at a level where the income received more than covers the day to day running costs.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions relating to small companies within part 15 of the Companies Act 2006.

#### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

#### Notes to the accounts

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

The charity has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard 1 (Revised 1996) 'Cash Flow Statements' from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small charity.

#### 1.2 Incoming resources

Fundraising income and donations are included in the year in which they are received.

Donations in the form of gifts in kind are recognised as incoming resources when distributed with an equivalent amount being included as resources expended. Gifts in kind are valued at an estimate of the market value the charity would have to pay for an equivalent item.

Grants are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Legacies receivable are included in the accounts when they satisfy the following criteria:

Entitlement - actual receipt or legally enforceable right to receipt Certainty - reasonable certainty of receipt Measurement - the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

#### 1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the category of expenditure to which it relates.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity.

Fundraising costs are those costs directly attributable to trading income and fundraising.

Governance costs are those costs incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

#### 1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Assets costing below £200 are not capitalised. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Buildings 10% straight line per annum Equipment 10% straight line per annum

#### 1.5 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

#### 1.6 Taxation

The company is exempt from corporation tax on the grounds that it is a charity and all of its income is applied for charitable purposes.

#### 1.7 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objects of the charity.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used, details of which are included in note 12.

#### 14 Legacies receivable

Following the sad death of Mrs A Garland in January 2014 the charity is entitled to a significant legacy consisting of the property where the Sanctuary is situated and the residue of Mrs Garland's estate. Probate was granted just before the approval of these financial statements and the trustees estimate that the overall value of the legacy that will be recognised in next year's financial statements is in the region of £920,000.

#### 15 Related parties

During the year the charity incurred expenditure of £600 and received income of £1,135 on behalf of the estate of Mrs A Garland. Mr A Sims, a trustee of the charity throughout the year, paid expenses of £385 on behalf of the charity and was repaid £920 by the charity. The charity also repaid £478 to Ms C Sims, a person connected with Mr A Sims. At the year end the charity owed £9,603 (2014: £9,068) to the estate of Mrs A Garland, £385 (2014: £920) to Mr A Sims and £nil (2014: £478) to Ms C Sims. Under the terms of Mrs Garland's will the amount owed by the charity will form part of the legacy referred to in note 14 above.
