Structure, governance and management

User Voice became registered as a charity with the Charity Commission for England and Wales on 21 May 2010. It is a charitable company limited by guarantee, with no share capital and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 16 February 2009, as amended by special resolution on 7 May 2010. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to a maximum of £10.

In accordance with the governing document, there shall be not less than two directors at any one time. The directors, who are also the charity trustees, are normally elected by the members of the company in a general meeting. The Board may appoint any member of the company as a director either as an additional director or to fill a casual vacancy. Any member so appointed must retire at the next annual general meeting but is eligible for re-election.

Each new trustee will receive an induction session with the Chairman and Chief Executive, where they are provided with the background to the charity and its work and receive guidance on their role as a director and trustee of the charity.

Risk management

The directors have reviewed the major and financial risks that impact on the work of the charity. The systems that have been established enable the directors to review and take necessary steps to lessen these risks.

Objectives and activities

The object of User Voice is to advance education for the public benefit in criminal justice and the rehabilitation of offenders by conducting study and research and disseminating the useful results of that research to the public

Public benefit

The directors have complied with section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act, having due regard for the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the trust's aims and objectives

Achievements and performance

User Voice is unique because its work is led and delivered by ex-offenders. We exist to reduce offending by working with the most marginalised people in and around the criminal justice system to ensure that practitioners and policy-makers hear their voices.

User Voice is well placed to gain the trust of and access to people involved in crime or who have direct experience of the criminal justice system as offenders and prisoners. Our work aims to deliver a powerful rehabilitation experience for offenders, better criminal justice services and institutions, and more effective, evidence-based policy.

The entrenched exclusion of some of the people we work with can be a huge obstacle to service providers. The involvement of ex-offenders has many benefits, not least of which is the power of a narrative of success, working with ex-offenders can be a powerful way of motivating people, often with little self-belief, that they can overcome the barriers they face. All the work User Voice has done suggests offenders want to talk to people who have 'walked in their shoes', which is why all our frontline staff are ex-offenders.

In order to achieve this we do the following

- Raising awareness through speeches and opinion, we present the models, practices, evidence-base and business case behind User Voice in order to inspire and influence. We create opportunities for the people we work with to meet and speak to those in power
- Bespoke consultations where we work with clients to design projects aimed at accessing, hearing and acting upon the insights of service users. These projects can include staff and user consultations, qualitative and quantitative work, and primary and secondary academic and operational research.
- User Voice Councils developed for use within prisons or in the community for probation, youth offending teams and related services. In whatever context it occurs, the User Voice Council approach is underpinned by democratic models, which seek to engage and empower participants in collective decision making within the confines of the particular service at hand.
- **Peer mentoring** projects that enable people with experience of criminal justice and related services to support others

Consultations

In our short life we have established a strong reputation working with the secure estate, social services, drug and alcohol services, the NHS, probation trusts and prisons, as well as focusing on specific groups of individuals, such as young people or ex-service personnel. In 2012/13, our consultations have included

- A consultation with young people on the complaints system in the youth justice system and secure estate for the Office of the Children's Commissioner
- A consultation with current and former probation service users regarding the Ministry of Justice's consultation 'Transforming Rehabilitation'
- A consultation with drug and alcohol services users to obtain their views about effectiveness of the national payment by results pilots for the Department of Health

- The continuation of an annual nationwide engagement project, What's Your Story?, with young offenders to get their insight into youth crime and deliver this to senior practitioners and policy makers, culminating at the Annual Youth Justice Convention
- A consultation with young people regarding the Ministry of Justice's consultation 'Transforming Youth Custody Putting education at the heart of detention'
- A consultation with young offenders about the barriers faced when seeking employment for Business in the Community
- A consultation with young offenders for The Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health as part of their project around the exploration of 'Healthcare for Young People in Secure Settings'
- Consultations with young offenders in Bradford and Leeds in order to inform service improvement

Councils

During the year User Voice has established and continues to support elected Councils based on our model of service user engagement in the following areas

- HM Prison Rye Hill, a training prison located near Rugby, Warwickshire, holding 660 adult male Category B sentenced prisoners (recommissioned)
- HM Prison Maidstone, a Category C training prison holding 600 adult male prisoners (recommissioned)
- HM Prison Wolds, a Category C training prison holding 395 sentenced male adults (recommissioned)
- HM Prison Aylesbury, holding up to 444 of the longest sentenced young adult males in the English prison system
- HM Prison Birmingham, a Category B prison holding 1450 adult remand and sentenced male prisoners (recommissioned)
- HM Prison Buckley Hall, a Category B prison holding up to 445 sentenced male adults
- London Probation Trust, the largest of the 35 probation trusts across England and Wales, supervising 40,000 offenders at any one time (recommissioned)
- Northumbria Probation Trust, which supervises an average of 7,000 offenders at any one time (recommissioned)
- Kent Probation Trust, which supervises an average of 6,500 offenders at any one time
- Cumbria Probation Trust, which supervises an average of 1,900 offenders at any one time
- Southwark Youth Offending Team
- Tower Hamlets Youth Offending Team

Peer Mentoring

During the year, User Voice has developed a new area of work. All engagement projects involve a degree of informal mentoring given the personal experience delivery staff have of the criminal justice system. This has now been formalised with User Voice becoming an Open College Network (OCN) Recognised Centre able to deliver accredited training, including Peer Mentoring. As a result User Voice has been commissioned to deliver a number of peer support programmes.

Peer Mentoring (continued)

- Essex Probation Trust, recruiting Peer Mentors (women and men), providing OCN accredited training and assisting them in order to develop mentoring relationships, with a number of Mentors progressing to paid support Case Workers
- HMP Drake Hall, providing training to women prisoners in the Sisters project in order to become Peer Mentors
- South London and Maudsley NHS Trust, an innovative project supporting individuals in forensic mental health services accessing employment, providing them with peer support.
- Kent Probation Trust, training former Service User Council members to become peer mentors supporting newly elected Council members
- Positive Steps Oldham (youth offending service), facilitating a peer support drug and alcohol group for young offenders that meets on a regular basis

Impact

During the year User Voice has significantly grown its reach working in more prisons, probation areas and youth offending teams, engaging with a wide number of policy makers and practitioners in order to affect change. In this period User Voice has engaged with over 2,500 service users, including.

Of these participants 2 were employed by User Voice during this period and around 40 were given further volunteering opportunities

User Voice is currently working with the Institute of Criminology at the University of Cambridge to undertake before and after evaluations of Aylesbury and Birmingham Prison Councils using the Measuring the Quality of Prisoner Life (MQPL) and Staff Quality of Life surveys (SQL) MQPL is a measure of prisoners' perceptions, consisting of a written questionnaire administered to randomly selected groups of prisoners and supplemented by discussion groups. The initial results of the study are due to be published in Autumn 2013

These are already making an impact in two significant ways. Firstly service users are feeding back ideas to improve outcomes such as increasing the chances of an offender completing their sentence. Examples include improvements in the ways we communicate, better access to services, or improving induction processes. The second and perhaps most inspiring impact is seeing how being involved in the council can change the life of an individual offender. They learn new skills, gain confidence and inspire others. Having User Voice as a partner is certainly adding real value to our work."

Financial review

The income received from donations, grants and other charitable activities allowed the charity to meet its objectives, resulting in deficit for the year of £29,740. This follows a deficit in the prior year of £156,125.

Investment policy and performance

There are no restrictions on the charity's power to invest and the current policy is to invest short term funds with the trust's bankers

Reserves policy

The directors' aim is to maintain free reserves in unrestricted funds at a level that will provide sufficient funds to cover operational costs for six months. The actual level of these reserves at 31 March 2013 was £241,759 (2012 £289,549) equivalent to around 3 months. This policy is under review



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have also been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, applicable UK Accounting Standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice. Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) and the Charities Act 2011.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company

1.2 Funds structure

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor Unrestricted funds are funds which are used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees

1.3 Incoming resources

Grants, donations and other income are credited to the statements of financial activities in the year to which they relate Grants and donations will be recognised on an entitlement basis and when receipt is certain Other income, including investment income, is recognised on an accruals basis

Income is credited to incoming resources when the conditions of entitlement, certainty and measurement have been met, unless it relates to a specific future period, in which case it is deferred Contract income is recognised over the life of the assignment

1.4 Resources expended and irrecoverable VAT

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Support costs not directly attributable to an expenditure category are shown in note 6 and have been apportioned on the basis of staff activity.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

4 years straight line

1.6 Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at cost less provision for diminution in value.

Staff Development Programme

Funded by The Paul Hamlyn Foundation, the aim of this programme is to enable us to meet the specific training and personal development needs of those who work for us, thereby strengthening project delivery

Northumbria Probation Community Council

This project established a permanent structure for on-going interaction that enables Northumbria Probation to gain insight from the end users of its services with the ultimate aim of reducing re-offending
