#### STRATEGIC REPORT

#### YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The directors present their strategic report for the company for the year ended 31 December 2022.

#### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND BUSINESS REVIEW

The principal activity of the company during the year was to produce a 3 day country festival and other live activities.

The result and position of the company as at and for the period ended 31 December 2022 are set out in the statement of comprehensive income, statement of financial position and statement of changes in equity pages 9, 10 and 11 respectively. The result and position of the company were in line with directors' expectations.

#### RESULTS AND DIVIDENDS

The company's loss for the financial year was £217,762 (prior period profit - £124,377). The retained profit for the year has been transferred to reserves.

The directors do not recommended a dividend payment for the year ended 31 December 2022 (prior period - £Nil).

#### PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

A key risk for the company is competing music events of the same genre which may occur within close proximity in terms of calendar date and location.

An additional risk for the company is the current economic environment which has been impacted post Covid-19 and Brexit, leading to high levels of inflation, price increases and labour shortages.

The Board of Directors continue to monitor these potential risks and will observe government advice should another outbreak occur.

#### **KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS**

The company uses a variety of performance indicators to review historical performance and plan for the future. The key indicators are turnover and gross profit margin.

#### Turnover

Turnover levels increased in 2022 after significantly low levels in 2021 due to Covid-19 which saw the cancellation of live events. 2022 Turnover has grown due to meeting the niche market demand for the Country Music genre and Americana themes of The Long Road Festival. The outlook for future years growth for the festival is positive as it looks to build on its unique presence in the market...

#### Gross Profit Margin

The company had a Gross Profit Margin of 21.34% in the current year compared to 29.56% in 2021. The company aims to achieve a profit distributable position within the next 5 years, despite the limitations caused by Covid-19 in 2021 and 2022.

#### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

Notwithstanding the risks and uncertainties outlined above, the long term impact of the Covid-19 virus and related social distancing and safety requirements surrounding live events is the only significant risk towards changing the activities and results of the company in the foreseeable future.

#### DIRECTORS' QUALIFYING THIRD PARTY INDEMNITY PROVISIONS

A qualifying third party indemnity provision remains in force as at the date of approving the directors' report, subject to the provisions of section 236 of the Companies Act 2006. Vivendi SE, headed by Bolloré Group, the ultimate parent undertaking, maintains a Directors & Officers Liability Programme which indemnifies directors' personal liabilities resulting from alleged wrongful acts committed in the line of their employment.

#### POLICY ON THE PAYMENT OF CREDITORS

It is the company's policy that payments to suppliers are made in accordance with those terms and conditions agreed between the company and its suppliers, provided that all trading terms and conditions have been complied with.

#### GOING CONCERN

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis based on future trading forecasts as well as the support of the group treasury function should it be required. The Company made a loss after tax of £217,762 and the current liabilities of the Company exceeded total assets by £1,462,213. The directors have prepared forecasts and projections for the parent company, Vivendi Live Limited and its subsidiaries covering a period of 12 months following the date of signing of these financial statements. Based on such projections, the directors believe that the parent company and its subsidiaries are reliant on the support from the ultimate parent company, Vivendi SE. The parent company has received confirmation from the ultimate parent company, that whilst the parent company remains a subsidiary of Vivendi SE, it intends to continue to provide financial and other support to the extent necessary to enable the parent company and it's subsidiaries to continue to pay its liabilities as and when they become due for a period of not less than one year from the date of approval of these financial statements. The ultimate parent company is considering entering into an exit event, after which it will cease to support the parent company and its subsidiaries. However, directors have reasonable expectations that financial support from the new investor will continue. These conditions indicate the existence of a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The directors have considered the cash flow projections, the support from the ultimate parent company and the expected financial support from the new investor, and have concluded that it is appropriate to prepare these financial statements on a going concern basis. However, in the event that the expected support is not forthcoming, the Company may be unable to continue as a going concern.

#### **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of Ulive Portfolio Limited (the 'company') for the year ended 31 December 2022, which comprise the statement of financial position, the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in equity and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the director's use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

#### Our responsibilities

We are responsible for concluding on the appropriateness of the directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the company's ability to continue as a going concern. #### YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Ulive Portfolio Limited is a private company limited by shares and incorporated in the UK under the Companies Act 2006 and registered in England and Wales. The registered office is 3 Pancras Square, London, NIC 4AG.

#### 2. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

The company's financial statements have been prepared in compliance with United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland" and the Companies Act 2006.

#### 3. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparation of financial statements

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company, and have been rounded to the nearest £.

The accounting policies set out below have, unless otherwise stated, been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

#### FRS 102 - Qualifying exemptions

The company meets the definition of a qualifying entity under FRS 102 and has therefore taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102:

- from preparing a statement of cash flows and related notes;
- · from preparing a reconciliation of the number of shares outstanding from the beginning to the end of the financial year;
- · from disclosing related party disclosures;
- from disclosing key management personnel compensation;
- from certain financial instrument disclosures required by FRS 102.11 Basic Financial Instruments and FRS 102.12 Other Financial Instruments.

This information is included in the consolidated financial statements of the company's parent undertaking, Vivendi SE, copies of which can be obtained from 42 Avenue de Friedland, 75380 Paris, Cedex 08, France.

#### Revenue recognition

Turnover represents income and amounts derived from ticket sales and other related services provided during the year, excluding VAT, and is recognised on the date of the festival or, in respect of cash based sales, on the date that cash is received.

#### **Basic Financial instruments**

#### Trade and other debtors / creditors

Trade and other debtors are recognised initially at transaction price less attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses in case of trade debtors.

Trade and other creditors are recognised initially at transaction price plus attributable transaction costs. If the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, for example if payment is deferred beyond normal business terms, then it is measured at the present value of future payments discounted at a market rate for a similar debt instrument.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are comprised of cash balances. Bank overdrafts are repayable on demand.

#### YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### **Impairment**

#### Financial assets (including trade and other debtors)

A financial asset carried at amortised cost is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial asset is impaired if objective evidence indicates that a loss event has occurred after the initial recognition of the asset, and that the loss event had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of that asset that can be estimated reliably.

An impairment loss in respect of a financial asset measured at amortised cost is calculated as the difference between its carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. For financial instruments measured at cost less impairment an impairment is calculated as the difference between its carrying amount and the best estimate of the amount that the company would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the reporting date. Interest on the impaired asset continues to be recognised through the unwinding of the discount. Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss. When a subsequent event causes the amount of impairment loss to decrease, the decrease in impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss.

#### Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty.

The directors may make judgements in the application of the accounting policies above that have a significant impact on the amounts recognised, and may make estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The directors have concluded there are no critical judgements and no key sources of estimation uncertainty to disclose.

#### Interest receivable and Interest payable

Interest payable and similar charges include interest payable, finance charges, unwinding of the discount on provisions, and net foreign exchange losses that are recognised through profit or loss in the statement of comprehensive income.

Other interest receivable and similar income include interest receivable on funds invested and net foreign exchange gains.

Interest income and interest payable are recognised in profit or loss as they accrue. Dividend income is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income on the date the company's right to receive payments is established. Foreign currency gains and losses are reported on a net basis.

#### **Taxation**

Tax on the profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised through profit or loss in the statement of comprehensive income except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly in equity or other comprehensive income, in which case it is recognised directly in equity or other comprehensive income.

Current tax is the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the statement of financial position date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred tax is provided on timing differences which arise from the inclusion of income and expenses in tax assessments in periods different from those in which they are recognised in the financial statements. The following timing differences are not provided for: differences between accumulated depreciation and tax allowances for the cost of a fixed asset if and when all conditions for retaining the tax allowances have been met; and differences relating to investments in subsidiaries, associated and joint ventures to the extent that it is not probable that they will reverse in the foreseeable future and the reporting entity is able to control the reversal of the timing difference. Deferred tax is not recognised on permanent differences arising because certain types of income or expense are non-taxable or are disallowable for tax or because certain tax charges or allowances are greater or smaller than the corresponding income or expense.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rate that is expected to apply to the reversal of the related difference, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the statement of financial position date. Deferred tax balances are not discounted.

Unrelieved tax losses and other deferred tax assets are recognised only to extent that is it probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits.

#### Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated to the company's functional currency at the foreign exchange rate ruling at the date of transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the statement of financial position date are retranslated to the functional currency at the foreign exchange rate ruling at that date. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rate at the date of transaction. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies that are stated at fair value are retranslated to the functional currency at foreign exchange rates ruling at the dates the fair value was determined. Foreign exchange differences arising on translation are recognised through profit or loss in the statement of comprehensive income.

#### Property, plant & equipment

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset. Plant & Machinery is depreciated using the straight line method over 3 years.

#### (b) Factors affecting current tax charge

The tax assessed on the profit on ordinary activities for the year is lower than the standard rate of corporation tax in the UK of 19% (prior period - 19%).

Under the Finance (No.2) Act 2015, the main rate of corporation tax was reduced from 20% to 19% effective from 1 April 2017. As announced in the 2021 Budget, the corporation tax rate will remain at 19% for the years starting 1 April 2021 and 2022 by virtue of the Finance Act 2021 s5 & s6.

In the Spring Budget 2022, the government announced an increase in the Corporation Tax main rate from 19% to 25% for companies with profits over £250,000 with effect from 1 April 2023.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the rate that is enacted and expected to apply to the accounting period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on the above rates.
