Objects and activities of the charity

Executive Summary

FACT's life began in 2008, only three years after its founder, Joanne Smith, was diagnosed with cancer. She soon understood the effect a diagnosis of cancer has within a family, for Joanne, her husband, children, mum, sister, grandparents and in laws, they were all affected. No matter who has cancer, families and friends are affected as well as the patient. As Joanne came to the end of over four years of treatment, the idea that is now FACT was developed.

FACT provides a seamless wraparound of support mentally and physically from start to finish outside of the hospital environment. Cancer is non-discriminatory, the support FACT offers the community across the North East displays their understanding of this. Anyone affected by cancer receives support from FACT, that may be a coffee and a chat to planning and preparing for end of life, but it does not end there for their loved ones, FACT also supports the family of the bereaved.



FACT is acutely aware upon beneficiary feedback, community engagement, focus groups, collaborative working, research, and data analysis that the demand for our services continue to increase. No one could have imagined how important this service would have been following the pandemic outbreak in March 2020.

During the pandemic, FACT reacted extremely quickly and adapted service provision to meet the everchanging beneficiary needs under unprecedented circumstances for all involved. As a local charity, we are fortunate to be able to assess and react quickly to changing situations, unlike larger organisations where the wheels are slower to turn, decision making is a longer process. This is especially the case for services based in hospital and clinical settings which unfortunately had to close due to COVID restrictions.

FACT decided to compile their report early, to the end of June 2020, as we believed that after the outbreak and first initial lockdowns that retail shops would reopen for the remainder of 2020 and a change of service delivery would have been implemented.

During the lockdown, FACT's support was needed more than ever within the community itself and we never envisaged how much this would matter.

Why FACT was founded

FACT was founded after Joanne Smith, Chief Executive, became aware that she had been looked after extremely well by local medical teams and services, however, once she stepped outside the hospital environment, there was no practical or emotional support for either herself, or more importantly, for her family, especially her young children. She wanted to make sure that everyone affected by cancer, either as the person diagnosed, or their family, carers, friends, or colleagues, could find help easily, in good time and free of charge.

Joanne founded FACT in 2008, initially its aim was to build partnerships with health professionals, support groups and other charities to help strengthen the current support network. This remains a key area of FACT's work, however, when Joanne could not find the support services that people were looking for, she started to fill the gaps herself, either as a one off for an individual, or by developing a programme of regularly accessible support. And so, FACT's direct support to those diagnosed with cancer, their family, carers, and friends began.

FACT has grown significantly since its humble beginnings, because of the vast demand of its service users.

Mission Statement

FACT's purpose is to source, promote, and form relationships between the support services, groups, organisations, and charities that are available to cancer patients.

By bringing together these services, a network of cross referral and recommended support can be formed between statutory, voluntary, and commercial bodies, and the strength gained in numbers be drawn on.

By strengthening the network of support, FACT will give those suffering from cancer, cancer survivors, and their friends and families the opportunity to access services more easily, and more quickly, often at a time when speed and ease is essential.



FACT provides social and support opportunities for all cancer patients, survivors, their family, and friends to meet, form friendships, and build communities with others in similar positions to themselves.

FACT is working with adults and children to educate and raise public awareness of cancer related and healthy living issues. FACT delivers numerous awareness programmes in schools, colleges, workplaces, and public buildings which are specifically tailored to suit their audience.

A word from the Chief Executive

We know that every day, in the UK, around a thousand people are diagnosed with cancer and that they need support as they and their families and friends begin their cancer journey. The challenges our beneficiaries face continue, and FACT is there to support the people of the North East. We simply could not offer the range of services, help and support that we do without our wonderful army of donors, volunteers, supporters, patrons, staff, and trustees.

2020 has thrown many challenges to all and with the loss of life to so many, it is a year that will be remembered in history, with many wanting to forget. The mental health impact has been huge and will probably not be fully realised for many years to come. The negative impact this has had on cancer treatment, surgeries and appointments is emerging daily with so many undetected cases and diagnosis being slow the prognosis has not been good for many.

The pandemics impact was more than anyone could have envisaged or planned for. Facts' work within communities has always been needed, supporting the most vulnerable across the North East however we never envisaged how much this would matter following the outbreak of COVID-19.

Forced closures of FACT charity shops and its hubs not only affected the way we needed to support communities and beneficiaries it also prevented us from generating income through shop sales, external events, fundraisers, sponsored walks, runs etc and in-house events.

FACT continued to support beneficiaries through this difficult time via alternative mechanisms. We recognised that the support we offer is to the most vulnerable in society and we had to continue to help them remotely. FACT did this through telephone counselling calls as opposed to 1-1 meetings, some of the people we support have attempted suicide or have active suicidal thoughts and we had to ensure that some contact remained. A large percentage of our beneficiaries are lonely, coming to sessions prior to the outbreak is sometimes the only time they saw someone, we replaced this with regular telephone, facetime contact to ensure their mental health remained stable. Their levels of anxiety were being heightened daily due to media coverage compounded by pre-existing health conditions and their age.

As the world became a different place, we have had to change the way we support our beneficiaries and the community. When things return to the new normal, we will adapt and change again to ensure our services reach the people who need us. FACT works with the most vulnerable who struggle with isolation and found themselves locked away, they needed us more than ever as they did not fall into any other catchments.



There was never any doubt that we had to continue to support growing demand for our services even at times when we did not know how. We could of not done this without the amazing support we received from 'Walk the Walk', the Pink Ribbon Foundation, The National Lottery Community Fund, Public Health England, Rutherford Centre, Newcastle Building Society, St James Place Foundation, Primula for their sponsorship of The Great North (VIRTUAL) Cancer Coffee Morning, The Community Foundation, P & G Community Fund, Co-Op Community Fund, Hadrian Trust, Tesco Groundworks UK, Greggs, Barratts, Nissan, Karbon Homes, BGL Group, Newcastle Round Table, UK Community Foundation (NET), Neighbourly Community Fund and VCAS, for their grants and funding which allow us to undertake specific projects and introduce / adapt sessions and services needed.

There are many more people who need our help who have not yet reached out to us. Our focus will continue to be able to help every single person who is affected by cancer and with your help and support we know we are making a tangible difference to lives in the North East. Thank you to everyone who has supported FACT, or who will support us in the future.

The purpose of the charity as set out in its governing document

The company is a registered charity and exists to provide support and assistance to people who have suffered or are suffering from all forms of cancer by such means as the trustees consider fit including, without limitation;

- 1) By advancing the education of the public in cancer awareness including (but not limited to) the distribution of literature relating to the detection and treatment of cancer.
- 2) By relieving the hardship of those persons directly or indirectly affected by cancer who are in need, including by:
 - a) creating a platform for the exchange of experiences, views and information, and
 - b) providing facilities to improve their conditions of life.
- By providing support and guidance for cancer sufferers and friends, family and carers of cancer sufferers.
- 4) For the general purpose of such charitable bodies or for such other exclusively charitable purposes in each case as the trustees may from time to time decide.



The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes during the period

FACT's services are offered based on demand and therefore continually meets the needs of our beneficiaries and our stated aims and objectives. FACT reacts to the needs of people, families and peer groups with us at any one time, and are planned around the need of support provision. We continually tailor events and sessions to the needs of our audience and work hard to publicise support as well as highlighting the opportunity for beneficiaries to request support that may not be listed.

In response to Covid-19 in the first 3 months FACT received 131 new counselling referrals mostly from hospitals, trusts and other cancer charities. As Hospitals closed their doors so did organisations that were placed within them. They had been strategically placed in medical environments but could no longer operate, as FACT was placed away from those same locations, we were able to continue to support our existing beneficiaries and communities but also picked up their shortfalls. Another key factor was that we were not a National charity, it meant that we could adapt and change quickly. No one could have envisaged its impact or have a contingency plan of action in place for the pandemic, hence the flexibility to change was a key driver in helping people as and when it was needed.

As we went out into the community to deliver food parcels and emergency items, we used this as an opportunity to do a doorstep check, a visual and real sense to see how people were coping. FACT completed 3,296 doorstep checks from April through June and delivered, on average 388 kindness kit hampers of food and essential supplies each month.

Out of diversity came a real community spirit likened to the war times, rebuilding a community from within and what we saw with our existing FACT family and new members was truly inspirational and very moving. FACT had 212 active volunteers in 2019, growing to 264 by end of June 2020, who supported beneficiaries and communities of the North East with 9,504 hours of their time. Truly amazing; if that be baking scones to be added to food parcels, making healthy meals in bulk ready to warm once at their home. Collecting and distributing essentials, befriending phone calls, doorstep checks, collecting someone's shopping / prescriptions or just being there. People came together helping one another, something most our generation had heard about but never truly experienced. This brings hope and we all needed that.

The main activities undertaken during the period to further the charity's purpose for the public benefit

FACT has continued to provide beneficiary led cancer support services. These are designed and delivered, bespoke to their audience, to individuals, families, carers, and peer groups as no two people affected by cancer are alike and it is important that they can access the services that they need as and when they need them. We also continued to run a wide range of support sessions open to anyone, affected in any way by cancer. No referral is necessary to benefit from the services. One to one and family support are also vital to enabling FACT to respond to the diverse range of needs presented to it by service users.

2020 started with a jammed packed year of events and group sessions planned. All were well supported with bookings and the year looked to be FACT's most successful to date in the support of anyone affected by cancer across the North East.



With the outbreak of the pandemic in March 2020, FACT adapted and changed quickly to ensure the people who need us the most continued to receive it and as the pandemic continued to grow, and infections levels raised, cancer patients' treatments / surgeries were stopped, life threatening and saving procedures halted. The biggest fear was that people stopped seeking medical advice which started to become a real issue heavily reported in June. Health England knew of the number of people affected by their treatment and surgeries being halted but they had no idea of the number of people who had not been diagnosed yet and who would lose their life though this.

FACT continued to offer a range of services from group sessions, to one to one and family sessions through different mechanisms, if not face to face due to restrictions, then through virtual means.

These sessions include: -

Wig service

This service is available to anyone who has suffered hair loss or thinning due to any illness, not just cancer. Body image and the need to feel important are vital for service users and their needs are at the forefront of what FACT does. FACT has a wide variety of wigs. The wig service is a very informal, private, friendly appointment where service users can come in and try on various styles with a member of staff.

Counselling/talking therapies/befriending service

The counselling service is free to anyone who has been affected by cancer and who feels as though they need additional emotional support. The support provided is through fully qualified, experienced counsellors who will assess the needs of the individual and allocate counselling accordingly. There is no referral needed.

Breast reconstruction advice/mastectomy wear/bra fitting services

The bra fitting service is run by Trulife once a month. Ladies can come in for a coffee and a chat as a coffee morning runs alongside this service. FACT has comfortable rooms where the ladies are privately and professionally measured. The service extends to providing low-cost mastectomy wear to purchase, which is available on site or to order. FACT's staff are also being trained to fit the bra's so that they can offer a drop-in service for ladies who cannot attend the regular service.

FACT also hold regular breast reconstruction advice events. The decision to have, or not to have surgery is not easy, and the journey through the process isn't simple. The event aims to inform ladies of the possible options for surgery, the surgical processes, and the recovery implications. FACT also supports the ladies emotionally through the process.

Men's group

The men's group consists of men who have been affected by cancer in some way, the group is very much a social one, which enables individuals to have a catch up over a coffee and seek additional support where needed.

Education and awareness programmes

FACT's cancer awareness and education programmes continue to be a vital part of its work, raising awareness of cancer related issues including, but not exclusively, healthy living, cancer prevention, signs and symptoms, early detection, and screening.

FACT has also increased the delivery of cancer awareness education programmes and activities throughout the region.

The FACT services team has attended local colleges, businesses, and primary schools, to provide them with education and awareness on various cancers and NHS screening programmes. How this has been facilitated has been dependant on the needs of the client group. The sessions have varied from a whole assembly presentation through to drop-in, 'signs and symptoms' stands. All the sessions are bespoke to the individual needs required. These sessions have been very well received and resulted in excellent feedback. During visits into local schools, previously unreached by FACT, the children responded very well to the interactive sessions regarding being 'Safe in the Sun'. The feedback from the teachers was very positive and resulted in the schools sharing FACT information on a regular basis. The 'Safe in the Sun' sessions offered awareness about the importance of protection from the sun, with the hope that the children will take the message home to parents and guardians and that this will be effective in reducing the frequency of skin cancer being diagnosed in the future. The session includes advice on the importance of wearing sunscreen, hydration, taking shade at the hottest time of the day and wearing a sunhat/cap. These sessions give an indirect message regarding skin cancer and educate the children on general health awareness.



The sessions provided for local businesses, have included breast, skin, and male cancers, in the format of an awareness stand and conversation regarding these cancers. Also included, once again, was general health advice and discussion on other cancers. FACT also raised awareness and educated the team, building attendees which it facilitated for local businesses. This session included a short cancer awareness quiz to gain insight into the groups' previous knowledge of cancer, allowing the session to be adapted as necessary. All advice and information given was up-to-date information from relevant sources. Groups are advised that FACT can offer no medical advice.

Discussion into the three NHS screening programmes (bowel, breast and cervical) is always a part of the awareness events. FACT hope that by talking about the benefits of screening this will help in increasing the numbers of attendees at appointments. Keeping these sessions relaxed and informal, encourages more people to participate and no-one feels embarrassed to ask questions.

Mental Health Training

Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) is a training course which teaches people how to identify, understand and help someone who may be experiencing a mental health issue.

Helps the individual to recognise warning signs of mental health, develop skills and confidence to approach and support. Gaining a valuable understanding of how to support positive wellbeing and address stigma in the workplace.

Aimed at: individuals, volunteers or staff members interested in developing knowledge, skills and capacity to support people with mental ill health.

The trustees have a high regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit in managing the activities of the charity.

The Short term longer term aims and objectives

FACT's services are offered based on demand and therefore continually meets the needs of our beneficiary and our stated aims and objectives. FACT reacts to the needs of people, families and peer groups with us at any one time and are planned around the need of support provision. We continually tailor events and sessions to the needs of our audience and work hard to publicise support as well as highlighting the opportunity for beneficiaries to request support that may not be listed.

FACT's long-term aim is to build a purpose-built Cancer Support Awareness & Education centre in Gateshead with an option agreement in place with Gateshead Council for a site for the project. The plans are currently being submitted for approval.



The Charity's strategies for achieving its aims and objectives in the future

FACT evaluates all aspects of service delivery via the Kirkpatrick methodology, to establish whether the Charity is meeting its aims and objectives. The evaluation assists FACT to determine whether certain programmes need to be altered or eliminated altogether. In addition, this aligns with our fundraising strategy as it allows donors, to look at the history of FACT and examine whether aims and objectives have been met, in order to determine whether the charity is ethical, effective and warrants future donations. FACT collates outcome data to demonstrate impact and measure results with mission statement outcomes. This methodology allows FACT to examine whether specific objectives have been achieved and to demonstrate that resources have been spent wisely. We also collect customer satisfaction data which allows us to calculate a Net Promoter Score.

FACT has developed a fundraising strategy in order to support the delivery of the Charity's mission statement, which includes the objective to raise funds in a variety of ways, such as soliciting donations, holding fundraising events or obtaining grants.

FACT has developed an outreach programme of activity which aligns with the aim to deliver education and awareness sessions within the region.

How the activities undertaken during the year contributed to the achievement of the aims and objectives

The first half of 2020 was very intense with the majority of our service users being classed as the most vulnerable in society and having received government guidance to shield due to the pandemic, they needed us more than ever as we went out into the community to deliver food parcels and emergency items. FACT delivered on average 388 kindness kit hampers of food and essential supplies each month.

Our beneficiaries have grown from just over 2500 annually to 2613 in the first 6 months and this figure is still growing.

FACT had 212 active volunteers in 2019, growing to 264 by the end of June 2020, who supported the beneficiaries and communities of the North East with 9,504 hours of their time. Truly amazing; if that be baking scones to be added to food parcels, making healthy meals in bulk ready to warm once at their home. The Contribution of volunteers during the period

FACT is very involved in the community and relies on voluntary help. 264 volunteers assist with events, charitable activities, befriending services, food parcels, fundraising, doorstep checks and office duties. 264 active volunteers donating more than 9,504 hours of volunteering time supporting communities and people in need of the North East.

Working alongside paid staff, volunteers offer their skills, experience, and expertise to every department within the charity.

We recruit and train volunteers from local communities. They are subject to the same requirements as paid staff in respect of compliance with statutory and regulatory conditions, standards of competence, personal conduct, and integrity. Paid staff provide volunteers with ongoing training, guidance, and support.



To demonstrate the contribution volunteers make, we have calculated an approximate equivalent cost of £82,875 to the organisation, if we had to pay for the additional support they provide, at the national living wage rate.

We are a volunteering organisation and without the support and commitment of our volunteers we would struggle to provide the vital services we do to local people and families.

The main achievements and performance of the charity during the period

As with many organisations and charities the Covid-19 pandemic has been a major challenge for us.

Since the pandemic outbreak FACT made over 300 calls daily from Friday 13th March to end of May 2020, contacting beneficiaries and advising of changes in support and to reassure them that we are putting remote mechanisms in place for continued support.

Our biggest area of interim support was and still is the delivery of kindness kits, food & toiletries to their homes as they are self-isolated and being at the end of a telephone for any concerns they may have.

The people FACT support are often in the middle of their cancer journey, receiving treatment and generally very poorly. FACT always has their health and wellbeing at the heart of what we do, day in day out and we would never put that at risk.



Fundraising activities during the period

FACT's supporters are at the heart of everything we do, with limited fundraising opportunities due to the pandemic and restrictions for events and gatherings, FACT diversified means of generating income to ensure we could continue to do what we do best, helping anyone affected by cancer.

FACT had to change its engagements with beneficiaries due to our events being cancelled. We would normally have an active annual calendar of events and gatherings, many pre booked and scheduled months in advance; such as Pamper Days, FACT Annual Ball, Annual Dog Walk, BIG Build Ball, Comedy Nights, Annual North East Coffee Morning, Annual Tennis Event, Annual Wig Walk & Cancer Run, FACT BBQ's, Annual Care Awards, Greek Nights, Day trips to Edinburgh, York, and Whitby, to name but a few.

The difference the charity's performance during the period has made to the beneficiaries of the charity

FACT's beneficiaries include people of all ages who are diagnosed with cancer, their families, carers, friends, and social networks. Local community groups and residents supporting their fellow neighbours. Cancer is not a journey that affects individuals in isolation, and it is therefore essential that services demonstrate effectiveness across a wider community. FACT continually evaluates its services and performance, not only directly from service users, but also from other organisations and professionals throughout its community network.

Since the pandemic outbreak FACT made over 300 calls daily from Friday 13th March to end of May 2020, contacting beneficiaries and advising of changes in support and to reassure them that we are putting remote mechanisms in place for continued support.

FACT continued to support their beneficiaries via alternative mechanisms. We recognised that the support we offer is to the most vulnerable in society. Structure, governance and management of the charity

Methods used to appoint and recruit new Board members to the Charity:

The directors of the company are also charity Trustees for the purposes of charity law. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association:

Trustees are elected by members at the Annual General Meeting

The Board is comprised of 8 Trustees

Trustees serve for a fixed term of 9 years from their election at an Annual General Meeting.

At other times of the year, the Board of Trustees may appoint a person who is willing to serve either to fill a vacancy or as an additional Trustee, provided the election does not cause the number of Trustees to exceed the maximum permitted.

In an effort to maintain a broad skill mix, the Board of Trustees reviews its effectiveness regularly and in the event of particular skills being needed or lost due to retirement, individuals are recruited to offer themselves for election or for appointment to the Board.

FACT is in the process of increasing the current board on a staggered basis to avoid all board members terms running in parallel. This will in turn enable the longer serving members to step down as appropriate which also on a staggered basis.

When recruiting new Trustees, we always seek to increase the diversity of the Board.

During 2020, no Trustees retired from the Board. Trustees serving are listed on page 2.

The policies and procedures for the induction and training of trustees

New trustees undergo an induction to brief them on their legal obligations under charity and company law, the content of the company's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the committee and decision-making processes, the up to date business plan and recent financial performance of the charity. During their induction new trustees are encouraged to meet key employees and other trustees. New trustees are also advised to attend appropriate external training events, where these can facilitate a greater understanding of their legal responsibilities.



Charity's Organisational Structure

The Trustees are directly responsible for the management and direction of the charity. Trustees meet 6 times per year to address policies, procedures, risks, finances, and governance matters. Decisions considered high and medium risk are considered and taken by the Trustees.

The Trustees have appointed a Chief Executive who has been delegated responsibility for the day to day running of the charity in accordance with policies and strategies set by the Board. The Chief Executive is supported by a management team and support staff. The managers have delegated responsibility in accordance with their roles and area of expertise.

How the charity makes decisions and how decisions are delegated

The management of FACT is delegated to the Management Team comprising the Chief Executive (Joanne Smith) and two other Management Team members, each with responsibility for specific aspects of the work the charity undertakes. The Chief Executive, with the support of the Management Team, reports to the Board, which approves major decisions and has overall responsibility for the charity's activities and direction.

The Board reviews and approves its Reservation of Powers, Delegation of Powers, Scheme of Delegation, Standing Orders and Standing Financial Instructions on a biennial basis to ensure high quality governance, the safeguarding of its assets and the good name of the charity.

Setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The pay of the charity's Chief Executive and the management team is reviewed annually by the Board of Trustees. Any uplift normally matches that awarded to all other staff groups although from time to time a full review of the salary of the Chief Executive and the Management Team will take place. This will be benchmarked to other charities of similar size and turnover and seek to compare like with like posts.

All trustees give of their time freely and no trustee remuneration was paid in the year.

The charity has two wholly owned subsidiaries:

Financial review of the position at the reporting date, 30 June 2020

During the short reporting period to 30 June 2020 this has certainly been a very strange period in terms of the financial activity, with all fundraising completely cancelled due to the pandemic we lost our biggest fundraising event of the year our annual ball which usually takes place in March. All our trading income from the trading subsidiary ceased as shops were forced to close.

We were lucky enough to benefit from the new government grants available due to Covid-19, the small business rates grants, and we managed to furlough some of our admin and fundraising team to save as much as we could without disrupting our services.

Unrestricted grants quickly became available for Covid support from a variety of doners, Karbon Homes, Wearmouth Community VCAS, Community Foundation, The National Lottery Community Fund, Tesco bags for life, Hadrian Trust, Proctor & Gamble and Gateshead Council to name a few and as always, we are truly grateful for your support especially over this very difficult period. We plan to use these funds to help us in the second half of this year where we are predicting that grants will not be as easily accessible.

This is the first year of our relationship with the National Lottery Community Fund and we are very grateful for the additional funding we received from them to enable us to increase our counselling services and additional kindness kits and emergency food hampers to our service users during the pandemic.



A special thank you to Stacey Stronach, Lowes Financial Management Limited, St James Place and Primula for their generous donations.

We also extend our enormous thanks to the generous individuals who are not listed here as well as to all donors who contributed less than £1,000 - these gifts are truly vital to our work.

We took out a £50,000 bounce back loan as an emergency buffer, at the period end this is sitting in reserves with the plan to repay the full amount in twelve months if we do not use the funds to avoid any interest charges as borrowing is not in our policies.

Policies on reserves

At the reporting date £255,165 was held in general unrestricted reserves. We plan to hold unrestricted reserves to cover the running costs of the charity for at least six months.

A designated reserve exists which are unrestricted funds which have been earmarked by the trustees for the "Big Family Home" and maintain the Cancer Support, Awareness and Education Centre.

Restricted Funds are funds which are not available for general charitable purposes, but which are available for objectives declared by the donors.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The board of trustees is satisfied that the charity's assets in each fund are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations in respect of each fund.

Significant events which have affected the financial performance and the financial position

During the first half of 2020 FACT had to cancel all its years fundraising events due to pandemic, which meant all of our usual fundraising income ceased with immediate effect.

We were very grateful when grant applications from our usual funders opened with emergency Covid-19 grants for a short period of time and we were very successful with the grants especially as the majority of them were unrestricted grants we have been able to plan to use these in the later part of 2020.



The major risks to which the Charity is exposed and reviews and systems to mitigate them

The Trustees are satisfied that appropriate policies, protection, systems, and checks remain in order to mitigate exposure to major risks and to ensure that FACT operates in accordance with ethical and environmental guidelines and protections.

Covid-19:-

The main current risk to FACT is the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic has on the organisation with local lockdowns resulting in our charity shops being closed this in turn has a financial impact on us.

Due to social distancing and lockdowns, we are at risk of no longer being able to deliver some of our services for our beneficiaries with the worry that has a huge impact of the health and welfare of our service users, we are working very closely with Public Health Gateshead to establish risk assessments and a safe way we are able to get our groups back up and running.

The principal risks relate to investment performance and operational risks in terms of grant making arising from system malfunctions or fraudulent applications.

Economic pressures, competition, e-commerce and changes in consumer behaviour, impact negatively on voluntary income

Annual budgeting and ongoing management reporting and monitoring of financial performance. The preparation of long-term financial forecasts aligned to FACT's strategy to 2020/21 that target a diversification of income streams and incorporate an ongoing consideration of market and consumer trends.

Incidents and damage reputation and/or negatively impact operations (including cyber security, serious fraud, major health and safety incidents, safeguarding and internal process failures).

Proactive detection, monitoring, reporting, investigation of potential adverse events and incidents.

Proactive and reactive media management in place, including ongoing digital and traditional monitoring

Dedicated specialist resource is applied in key areas such as health and safety, risk and assurance and legal that support organisation wide events and operations.

Continuing programme of health and safety improvements and safeguarding training is being delivered to strengthen our safety management system.

Continuing programme to drive IT improvements and strengthening of infrastructure and cyber security to protect FACT's assets.

Continuing programme to strengthen business continuity and disaster recovery plans that help minimise disruption to operations from unexpected events.

FACT risk management, legal and fundraising compliance teams monitor public policy and the regulatory environment on an ongoing basis to ensure potential risks can be proactively managed. This includes a focus on development in fundraising regulation and the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

Active programmes of advocacy, influencing and senior level engagement to ensure our views are shared. Senior FACT and partner representation at key events and forums to help shape the organisations growth activities.

FACT is exposed to financial risk and market movements through its cash and investment portfolios, and via the assets and liabilities of a defined contributions pension scheme.

Expert financial advice informs investment and treasury policies that ensure all portfolio is adequately diversified and managed.

Attracting, developing and retaining talented staff in a competitive employment market impacted by the uncertainties of Brexit combined the reliance on significant levels of volunteer support both in fundraising and retail operations.

Factors likely to affect future financial performance

The most significant financial risk facing FACT is the reliance on potentially volatile income streams such as grant income, voluntary donations, and legacies. While FACT continues to be well supported locally, there is always the possibility that support could fall due to increasing popularity of other charities or as a result of local, national or international events. Changes in the economic climate of our region could also impact on the levels of support we receive each year.

Covid-19 has had a major impact on our finances although we have been very successful with unrestricted grants at the start of the pandemic these funds need to managed very carefully as we cannot be certain of when new grants will become available and our main priority is sustain the charity and provide the services our benefices require.



Plans for the Future

Summary of plans for the future and the trustees perspective of the future direction of the charity

FACT will continue to survive the Covid-19 pandemic and grow its range of services, as well as extending its reach into more North East communities adding new services to Teesside thanks to the support of the National Lottery.

There are plans to build a purpose-built Cancer Support Awareness & Education centre in Gateshead.

The centre will not only offer support to people diagnosed with cancer, but also to their families, carers and friends. FACT wants to help anyone who feels they have been affected by cancer, at any time, no matter how long ago they were diagnosed, or when they had their treatment. This will also include helping those who are close to someone who has cancer, or have lost someone close to them, without the need for clinical referrals. There is currently no other centre in the region offering this type of support. FACT has proved that people respond to offers of support in gentle, non-clinical environments, and have evidence of increased attendance on programmes offered by FACT away from clinical and hospital settings. FACT also works closely with the NHS and medical professionals to deliver support, ensuring compliance with current guidelines and legislation.

FACT has spoken to other long-established support centres in other regions who say that many people turn up to their centres up to six times before they find the courage to go in – because they do not know what is behind the centre's closed door. FACT knows that by working with the community they build relationships that will make it easier for people to ask for support when they need it – this is especially the case with children and young people. They will know FACT, and they will know what the centre is all about.

Every two minutes someone is diagnosed with cancer in the UK, and this statistic increases in the North East. This means that almost everyone will be affected by cancer at some time in their lives, either by being diagnosed themselves, or by a family member or friend being diagnosed. This means that FACT's centre has the potential to benefit everyone in Gateshead, and the North East, and provides an innovative model with the potential to be replicated throughout the UK.

The new centre will also provide valuable volunteering, training and employment opportunities for local people and organisations. Medical staff also refer people during/post cancer treatment to volunteer with FACT as they recognise it to be a safe, secure environment that succeeds in building peoples' self-confidence, self-esteem, and motivation to enable them to return to work if they want to and enjoy active social lives.

FACT is in the early stages of a capital appeal to build the centre and have an option agreement with Gateshead Council for a site for the project. The plans are currently being submitted for approval.

Respective responsibilities of the Trustees and the Independent Examiner and the basis of the report

As described on page 9, you, the charitable company's Trustees, who are also the Directors of the Company for the purposes of Company law, are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2011 and all other applicable law and with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice, applicable to smaller entities, and for being satisfied that the financial statements give a true and fair view.

The Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Section 144(1) of the Charities Act 2011 (the Act) does not apply, and that there is no requirement in the memorandum and articles of the charity for the conducting of an audit, and that the accounts do not require an audit in accordance with Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and that no member or members have requested an audit pursuant to Section 476 of the Companies Act 2006. 1 Accounting policies

Policies relating to the production of the accounts.

Basis of preparation and accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared on the accruals basis, under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102, (effective 1st January 2016) and 'FRS 102 SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities) 2015, (as amended by the Bulletin issued in October 2018 and applicable to all accounting periods beginning on or after 1st January 2019), (The SORP), published by the Charity Commission in England & Wales (CCEW), effective January 2016, , and in accordance with all applicable law in the charity's jurisdiction of registration, except that the charity has prepared the financial statements in accordance with the FRS 102 SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities) 2015, (as amended by the Bulletin issued in October 2018 and applicable to all accounting periods beginning on or after 1st January 2019), (The SORP), in preference to the previous SORP, the SORP 2005, which has been withdrawn, notwithstanding the fact that the extant statutory regulations, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 refer explicitly to the SORP 2005. This has been done to accord with current best practice.

Going Concern

The charitable activities are entirely dependent on continuing grant aid and voluntary donations as well as trading revenues. As a consequence, the going concern basis is dependent on the future flow of these uncertain funding streams. Accordingly, the Trustees have obtained forecasts and, after reviewing the financial forecasts for future periods to 31 December 2020, the Trustees are satisfied that, at the time of approving the financial statements, it is appropriate to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Other than these matters, the Trustees are not aware of any material uncertainites about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Risks and future assumptions

The charity is a public benefit entity.

Policies relating to categories of income and income recognition.

Nature of income

Gross income represents the value, net of value added tax and discounts, of goods provided to customers and work carried out in respect of services provided to customers.

Categories of Income

Income is categorised as income from exchange transactions (contract income) and income from non-exchange transactions (gifts), investment income and other income.

Income from exchange transactions is received by the charity for goods or services supplied under contract or where entitlement is subject to fulfilling performance related conditions. The income the charity receives is approximately equal in value to the goods or services supplied by the charity to the purchaser.

Income from a non-exchange transaction is where the charity receives value from the donor without providing equal value in exchange, and includes donations of money, goods and services freely given without giving equal value in exchange.

Notes to the Accounts for the period from 1 January 2020 to 30 June 2020

Income recognition

Income, whether from exchange or non exchange transactions, is recognised in the statement of financial activities (SOFA) on a receivable basis, when a transaction or other event results in an increase in the charity's assets or a reduction in its liabilities and only when the charity has legal entitlement, the income is probable and can be measured reliably.

Dividends are accrued when the shareholder's right to receive payment is established.

Income subject to terms and conditions which must be met before the charity is entitled to the resources is not recognised until the conditions have been met.

All income is accounted for gross, before deducting any related fees or costs.

Accounting for deferred income and income received in advance

Where terms and conditions relating to income have not been met or uncertainty exists as to whether the charity can meet any terms or conditions otherwise within its control, income is not recognised but is deferred as a liability until it is probable that the terms or conditions imposed can be met.

Any grant that is subject to performance-related conditions received in advance of delivering the goods and services required by that condition, or is subject to unmet conditions wholly outside the control of the recipient charity, is accounted for as a liability and shown on the balance sheet as deferred income. Deferred income is released to income in the reporting period in which the performance-related or other conditions that limit recognition are met.

When income from a grant or donation has not been recognised due to the conditions applying to the gift not being wholly within the control of the recipient charity, it is disclosed as a contingent asset if receipt of the grant or donation is probable once those conditions are met.

Where time related conditions are imposed or implied by a funder, then the income is apportioned to the time periods concerned, and, where applicable, is accounted for as a liability and shown on the balance sheet as deferred income. When grants are received in advance of the expenditure on the activity funded by them, but there are no specific time related conditions, then the income is not deferred.

Any condition that allows for the recovery by the donor of any unexpended part of a grant does not prevent recognition of the income concerned, but a liability to any repayment is recognised when repayment becomes probable.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Donated fixed assets are recognised at the current fair value. All such donations are recognised as donation income, and debited to fixed assets.

Notes to the Accounts for the period from 1 January 2020 to 30 June 2020

Donated goods that are not fixed assets are accounted for at a fair value, unless it is impractical to reliably measure the value of the donated items.

In the absence of any direct evidence of fair value of donated goods, then a value is derived from the cost of the item to the donor or, in the case of goods that are expected to be sold, the estimated resale value after deducting any anticipated costs of sales.

If it is impracticable to measure the fair value of goods donated for resale, or the costs of valuation outweigh the benefits, the donated goods are recognised as income when sold, with an equivalent amount being recognised as an expense.

The costs of goods donated for distribution to beneficiaries is deemed to be the fair value of those goods upon receipt. When the goods are distributed freely or for a nominal consideration, then the carrying amount is adjusted at the time of sale, to the value at the point of distribution and the adjustment is shown as a cost of donations made.

The carrying amount of any stock held for distribution is assessed for impairment at the reporting date. All donated goods are recognised as donation income, and debited to trading stock. When trading stock is subsequently sold, or appropriated to meet an expense, then the carrying value of the stock is recognised as an expense. In accordance with the SORP, goods donated for distribution to beneficiaries, or for consumption by the charity are included in 'legacies and donations'. Goods donated for resale are included in 'Income from other trading activities'

The cost of any stock of goods donated for distribution to beneficiaries is deemed to be the fair value of those gifts at the time of their receipt. If the goods held are to be distributed freely or for a nominal consideration, then the carrying amount is subsequently adjusted to reflect the lower of deemed cost adjusted for any loss of service potential and replacement cost. Replacement cost is the economic cost incurred if the charity was to replace the service potential of the donated goods at its own expense in the most economic manner.

Donated services and facilities (including seconded staff and use of property) are included in the accounts on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity.

All donated services and facilities are recognised as donation income when received,(provided the value of the gift can be measured reliably) and recognised as an expense with an equivalent value.

Membership subscriptions

The income and any associated Gift Aid or other tax refund from a membership subscription received by the charity in the nature of a gift, is accounted for on the same basis as a donation.

The income from a membership subscription received by the charity where the subscription purchases the right to services or benefits is recognised as income from charitable activities.

Policies relating to expenditure on goods and services provided to the charity.

Recognition of liabilities and expenditure

A liability, and the related expenditure, is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation exists as a result of a past event, and when it is more likely than not that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and when the amount of the obligation can be measured or reliably estimated..

Liabilities arising from future funding commitments and constructive obligations, including performance related grants, where the timing or the amount of the future expenditure required to settle the obligation are uncertain, give rise to a provision in the accounts, which is reviewed at the accounting year end. The provision is increased to reflect any increases in liabilities, and is decreased by the utilisation of any provision within the period, and reversed if any provision is no longer required. These movements are charged or credited to the respective funds and activities to which the provision relates.
