The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

## Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors of International Society for Krishna Consciousness London for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware; and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

## **Objectives and Activities**

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association. ISKCON-London is guided by the seven purposes that our Founder-Acarya His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada established when ISKCON was inaugurated. The purposes stand as our objectives for the charity.

Those purposes are as follows:

- 1. To systematically propagate spiritual knowledge to society at large and to educate all people in the techniques of spiritual life in order to check the imbalance of values in life and to achieve real unity and peace in the world.
- 2. To propagate a consciousness of Krishna (God), as it is revealed in the great scriptures of India, Bhagavad-gita and Srimad-Bhagavatam.

- To bring the members of the Society together with each other and nearer to Krishna, the prime entity, thus developing the idea within the members, and humanity at large, that each soul is part and parcel of the quality of Godhead (Krishna).
- To teach and encourage the sankirtana movement, congregational chanting of the holy name of God, as revealed in the teachings of Lord Sri Caitanya Mahaprabhu.
- 3. To erect for the members and for society at large a holy place of transcendental pastimes dedicated to the personality of
- 4. To bring the members closer together for the purpose of teaching a simpler, more natural way of life.
- 5. With a view towards achieving the aforementioned purposes, to publish and distribute periodicals, magazines, books and other writings.
- 6. In order to achieve the above objectives we use the following strategies:
  - Publication and distribution of literature
  - · Promotion through other media
  - Public services, festivals, retreats and pilgrimages which promote spiritual culture
  - The distribution and promotion of sanctified vegetarian food (prasadam)
  - Education in doctrines, training in religious practice: pastoral care
  - Encouraging positive life principles and social engagement through volunteering
  - The opening of new centres / sangas (spiritual gatherings)
  - Youth outreach

## **Literature Distribution**

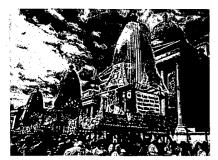
We increased not only the number of books distributed (show below by amount of money earned) but also the volunteer community involvement (500+ persons). We also introduced follow-up programmes in towns where we distribute books and utilised a 50/50 programme for 50th Anniversary year.

## **Promotion Through Other Media**

Our Radha Krishna Records music label, started 7 years ago, released one new album which engaged the talents of many youth and volunteers. This album was also launched across internet channels such as iTunes. RK Records sold over 1000 albums in 2016. The "Harinama Ruci" album was launched and is now on sale. It is a joyful and uplifting album of devotees performing harinamas on the streets of London. Radha Krishna Records have also been working on the ISKCON50 "Kirtan on the Thames" album and "Mantra Lounge Volume 2" album which will be released in 2017. Plans for 2017 - another exciting "Radha Krishna Records presents..." event, following on from the successful "A Contemporary Krishna Culture Showcase" event in 2015.

## Public Festivals, Retreats and Pilgrimages

We hold the biggest annual Ratha Yatra festival outside of India peaceful more spiritual way of life.



In 2016, as well as the daily and festival harinamas that took place throughout the year, in this special year of ISKCON's 50th Anniversary, Dayal Mora dasa, Men's Ashram Leader, was inspired to organise a padayatra, named "A Pilgrimage for Peace", from Hastings to Brighton. The 40-mile walk was covered over a period of five days from Monday 30th May to Friday 3rd June.



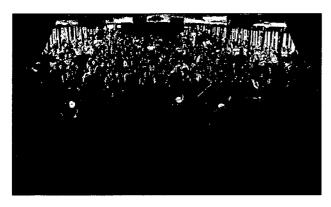

A core team of 10 devotees participated in the walk and were joined by many others for part Of the route. They walked with a bullock cart including a pair of bullocks from the cow protection farm project in Watford.

On Sunday 31st July, ISKCON-London hosted the UK's grandest 50th Anniversary kirtan event yet. In true London style, this event was held on a magni cent boat cruising along the River ames. Be tting the grandeur of the event, one of the largest boats with a capacity of 500 was hired. We plan continued investment in these outreach areas for 2017 as they attract many new people with the peaceful and colorful culture.

## The Distribution of Sanctified Vegetarian Food (Prasadam)

Finally we managed a major upgrade and refurb of Govinda's Restaurant and Kitchen in 2016.

Our Govinda's Restuarant served on average 500 customers per day, as well as providing prasadam for several University programmes, catering for many spiritual, professional events and weddings. The sales in 2015 were £681,766. The sales in 2016 were £648,791. We were also closed for some times for renovation in 2016 - which explains the shortfall of £32,974. But if we calculate the days we were closed, the restaurant an average is £61,558.02 per month. Which would mean the total including average sales for 2016 would have been £832,173.30. So if we compare 2015 to this we would have had an increase in 2016 of £49,645.40 - which is very significant.

Food for Life has been successfully continuing its ongoing prasadam distribution programme to homeless people in central London and in 2016, the team increased their operations to five days a week by adding Fridays. Run wholly by a team of about 20+ volunteers and feeding at least 750 people per week.

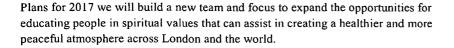
As a collaborative event, ISKCON-London and Bhaktivedanta Manor Communications helped organise, raise awareness, and generate press and media interest for the special "5,000 Cupcakes" distribution outreach initiative on 13th July on ISKCON's Incorporation Anniversary.

### **Education & Training**

London College Vedic Studies provided many courses in 2016 tailored for those curious in spirituality, newcomers embracing the world of Krishna Consciousness, and for

established devotees. Over 125 participants attended various courses run by the College including Bhakti Life, Gita Explore, Home Worship, ISKCON Disciples Course, Mridanga & Kartal Lessons, Pujari

Seminar, and Tulasi Workshop.

## Encouraging positive life principles and social engagement through volunteering

The total number of hours provided by volunteers is in the region of 350 to 400 hours a week.

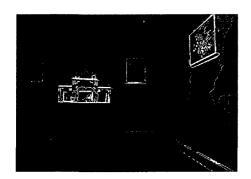
Annually we appreciate our volunteers with a large Volunteers Dinner and Celebration.

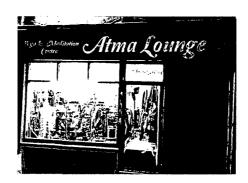


# The opening of new centres / sangas (spiritual gatherings)

At the close of 2016 - we managed to secure a property for yet another centre in the South East Region. This time in Folkestone, Kent. The ISKCON-Folkestone Centre will function as a shop Atma Lounge and Outreach Centre for continuing our charities aims.







Plans for 2017 - to cultivate and nourish these new centers with regular visits from senior members and our traveling sankirtana parties.

### Fundraising & Financial Information

Our center is not in financial deficit. In fact we are doing well financially.

In 2015 we did not do any specific fundraising for any projects over and above our normal activities.

Our main areas for fundraising are:

Govinda's Restuarant Community Development Literature Distribution Festivals and Deity Department

We spent nearly £400,000 last year on refurbishment to upgrade the facilities in order to maintain it as our primary fundraiser.

In order to sustain our donations we hold two annual events for our donors - Summer Patron Dinner and a large hall program in the winter. We also send them prasadam sweets and magazines on a monthly and bimonthly basis respectively, and do programs at their homes on their request.

We hold the following reserves and restricted funds:-

Property Fund £591,000 - created in 2014 for buy to let property investments. These investments were delayed and will be made in 2017. (We identified the property in 2016 and are proceeding with purchase of a accommodation for young professionals wishing to live in a contemporary ashrama setting that is conducive to spiritual well being. This will cost approximately £550,000.)

New Temple Reserves £108,822 – This project has been on-going for some time and will cost several million to complete. These are Restricted Funds.

Restaurant Refurbishment Reserves £6,000 - We already spent around £80,000 refurbishing the Restaurant last year.

Benevolent Fund £20,000 - The fund will be used in case of emergency requirement in regard to the monks living in our charity's temple.

Deity Department Reserves £4,000 - We spent £75,000 refurbishing the Deity's Department last year.

Nitya Seva Reserves - £4000. This amount is kept in the high interest account and the interest goes to pay for the worship of the deity on a particular day chosen by the donor. The capital amount remains intact.

We have no separate or specific investments apart from £1.1 million in a high interest account with Lloyds Bank Ltd.

We hold "NO" assets on behalf of other individuals and are not affiliated with any other charities. Although as mentioned above we act as a foster parent charity for ISKCON Rochester, Crawley and Folkestone.

Neither our centre nor our trustees hold or act as custodian trustees of other organisations, though our Temple President and Chairman Mr. James Edwards is also the Chairman for the Sri Sri Radha-Krishna Cultural Centre Trust (ISKCON-South London) — in a managerial capacity.

We are very much dependent on donations in kind in monetary terms it would be worth £150,000 per annum. Funding Other Projects:

In 2016 we were able to assist a few other projects who share the same objectives and strategies but are in less favorable circumstances. Annually we give £10,000 to other projects.

**ISKCON-Leicester** - Recently purchased a large property requiring a lot of maintenance and refurbishment. We made a contribution to them of £1,260.

International Deity Worship Ministry- require on-going funding as this Global Ministry operates on a very small budget and our Head Priest is a regional representative to this Ministry. We donated £1,200.

**ISKCON - GBC College -** This is the newly formed college for training future leaders within ISKCON. Our Temple President will complete this course in 2017. They are seeking funding for on-going training. We donated £2,500.

ISKCON-Kathmandu: Sankirtan Van - requested a donation via the Literature Distribution Minister for a new travelling out-reach vehicle. We gave a donation of £1,260.

Scotland Temple - Have recently had serious financial difficulties and are in need of some assistance. We gave a donation of £1,260.

**ISKCON-Lithuania (Harinama Mandir)** - are continuing construction of a monastery for their travelling monks who regularly visit London and assist with our street chanting and other charitable activities. They requested a donation and we gave £1,260.

# Kirtan (Congregational Chanting of the Names of the Supreme Being)

This activity is one of our primary activities and accompanies all our activities. It is thus already mentioned several times elsewhere in this report.

We hope that 2017 will show increased improvements in our ability to outreach and develop our charities aims.

## Care for Devotees:

Initially this will focus on our Temple Residents (Monks and Nuns):

Resident Devotee Care:

- Invest in Training Send 2 male residents to Mayapur Academy for pujari training
- Purchase a 2nd house for missionary activities and away from the Central London intensity
- Send devotees regularly to outpost centers for preaching breaks
- Send devotees to study in India GBC College or Mayapur Institute
- Create adventurous outreach opportunities to generate inspiration and missionary spirit
- Help them to make a serious contribution to the mission by giving their valuable time and energy to the variety of
  activities we perform.

### Another London Centre/Temple:

In keeping with the vision of our Founder who wanted 10 Centers/Temples in London including a large purpose built Temple in the Centre of London - we propose to start a new center in London.

This year we can focus on Wimbledon - Temple residents can visit twice a month and also go regularly to preach in a fortnightly meeting there.

- Bi-monthly weekend warriors (outreach)
- Bi-monthly meetings (follow up)
- · Need preachers and followers for this venture

## In six months (September 2017) time we would like to see:

- · local community active and inspired
- fortnightly attendees approx. 10
- 2 people chanting 16 rounds
- 1 ashram devotee (male or female)
- · Assess if can manage the programme

### If these goals are met then we can look to:

Establish semi-permanent shop front/preaching center

Purchase 2nd house or lease (Looking at a 3-4 bedroom house in the Modern area, looks like 36 minutes to get into TCR on Northern Line and may be a possible good area.)

### **Support Smaller Centers:**

Weekly travel to visit our smaller centers or surrounding areas with our "Weekend Warrior" Harinama and Book Distribution Team.

- This will train local devotees how to out-reach
- Attract new comers to the local programmes
- Inspire our team and the local devotees
- Increase the visibility of our mission in the public eye

## **Increase Literature Distribution:**

We wish to increase our literature distribution by at least 10% in 2017.

This means increase of £17,086 bringing the total for 2017 to £187,950.

### **Identify and Purchase Office Building:**

In order to finally resolve many issues we have with space in the current building and given that a new building to serve as a Temple would likely cost more that we can afford now - we propose to:

- source a building within 15 minute walk from current Temple
- consisting of space for
- offices
- storage
- classrooms
- if possible also at least one flat and ground floor shop front space

The acquirement of such a property would resolve space issues, facilitate expansion and also build our investment portfolio bringing us closer to a large, new Temple in London.

# Town Hall Meeting:

To host at least one town half the meeting with specific chosen guests in order to share these visions and petition input and assistance with fulfilling them.

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### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Long leasehold

- Over the period of the lease

Plant and machinery

- 20% on cost

Motor vehicles

- 25% reducing balance

### Stock

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

## Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
