### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTS AND ACTIVITIES**

ISKCON-London is guided by the seven purposes that our Founder-Acarya His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada established when ISKCON was inaugurated. These purposes stand as our objectives for the charity.

#### Those purposes are as follows:

- 1. To systematically propagate spiritual knowledge to society at large and to educate all people in the techniques of spiritual life in order to check the imbalance of values in life and to achieve real unity and peace in the world.
- 2. To propagate a consciousness of Krishna (God), as it is revealed in the great scriptures of India, Bhagavad-gita and Srimad-Bhagavatam.
- 3. To bring the members of the Society together with each other and nearer to Krishna, the prime entity, thus developing the idea within the members, and humanity at large, that each soul is part and parcel of the quality of Godhead (Krishna).
- 4. To teach and encourage the sanki rtana movement, congregational chanting of the holy name of God, as revealed in the teachings of Lord Sri Caitanya Mahaprabhu.
- 5. To erect for the members and for society at large a holy place of transcendental pastimes dedicated to the personality of Krishna.
- 6. To bring the members closer together for the purpose of teaching a simpler, more natural way of life.
- 7. With a view towards achieving the aforementioned purposes, to publish and distribute periodicals, magazines, books and other writings.

In order to achieve the above objectives we use the following strategies:

- · Publication and distribution of literature
- Promotion through other media
- Public services, festivals, retreats and pilgrimages which promote spiritual culture
- The distribution and promotion of sanctified vegetarian food (prasadam)
- Education in doctrines, training in religious practice: pastoral care
- Encouraging positive life principles and social engagement through volunteering
- The opening of new centres / sangas (spiritual gatherings)
- Youth outreach
- Fundraising
- Kirtan (congregational chanting of the names of the Supreme Being)

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### Appointment of trustees

The Trustees named on page 7 have served throughout the year. The power to appoint new trustees is vested in the members of the charity. In considering the recruitment of a new trustee, the members would look to individuals with experience, empathy and knowledge of the charity's work.

### Trustee induction and training

New trustees undergo an orientation to brief them on: their legal obligations under charity and company law, the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit, and inform them of the content of the trust deed. Continuing training for trustees is undertaken through regular meetings, attending relevant seminars, specific discussions with individuals and organisations and briefing papers in the areas supported by the charity.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Financial results

The charity recorded net incoming resources of £8,426 for the year ended 31 December 2019.

#### **Annual Donations**

Every year we donate £10,000 to other ISKCON projects. In 2019 we were able to assist 2 centres who share the same objectives and strategies as ISKCON London, but are in less favourable circumstances.

- ISKCON Leicester New Roof £5,000
- ISKCON Ireland Building Repairs and Maintenance £5,000

#### Benevolent Fund

Our Benevolent Fund was set up with donations from Mr. Martin Hayes and Ms. Jaqueline Raymen in order to assist devotees in dire need, especially our temple residents.

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In 2019 we made a contribution of £2,589 to an anonymous Victim of Domestic Violence

### ISKCON London Mortgage

At the end of 2018 we purchased an investment property akin to a vicarage for whomsoever is occupying the role of the Temple President: Flat 26, Russell Chambers, Bury Place, London WC1 2JX for £800,000.

We borrowed £300,000 from Lloyds Bank Plc for a period of 10 years with monthly repayments of around £2,966. We have reduced the mortgage balance by £25,527.43. (Formerly we were paying £15,340 per annum for rent.) The mortgage balance as at 31 December 2019 is £274,472.57.

#### ISKCON Dublin Loan

In 2019 we advanced a further 40,000 EURO to ISKCON Dublin to help with the emergency refurbishment of their property.

The amount due from ISKCON Dublin as at 1 January 2019 was £18,751.41. The amount due as at 31st December 2019 is £43,900.47.

#### Other information

We hold "NO" assets on behalf of other individuals and are not affiliated with any other charities. We act as a foster parent charity for both ISKCON Crawley and ISKCON Folkestone.

Neither our centre nor our trustees hold or act as custodian trustees of other organisations. However, our Temple President and Chairman Mr. James Edwards acts in a management capacity as the Chairman for the ISKCON South London.

We are very much dependent on donations in kind and in monetary terms which would be worth £250,000 per annum.

#### **OVERVIEW OF ACTIVITIES**

#### 2019 Goals:

Reporting on specific goals set in 2018 to be achieved in 2019 we achieved the following:

'50th Anniversary Year for ISKCON-London and ISKCON in the UK.

- 1. To hold a magnificent community building and outreach event in November 2019 in honour of the 50th Anniversary Year. We did this with amazing style and grace. The event called Krishna Spectacular was held at the famous Event Apollo in Hammersmith and had 3,300 attendees.
- 2. The event allowed a huge force of volunteers to come together in order to plan and execute this "never done before" event. You can read more about it in our Annual Review.
  - \* The loss of £63,326 was covered by a £50,000 inheritance left to us by Ms. Jaqueline Raymond. These funds were earmarked for the 50th Anniversary Events.

#### 2019 Goals (continued):

3. To Increase our outreach to the masses in a more accessible way by:
A. Creating a 50th Anniversary initiative called "Love and Happiness Events" - This we did and managed to put on two major events in 2019, the Krishna Spectacular mentioned above and OMFest - which was a venture to make Bhakti Yoga accessible to the masses. This event was also a big success with alot of interest and attendance - but had a loss of £24,103.

B. Assigning of a Preaching Department Head and development of the Bhakti Yoga London initiative for outreach to the general public. We assigned a head of department: Dayal Mora dasa and an assistant head: Shyam Govinda dasa. Both are volunteers and full-time monks/residents. They began working on a number of outreach initiatives aimed at attracting especially youth and offering ashrama residents training. To this end there was great success with a Wisdom Wednesdays weekly event attended by about 35-40 youths weekly.

The Bhakti Yoga London brand still requires more work.

- 4. To launch a new album from Radha Krishna Records and possibly expand into the on-line YouTube market. The Mantra Lounge 3 album was released and reached number 1 in the UK New Age Charts. Radha Krishna Records also reached over 300,000 unique listeners were reached globally via various streaming sources. This is a huge success. A couple of videos were released but the YouTube market still requires more work.
- 5. Initiate a programme to collaborate with Ahimsa Dairy Foundation in order to move towards a long term goal of creating our own farm community. This was started and we brought on board a fund/profile raiser Tarun Krishna dasa. We began raising funds to this end by initiating a membership scheme. We also sent a number of volunteers to assist with the Ahimsa Project. A plot of 120 acres of land was identified as suitable to purchase and £1 million will be required.
- Address all concerns presented by the auditors in their 2018 report All concerns relating to Quarterly VAT Returns, Gift Aid Claims, Database clear up and maintenance & Mayapur Flat Purchase details were addressed and resolved.

#### 2019 Goals (continued):

7. Work with Trustees Advisors on the following projects to develop and strengthen our management infrastructure:

A. Have a clear idea of what main areas of ISKCON-London management need attention, look to hire staff or engage volunteers to take up the roles with clear service descriptions and guidelines. - We began and had wonderful discussions on these topics and this resulted in the appointment of a Facilities Manager - Rsi Raya Gauranga dasa who is a full-time volunteer and monk/resident. There is still a lot more work to be done.

B. To apply for and acquire our own immigration license so that we can more easily bring in help from abroad if required. - This process was initiated but did not achieve completion and still requires follow-up.

#### More Long Term Goals:

- 1. The purchase of 7 Bury Place This was not achieved not really focused on unfortunately.
- 2. The purchase and development of a farm community in Kent. This initiative was addressed by the Ahimsa collaboration but nonspecific purchase or progress in this area.

#### Food For Life Project (FFL)

Although it was not on the list of goals - we managed to increase our food distribution to the homeless, by going out an extra night and feeding an extra 100 people per week.

Also a FFL leadership team was established and they were inspired to have an electric van for food distribution, as the ULEZ was introduced in Westminster and we had to convert our vehicles for compliance. Therefore, we had a huge fund/awareness raising event called "Walk Against Hunger" and raised over £60k. The van was ordered- but has yet to be delivered by end of 2019. We will use this to increase our Food Relief programme.

#### 2020 Goals:

- 1. To launch a new album from Radha Krishna Records to inspire and attract people through the chanting/kirtan and possibly expand into the on-line YouTube market.
- 2. Development of the Bhakti Yoga London initiative for outreach to the general public in conjunction with LCVS (London College of Vedic Studies) to make the practice more accessible for the masses of people.
- Work with Trustees Advisors on the following projects to develop and strengthen our management infrastructure:
   A. Have a clear idea of what main areas of ISKCON-London management need attention, look to hire staff or engage volunteers to take up the roles with clear service descriptions and guidelines.
   B. To apply for and acquire our own immigration license so that we can more easily bring in help from abroad if required.
- 4. Continue the programme to collaborate with Ahimsa Dairy Foundation in order to move towards a long term goal of creating our own farm community.
  - A. All deity department milk supplied by Ahimsa by the end of 2020 this will be an increase of about £25k expenditure for milk.
  - B. Continue to raise funds for the purchase of land near the Ahimsa project for growing our own veg and for increase of Ahimsa herd. 120 acres for £1 million.
- 5. To acquire, fit-out and establish our electric van for Food for Life and expand our Prasadam distribution.

### Carried over Medium to Long Term Goals:

- 1. The purchase of 7 Bury Place purchase the original property and use for offices, outreach, housing for senior brahmacaris and LCVS expansion. We may be looking at £5-8 million investment.
- 2. The purchase and development of our own property and development of a farm community in Kent. £1-2 million investment.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

#### RESERVES

The trustees aim to establish a level of unrestricted funds, in real terms that ensures they can meet the future funding requirements of the charity's ongoing activities. Unrestricted reserves are recorded at £1,984,356 at 31 December 2019. The trustees consider this sum to be adequate for their ongoing needs.

### RISK MANAGEMENT

The trustees are responsible for establishing and monitoring internal control systems within the charity. The major risks which may impact the activities of the charity have been reviewed during the year and the Trustees are satisfied that the system of internal controls currently in place is adequate, whilst recognising that they are designed to manage rather than eliminate risk. Internal controls are reviewed on an ongoing basis as part of the day-to-day risk management process within the charity.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Long leasehold

- Property over the period of the lease / improvements 10% on cost

Plant and machinery

- 20% on cost

Motor vehicles

- 25% reducing balance

### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

### Going concern

The trustees having given consideration to the charity's positive net asset and incoming resources position have concluded there exists no material uncertainty regarding the continued adoption of the going concern basis.

#### 9. TRUSTEES' REMUNERATION AND BENEFITS

During 2018 the charity purchased a flat akin to a vicarage for use by whomsoever is occupying the role of the Temple President. The current Temple President (Mr James Edwards) took up residence from January 2019.

The Temple President received a salary in 2018 and 2019 which was set at the National Minimum Wage. He is not on the Temple bonus scheme and does not receive remuneration for overtime. During 2018 the charity paid for rent and other expenses on behalf of the Temple President. During 2019 the charity paid for mortgage repayments on the flat occupied by the Temple President and paid for other expenses on behalf of the Temple president. These expenses are incurred for the performance of temple duties.

The total of salary and expenses was £40,225 for 2018 and £59,650 for 2019. The increase in reported costs is due to mortgage repayments being more than the rent paid in 2018. Mortgage payments for 2019 were £35,594 (rent for 2018 was £15,340).

Trustees' expenses

There were no other trustees' expenses paid for the year ended 31 December 2019 nor for the year ended 31 December 2018.

#### 12. PRIOR YEAR ADJUSTMENT

The trustees have reviewed the accounting estimates recorded in the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018.

In the trustees' opinion the provision for depreciation on leasehold property was overstated by £67,562, prepayments and accrued income were overstated by £77,250, and accruals and deferred income were understated by £10,000.

The combined effect of these items was that net assets were found to be overstated by £19,688.
