TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

The Trustees, who are the directors of the company submit their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2014. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 9 and comply with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2005.

1. STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

1.1 Governing Document

Full Fact is a charitable company limited by guarantee and registered in England and Wales. It is registered at Companies House (No. 6975984) and with the Charities Commission (No. 1158683)

1.2 Appointment of Trustees/Directors

There are three Trustees meetings held during the year. New Trustees are inducted through a process of briefings by the Board and Executive Management.

1.3 Strategies, Vision and Risk Review

The Trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charitable company faces and confirm that systems have been established to engage regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps may be taken to mitigate these risks.

1.4 Organisational Structure

Will Moy has overall day-day responsibility for the charity. The financial management of the organisation is administered by volunteer financial professionals.

2. OBJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

2.1 Charitable Objects

The advancement of public education in the fields of crime, health, immigration, economy, education, environment and social welfare, through education, research and training, using such expertise (legal or otherwise) and advice as the trustees shall consider appropriate, to promote and advance public understanding and inform public debate in those fields whether in the UK or abroad and in particular by making available to the public, through a process of objective, impartial research and rigorous factual analysis, full, accurate and relevant information to assist such public understanding and to inform and improve the quality of public debate.

Such purposes shall in all respects and at all times be construed and promoted:

- (i) In an impartial, objective, balanced and independent manner observing strict political neutrality and, to the extent that such principles may be applied to such purposes, consistent with the principles enunciated in the code of practice for official statistics;
- (ii) Exclusively for the benefit of the public and in accordance with the law relating to charity in England and Wales. The fields of education may be extended in so far as such fields are consonant with charity law and subject to the trustees' unanimous approval and the charity commission's consent.

2.2 Review of Activities

Full Fact provides free tools, advice and information so that anyone can check the claims we hear in public debate.

2014 has been a successful year with wide take up of our work.

Research

Full Fact continued to publish daily factchecks on a wide range of topics. Most fall within our core areas derived from Ipsos MORI's Issues Facing Britain Today survey: the economy, immigration, health, education and crime. Claims of public interest or importance outside these areas were also factchecked.

We produced a series of factual briefings during the Scottish Independence Referendum.

We began a process of publishing briefings on recurring issues of public debate or confusion, working with leading specialist research institutions. This is part of our preparation for the 2015 general election.

Our first legal specialist joined the team late in the year, an initiative that responds to repeated warnings by senior judges of the consequences of public misunderstanding of legal issues.

We also began to prepare for a possible EU membership referendum, building on work done during the European Parliamentary elections.

Public Debates

Full Fact provided live factchecking and subsequent analysis of the major broadcast debates of the year: The European Parliamentary Elections – working with LBC, BuzzFeed, and the Independent, and appearing on the Today Programme.

The Scottish Independence Referendum – working with Sky News Party conferences party leaders' speeches – working with Sky News.

Making Factchecking Easier

Full Fact works particularly with providers of public information to make it more readily usable by the public, the media, and decision makers.

ONS and the Government Statistical Service. Through a programme of speaking engagements, meetings, and secondments we share expertise in interpreting and communicating statistics with official statisticians. This engagement is made possible because of the independent professional accountability of official statisticians provided for in connection with the statutory arrangements for the UK Statistics Authority.

Researchers and research institutions. Full Fact has sought to be a catalyst for individuals and organisations with deeper specialist expertise to contribute more to public debate. We have developed relevant relationships in our core areas whose benefits are felt in our daily factchecking, our briefings, and in preparations for the 2015 general election.

We provide Full Fact Finder, a free online tool that guides people to the best available sources of information on our core areas in three clicks or less. We know that this has been taken up in various newsrooms.

2.3 Charitable Status

Full Fact developed as an organisation during 2014. The Charity Commission recognised our charitable status in September.

2.4 Sustainability

Full Fact is grateful for the early financial support of our Chairman and a number of charitable trusts. For long-term sustainability we have begun to focus on developing additional new income streams including paid training and the possibility of corporate membership.

In this first annual report as a charity, the trustees record with thanks the service of two of the founding trustees of Full Fact, Lord Archer of Sandwell, who died in 2012, and Mr. John Lloyd.

3. FINANCIAL REVIEW

- 3.1 The financial statements are attached to this report
- 3.2 The charitable company is funded entirely through grants and donations.

3.3. Reserves Policy

It is the policy of the Charitable Company to strive to maintain the level of free reserve funds at approximately three months running costs of the core activity. Currently the reserves are below this level.

- 3.4 These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).
- 3.5 The charity had grants and donations income of £319,598 and other income of £15,982 totalling £335,580. Expenditure consisted of charitable activities of £308,509 and governance costs of £15,565 totalling £324,074. There was a surplus for the year of £11,505.

4. STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees, as directors of the charitable company, are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that year. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985.

1.2 Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

1.5 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects and include project management. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.6 VAT

The charity is not registered for VAT. In common with many other charities, the Small Charities Coalition expenses are inflated by VAT, which cannot be recovered.
