Structure, governance and management

Governing Document

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The organisation was formed as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association. It was incorporated on 27th October 2009, registered as a Charity on 22nd February 2011 and started to operate on 1st April 2011.

This followed the amalgamation of two existing organisations, being Awetu and the Cardiff & Vale Coalition for Disabled People. Awetu ('Our Unity' in Swahili) was a registered charity set up in 1988 as a result of the growing concern among a number of professional workers at the over representation of black clients within the mental health services and the need to improve the sensitivity of these services to black people 's needs.

Cardiff & Vale Coalition for Disabled People, a Company Limited by guarantee, was created in 1991. It was established from the outset as an organisation for disabled people that could challenge barriers; bring disabled people together to campaign on relevant issues such as education, employment, housing, transport and strengthen the voices of disabled people in the community and in decision making.

Recruitment

The Directors also serve as Trustees of the Charity. Trustees can be voted for at the Annual General Meeting or can be co-opted by the Board of Trustees at any time.

Trustee Induction and Training

The charity has a comprehensive induction training programme. Following the initial induction a range of training opportunities are provided with particular regard to governance.

Risk Review

All major risks to which the Charity becomes exposed to, is identified by the Trustees. These are reviewed and systems or procedures established to manage those risks

The following key principles outline Diverse Cymru's approach to risk management and internal control:

- The Board of Trustees has responsibility for overseeing risk management within Diverse Cymru as a whole
- A risk register is maintained and updated as required.
- An open and receptive approach to solving risk problems is adopted by the Board of Trustees.
- The CEO and Senior Management Team (SMT) offer support, advice and implement policies and procedures agreed by the Board of Trustees.
- Diverse Cymru recognises prudent disclosure of financial and non-financial implications of risks.
- The Trustees, CEO, SMT and other key staff are responsible for encouraging good risk management practice within their areas of work.

Organisational structure

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The Board of Trustees has strategic oversight, in line with charity law. The Chief Executive is an ex officio member of the Board by virtue of his role as Company Secretary and is supported by SMT in the administration of his operational responsibility for the charity.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Charity's objects are specifically restricted to promote equality and diversity for the benefit of the public by seeking to eliminate discrimination in all its forms, in particular but not exclusively, by the provision of advice, information and training.

Diverse Cymru's vision is 'a world without prejudice or discrimination, where every person is equal and diversity is celebrated'.

Our mission is to eliminate discrimination and inequality in Wales. We will do this through:

Provision - Delivering services that reduce inequality;

Promotion - Increasing awareness of equality issues;

Participation - Enabling people affected by inequality to engage and speak for themselves;

Inspiring action - Motivating people to take action against inequality

Achievements and performance

Since last year 2018-19, Diverse Cymru has continued on its journey to provide high quality services that make a real difference to the lives of those we support. This year has not been without its challenges; we have again found the need to reduce staff costs and this resulted in losing two members of staff. Whilst these losses had an impact internally we were able to maintain our standards of service to customers. We also had some positive news in that we were informed that we had won the Direct payments contract for Newport and this without doubt has improved our financial position for this year. The management team and staff as usual did not stand still but instead have put extra time and effort into finding alternative funding options, and this will pay off next year with a positive end of year balance.

All staff must be congratulated for their dedication and commitment ensuring we never lost sight of what really matters, "Our Service Users". As you can see from the following overview we have also been successful in delivering positive results in all areas of our operation. We also take this opportunity to thank all the staff, trustees, volunteers, clients and service partners for their support, ensuring this year ended with a positive outlook for the future.

Advocacy

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Working under the Social Care and Wellbeing (Wales) Act 2014, Diverse Cymru provides a free and Independent Professional Advocacy (IPA) service for disabled users of Adult Social Services who are residents in the Vale of Glamorgan, commissioned by the Council. In this year, we provided Advocacy to over 80 people, supporting people through a range of difficulties and issues including housing, health and disability benefits related issues.

Direct Payments

Direct payments are an alternative to having support arranged directly by social services and provide people with choice, voice and control over the care that they receive, as identified in the Social Services and Wellbeing (Wales) Act 2014. Diverse Cymru support disabled people and carers to achieve this control in 5 counties across Wales including a new commissioned service in Bridgend County from 5th July 2019.

We are currently commissioned by the 3 West Wales counties of Ceredigion, Carmarthenshire and Pembrokeshire to deliver a full Direct Payments support service including managed accounts and payroll support to over 1,500 clients. This year was our first full year commissioned by Newport City Council to work alongside the Council's Independent Living Advisors and provide a payroll and managed accounts service to approximately 130 Direct Payments clients.

BME Mental Health Recovery Project

Commissioned by the Cardiff and Vale University Health Board, Diverse Cymru provides support, befriending and advice to Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) people in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan who are affected by ill health. During this year we worked with clients through an individual recovery plan, collaborating to identify individual goals and ideal paths to recovery, and provide essential support in the community and a befriending service.

Financial review

Results for the year

The charity incurred a deficit for the year of £70,924 This reflects the impact of a full year of direct payments in Cardiff not recurring and tempered by the first year of direct payments in Newport City Council was anticipated by the Trustees.

The average number of employees, calculated on the basis of full-time equivalents, has decreased from 42 to 40.

Reserves Policy

The Board of Trustees believes that the Charity requires a sufficient level of reserves to cover the on-going work of the Charity and its administrative functions. At this point there are insufficient reserves to cover material one-off unexpected occurrences. The Board aims to maintain three months running costs in order to ensure continued operation and appropriate cash flow management.

Unrestricted funds stand at £314,123.

The Trustees regard the on-going review of the reserves policy as part of managing the Charity. The operating results are identified and reported upon each month. On completion of the Audit of the Annual Accounts unrestricted funds are identified and analysed. The reserves policy is then reviewed by the Board of Trustees as part of the Charity's strategic planning process. The review ensures that the policy is still relevant as the Charity develops, changes and implements its strategy.

Principal Funding

The principal funding of the Charity is through West Wales by supporting the Direct Payments operations for £799,552. During the year Direct Payments operations were also supported by Newport City Council for £32,883. The organisation is looking at developing the provision of our services throughout the rest of Wales.

Material Investments Policy

The Bank Account is reviewed daily. At present the Charity does not consider itself to have sufficient funds to invest elsewhere and receive a beneficial return. This however is a matter which is continually under review.

Plans for future periods

The Charity is looking to develop the existing operations in all areas and in particular in other parts of Wales.

Funds held as custodian trustee on behalf of others

The Charity manages, on behalf of Carmarthenshire County Council, Ceredigion County Council, Pembrokeshire County Council and Newport City Council the Direct Payment matters for registered Service Users. This is seen as a way of assisting the Service Users in their independence and the respective Councils in the areas of South Wales providing that service.

In doing this we hold, in the Charity's name, monies in a separate bank account which cannot be used for the operation of Charity activities.

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BME Mental Health All Wales Projects

Funded by the Welsh Government through a Section 64 mental health grant, this year saw the successful rollout of our BME Mental Health Workplace Good Practice Certification Scheme endorsed by the Royal College of Psychiatrists in Wales that is designed for professionals that work with BME communities in Wales, in efforts to improve the accessibility and quality of social care and mental health services. The project includes research into the experiences of BME people with dementia and their carers and provides specialist BME mental health awareness training.

Finally, within this programme, our HYPE Cymru project engages with BME children and young people across Wales on engaging approaches to talking about mental health. This includes workshops on feelings, mindfulness and yoga and The Green Prescription, taking young people out and about to experience Wales' countryside.

Policy, Engagement and Training

Diverse Cymru has a proven track record of understanding the experiences of multi-characteristic individuals and communities. The provision of a training and consultancy service contributes to the organisation's profile and reputation as experts in the elimination of discrimination and inequality and to directly improving the experiences of people affected by inequality in Wales.

Diverse Cymru also has a proven track record of delivering high-quality specialist equality and diversity research. The provision of this service contributes to ensuring that the voices of people affected by inequality are heard and acted upon by decision-makers. This research, in partnership with the case studies we produce, enhance the evidence base for equality policy and practice in Wales.

In this year, the project was commissioned by the EHRC to undertake a review of public authorities under the Public Sector Equality Duty; continued public engagement on a range of themes through the 3rd Sector Partnership with C3SC, commissioned by Cardiff Council; and completed the 'Your Wellbeing Your Government' project, in collaboration with C3SC.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 March 2019

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Alexandra House, 3rd Floor, 307 - 315 Cowbridge Road East, Cardiff, CF5 1JD.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful life of that asset as follows:

'ILS' Database - Over the useful economic life of 10 years less 50% residual value

If there is an indication that there has been a significant change in amortisation rate, useful life or residual value of an intangible asset, the amortisation is revised prospectively to reflect the new estimates.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

- 20% p.a. straight line basis

Impairment of fixed assets

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The charity is incorporated under the Companies Act 2006 and is limited by guarantee, each member having undertaken to contribute such amounts not exceeding one pound as may be required in the event of the company being wound up whilst he or she is still a member or within one year thereafter. There are 9 members of the company.

Welsh Government Section 64 – This grant funds a project to promote the cultural competency of mental health services across Wales at Policy level. Through this grant we work with health professionals on the BME Mental Health Good Practice Certification Scheme and train professionals in BME mental health. The grant also funds Hype Cymru (Helping Young People Through Empowerment) a Wales-wide programme to engage BME children and young people in training, information and activities to support good mental health.

Advocacy – The Vale of Glamorgan Council engages Diverse Cymru to provide Advocacy support to disabled adults on a range of issues to improve their health and wellbeing. Supported by Creu Cymru, the Charity provides an Arbitration service for the Hynt Card. Hynt is a membership card that provides disabled customers and their carers with access to consistent concessions when purchasing tickets across all theatres and arts centres in Wales.

Cardiff Third Sector Partnership – This project is a partnership between the Charity, Cardiff Third Sector Council (C3SC) and Race Equality First. The Charity's role in the partnership is to bring together, develop the capacity, promote the voice and support seldom heard groups and individuals in Cardiff.

Families First – This grant, funded by Action for Children, enabled the Charity to provide Advocacy support and welfare advice for families with children and young people with disabilities.

Arts Council for Wales – The aim of the project was to produce a toolkit on equality and diversity for use by a wide range of organisations and individuals across the arts in Wales to promote good practice.

Welsh Gymnastics – This project saw the Charity work in partnership with Welsh Gymnastics to develop a sustainable women and girls only gymnastics club within Butetown.

High End TV – Funded by Creative Skillset, the Charity was able to provide small bursaries to Welsh filmmakers from underrepresented groups to enable them to obtain equipment, or training to further their careers in Wales' film and tv industries.

Cardiff and Vale University Health Board – The Charity is commissioned by the Health Board to deliver a one to one project supporting BME adults in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan with their mental health recovery, and to provide a volunteering and befriending programme.

Golden Thread Advocacy Programme – the Charity continues to support this project that helps to ensure that local authorities are ready for the commissioning of Independent Professional Advocacy services in line with the Social Services and Well-being (Wales) Act 2014

Open Gov Network Wales – The Your Wellbeing, Your Government project (WCVA Open Government Network Wales funded) looked at skilling up diverse individuals in engaging with public sector organisations and co-produce new ways of engaging diverse communities between diverse individuals and public sector organisations.

EHRC – The Charity was engaged by the Equality and Human Rights Commission to research public sector organisations' compliance with the Public Sector Equality Duties for Wales. This involved extensive desk-top research, questionnaires, interviews and case study and report development alongside compliance data.
