STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The organisation was formed as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association. It was incorporated on 27th October 2009, registered as a Charity on 22nd February 2011 and started to operate on 1st April 2011.

This followed the amalgamation of two existing organisations, being Awetu and the Cardiff & Vale Coalition for Disabled People. Awetu ('Our Unity' in Swahili) was a registered charity set up in 1988 as a result of the growing concern among a number of professional workers at the over representation of black clients within the mental health services and the need to improve the sensitivity of these services to black people 's needs.

Cardiff & Vale Coalition for Disabled People, a Company Limited by guarantee, was created in 1991. It was established from the outset as an organisation for disabled people that could challenge barriers; bring disabled people together to campaign on relevant issues such as education, employment, housing, transport and strengthen the voices of disabled people in the community and in decision making.

Recruitment

The Directors also serve as Trustees of the Charity. Trustees can be voted for at the Annual General Meeting or can be co-opted by the Board of Trustees at any time.

Trustee Induction and Training

The charity has a comprehensive induction training programme. Following the initial induction a range of training opportunities are provided with particular regard to governance.

Risk Review

All major risks to which the Charity becomes exposed to, is identified by the Trustees these are reviewed and systems or procedures established to manage those risks

The following key principles outline Diverse Cymru's approach to risk management and internal control:

- The Board of Trustees has responsibility for overseeing risk management within Diverse Cymru as a whole.
- · A risk register is maintained and updated as required.
- An open and receptive approach to solving risk problems is adopted by the Board of Trustees.
- The CEO and Senior Management Team (SMT) offer support, advice and implement policies and procedures agreed by the Board of Trustees.
- Diverse Cymru recognises prudent disclosure of financial and non-financial implications of risks.
- The Trustees, CEO, SMT and other key staff are responsible for encouraging good risk management practice within their areas of work.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Organisational structure

The Board of Trustees has strategic oversight, in line with charity law. The Chief Executive is an ex officio member of the Board by virtue of his role as Company Secretary and is supported by SMT in the administration of his operational responsibility for the charity.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Charity's objects are specifically restricted to promote equality and diversity for the benefit of the public by seeking to eliminate discrimination in all its forms, in particular but not exclusively, by the provision of advice, information and training.

Diverse Cymru's vision is 'a world without prejudice or discrimination, where every person is equal and diversity is celebrated'.

Our mission is to eliminate discrimination and inequality in Wales. We will do this through:

Provision - Delivering services that reduce inequality;

Promotion - Increasing awareness of equality issues;

Participation - Enabling people affected by inequality to engage and speak for themselves;

Inspiring action - Motivating people to take action against inequality.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Since last year 20016-17 which saw unprecedented change in the organisation, Diverse Cymru has continued on its journey to provide high quality services that make a real difference to the lives of those we support.

This year has not been without its challenges, in June of this year we lost the Cardiff Direct Payments contract that we have held for over 10 years.

This was followed by the loss of the "families first" contract for giving advice and advocacy to Cardiff council.

Whilst these losses had a significant impact on finances it was not catastrophic, and with some cost reduction the loss has been managed effectively as we outlined in our risk management plan. The management team and staff did not stand still but instead have put extra time and effort into finding alternative funding, this was paid off by being awarded the DP contract for Newport in March of 2018.

However through all the difficulties one thing has remained constant throughout, and that is the dedication and commitment of all staff to ensure we never lost sight of what really matters, "Our Service Users".

As you can see from the following overview we have also been successful in delivering positive results in all other areas of our operation.

We will also take this opportunity to thank all the staff, trustees, volunteers, clients and service partners for their support, ensuring this year ended with a very positive outcome.

BME

The 'Get Your Kicks on' project worked with over 200 youth in Cardiff, Swansea, Newport and Wrexham. Delivering mental health awareness sessions to the youth and the youth workers. If the youth workers noticed any unusual behaviour with their youth, they now have the confidence to either speak to the member or contact diverse Cymru and ask for the youth worker to drop in.

Last year the most severe case was dealing with a suicidal youth in Riverside, with the help of Diverse Cymru and encouragement from Riverside youth team the young male is doing a lot better and has accessed the help he needed.

The project took several groups out for walks with the green prescription activity. Visiting Pen-y-Fan, Cardiff Bay and Mount Snowdon. Every walk the youth received bags full of information on mental health and organisations to help with mental health issues. The bags had activities in for the younger participants to help talk about feelings.

Every activity had feedback forms, to document the benefits of the green prescription the feedback was all positive the participants all noticed a difference with their mental health feeling a lot more positive after the walk or having a clearer head. The walks had given them time to think and time away from the regular normalities in their lives. The documentation for the green prescription has all been positive.

The BME Mental Health Policy project went on the road in 2017 with the United Kingdom Investors in Equality and Diversity (UKIED) to promote the Accreditation scheme for working with diverse communities in mental health. This will be the first of its kind in the United Kingdom. We held Stakeholder Information events in Cardiff and Carmarthen. Follow-up meetings and take-up of the scheme planned for Summer of 2018.

Delivered 6 BME mental health awareness sessions around Wales. Sessions were delivered to mental health/psychology practitioners, independent advocates and voluntary sector workers in Hywel Dda, Pontypridd, Cardiff and Swansea. All sessions were received positively.

Advice

Before losing the Families First contract the Advice section had been running three projects:-

As part of the Families First programme we provided benefit advice for families with a disabled child(ren) and for young disabled people who live or wish to live independently and an advocacy service for parents of disabled children. The service was for Cardiff residents and ended on 31st March 2018 due to funding ending.

Advocacy to disabled people who are residents in the Vale of Glamorgan with priority to those with critical and substantial care needs. The service is funded by VoG Adult Social Services and is limited to 30 cases a year. For FY2017/18 we opened 43 cases thus exceeding target by 13. The contract to deliver the service has been renewed for the year 2018/19 with 1% increase in funding. The work undertaken includes welfare benefits (applications, appeals and Tribunal representations), social care and housing.

Hynt arbitration – has been carried out by the team since January 2017 and the contract runs until 2020. The scheme is funded through Creu Cymru by Arts Council for Wales. Hynt is a card for disabled people with care needs that entitles the holder to a ticket free of charge for their accompanying carer(s), companion or Personal Assistant.

Arbitration is for customers who have access needs that are not represented in the automatic eligibility criteria or whose original application was rejected. For the FY17/18 the team considered 124 applications.

Funding and Projects

In this period Diverse Cymru continued to receive funding from Cardiff Council in support of our engagement programme and the third sector partnership (with Cardiff Third Sector Council and Race Equality First)

Cardiff Third Sector Council funded Co-Creating Health Change Project – November 2017 saw the end of this successful engagement project that brought together people from diverse communities to share views about health, social care and wellbeing services. Our Policy and Engagement department continue to develop opportunities for people to feedback about services and policies that affect them.

My Wales: Stories from Asylum Seekers and Refugees in Wales. Commissioned by the Equality and Human Rights Commission (EHRC) to film asylum seekers and refugees across Wales, making a series of short films to highlight people's 'lived experiences' in Wales.

Diversity in the Film and TV Sectors in Wales – Funded by the Welsh Government's Creative Unit, we have developed a network of engaged professionals to take forward recommendations from the Strategy report written in 2016.

Golden Thread Advocacy Project Board Member – a Welsh Government funded 3-year project to run alongside and support the implementation of Part 10 (Advocacy) of the Social Services and Wellbeing (Wales) Act 2014. Diverse Cymru is a member of the Golden Thread Advocacy Project Board.

BME Girls Gymnastics Project – funded by Welsh Gymnastics, this project implemented and manages a new gymnastics club for BME girls in Butetown, Cardiff. Our management of this project will come to an end in May 2018 but as a result of our successful management, the project will continue to be delivered by parents and others involved.

Direct Payments

At the start of 2017, Direct Payments under Diverse Cymru was looking very healthy with the statistics reported below:

We had the following service users in Cardiff prior to loosing Contract in June 2017. 858 active Service Users and 15 members of staff dealing with the contract.

In West Wales in March 2018 we have:-

Carmarthenshire – 453 active Service User Ceredigion – 308 active Service Users Pembrokeshire – 349 Service Users

Totalling – 1110 Service Users we also have 18 members of staff spread across the three counties.

The team in West Wales have been very busy this year, promoting both Direct Payments and the Role of the Personal Assistant, resulting in increased referrals and a faster recruitment process. The Service Users were obviously pleased by this, as the results from the Annual Evaluation of Services illustrated a high level of satisfaction.

On April 1st 2018, we began delivery of a Payroll and Managed Banking Service to Newport County Council.

It is expected that we will continue to build the service in the following year.

Engagement, Research and Policy department

During 2017-18 we undertook a joint engagement project with C3SC. This Your Wellbeing, Your Government project (WCVA Open Government Network Wales funded) looked at skilling up diverse individuals in engaging with public sector organisations and co-produce new ways of engaging diverse communities between diverse individuals and public sector organisations. 2 launches and 6 engagement events in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan were held in 2017-18 with an initial report produced. This project will be completed in 2018-19 with further engagement events and an end of project event launching the new model and working together to implement it.

We also completed the 4 ½ years Co-creating Healthy Change project. This involve forums, meetings, engagement and developing co-production in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan. The network of contacts who want to get involved in engagement, policy and influencing has fed into our Cardiff Third Sector Partnership and University Service User involvement work. We continue to engage these diverse individuals and influence local, Welsh and UK policy, legislation and practice design building on the legacy of this project.

Research projects

Our team delivered 4 specific funded research projects in 2016-17.

We undertook an evaluation of Powys County Council's Syrian Vulnerable Persons' Resettlement Scheme. This involved interviews with Syrian refugees, support organisations and public services. A report with recommendations was produced.

We delivered a project looking at public sector organisations' compliance with the Public Sector Equality Duties for Wales commissioned by the EHRC Wales. This involved extensive desk-top research, questionnaires, interviews and case study and report development alongside compliance data.

We delivered a project with C3SC engaging third sector organisations in developing resources for third sector organisations throughout Wales to understand and use the Public Sector Equality Duty specific duties for Wales. We produced a range of resources for the EHRC to distribute to third sector organisations in Wales.

We delivered a project for the EHRC Wales evaluating the effectiveness and impact of the identifying and tackling discrimination course. This involved surveys, extensive interviews, and developing recommendations and reports.

University service user involvement

We continue to deliver equality lectures and service user and carer involvement and development activities in relation to the social work courses at Cardiff University and Cardiff Metropolitan University.

Engagement and Cardiff Third Sector Partnership

We are funded by Cardiff Council to deliver engagement, policy and influencing work as part of the Cardiff Third Sector Partnership. We also deliver engagement and strategic advice for the Age Cymru Golden Thread Advocacy Project. We delivered 8 engagement events with diverse communities with over 40 different diverse individuals attending. These fed into responses to 8 Cardiff based consultation or influencing opportunities and 10 Welsh or UK consultations, inquiries and other influencing opportunities. We have engaged quarterly with 6 strategic networks and have been part of 15 different Welsh strategic partnerships, networks and meetings during the year. We've held 2 training events skilling up individuals from diverse communities and brought a number of external organisations to discuss their priorities and projects with diverse communities. We arranged and facilitated engagement on their Strategic Equality Plan for Social Care Wales, which they funded. We have hosted 2 student placement and 4 volunteers with the department this year.

Financial review

Results for the year

This is the sixth year of operation for the Charity during which the organisation has continued to grow with a surplus of £163,694 increase in the Incoming Resources. This reflects the impact of a full year of direct payments in West Wales and was anticipated by the Trustees.

The average number of employees, calculated on the basis of full time equivalents, has decreased from 58 to 42.

Reserves Policy

The Board of Trustees believes that the Charity requires a sufficient level of reserves to cover the ongoing work of the Charity and its administrative functions. At this point there are insufficient reserves to cover unexpected occurrences. The Board aims to maintain three months running costs in order to ensure continued operation and appropriate cash flow management.

Unrestricted funds stand at £469,964.

The Trustees regard the on-going review of the reserves policy as part of managing the Charity. The operating results are identified and reported upon each month. On completion of the Audit of the Annual Accounts unrestricted funds are identified and analysed. The reserves policy is then reviewed by the Board of Trustees as part of the Charity's strategic planning process. The review ensures that the policy is still relevant as the Charity develops, changes and implements its strategy.

Principle Funding

The principle funding of the Charity is through West Wales by supporting the Direct Payments operations for £734,577 and Cardiff City Council £337,880. The organisation is looking at developing the provision of our services throughout the rest of Wales.

Material Investments Policy

The Bank Account is reviewed daily. At present the Charity does not consider it self to have sufficient funds to invest elsewhere and receive a beneficial return. This however is a matter which is continually under review.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The Charity is looking to develop the existing operations in all areas and in particular in other parts of Wales.

FUNDS HELD AS CUSTODIAN TRUSTEE ON BEHALF OF OTHERS

The Charity manages, on behalf of Cardiff City Council, Carmarthenshire County Council, Ceredigion County Council and Pembrokeshire County Council the Direct Payment matters for registered Service Users. This is seen as a way of assisting the Service Users in their independence and the respective Councils in the areas of South Wales providing that service.

In doing this we hold, in the Charity's name, monies in a separate bank account which cannot be used for the operation of Charity activities.

At the year end the charity held the following amounts as custodian trustee on behalf of the Managed Payments Scheme:

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Alexandra House, 3rd Floor, 307 - 315 Cowbridge Road East, Cardiff, CF5 1JD.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the
 contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual
 requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case
 it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful life of that asset as follows:

'ILS' Database

Over the useful economic life of 10years less 50% residual value

Amortisation (continued)

If there is an indication that there has been a significant change in amortisation rate, useful life or residual value of an intangible asset, the amortisation is revised prospectively to reflect the new estimates.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Leasehold Property

Over the term of the lease 20% p.a. straight line basis

Equipment Fixtures & Fittings

20% p.a. straight line basis

Impairment of fixed assets

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The charity is incorporated under the Companies Act 2006 and is limited by guarantee, each member having undertaken to contribute such amounts not exceeding one pound as may be required in the event of the company being wound up whilst he or she is still a member or within one year thereafter. There are 9 members of the company.

Cardiff Advice Service - This project is funded by the Vale of Glamorgan Citizens Advice Bureau to provide specialist welfare advice service.

Comic Relief - The purpose of this project is to promote greater involvement of people who have mental health problems and assist in decisions that affect their lives. This is done by increasing the knowledge and understanding of BME people and their communities in mental health issues and increasing their ability support each other and speak up for themselves.

Community Voice - The purpose of this project is to bring together, develop the capacity, promote the voice and support the seldom heard individuals of Cardiff and the Vale.

Families First - The grant is funded by Action for Children to provide support and welfare advice for families with children and young people with disabilities.

Art Council of Wales Framework - The aim of the project is to produce a tool kit on equality and diversity or use by a variety of people in the arts to promote good practice.

Creu Cymru - The project now known as Hynt will enable disabled customers and their carers to access consistent concessions when purchasing tickets across all theatres and arts centres in Wales. The developed scheme rolled out nationally, will act as a catalyst and valuable tool for audience development across the venue network.

Supporting People with Disabilities - The purpose of the grant is to provide advice and support to people with disabilities.

The Welsh Assembly S64 Grant - This grant was used to contribute towards the cost of taking forward BME Mental Health issues across Wales.

Welsh Gymnastics - The project was funded to develop a sustainable women and girls only gymnastics club within the local community with the main focus on the ethnic minority females.

Ffilm- Supporting diverse individuals in gaining access to work opportunities within film and TV.

Golden Thread - DC continue to support this project that helps to ensure that organisations are ready for the commissioning of Advocacy services in the near-future. We continue to contribute as part of the Project's steering group.

Asylum seekers - working with refugees and asylum seekers who share their stories in interviews. To be followed by a publication and a film to be shown nationally.

Equality and Human Rights Commission - three research projects to assess effectiveness of various diversity initiatives

WCVA Open Government Network - project to skill up diverse individuals and co-production of a new model of engagement
