The Directors present their report and the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2011 The Directors who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

The name of the charity is the "Nottingham Roman Catholic Diocesan Trustees"

The charity was responsible for the financial and administrative affairs of the Diocese of Nottingham for the year ended 31st March 2011 and is referred to as "the Diocese" in this report and accounts. The existing charitable trust formerly responsible for the Diocese will continue for a period while arrangements are made to transfer all of the assets of the Diocese into the new company. When the necessary regulations come into effect, the Directors of the company propose to re-register the company as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation under the Charities Act 2006.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Diocese as a charitable company, limited by guarantee, is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Directors are the members of the company. Major decisions are made by the Directors Other decisions may be delegated to committees or to individual members of staff. Under the Articles the Bishop may require that decisions with which he disagrees be not put into effect.

The affairs of the Diocese are conducted in accordance both with the national law of the United Kingdom and with the Canon Law of the Catholic Church The Directors are responsible for the management of the charity under the national law. They also act as the Finance Committee of the Diocese under Canon Law Under Canon Law the College of Consultors of the Diocese must be consulted before any major acts of administration and before any substantial alienation of property. The Financial Secretary has been appointed Financial Administrator of the Diocese under Canon Law.

The Diocese co-operates with other Catholic dioceses and those of the Church of England In particular, it contributes, with other Catholic dioceses, to a number of national organisations set up by the Catholic Bishops Conference of England and Wales, principally, the Catholic Trust of England and Wales, the Catholic Education Service and the Catholic Safeguarding Advisory Service (formerly the Office for the Protection of Children and Vulnerable Adults)

Risk management

The Directors have identified the major risks to which the Diocese is exposed and have established systems to mitigate exposure to those risks.

Re-organisation

During the year the Directors have wound up the remaining smaller trusts, which have outlived their usefulness. The support of the Charity Commission over this and over the incorporation is gratefully acknowledged.

Sick and Retired Priests Fund

The Charity has been appointed to be the trustees of the Sick and Retired Priests Fund from the 1st April 2010 and its accounts have been consolidated with the accounts of the Diocese. The Management Body of the fund remains in existence to support the work of the Bishop's Chaplain for Sick and Retired Priests This fund maintains its separate identity as a charity (number 510119) in order to emphasise its special status

Nottingham Lourdes Fund

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The Trustees of the separate Nottingham Lourdes Fund resolved on 5th December 2010, that its assets be transferred to the Diocese with effect from 1st April 2011 These assets have been accepted and credited to a new Restricted Fund to be known as the Lourdes Pilgrimage Fund The terms of this fund, which are identical to those of the Nottingham Lourdes Fund, are as follows.

"The advancement of Christian Religion and relief of sickness and for that purpose to provide for and assist poor, sick, handicapped and infirm persons of all ages, and in particular to provide for and assist financially and otherwise any such persons wishing to make a pilgrimage to Lourdes."

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Diocese of Nottingham comprises the major part of the East Midlands — It extends to the north from Marple Bridge on the outskirts of Manchester and south to Lutterworth, east to the Lincolnshire coast, and west to Burton-on-Trent — It includes the following civil administrative areas:

Counties - Nottinghamshire (other than the district of Bassetlaw), Derbyshire (other than the areas of Bamford, Chesterfield, Clowne, Dronfield, Eckington, Hathersage and Staveley), Leicestershire (other than those areas of Stamford and Market Harborough which are South of the River Welland), Lincolnshire (including the City of Lincoln but excluding the area East of the River Nene), Staffordshire (the area of Burton on Trent North of the River Trent)

Unitary Area Authorities - North Lincolnshire, North East Lincolnshire, Rutland

Cities - Nottingham, Derby and Leicester

Metropolitan Boroughs - Stockport (the area of Marple Bridge East of the River Etherow and the River Goyt).

The objects of the Diocese are

- (1) The advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in the area of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Nottingham as determined under the laws of the Roman Catholic Church and in accordance with them.
- (2) The advancement of any charitable purpose supported by the Roman Catholic Church in any part of the world

Grants are made by the Diocese to other charities in furtherance of its objectives
The chief of these are to the Diocesan Sick and Retired Priests Fund, the Housekeepers Retirement Fund and the Diocesan Youth Service

Much of the work of the Diocese takes place in the Parishes by volunteers

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The accounts of the Diocese distinguish between the Parishes of the Diocese and the Curia, which performs its central administration. The income of the Diocese is mainly from Parish collections, donations, legacies, grants and specific fundraising activities. The Curia is funded by the income from its investments, from interest on its own and from shared interest on the Parishes' cash balances and from the Diocesan Quota, which is a levy on the Parishes of the Diocese authorised by Canon Law

Taking the Parishes' and the Curia's Unrestricted Funds together there is a surplus of Net Incoming Resources particularly from the Parishes' Funds. The Curia's underlying result is to make a small surplus each year During the year the Catholic National Mutual, the insurer of the Diocese and of which it is a shareholder, has made substantial donations to the Diocese to offset its share of the cost of the visit of Pope Benedict XVI to the United Kingdom in September 2010.

Funding

The Directors are of the opinion that its assets are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations and to provide prudently for future expenditure. Further specific comment is made about the Sick and Retired Priests Fund below.

It is the policy of the Directors that the unrestricted liquid reserves of the Diocese be between one and three years of its normal expenditure. As a separate juridical person under Canon Law each parish is responsible for determining its own reserves policy. Again the Directors expect that this be between one and three years of its normal expenditure and in any case not less than the cost of its outstanding maintenance.

Grants

Grateful thanks are made to the Directors of the Sir Harold Hood Charitable Trust for grants to individuals, to the Master of the Guild of Our Lady of Ransom for a grant for poor parishes and to an individual for making a substantial grant for the Cathedral choristers. Many other individuals and organisations have made grants to parishes which have not been brought to the attention of the Directors and are therefore not formally mentioned here. Nevertheless both these and generous legacies have been very gratefully received and the thanks of the Directors are recorded for those who have made these kind gifts.

Education Service

The Diocese's Diocesan Education Service is substantially funded by a charge on the schools of the Diocese, based upon the number of pupils in each school

Investments

The listed investments are almost entirely managed by a firm of Investment Managers, in accordance with an ethical policy approved by the Directors, in order to maximise the total return from them on a medium risk basis. With very few exceptions, these investments are held in the name of the Investment Manager's nominee company, on behalf of the Diocese. The gain on investments during the year was £158 thousand (2010 £823 thousand). The value of the listed and unlisted investments at the end of the year was £5,341 thousand (2010 £5,047 thousand).

Interest rates

During the year interest rates remained at historically low levels. As a net saver this has severely reduced the income of the Diocese. The Directors considered how best to make up the shortfall and, following consultation of the parishes, the Diocesan Quota was increased for the year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW (continued)

Sick and Retired Priests Fund

During the year a review was undertaken of the Sick and Retired Priests Fund. Although on an ongoing basis the income of the fund, including a substantial grant from the Diocese, is adequate to meet its needs the Trustees are aware of a large number of priests approaching the age of 75 at which a parish priest is required to offer his resignation to the Bishop Although the resignation does not have to be accepted it is prudent to provide for the additional grants which may become payable. Had provision been made on a traditional Pension Scheme basis the fund would be regarded as being in substantial deficit. Accordingly, consideration is being given to increasing the resources of this fund

The Papal Visit in September 2010

The costs of the very successful visit of Pope Benedict XVI to the United Kingdom in 2010 have been funded by substantial donors, by a special second collection, by a substantial payment from the Catholic National Mutual insurance company (of which the Diocese is a shareholder) and by loans

English Heritage Review

During the year a professional review was undertaken of the Churches of the Diocese the cost of which was shared with English Heritage. This review has assisted the Diocese in identifying historic churches and valuable contents.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Administrative changes include the appointment of Ms Gail Neill as Director of the Diocese's well respected Diocesan Education Service from 1st September 2010

Internal control is being developed in order to improve the financial information available to the Company At the same time consideration will be given about how the Curia can better support the parishes of the Diocese

The Gift Aid office has been taken in to the Curia offices with effect from 1st April 2011.

The Diocese has co-operated with other English and Welsh dioceses in the development of "Church Marketplace", an on-line purchasing consortium

A number of the Dioceses Catholic Schools have or are actively taking steps to become academies under the government's plans.

A new company has been set up to run the Diocesan Education Service and for other purposes to support the schools of the Diocese

1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year except as stated.

1.1 Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005)

1.2 Funds

The accounts distinguish between those funds which are unrestricted income funds, and those which are restricted funds and special trusts. The unrestricted income funds are either general and may be used for any charitable purpose permitted under the Trust Deed or may be designated by the Directors to a particular purpose, if so designated the designation may be later removed by them. At present there are no funds which have been so designated. The restricted funds and special trusts are required to be used for a specific purpose. The Diocese acts as trustees of them.

The accounts further distinguish between the Parishes and the Curia Under national law all of the affairs of the Diocese, including those of the Parishes, are those of the charity and are the responsibility of its Directors. Under Canon Law each Parish is a "Juridical Person" and its funds are required to be held separately for each Parish. Accordingly the funds described as Parishes' funds are restricted.

1 3 Incoming resources

Incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on the basis of the amounts receivable for the year Legacies are included when there is sufficient certainty of receipt. Investment income is included when it is received.

Donations to the parishes which are net of income tax are recognised when they are received. Any income tax reclaimed from the Inland Revenue is credited when it is recovered.

1 4 Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when a legal or constructive obligation has arisen

1.5 Investments

Investments held as fixed assets (other than property investments) are revalued at mid-market value at the balance sheet date and the gain or loss taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.6 Taxation

As a registered charity, the charity is exempt from taxation on its income and gains arising out of its charitable activities.

1.7 Tangible Fixed Assets

Investment land and buildings are stated in the accounts at the Directors' valuation either using historical insurance values or subsequent revaluations as the basis.

Functional land and buildings held by the Parishes at 31 March 1996 and those held by the Curia at 31 March 1999 were re-valued, excluding land, using insurance values as the basis. Properties purchased since that time are included at cost, including land. As stated in note 6 the value of land and buildings used by the schools of the Diocese has not been included in the financial statements for the reason noted therein

The contents of the buildings held by the parishes at 31st March 1996 have been included from that date using insurance values as the basis

Functional tangible fixed assets acquired since those dates have been included at their cost or subsequent valuation

Depreciation rates have been applied as follows in order to write off the assets concerned by equal annual instalments over their estimated useful lives:

LandNo depreciationBuildings2%Contents of parish buildings10%Other fixed assets10%

A number of the churches and other buildings owned by the Diocese are listed by the appropriate listing authority. In many cases property is held subject to covenants restricting its use for the Catholic Church or other condition under which it was transferred to the Diocese. Some of the parishes hold historic artefacts, which it is not practical to value. No adjustment has been made to the values at which the Tangible Fixed Assets are stated in the accounts in respect of any these.

18 Pension Schemes

The Diocese operates a defined contribution pension scheme for its clergy and has designated a Stakeholder defined contribution pension scheme for its staff. It also contributes to the Teachers Pensions Association for certain members of the Diocesan Education Service. Although the Teachers Pensions Association is a defined benefits pension scheme, any actuarial shortfall in the scheme will be made up by increasing future contribution rates. Accordingly no provision has been made for any shortfall at the Balance Sheet date, nor will the Diocese be able to benefit from overfunding.

1 9 Grants received

The grants received for expenditure which is capitalised are credited by equal annual instalments to the Statement of Financial Activities, over the same period as the related expenditure is depreciated subject to a maximum of 50 years. The amounts not yet credited in this way are carried forward in the balance sheet as a long-term liability. Grants received towards revenue expenditure are credited to income. All grants are included from the date on which they become receivable.

1.10 Comparative Figures

As noted earlier the Diocese was transferred from Nottingham Roman Catholic Diocesan Trustees Registered to Nottingham Roman Catholic Diocesan Trustees, a company limited by guarantee The closing figures of the transferring charity are shown for comparative purposes

The Housekeepers Retirement Fund and the Diocesan Youth Service are connected with the Diocese as they have some trustees who are Directors of the Diocese The Diocese has been appointed to be the trustees of the Sick and Retired Priests Fund

In addition to the grant shown above, the Diocesan Youth Service occupies property at Crich which is owned by the Diocese and for which rent is not charged. The property was purchased by the Diocese from the the Youth Service Trustees for £415 thousand in 2002 at an open market valuation by Messrs Chesterton Plc

The Clergy Students fees and grants have been charged to the Ecclesiastical Education Fund or Clergy Formation Fund (The two funds have been merged during the year).

Both the Catholic Trust of England and Wales and the Catholic Education Service are organs of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales The Bishop who is the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Diocese is also Chairman of both bodies

The Clergy Formation Fund, the Poor and Needy Parish Funds, the Mission Fund, the Lenten Station Masses Fund are Restricted Funds of the Diocese

The grants to sick and retired priests have been charged generally to the Sick and Retired Priests Fund Because the Sick and Retired Priests Fund is a separately constituted charity, donations and legacies received by the Diocese for the purpose of looking after the Sick and Retired Diocesan Priests are immediately granted on to that charity. Grants made from the Sick and Retired Priests Fund are for various amounts usually between £5 and £10 thousand per annum and approved by the Trustees on the basis of need. The assets of this fund are not sufficient to provide for all the Priests requiring support and the fund, therefore, relies on voluntary income and from a grant from the Diocese. Additional provision is made by some Priests contributing jointly with the Diocese to a registered pension scheme.

The Charity Commission has established a scheme authorising the payment during the year of £95,000 by the Trustees of the Chambers Trust to the Youth Service Trustees

12. Amounts owed to and from Parishes by the Curia

Each parish is required to hold amounts in excess of its immediate requirements in a separately designated account with the Curia. Out of this, loans are made to Parishes for approved building projects at an interest rate which is currently 3% for existing projects and 6% for new ones. The balance is deposited with the money market. The interest earned is partly retained by the Curia and partly passed on to the Parishes which hold such amounts held with the Curia, pro rata to those amounts and to the periods for which they are held.

In view of the continuing uncertainty in the financial markets the policy of only holding deposits in UK clearing banks has been continued

14. Inter-Diocesan Fuel Management Ltd

The Diocese owns 1 share out of 9 issued and fully paid ordinary shares of Inter-Diocesan Fuel Management Ltd (IFM) This company was set up in conjunction with 8 other Catholic dioceses in order to purchase electricity and gas for Diocesan properties The profits of IFM are covenanted to the participating dioceses under deed The sum due to IFM at 31st March 2011, is £1,390 thousand (2010 £1,390 thousand) In addition to this, at 31st March 2011, debtors due within one year include the amount of £1,432 thousand (2010 £1,432 thousand) This represents payments made on account to IFM by the Curia on behalf of the parishes and which are recoverable from IFM

The amount due to IFM at 31st March 2011 for fuel consumed but not yet charged is estimated at £55 thousand (2010 £33 thousand), and is included in the Parishes' Current Liabilities

15. Contingent Assets

The estimated value of legacies to which the Charity will be entitled but which have not been included as Incoming resources at 31st March 2011 is £225 thousand (2010 £105 thousand)

16. Commitments

Capital commitments at 31st March 2011 amounted to £1,677 thousand, (2010 £2,461 thousand)
