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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 June 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives of the Charity

Our charity's objectives are as set out in the Articles of Association:

"To relieve the mental and physical sickness of persons resident in the United Kingdom, in particular children and young people suffering from bereavement or loss or a serious health crisis of a family member by the provision of workshops and support.

"To advance the education of professionals working with children and young people suffering from bereavement, loss or the serious illness of a family member by the provision of training."

The following quotation is pertinent to the setting of our aims and objectives; "Children who experience three or more stressful life events, such as family bereavements, divorce or serious illness are significantly more likely to develop emotional and behavioural disorders" (Source: The Office for National Statistics 21st October 2008).

Main Objectives for the Year July 2021 - June 2022

The trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit and the summary of the main activities for the year are:

- 1. Expand the financial scope of the charity to ensure diversification and source income from alternative and sustainable streams.
- 2. Further develop our blended service to effectively support 5–25-year-olds with a range of options for digital and face-to-face engagement and incorporating the Hope App.
- 3. Continue promoting and expanding throughout Herefordshire and beyond with a focus on partnerships with schools, hospitals, and hospices.
- 4. Continued development of an effective management structure including Trustees, the Youth Management Team, and Senior Staff. Development of existing workforce and recruitment of experienced and qualified staff to meet the growing demands for the Hope service.
- 5. Recruitment of a Youth Trustee to join the Board and work in liaison with the Youth Management Team.
- 6. To continue to develop operational systems, policies and procedures to ensure the safeguarding of service users and staff.

Volunteers contribute to the work of the charity supporting by fundraising, but also in administration, publicity, marketing and support at youth sessions and activities. All members of staff also volunteer on a regular basis. The Youth Management Team are all volunteers and are a significant part of the organisation.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 June 2022

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Significant achievements this year include:

Procurement of funding from a range of sources including The Dulverton Trust and The Alan and Dorothy Brailsford Charitable Trust as well as funding from the National Lottery to grow our online service.

Development of downloadable resources to inform and assist the adults who are working with our children and young people.

- What to say to your children now you have a diagnosis
- Hope Support Services Education Pack

We provided consultancy for a long-running storyline featured in BBC's Eastenders and also for an episode of CBBC's Operation Ouch.

Our Youth Action Team Choir sang at the annual 'Light Up a Life' Service in Hereford Cathedral, an event which was live streamed to hundreds of people in Herefordshire and beyond.

The Hope App was launched to the general public signposting young people to other online support offered by Hope Support Services.

Continued provision of regular sessions was delivered by the frontline team to young people across Herefordshire, with this year being all been about getting things back up and running and building back after Covid

- Provided 96 face-to-face group sessions across Herefordshire.
- 149 young people across Herefordshire accessed our services with a 67% increase in 1-1 sessions and an 11% increase in self-referrals.
- Expansion of the staffing team to include a youth social action role.
- Continued delivery of the children and young person's support service at St Michael's Hospice.

Both the Youth Management Team and Advisory Team continue to thrive, with five new members recruited. The Youth Management Team ran a successful 'Away Day' for Staff and Trustees, enabling all invested parties to come together and agree upon a shared vision for Hope Support Services going forward. They are also pioneering a Hospice Child-Friendly Project at St Michael's Hospice, Hereford.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Summary

Covid has continued to affect our services and ability to raise funds. However, we have been successful in securing sufficient funds to continue the valuable work that Hope undertakes and remain enormously grateful to all who have shown faith in us and what we are seeking to do and whom, through grants, donations or fundraising have enabled us to continue our work this year.

Due to the post-pandemic economic climate, which continued to limit fundraising opportunities, even though we were once again able to offer face-to-face services to children and young people, we saw a financial outcome for the period with a net loss of £44,514, with very limited unrestricted working capital at the end of the financial year. Significant energy is being focused on submitting funding applications to counter this deficit without accessing investment funds which stand at £108,472.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 June 2022

Funding Sources

Apart from fundralsing income, the principal funding sources for the charity are by way of grants and donations. During the year, we received funding from various grant funders, as well individual donations and support. Our largest funder was the National Lottery Community Fund for both our Hope in Herefordshire and online projects, with money secured from many other charitable trusts such as the Alan & Dorothy Brailsford Charitable Trust this has helped cover both project and core costs.

Reserves Policy

The trustees continue to maintain the reserves policy. Our investment is managed cautiously, in ethical and socially responsible funds. This investment represents around six months reserves. The trustees will continue to have unrestricted reserves to ensure as far as possible that the work of the charity can continue and vital costs can be met, should the economic situation change in future financial years or new opportunities arise.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Aims and Objectives for the Future:

- Development of Board to best use skills and expertise available and access additional expertise with the intent of maintaining robust governance which allows for the potential growth of Hope Support Services.
- Safeguard the economic sustainability of the charity through the development of a finance strategy focusing on non-restricted and sustainable income streams.
- Strategic approach to raising awareness of Hope Support Services within Herefordshire and the surrounding counties with an aim to introducing a membership base

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Hope's Children and Young Peoples Support Services (Hope Support Services) is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity. It is governed by its Articles of Association dated 22nd February 2010 (revised 17th December 2020). In the event of the company being wound up directors are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. All trustees gave their time voluntarily and received no benefits from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in the Financial Statements. Due to the nature of the work of the charity, there is a mix of business, educational and medical expertise within the board of trustees.

The trustees are familiar with the work of the charity, some having been involved since the early inception. New trustees are appointed by the existing trustees and are briefed on the objectives and work of the charity and provided with information and full supporting documentation including information on the statutory responsibilities of trustees. The trustees work with the CEO on a strategic level. The CEO has responsibility for the management of the charity.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 25% on cost
App - 25% on cost
Computer equipment - 25% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The Statement of Financial Activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.
