Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Welsh Women's Aid is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association and was incorporated in January 2011. Welsh Women's Aid was registered as a charity in March 2011.

As a registered charity and a Company Limited by Guarantee, Welsh Women's Aid is required to report annually to both the Charity Commission and Companies House. In the event of the organisation winding up, its members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1. Welsh Women's Aid's current governing document was updated in December 2013.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The Directors of the company are also the charity trustees.

All Trustees are recruited in line with Welsh Women's Aid Trustee Recruitment and Selection Policy and procedural framework. The Board is able to decide how many vacancies there are subject to the maximum of twelve persons and minimum of three persons. At least four Trustees should be recruited from Welsh Women's Aid membership of specialist services.

All Trustees are appointed for the skills and experience that they bring and their ability to assist Welsh Women's Aid in meeting its charitable objects. Candidates for all Trustee positions are interviewed, references are sought, and the recruitment panel recommendations are agreed by the Board. Trustees are confirmed at the AGM.

All terms of office are for a period of 3 years. Trustees who serve a three-year term are eligible for reappointment for one additional term.

Trustees have the power to co-opt additional board members, who must retire at the next AGM but may stand for re-election as a Trustee. When considering co-opting members, the Board has regard to the requirement for any specialist skills and knowledge, such as fundraising/funding, HR, understanding of domestic abuse and other forms of violence against women, children and young people.

In 2019/20 a recruitment process to replace trustees stepping down at the end of their term resulted in 5 new trustees joining the board.

Board of Trustees induction and training

All new Trustees are provided with Welsh Women's Aid's Memorandum and Articles, Governance Policy which sets out their roles and responsibilities, a copy of 'The Essential Trustee' provided by the Charity Commission, and are invited to discuss any queries with the Chair.

New members of the Board undergo a comprehensive induction programme to brief them on the work of Welsh Women's Aid, the history of the women's aid movement, their legal obligations as Trustees, the Board's decision making processes, the functioning and structure of services, the business plan and recent financial performance. During induction, new Trustees meet key employees and other Trustees. The Board is encouraged to participate in internal and external training events which will further their skills and knowledge in undertaking their roles. A skills audit is undertaken every two years to ensure that the Board has the right mix of skills and experience and the information to determine whether they need to recruit appropriately skilled external members.

Risk Management

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A review of the organisation is undertaken annually, and to inform this process a risk assessment is undertaken by the Board, which identifies threats to the organisation. Systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

The Governance Sub-Group, Finance and Fundraising Sub-Group and HR and Employment Sub-Group assist the decision making process by exploring risks and options in detail and, where appropriate, making recommendations to the Board. The Governance Sub-Group maintains oversight of the risk management process. Sub-Groups do not have decision making powers; they are a recommending body only.

Internal controls are made more robust by the existence of procedures for the authorisation of all transactions. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with the Health and Safety of staff, Trustees, volunteers, clients and visitors to the organisation. These controls and procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

A key element in the management of financial risk is the setting of a reserves policy and its regular review by the Board. All significant new initiatives, major commitments and investment projects are subject to formal approval by the Board.

During 2019/20 3 critical strategic risks were identified and addressed during the year. These included actions to mitigate risks associated with replacement of outdated IT infrastructure; implications on specialist services and survivors of abuse of leaving the EU; and addressing the impact of covid-19 pandemic which started in March 2020. Activities to mitigate the risks identified due to the covid-19 pandemic and lockdown restrictions on survivors continues into 20/21 and is subject to significant funding and service delivery impact. We continue to work with services, key stakeholders and funders to address the increase in demand access to specialist services.

Organisational Structure and Management

Welsh Women's Aid has a Board which meets quarterly and is responsible for the strategic direction and governance of the charity. There are three sub-committees that explore strategic options and key operational issues referred to them and make recommendations to the Board, which greatly enhances the decision making process. In 2019-20 these sub-committees focussed on Governance and Risk Management, Finance and Fundraising, HR and Employment.

The responsibility for the day to day management and delivery of services to meet the charity's objects is delegated to the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and Senior Management Team (SMT).

The SMT shares the responsibility for reporting to the Board with the CEO, in relation to the management and implementation of the organisation's strategy, its priorities, progress reports on its operational plan and its financial position. Each member of the SMT is responsible for elements of the Strategic Delivery Plan.

Welsh Women's Aid staff remuneration is aligned to the NJC pay scales based on the evaluation of appointed roles. Application of cost of living pay increases are subject to funding and approval by trustees.

In 2019/20 Welsh Women's Aid applied for Trusted Charity status as Level 2 (previously known as PQASSO Quality Mark at Level 2). This is a nationally recognised award that offers both users and funders/commissioners external verification of the quality and credibility of an organisation. Notification of a successful award was received in April 2020.

Following a strategic review of the organisation with members, staff, trustees and stakeholders in 2018, the trustees decided to transfer the direct services delivered in Colwyn Bay and Wrexham to another charity. The voluntary transfer took place in April 2019.

Objectives and activities

Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

The Welsh Women's Aid charitable objects are for the benefit of the community:

To promote the relief of distress and suffering experienced by, in particular but not exclusively, any women or her children from differing social groups who have or are experiencing domestic abuse and all other forms of 'violence against women', including the wider social and economic impacts.

Welsh Women's Aid is a national violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence membership organisation, with over 40 years of experience in campaigning, shaping and influencing policy to be prioritised by government. Welsh Women's Aid represents and supports a federation of local independent charities delivering specialist violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence against women prevention services in Wales, as part of a UK network of provision. Welsh Women's Aid works to achieve improvements in national policy and practice for the benefit of members of the women's aid movement and others working in this area, and most importantly, their primary service users: women, children and young people experiencing domestic abuse, sexual violence and other forms of violence against women.

Our 5 Year Strategy 2019-24 which sets out our vision, mission, values and planned activities in more detail is available on our website.

Our Vision: A world in which women and children live free from domestic abuse, sexual violence and all forms of violence against women, and by doing so achieve independence, freedom and liberation from oppression.

Our Values: We are feminist and value diversity of lived experiences

We promote integrity: We are accountable, and place survivors' voices and their lived experiences central to our work. We encourage respect, transparency and learning from experience, we challenge misuse of power and promote social responsibility in all we do.

We collaborate: We work with survivors, specialist services, other organisations, individuals and communities, to capacity-build services and to evidence and deliver what works in preventing violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence.

We empower: We advocate a rights-based approach so that all women and children can achieve their full potential, and we promote services led by and for women/minoritised groups as being vital to meeting needs and to achieving social, economic and political liberation from patriarchy, racism, and other oppressions.

We transform: We are committed to challenging inequalities and discrimination, to combining high-quality services with activism for social change, and building a movement that ends violence against women and girls and liberates women and girls from multiple and intersecting oppressions to benefit everyone.

Objectives and Priorities in 2019/20

Preventing violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence from happening in the first place:

We are committed to primary prevention, which involves education to change attitudes and perceptions, to prevent abuse from happening in the first place. It can be targeted universally or at specific groups, such as children or members of a particular community. Prevention work requires a commitment to challenging and changing the social and cultural norms, systems and structures that perpetuate abuse, harms and inequalities. Prevention work also needs to address the fact that violence against women and girls is structural and one of the social mechanisms that forces the subordination of women and girls in society. For this reason, working to further women's and girls' liberation, to challenge and dismantle gendered social norms and expectations, and to dismantle the patriarchy and other systems of oppression is a key means of achieving its prevention.

Ensuring provision of quality services for survivors that build on strengths, meet needs and reduce the harmful effects of abuse over time:

We are committed to providing excellent member services and support which helps specialist services deliver quality provision, as centres of excellence in their communities. Effective provision is dependent on identifying as early as possible those who are likely to experience abuse, and to provide high quality resources and support to prevent further abuse and reduce its impact ("secondary prevention"). Effective provision is also dependent on providing longer term support and advocacy to reduce the trauma and harm caused by more prolonged exposure to violence and abuse, which is often cumulative for women and girls ("tertiary prevention").

Creating effective partnerships with survivors, specialist services and others to strengthen our movement to achieve change that lasts:

We are committed to amplifying the diverse experiences of survivors and to developing and collaborating in partnership in a way that upholds our values and demonstrates mutual respect, transparency, honesty and integrity, which underpins all our work. By focussing on collaboration to improve responses for those who experience multiple discrimination - Black and minoritised women, lesbians, disabled women, migrant women, young people, older women, trans women - we aim to improve access to support and justice for all survivors of abuse.

ENSURING OUR WORK DELIVERS OUR AIMS

All staff and Trustees are active in reviewing progress and achievements on a monthly and quarterly basis, as well as reviewing delivery against strategic objectives on an annual basis.

A robust review process helps Welsh Women's Aid to ensure aims, objectives and activities remain focused on charity objects, in accordance with charity commission guidance. The trustees set a list of key performance indicators against which progress is assessed at a strategic level against the Welsh Women's Aid strategic objectives allowing scrutiny and corrective action to be taken where necessary.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND HOW WE DELIVER PUBLIC BENEFIT

Progress and achievements in 2019/20

Welsh Women's Aid had a very successful year in 2019/20. We have successfully extended our influence in Wales, UK and internationally by engaging with local government, Welsh Government, Westminster and the European Union to talk about the importance of addressing violence against women and our approach through the Change that Lasts model. This has influenced changes in policy and the introduction of new legislation. Our standing as a leading light on violence against women has increased and we have further developed Change that Lasts, which originally related to domestic abuse only, to sexual violence and all forms of violence against women, including response to perpetrators of abuse. We continue to roll out our Ask Me Community Ambassador Scheme to North and Mid Wales. We have supported our membership with capacity building support, our roll out of National Quality Service Standards, briefings and other bespoke support and advocacy.

In March 2020 the covid-19 pandemic led to unprecedented restrictions on the public's activities including an extended period of lockdown. The impact of access to help and support for victims and survivors of violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence was curtailed and the sector has had to adapt to the conditions. Welsh Women's Aid has worked tirelessly to promote services, the plight of survivors and campaign for ringfenced funding and promotion of services. This work continues into 2020/21.

Fundraising

Welsh Women's Aid carries out its fundraising activities in accordance with our Ethical Fundraising Policy. The Policy applies to the Board of Trustees, all staff and volunteers and to all types of donation including cash, grants, donations in kind, shares, legacies, pro bono work, sponsorship, and corporate donations.

This Policy is consistent with Charity Commission guidance and that of the Fundraising Regulator and includes our procedures to carry out fundraising activities, manage donations and protect vulnerable people. As a member of the Fundraising Regulator, Welsh Women's Aid publicly uses their badge to demonstrate that we follow the standards set out in the Code of Fundraising Practice.

Fundraising activity is carried out in-house and we have no plans to engage third part professional fundraisers. Our website outlines our complaints procedure for the public and clearly explains how an individual can complain. We received 0 complaints in the 2019-20 financial year.

During 2019/20, Welsh Women's Aid received donations totalling £26,603. Funds were raised from a wide range of supporters including the Chartered Institute of Housing Cymru, individuals, community groups and local businesses. Those supporting WWA made donations and took part in fundraising activities such as the Welsh Cakes for Welsh Women's Aid campaign; the Cardiff Half Marathon and the Newport Half Marathon and various social activities and events. We were pleased to be supported by the Cardiff Lord Mayor's Charity Appeal during 2019/20, a partnership which continues into the early part of 2020/21. During 2019/20 we successfully secured funding to extend our sexual harassment campaigning work, invested in our Live Fear Free Helpline provision and increased our organisation core funding.

Data protection

In 2019/20, we continued our work to maintain the highest standard of data protection and compliance with the GDPR legislation. To that end all staff have received up to date, bespoke GDPR training, guidance and information on data WWA protection procedures. Further to this we have supported members with their work to ensure that their data protection procedures are also compliant by providing advice, guidance and templates.

Work on our records management system has also allowed-Welsh Women's Aid to produce an online donations collector, reducing the volume of data held on supporters, allowing them to review data privacy notices and provide informed consent on how their data is used.

Preventing violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence from happening in the first place

Website and Social Media:

Over the financial year WWA has produced 12 infographics raising awareness of VAWDASV, promoting the Live Fear Free Helpline and highlighting specific forms of VAWDASV and concerns of survivors and specialist services. This included infographics promoting engagement with our events on sexual violence, business responsibility to respond to VAWDASV and our national conference. Aside from the targeted awareness raising via social media, Welsh Women's Aid also saw increases in its website and social media platforms:

Increased focus on online and social media engagement in 1029/20 led to an increase of 11.79% of new users accessing the website with social media traffic as the source for 11.60% of users. Across all social media platforms WWA increased its followers/likes by 34%. Subscribers to our newsletters increased by 12% in 2019/20.

Events:

This year, Welsh Women's Aid has organised numerous events, including the We Believe Her sexual violence awareness seminar; a VAWDASV Business breakfast; and seminar for journalists on media reporting of VAWDASV. Events outlined the importance of workplace policies, training, specialist services and guidance for service commissioners. Resources: Toolkits and resources produced in the year included the VAWDASV Health Toolkit which includes 8 different briefings/ papers including a paper on healthcare approaches to prevent VAWDASV. Since the covid-19 pandemic we have developed a 3-pronged communications and campaigns plan aimed at:

- Promoting the Live Free Fear Helpline and local support services.
- Bystander action and support
- Survivor safety and self-care information

Ambassadors:

This year we worked with Sian Harries to promote WWA work at the UK's/Wales' prestigious comedy festival held annually in mid Wales, and several comedians raised awareness of our work/the Helpline as part of their shows. All ambassadors have been invited to speak at our events (Jocelyn Davies at Cheques and Balances seminar, Rachel Williams at Cross Party Group on the family justice system) and we also have liaised with Rachel Williams on joint press work around the DA Bill and coercive control and Sian Harries to promote WWA's work at the UK's/Wales's Machynlleth Comedy Festival.

Our ambassador Sian Harries provided a social media video for our covid-19 Live Fear Free promotion campaign as well as helping us link to other high profile supporters.

At the end of 2019/20 our first Ambassador for children and young people, Rachel Williams, sadly stepped down after 6 years of acting as a WWA ambassador. This was in order to concentrate her time on the set up of her own organisation, Stand Up To Domestic Abuse (SUTDA). However, we were also able to recruit a new ambassador in 2019/20. To announce the recruitment of cook, food writer and presenter, Beca Lyne-Pirkis's, we produced a press release and produced a series of social media posts to align to the Welsh Cakes for Welsh Women's Aid campaign.

Change that Lasts: Ask Me Community Ambassadors:

The 'Ask Me' scheme aims to improve the community's response to survivors of abuse by training members of the community to become "ambassadors". This year we trained a total of 170 ambassadors across Wales. Not only did ambassadors support and signpost survivors, concerned others and perpetrators to seek help and services, but they were also involved in other key community work. For example, ambassadors have engaged with health and police services, including providing Live Fear Free resources. This was in addition to raising awareness with friends and colleagues at work. Ask Me Ambassadors were involved in a variety of fundraising activities. One ambassador ran the Cardiff half marathon on behalf of Welsh Women's Aid; while another arranged for a significant sum (approximately £17,000) to go to women's services across Wales; and one recently held an online relay to raise money for Cardiff Women's Aid.

Their work has been incredibly important and has already shown valuable benefits to the communities they represent.

Ensuring provision of quality services for survivors that build on strengths, meet needs and reduce the harmful effects of abuse over time

Influencing the National Agenda:

In 2019/20 WWA responded to 100% of VAWDASV relevant consultations. Priority was given to those consultations where influence from survivors and services were most required.

The Domestic Abuse Bill was re-introduced post general election with the first reading taking place on 3rd March 2020. WWA have collaborated with sister organisations in England to respond to the reintroduction of the DA Bill and provide supporting evidence for the first reading. We have informed a joint briefing from the sector outlining the priorities of the bill, reviewed and informed amendments on family courts and provided guidance to the Victims Commissioner on a new offence regarding strangulation. We continue to work alongside EVAW, Rape Crisis and Imkaan. Welsh Women's Aid has continued to support the Welsh Government VAWDASV communications meetings and provide feedback on the latest campaign concepts.

We have provided media responses to BBC Wales, ITV, Wales Online, the Guardian and local newspapers in both Welsh and English. Topics covered_include promotion of the Live Fear Free Helpline, disclosures by survivors and covid-19.

During the final weeks of March blogs on self-care and safety for survivors were produced that supported children and young people and we developed an information page with all relevant guidance and advice for the sector and survivors related to VAWDASV. We produced a public statement on the use of Hotels and B&Bs to inform government and media discussions.

Since the covid-19 pandemic we have produced two briefings for Welsh Government regarding the initial impact assessment of covid-19 on survivors and specialist services outlining clear solutions to mitigate the impact and enable services to maintain and increase support. These were informed by direct consultation with specialist services. We have also written to the First Minister, key portfolio ministers, PCCs and WLGA to outline the focus needed from all stakeholders and to offer to work with them to maintain and increase provision. We have worked closely with the Welsh Government covid-19 strategic VAWDASV Team to advise on the government's response and approach to covid-19 during lockdown.

Provided expertise on VAWDASV to commissioners:

During 2019/20, WWA held a seminar for commissioners with presentations and workshops on various subjects including: commissioning trauma-informed services and the Change that Lasts model; regional commissioning; commissioning services for LGBT survivors; and survivors with No Recourse to Public Funds.

WWA has promoted the opportunities with commissioners to adopt the Change that Lasts model across Wales having piloted the full model with specialist services in collaboration Respect in Cardiff. Continuation funding has been secured to continue the project in 2020/21.

The commissioning briefing (as a part of the Lloyds toolkit) was shared with the Supporting People network in addition to the circulation of the Toolkit using our Newsletter, and correspondence with commissioners throughout the year.

National Quality Service Standards:

NQSS Quality Mark scheme continues to be monitored and assessed across Wales to help specialist services evidence their quality and promote consistent delivery of high quality, needs led, strength based, gender responsive services. Throughout the year members have been completing assessments including first time assessments, mid-term reviews and re-assessments. All members with a conditional pass have been provided with capacity support to work towards a full pass. Members receive support throughout the standards cycle, rather than just at the points where they are working towards recommendations. They are supported to achieve the quality mark and maintain the standards.

83% of services are engaged in the NQSS Quality Mark (15 out of the eligible 18 services). In addition, we produced an enhanced external assessment toolkit and provided expert training to the pool of external assessors on the enhanced assessment process.

Children Matter:

Our Children Matter report was published this year. The report provides the gap analysis in provision of services for children and young people in Wales, and produced a model of delivery with proposed costings and funding model. The report can be found on our website. This information was presented at the children and young people's conference in November. We established regional children and young people worker meetings to focus on regularly updating on collective experiences and needs of workers and children and young people in their services to share expertise and practice.

This year Welsh Women's Aid trained 96 professionals from 22 organisations within our STAR suite of services. The professionals trained in 2019/20 are delivering STAR preventative programmes within Youth Justice settings, and our member groups are delivering recovery STAR programmes. In order to expand upon the work of STAR, a webinar was developed and delivered for VAWDASV specialists on supporting mothers and babies from a specialist domestic abuse and sexual violence perspective.

Live Fear Free Helpline:

The Live Fear Free Helpline is funded predominantly by the Welsh Government and delivered by Welsh Women's Aid having delivered the helpline in Wales for the last 15 years. The helpline managed 32,270 contacts during 2019/20 in comparison to 31,981 in the previous year. The strike rate (rate of incoming calls answered within 30 seconds) for the year was 97%.

The Helpline also undertook 7,281 outgoing calls, ranging from calls to agencies, passing messages on to domestic abuse services, survivors participating in-the-Holding services and Ambulance referral pathways etc. This would take the total number of incoming and outgoing contacts managed by the Helpline to 39,226. 17,804 individuals received help and support from the service in 2019/20 (through calls, call-backs, emails, texts and webchats).

302 service users provided feedback to the helpline over the course of the year. The percentage of service users reporting referrals to appropriate support services was 100%; and the percentage of service users reporting they have accessed information and advice (either by telephone or website) was also 100%.

Direct Domestic Abuse Services:

The Colwyn Bay and Wrexham domestic abuse services were successfully transferred to Domestic Abuse Safety Unit (North Wales) in April 2019. Ongoing support continues as part of our federation of specialist member services.

Creating effective partnerships with survivors, specialist services and others to strengthen our movement to achieve change that lasts

National Training Partnership:

Our National Training Partnership involves representatives from the specialist VAWDASV sector in Wales to deliver training contracts in Wales. We continue to promote this national service as being the only Wales-based accredited provider of Domestic Abuse Matters training for the criminal justice system in Wales, which accompanies our specialist training for the CJS on working with perpetrators, on coercive controlling behaviour and on other aspects of VAWDASV.

In total, 805 professionals were trained including QCF, Sexual Harassment, Violence and abuse training, Trusted Professional, DA Awareness, Bystander Awareness, STAR 7-11 and 14-25, and Offender Management. In addition, we also provided training for 145 practitioners in Group 2 & 3 of the Welsh Government National Training Framework for VAWDASV.

Survivor Participation:

Throughout the year, we continued to engage with survivors through our National Survivor Participation Project SEEdS project. Three survivors from our project were supported to speak at our National conference and our journalist seminar and one at the Business Breakfast. SEEdS also attended our We Believe Her event. We continue to facilitate an online forum of 90+ survivors and promoting on our website and at events. This forum enables survivors to be informed of policy and service developments, opportunities to engage and attend events.

Achievements and performance (continued)

During 2019/20 we have developed the national survivor engagement framework. The survivor engagement framework covers all aspects of survivor engagement across our federation and how this will support survivor engagement with national and local government decision makers and other stakeholders. This will now be implemented in the coming year.

Further to this we supported our established SEEdS group to transition to an independent group following the end of the programme in March 2020. At the end of the project there was a total of 18 SEEdS members. We will provide ongoing support for the group as a self-governing collection of VAWDASV experts.

Welsh Women's Aid Federation:

We have continued to work collaboratively in partnership with our members and the wider VAWDASV third sector. In 2019/20 a total of 10 regional meetings were held to share practice, develop joint working relationships and support the engagement with regional commissioners. A funding task and finish group which involved members inputting around the Welsh Government sustainable funding agenda was created during the year.

Welsh Women's Aid held a focus group with sexual violence survivors exploited though prostitution. This was organised in partnership with one of our members who deliver the service. As a result of this work, we produced a list of recommendations for policy makers and service providers and a position paper outlining key priorities to address prostitution and sexual exploitation under VAWDASV.

As a result of the covid-19 pandemic our engagement and support to our membership increased significantly in March 2020 with a continued level of enhanced support into 2020/21.

VAWDASV partnership work:

In partnership with VAWG organisations across the UK, we wrote to the Prime Minister and informed a joint sector briefing outlining covid-19 impacts and the need for coordination and support across non-devolved areas aligning with the Welsh context. We have provided representation for the Welsh specialist sector at meetings led by DA Commissioner, VAWG sector coalition meetings, and National Policing Domestic Abuse advisory meetings, led by the College of Policing.

In 2019/20, we focused on giving a voice to the sector in communicating their needs to the UK and Welsh Government as well as other public and third sector bodies such as Community Housing Cymru. We continued to partner with Cymorth Cymru and CIH Cymru to inform the Welsh Government budget to ensure that it appropriately resources commissioners to enable adequate housing related support to all survivors.

Achievements and performance (continued)

This year WWA collaborated with WEN Wales, Disability Wales, Shelter Cymru, Chwarae Teg' and others to jointly advocate for VAWDASV prevention and address intersecting/multiple disadvantage. We provided workshops on sexual harassment; inputting into the Gender Equality Review; promoting joint briefings and reports to meet the needs of disabled survivors, and housing needs of sexual violence survivors.

We continue work with PCCs; specialist services that support women in the CJS; Wales Women in the CJS Board; and the IOM Cymru Women's Pathfinder Programme, to ensure members are supported to meet the needs of women and girls in the criminal justice system who have experienced abuse. We are supporting members to maximise their support for women involved in the CJS and we have been engaging with Clinks and took part in follow up work to their joint Women in the Criminal Justice System Summit in Q3.

In addition, WWA sustained our partnership with Wales Arts Review, providing a piece for St Dwynwen's day linking her history as a survivor of forced marriage and rape and her message of love to the promotion of healthy relationship education and prevention of VAWDASV today.

National Data Gathering and Reporting:

This year WWA has engaged with members to update and improve the data collection method for gathering information on demand for services in Wales. The methodology, return and timeliness of data submissions has improved, so that Welsh statistics are more reliable and robust.

Data gathered by specialist services in Wales is collated and analysed to inform the Welsh Government to assist with the development of national strategy and national outcome measures. The information was also used to inform regional plans, needs assessments, national and international campaigns and research.

Support was also provided for members with specific data analysis requests to enable their funding applications to be more robust and to improve reports to funders on outcomes and the impact of the services they provide.

The Wales Audit Office Report: Progress in implementing the Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Act identified the Welsh Women's Aid data as "one of the best sources of Welsh specific information on demand for domestic abuse and violence services".

Financial review

In 2019/20 the organisation had an in year deficit of £115,762 arising from the costs of transferring our direct services in Colwyn Bay and Wrexham to a local specialist VAWDASV provider. The services remain in the Welsh Women's Aid Federation as they are now being run by a member organisation in North Wales. As a result, restricted funds decreased by £103,563. As at 31 March 2020 the charity reported retained funds of £957,547. Represented by; £560,626 of unrestricted funds and £396,921 of restricted funds.

The majority of the organisation's income is grant funded and we recognise the need to build a suitable level of reserves to meet the needs of the charity. We have a Reserves Policy which assesses the level of unrestricted reserves required to meet costs of closure, foreseeable exceptional expenditure and temporary reductions in funding. The current level of unrestricted reserves are adequate to meet the Reserves Policy.

The Welsh Government is the principal funder providing 59% of the charity's income for continuing operations. The remaining income is from a variety of sources including donations, member subscriptions, foundations and other public sector bodies.

The continuing and discontinued operations are stated separately throughout the report for transparency.

Plans for future periods

2020/21 will be the second year of our 5 Year Strategy delivery. We will continue with our work to promote the social and cultural change needed to end violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence, that unites us with our funders, supporters, and the communities we serve. Our national federation has a shared vision, value-base and approach, and investment into a federated structure provides the combined impact of individual charities with the benefit of collective impact, resilience and strength as a movement. Together, we provide a strong, well-developed and cohesive programme of local, regional and national work that benefits survivors and creates a safer, healthier, more equal and violence- free future for everyone.

Our Strategy and delivery align with the Well-being of Future Generations framework in Wales by adopting a long-term approach that focuses on prevention, prioritising collaboration and integration, and centring the involvement of survivors, members, services and stakeholders

In 2020/21 our work will continue to focus on our strategic priorities:

- Preventing violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence from happening in the first place
- Ensuring provision of quality services for survivors that build on strengths, meet needs and reduce the harmful effects of abuse over time
- Creating effective partnerships with survivors, specialist services and others to strengthen our movement to achieve change that lasts

Our priorities for 2020/21 will be to ensure:

That violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence remains a top priority for government during and following the covid-19 pandemic regardless of the risks of economic downturn and future surges in demand and spikes in the prevalence of covid-19.

Internally, we will also work to ensure our overall efficiency and effectiveness is improved, we lead on evidence-based services, our capacity, fundraising and supporter base is increased, we enhance and improve delivery and impact of direct services, and strengthen our internal and external communications.

This will include, for example, providing member services with bespoke support and making sure that survivors get the help and support they need, through providing training, guidance and toolkits, that support professionals to provide effective and appropriate responses to survivors; and using our influence and networks to ensure survivors voices are heard and remain at the centre of any existing or developing interventions.

We will continue to support implementation of the Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Act including the refresh of the Welsh Government VAWDASV Strategy and development of a sustainable funding model for Wales.

We will continue to campaign for a strong and effective Domestic Violence Bill with our sister federations in the UK and that the risks related to leaving the EU are mitigated.

We will continue to advocate to ensure Wales' strategy, legislation and international convention requirements are delivered. We will be ensuring that the diverse interests and experiences of our member services and of survivors remain at the centre of any approach to improve practice and prevent violence and abuse to ensure that no woman is left behind.

We will review our 5 Year Strategy to ensure that it remains current and relevant in the post covid-19 environment and continue to develop our services in response to the pandemic including our increased social media presence, online training delivery, enhanced survivor—and community engagement and increased capacity building for our members.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 March 2020

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Pendragon House, Caxton Place, Cardiff, CF23 8XE.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them.

Any proposed transfer between funds would be considered on the particular circumstances.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the
 contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual
 requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case
 it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Freehold Property

- 2% p.a. Reducing balance basis

Equipment

- 25% p.a. Reducing balance basis

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

4. Limited by guarantee

The charity is incorporated under the Companies Act 2006 and is limited by guarantee, each member having undertaken to contribute such amounts not exceeding one pound as may be required in the event of the company being wound up whilst he or she is still a member or within one year thereafter.

There are 21 members of the company (2019: 22).
