# Report of the trustees for the year ended 30 April 2017

The Trustees present their report along with the financial statements of the Foundation for the period ended 30 April 2017. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 8 of the accounts and comply with the constitution of the Charities Act 2011 and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015).

### **Future development**

On 1 May 2017, Olswang LLP participated in a three way merger with CMS Cameron McKenna LLP, Nabarro LLP and Olswang LLP to form a new entity, CMS Cameron McKenna Nabarro Olswang LLP. This merger may affect the future structure, governance and management of the Foundation going forward.

### Structure, governance, management and Trustees

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 21 January 2011 and registered as a charity on 23 March 2012 under registration number 1146554. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

The directors of the company are also the charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as the Board of Trustees who are responsible for the governance of the Foundation. Unless as otherwise stated the following directors served during the period and to date of this report:

Mark Devereux was a member of Olswang LLP during the period. All directors give their time voluntarily and received no benefits from the charity.

The trustees are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. The trustees meet regularly throughout the period to consider charitable nominations, fund raising requirements and activities, grants to be made as appropriate and overall risk management policies and performance. The day to day administration is delegated to support staff. The trustees look to recruit new candidates by reference to the medium to long term needs and expertise required, bearing in mind: the skills and experience of the existing trustees; the direction of the Olswang Foundation; the voluntary nature of all those who work for it; the connection with CMS Cameron McKenna Nabarro Olswang LLP; and the need for independence from CMS Cameron McKenna Nabarro Olswang LLP.

### Risk management

The trustees have a risk management strategy which comprises:

- an annual review of the risks the charity may face;
- the establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified in the plan; and
- the implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the charity should those risks materialise.

This work has identified only a few minor risks and the Trustees have put in place the necessary procedures to manage them.

### Objectives and activities for the public benefit

The charity's purpose, as set out in the objects contained in the Memorandum and Articles of Association, is to support appropriate and relevant charitable purposes which benefit the community. The charity has in the period under review worked closely with Olswang LLP, a firm of International Solicitors based in London.

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we have achieved and the outcomes of our previous experiences in terms of success and benefits of specific activities. The review also helps us to ensure that our objectives remain focused on our stated purpose and are deliverable.

We confirm that we have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

### **Grant making policy**

In exercising their absolute discretion in making grants, the Trustees of the Olswang Foundation have given regard to the values and recommendations of Olswang LLP and make grants to organisations that:

- have a clear mission and sustainable objectives;
- use funds efficiently and effectively;
- are registered with the UK Charity Commission or equivalent regulatory body in their country of formation
  or incorporation; or an organisation engaged solely in providing educational services; or a social
  enterprise or other similar not for profit organisation providing facilities or amenities and/or providing
  services benefitting the community in the area of environment, health, sport and/or medical research; and
- · are not affiliated to a particular political party or religious belief.

Nominations for charitable organisations to support have generally been elicited by informal means and included input from the charity committee of Olswang LLP.

### Achievements and performance for the public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Foundation's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. Principal funding sources include fundraising events from the staff and partners of Olswang LLP and donations from clients of Olswang LLP. Olswang LLP also provided pro bono financial, administrative and legal support.

In the year ending 30 April 2017, donations amounting to £10,000 were made to Alzheimer's Research UK. Alzheimer's Research UK was The Olswang Foundation's principal beneficiary for the year beginning 1 May 2016 until 30 April 2017. Alzheimer's Research UK is the UK's leading dementia research charity. Prior to this the principal beneficiary of The Olswang Foundation was Carers Trust for two years from 1 May 2014 to 30 April 2016. In the year donations of £23,434 (2016: £50,000) were made to the Trust. Carers Trust is a major new UK charity for, with and about carers. Other significant donations include: Brent Centre for Young people, Court Based Personal Support Unit (PSU), Holborn Community Centre, West Hampstead Women's Centre, WAC Arts, The Access Project (an educational charity that links businesses with schools to provide one-to-one academic tuition to students in disadvantaged areas), MIND, Nature, Restart Project, Ridgeline Trust, Shooting Star Chase, Prison Reform Trust (an independent UK charity working to create a just, humane and effective penal system), and the Royal Free Charity (a charity that provides resources which directly improve the patient and staff experience and funds pioneering research). In addition, certain other beneficiaries were selected by the trustees to receive grants and donations for smaller sums. Totals in the year are reported in Note 6 on page 10.

The Board of Trustees will continually review the Foundation's activities and opportunities available to the Foundation.

#### Financial review

The charity was able to raise valuable funds in the period of operation with the support of an enthusiastic volunteer base. Donations revenue of £91,309 (2016: £237,012) was received in that period. The closing balance of the unrestricted funds in that period was £117,241 (2016: £166,380).

Where possible and subject to the desire to moderately increase reserves, it is the Trustees' intention that each year all donations received by the charity are paid out either during the same year or shortly thereafter.

### Investment policy and performance

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to invest in any way the trustees wish. Donations received are placed in an interest bearing current account until grants are made. The investment policy of the charity is to ensure that most of the charity's funds are spent in the short-term and there are no reserves retained for long-term investment.

#### **Reserves Policy**

The Trustees aim to keep reserves at a level to ensure that most of the income generated is distributed. The minimum limit of £10,000 is deemed to be appropriate but this varies on timing of decisions over grant payments. The difference between the minimum limit of reserves of £10,000 and the actual funds level of over £100k are due to the mentioned timing difference, the trustees plan to pay these grants in the coming years. Furthermore, as the Foundation operates on minimal overheads with many services and facilities provided in the period under review by Olswang LLP for no fee, there is no requirement to hold reserves to meet fixed costs and the same situation is anticipated to apply going forward with services and facilities being provided by CMS Cameron McKenna Nabarro Olswang LLP.

### Plans for the future for the public benefit

The trustees plan to encourage more fundraising activities in the coming year to boost funds available for charitable donations.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that show and explain the Foundation's transactions, disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Foundation and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006.

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Foundation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF OLSWANG FOUNDATION LIMITED

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. # Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2017

### 1 Accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Accounting and reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP (FRS102)), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) and the Companies Act 2006.

The foundation constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102 and the trustees consider it to be a going concern.

Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS102 and the Charities SORP 2015 a restatement of comparative items was needed. No restatements were required.

### Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:

- Unrestricted general funds these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees.
- Restricted funds these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the
  objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for
  particular restricted purposes.

#### **Donations**

Income from donations is included in unrestricted incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows:

- When donors specify that donations given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
- When donors specify that donations are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to preconditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable.

### Gift Aid

Tax credits received from gift aid donations are recognised in the period in which the claim is made.

### Expenditure

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Grants payable are recognised as expenditure in the year in which a binding commitment to make payments is entered into.

### 1 Accounting policies (continued)

Allocation of overhead and support costs

Overhead and support costs of the charity have been borne by Olswang LLP. These are not significant for inclusion in the financial statements of the charity.

#### Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities include grants made and governance costs. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. Governance costs of the charity have been borne by Olswang LLP and these are not significant for inclusion in the financial statements of the charity.

### Judgements and uncertainties

In applying the accounting policies for the split between restricted and unrestricted funds, the Foundation applies certain judgements and assumptions. These judgements and assumptions are based on historical experiences and other relevant factors. Actual results may vary and hence the estimates are reviewed constantly and any revisions required are made.

### 2 Charitable company status

The charitable company does not have a share capital and the liabilities of its members are limited to the guarantee of up to a maximum of £10 each.
