The International Curators Forum Board of Trustees are pleased to submit their report and independently examined financial statements for the period 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2021. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORPP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (FRS 102)) in preparing the report and financial statements of the charity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting policies set out in the notes to the financial statements and comply with the Charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

Reference and Administrative Information

International Curators Forum (ICF) was founded in 2007 to publicly promote the work of cultural practitioners, and to encourage and develop artistic and curatorial practice and discourse about contemporary visual art across all forms. The practices that ICF promotes span painting, sculpture, photography, film, live performance art and curation. ICF does this through commissioning new works, programming and presenting these and other artworks in exhibitions, projects and events. ICF also promotes and supports the professional development and public visibility of cultural practitioners through programmes that include public exhibitions and events, mentoring and masterclasses that aim to equip artists and curators to create and present contemporary visual art of high merit from which a diverse public can benefit. ICF is a registered charity (1189228) and an Arts Council England National Portfolio Organisation.

Objects, Aims and Principal Activities

The International Curators Forum's principal activities are to advance education and to promote the arts for public benefit. The Charity aims to achieve its objectives through the following activities while the charity's objects ('Objects') are specifically restricted to the following:

To promote the contemporary visual arts for the public benefit by:

- (a) creating events and exhibitions for the general public with a particular focus on diasporic cultures, to increase understanding and appreciation of those cultures and of contemporary visual art in all its forms; and
- (b) facilitating the innovation and diversification of curatorial and artistic practice to better present visual arts to the public, and utilising those developments to better educate and inform the public about the contemporary visual arts.

Principal charitable activities

The principal charitable activity of the International Curators Forum is in seeking to meet the above aims.

Public Benefit

The International Curators Forum carries out a wide range of activities as detailed in pursuance of its charitable aims. In setting the work programme each year the Trustees give regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and are satisfied that the Charity's activities throughout the year provided public benefit because:

- the Exhibition, Residency, Commissioning, Mentoring, Masterclasses and Professional Development programme enabled access to skills development and higher education for people from culturally diverse and disadvantaged backgrounds;
- Public Programme activities generated significant interest; all were free to the public and nearly all were recorded and made available online free of charge;
- feedback from participants, audiences and partners praised the work of the Charity.

Review of Achievements and Performance

Through our public programme we continued our commitment to transforming diversity agendas by sharing research and creative expertise among artists, academics and activists with a commitment to social change and a just society. We made our activities and work accessible to broader audiences by developing and extending the reach of our digital presence, a strand of work that we will be building on and developing further in the next year.

Our Public Programme has harnessed arts and culture as a tool for engaging the public with narratives that aim to educate and shift perspectives on race, social justice, art and activism. Between April 2020 and the end of March 2021 through several partnerships we organised or were involved in producing and creating 24 online products (all of which were new commissions), one exhibition with 3 new artwork commissions, one publication and two curatorial residencies, all of which directly supported and showcased the talents artists and curators, and reached a online audience of 8179. Through these projects we worked in partnership with cultural institutions including Tate Britain, New Art West Midlands, University of the Arts London, the Herbert Art Gallery and Museum, Harvard University, 4a Centre for Contemporary Asian Art, Campbelltown Arts Centre and Art360 Foundation. During this time we also fostered new partnerships with cultural institutions including Whitechapel Gallery, Guest Projects, the Yinka Shonibare Foundation, GAS Foundation and FCA Ghana for upcoming programming in 2021-2. We also provided 50 hours of one-to-one mentoring sessions for emerging artists and curators in our network to nurture knowledge, skills and project development.

ICF is developing and extending the reach of our digital presence by undertaking development work on our website to improve accessibility and navigation as well as the visibility of our past work through the activation of our archive, which will become a resource for students and other creative practitioners. We have appointed a new Digital Strategist & Curator who will ensure sustained activity on our website and across our social media channels, and undertake monthly audits of our online activity to ensure we can best respond to the audiences we are engaging and continue to reach new, wider audiences. Going forward we will produce a dual in-person and digital programme that will increase access to our events by making content available through livestream, video and audio recordings.

In the financial period we also continued to develop and expand our programme of commissions, mentorship, fellowships and residencies, and professional development activities. This included: curatorial residencies for Sylvia Theuri and Hope Strickland; and dedicated one-to-one mentoring for

artists and curators Kasia Sobucka, Katarzyna Perlak, Dave Lewis, Farzana Khan, Georgia Tucker, Abbas Zahedi, Farwa Moledina, Carmen Okome and Aliyah Hasinah.

The financial period also saw the research and development of two of our ambitious exhibition and commissioning projects such as:

- Diaspora Pavilion: the legacy of the Diaspora Pavilion project continues expanded with Diaspora Pavilion 2 (DP2), a multi-site professional development project that innovates by building on the 2017 Diaspora Pavilion model to reach wider UK and global audiences and test sustainable strategies for promoting UK emerging artists on national and international platforms. In 2020/2021 in response to delays created by the pandemic we adapted and redeveloped the group exhibition 'I am a heart beating in the world: Diaspora Pavilion 2, Sydney' in partnership with 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art and Campbelltown Arts Centre, and began development of a new performance commission in partnership with Whitechapel Art Gallery and Queen Mary University.
- The Caribbean in Britain: through networks, resources and development of a special anthology publication, ICF has made an invaluable contribution in this period to the development of major exhibition Life Between Islands, to be presented at Tate Britain from December 2021 to May 2022. It will be the first major museum exhibition to examine, through the visual arts, the interrelationship of Britain and the Anglophone Caribbean from Windrush to the present in social, cultural and political terms. It aims to reveal the extraordinary ways artists of Caribbean descent across generations have contributed to, decentred and reshaped the development of post-War and contemporary art in Britain.

The Covid-19 pandemic brought significant disruption to our work and planned programme. We have worked closely with our network and partners to assess the medium and long-term impact of the pandemic on ICF's plans, sustainability and fundraising efforts. Having carefully considered how ICF could contribute most effectively to the current challenges we all face - most notably Covid-19, the climate crisis and the systemic conditions fuelling the Black Lives Matter protests - in 2020 we made a strategic decision to streamline and re-focus resources on two key strands of activity:

- Delivering a dynamic digital programme to contribute to the building of a better society and culture in the aftermath of the pandemic, connecting the arts, education, culture and politics, providing dynamic and engaging content for our online audiences, and supporting members of our network who have been impacted by lockdowns. This included:
 - Blue Skies: a digital conversation series which selected 37 creative practitioners from an international open call that received over 100 proposals to undertake 14 conversations which considered the immediate and long-term impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on the arts, personal and/or public life. Participants included Khaleb Brooks, Naeem Davis, Season Butler, Françoise Vergès, Naima Hassan, Anisa Daud, 6 workers in Oxford and Nairobi, Jamila Johnson-Small, Giorgia Ohanesian Nardin, Vidisha Fadescha, Jyotsna Siddharth, Arun Vijai Mathavan, Rujunko Pugh, Marie-Therese Png, Rubiane Maia, Tom Nóbrega, Simina Neagu, Valentina Bin, Andrea Phillips, Elijah Maja, Ibrahim Cissé, Dominique White, Adam Farah, Bhavisha Panchia, Leyya Mona Tawil, Alex, Rory, Jaša Mrevlje-Pollak, Gorazd V. Mrevlje, Aidan Moesby, Claire Doherty and Jillian Mayer. All of the conversations were shared in either text, video, image or audio formats on the ICF website.

- The Global Plantation Series: initiated by art historian Anna Arabindan Kesson, this series through together 3 artists based in the UK and Australia Shiraz Bayjoo, Jasmine Togo-Brisby and Sancintya Mohini Simpson to explore the ways in which their respective bodies of work contemplate the global forms and meanings of the plantation historically and in our contemporary moment. The series included 2 live discussions presented on Zoom and Facebook live and 2 recorded conversations which were shared on the ICF website and Vimeo. All 4 conversations remain available on the ICF website and Vimeo account.
- 2. Building and developing the **network of fellows, artists and practitioners** engaging with ICF's archive and the ways it can help us to address today's issues of racial inequality and other forms of underrepresentation and disadvantage within both the various arts sectors and the wider public world.

Our Partnerships

ICF is the only organisation in the UK dedicated to supporting professional development opportunities for early- to-mid career creative practitioners from underrepresented backgrounds across our entire programme. However, we never work in isolation. Everything we do is delivered through strategic partnerships with creative practitioners and a multifaceted range of organisations including galleries, museums, universities, colleges, funders etc. NPO funding has enabled us to develop and execute the following partnerships across our 2020-21 programmes:

Events produced:

- Blue Skies: Initiated as a conversation series, Blue Skies fostered one-to-one and group
 conversations led by practitioners working across multiple disciplines on a proposed topic that
 could take into account the immediate and long-term impact of Covid-19 upon creative
 practice, personal and/or public life. This series also received funding support from Art Fund.
- Global Plantation Series: This programme is a series of artist-directed digital discussions to contemplate the global forms and meanings of the plantation historically, and in our contemporary moment.
- New Art West Midlands and Herbert Art Gallery & Museum: ICF and NAWM facilitated a curatorial fellowship for an emerging Coventry-based curator selected through an open call to develop an exhibition at the Herbert based on the cross-generational exhibition model for the Diaspora Pavilion programme. This exhibition was the curator's first major project, through which she presented the works of 6 emerging artists from the West Midlands alongside the works of established artists, as well as a comprehensive digital public programme of talks and performances. The exhibition had to close after 1 month due to the Covid-19 pandemic, but welcomed 3277 visitors between October and November 2020.

Professional development programmes in development:

- Art360 Foundation: ICF and Art360 Foundation collaborated to develop and deliver a
 fellowship for an emerging curator to conduct research into and develop a project around the
 archive of artist Aubrey Williams. The curator has since presented her research as part of a
 major online symposium hosted by the Ruskin School of Art at the University of Oxford.
- Yinka Shonibare Foundation, GAS Foundation Nigeria and Foundation for Contemporary Art Ghana: ICF was asked to be a partner for and support the development of a digital residency programme for emerging UK- and Africa-based artists.

Exhibitions in development:

- Whitechapel Gallery and Queen Mary University: A newly commissioned performance by artist Shiraz Bayjoo at Queen Mary University as part of ICF's DP2 project will be presented in partnership with Whitechapel Gallery as part of their Ways of Knowing public programme.
- 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art and Campbelltown Arts Centre: ICF and two
 partners in Sydney, Australia presented the exhibition 'I am heart beating in the world:
 Diaspora Pavilion 2' featuring the works of 6 emerging UK- and Australia-based artists.

Publishing & Knowledge Production:

• Tate Publishing: ICF is working with Tate Publishing to publish an anthology of British-Caribbean Art. This comprehensive volume brings together key writings on the interrelationship of Britain and the English-speaking Caribbean nations, focussing specifically on the art of the Caribbean diaspora in Britain from the 1920s to today. Combining classic writings with some newly commissioned contributions, it explores intersecting areas of Black- British cultural production and reflects the diversity of the Black-British experience. With contributions from a range of scholars, Liberation through Imagination is an invaluable sourcebook for those interested in the rich and diverse field of postcolonial British-Caribbean art. Contributors include: Rasheed Araeen, Coco Fusco, Paul Gilroy, Stuart Hall, Roshini Kempadoo, George Lamming, Errol Lloyd, John Lyons, Amna Malik, Courtney J. Martin, Michael McMillan, Kobena Mercer, Richard J. Powell, Elizabeth Robles, Lou Smith, Helen Sumpter, Claire Tancons, Gilane Tawadros, Jessica Taylor and Yvonne Weekes.

Principal funding sources

ICF's core and programme costs for the year 2020-21 were supported by trusts and foundations including, Outset Contemporary Art Fund, The Hutchins Center for African & African American Research at Harvard University, University of the Arts London, Art Fund and Arts Council England).

Structure, Governance and Management

The International Curators Forum is a registered charity and a limited company registered with companies house.

Governance

Responsible governance of the Charity is exercised through the Board of Trustees who are all board members ('the Board'). The Board is made up of independent lay members who are responsible for the Charity's conduct and for ensuring that it satisfies all legal and contractual obligations. The Trustees are volunteers and are not remunerated for their time.

The Charity is comprised of 5 Trustees with wide international experience in finance, senior management, academia, the arts and creative industries, broadcasting and philanthropy.

The Board is responsible for setting the Charity's strategic direction and is ultimately accountable for how effectively the Charity meets the defined aims through direct charitable activity. The Board engages an Artistic Director who runs the day to day activities and supports the Charity's strategic planning and operational activities. Trustees meet at least four times a year; financial and management reports are provided to the Board quarterly.

Trustee Investment powers

Investment powers are governed by the Trust Deed. There are no restrictions on charity's absolute powers of investment to the extent that any retained funds that arise are dealt with by depositing surpluses into the COIF Charities Deposit Fund or with authorised banks.

Trustee recruitment, induction and training

The Chair of the Trustees is nominated by the Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees has power to appoint additional Trustees as it considers fit to do so to ensure that all relevant skills and experience are represented. Under the Trust Deed every Trustee must be appointed by a resolution of the Trustees. The appointed Trustees fulfil their duties without any term limitations. Each new Trustee is given an induction in the work of the Charity and financial systems. Each new Trustee receives a copy of the Trustees Deed and any amendments made to it and a copy of charity's latest report and statement of accounts. A Trustee shall cease to hold office if he or she (1) is disqualified for acting as a Trustee by virtue of sections 178 and 179 of the Charities Act 2011 or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that provision, (2) is no longer able to fulfil duties due to medical reasons, (3) is absent without the permission of the Trustees from all their meetings held within a period of six months, (4) notifies to the Trustees a wish to resign.

In the future depending on the raising of funds ICF will want to engage a part-time freelance Coordinator to support the Charity's activities; and a fundraising consultant and event support on a freelance basis.

Currently, the core structure will remain small and, where possible, rely on freelancers to remain at low risk financially and reactive to the workload.

Financial review

The charity had a surplus on unrestricted funds, of £22,708 (2020 - £13,924) for the period. Together with the accumulated surplus brought forward from previous years, the company now has an accumulated surplus on unrestricted funds of £38,891 (2020 - £16,183). Restricted funds carried forward at 31 March 2021 amounted to £23,658 (2020 - £3,000).

Reserves policy

The charity holds free reserves for a variety of purposes. In a relatively steady operating environment such purposes would include:

- a financial buffer to cushion an unexpected fall in income in addition to the contingency contained within the charity's operating budgets;
- meeting cashflow requirements caused by delays in receipt of fee or grant income;

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The Charity undertakes periodic reviews for different areas of risk including, insurance cover; health and safety policies in the workplace; financial affairs; personnel practices; ICT technology. In relation to these matters, and apart from matters completely outside the Charity's control, the Trustees consider that the risks to which the Charity is subject have been mitigated to a satisfactory level.

The Charity closely manages its finances. A budget is approved before the beginning of the year. All expenditure is monitored against budget and authorised by the Chair and Board Members who are responsible for ensuring that the expenditure remains within agreed limits.

Plan for future periods

As part of this next phase, we have reviewed ICF's organisational budget. We have considered the impact that Covid-19 is having (and will continue to have for a long period) on funding opportunities, as well as the minimum resources needed to deliver a successful digital programme. We have prudently updated our budgets and now feel confident that we can remain ambitious, agile and realistic with our aims.

To prepare us for the future and to prepare the organisation for any new challenges facing or from our main funders such as Arts Council England's National Portfolio and the new demands of working digitally, we have appointed within this period a fundraising strategist – Julian Lomas and a Digital Strategist & Curator – Orsod Malik. Our major digital developments to ensure the organisation's resilience and innovation are supported with funding from Paul Hamlyn Foundation.

Many of the partnerships that we fostered between April 2020 and March 2021 will continue into 2021-2, including: 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art, Yinka Shonibare Foundation, Art360 Foundation, Whitechapel Gallery and Tate Britain. Since March 2021 we have fostered further new relationships with Block 336, the African Art in Venice Forum, Birmingham Open Media, Ort Gallery and the Black Curators Collective.

The above lists demonstrate ICF's dynamic approach to tackling injustice by calling on larger organisations to foster professional development opportunities for emerging practitioners and by supporting small organisations who share in our mission for diversity to empower them to challenge the systems that create barriers for their networks and communities.

Recognising the impact that the pandemic has had on small organisations reliant on project-to-project funding, we will increase the number of partnerships that we foster with small organisations to help ensure their post-Covid recovery.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Company information

International Curators Forum is a private company limited by guarantee, domiciled and incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is University of the Arts London, 272 High Holborn, London WC1V 7EY. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are desribed in the Trustees' report.

Basis of preparation of financial statements

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The effects of events relating to the year ended 31 March 2021 which occurred before the date of approval of the financial statements by the Board of Trustees has been included in the financial statements to the extent required to show a true and fair view of the state of affairs at 31 March 2021 and the results for the year ended on that date.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity.

The charity has adopted the SORP (FRS 102) in the current period. In preparing the accounts the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the charities SORP 102 a restatement of comparative items was needed. No restatements were required.

Going concern

The trustees have assessed the use of going concern and have considered possible events or conditions that might cast doubt on the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern, including the impact of Covid-19. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objects of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The cost of administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Statutory grants which are given as contributions towards the Charity's core services are treated as unrestricted.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 March 2021

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be reliably measured and it is probable that income will be received.

No amount is included in the financial statements for volunteer time in line with the SORP.

Other income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Bank interest is included when received.

Resources Expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Support costs are those that costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the charitable activities of the company and include office costs, governance costs, administrative costs and project management carried out at Headquarters. Governance costs are included in support costs and are those costs incurred in connection with compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

No judgements (apart from those involving estimates) have been made in the process of applying the above accounting policies that have had the most significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements
