TRUSTEES' REPORT

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for the year ended 31 March 2013

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Fleet Air Arm Museum CLG Limited ('Charity") is a company limited by guarantee registered with the Charity Commission and was incorporated on 18 March 2011. Its governing document is its articles of association dated 21 June 2011.

The National Museum of the Royal Navy (NMRN"), is a member of the Charity and has special membership rights as set out in the Charity's articles of association

The Trustees, as listed on page 1, are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

As stated in the Charity's articles of association (extracted below) its aim is to provide an effective and accessible repository both now and in the future for the heritage of the Fleet Air Arm and to raise public awareness of the history of the service, whilst encouraging scholarship and research into Fleet Air Arm history. These aims have been defined as relating primarily to the aircraft and personnel of the Fleet Air Arm. In consultation with the trustees of the other naval museums and NMRN, the Fleet Air Arm Museum includes in its exhibitions only those aspects of the history of the Royal Navy, the Royal Marines and of the Submarine Service as are necessary for the sake of completeness and to stimulate interest in the other museums.

The Charity's articles of association sets out the Charity's objects as follows

To educate and inspire the public and all members of the Armed Forces as to the history and current activities of the Royal Naval Air Service and the Fleet Air Arm and their contribution to Defence and in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing -

- (a) To maintain, develop and manage, for public benefit, a collection of aircraft, technical artefacts, related documents and general exhibits which relate to and record the history of British naval aviation. The collection thus created will be known as 'The Fleet Air Arm Collection' and will be predominantly related to the Royal Naval Air Service and Fleet Air Arm, but will also comprise a small proportion of material which will help to place naval aviation into the general history of aviation and of the Naval Service.
- (b) Fo make the Fleet Air Arm Collection accessible to all members of the general public and the Naval Service through but not limited to physical and electronic displays, presentations and services so as to contribute to the education, enlightenment, enjoyment and inspiration of all users of the collection and to enhance their understanding of naval, naval aviation and military history, the technologies of aviation, and their social contexts, and other matters relating to the defence of the realm, at every level
- (c) To contribute specifically presentations and activities to promote the education of children and young people under the National Curriculum
- (d) To demonstrate to members of the Naval Service and Auxiliary Services related thereto an important aspect of the history of which they are now a part and in particular, the evolution and development of naval aviation, its history, deeds and traditions so as to kindle their interest to inspire them through the traditions of the Naval Service and to foster esprit de corps in aid of military efficiency and retention. To make this history as referred to above in this Article available and accessible to members of other Services.
- (e) To provide an attractive history, display and collection which has a wide popular appeal to civilians in order to keep the Naval Service in the public eye and to act as a valuable recruiting aid to the Naval Service in general and to the Fleet Air Arm in particular and through the interpretation of the technology elements of the Fleet Air Arm Collection to those industries involved in defence and aerospace

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) for the year ended 31 March 2013

ORGANISATION

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The Charity is governed by a board of directors (referred to as "trustees") and is a registered charity within the meaning of the Charities Act 2011, which places on the trustees the responsibility for the effective management of the Charity and the stewardship and care of the collections

There are two sub-committees the Finance and General Purposes Committee which meets typically four times per year and the Audit Committee which meets usually twice per year, once of which to review the Charity's audited accounts

The Trustees delegate the day to day running of the charity to the Museum director and his staff who are supported by the efforts of volunteers in several areas of activities, notably Curatorial and Visitor Services Divisions. Around 62 people (2012 67) gave some of their time to support the Museum, contributing around 9,450 hours (2012 8,541 hours) in the year

APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

Trustees are appointed to the board in strict accordance with the guidance laid down by the Office of the Commissioner for Public Appointments. This procedure includes the obtaining of nominations from a variety of sources, including advertising and liaison with the Public Appointments Unit and the vetting of nominations by a panel. Prospective Trustees are normally interviewed by a panel of Trustees. Other than those appointed as ex-officion members of the board, Trustees are normally appointed for a period of five years, but may be reappointed for a second and final five-year term.

TRUSTEE INDUCTION AND TRAINING

New Trustees attend for at least one half day and usually more, between their appointment and attending their first Trustees' meeting, to meet other Trustees and senior staff, and to see the Museum at work. All Trustees receive copies of the Corporate Plan, the first part of which contains the key strategy and aims of the Museum, and a recent innovation has been the Trustees Information Folder which contains, amongst other documents, the Charity's articles of association

Trustees are expected to choose at least one element of the Museum's activities as their own specialism, and to visit the Museum from time to time to learn more of, and to contribute to, this area

INVESTMENT POWERS AND POLICY

Where surplus monies become available as a result of seasonal timings, these are invested in low risk deposit or money market bank accounts. As reserves are increased any surpluses will continue to be invested in low risk investments. The Museum holds an investment in a subsidiary trading company which is under the control of the trustees and Museum management and which is closely monitored by them

RESERVES POLICY

The trustees have a policy of holding sufficient reserves, excluding those held as fixed assets, to meet 6 months' expenditure

POLICY ON THE EMPLOYMENT OF DISABLED PERSONS

The Museum is committed to managing staff solely on the basis of actual performance in the job, and considering new applicants solely on the basis of their ability to do the job

CONSULTATION WITH EMPLOYEES

Senior management achieves communications with its staff through monthly management meetings, staff forum meetings and a Health and Safety Committee in addition to informal meetings and internal memoranda

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Trustees comply with the duty in the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit

SOCIAL, COMMUNITY AND ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

The Charity's museum actively engages with the public that it serves, especially through its education and public events programmes. Its admission charging policy is sensitive to social and educational needs with a range of concessionary rates. Pre-booked school groups enjoy a 50% discount.

In addition to the Society of Friends of the FAA Museum (SOFFAAM), whose membership is international the Museum has built a large team of volunteers who assist the Museum in a variety of ways. Whilst many of these volunteers are fairly local, some travel significant distances to carry out their duties. Some have recently committed themselves to an intensive training programme and passed the examination for Level 2 of the Institute of Tour Guides.

The Charity is committed to, as far as is reasonably possible, ensuring that the Museum's operations are carried out in an environmentally sensitive and sustainable manner, recycling waste materials and ensuring that contractors undertake work in a manner compatible with sustainable development

RISK MANAGEMENT

The management of risk is exercised through the Charity's senior management who review on a regular basis the Museum's principal activities and events, with associated risks. The Audit Committee, on behalf of the Trustees, receives periodic reports on the principal risks and the steps being taken to manage them effectively.

HISTORY

With the approval of the Admiralty Board, the Fleet Air Arm Museum was established in 1964 as an unincorporated trust (the "Trust). Seven acres and 11 Hangar were leased at a peppercorn rent from the Ministry of Defence which agreed to support and staff the site with a mixture of naval personnel and civil servants. Any further developments were to be the responsibility of the trustees of the Trust.

In 1974 admission charges were introduced and the trustees launched a development programme which provided capital for three new halls and the Swordfish Restaurant

Concorde arrived in 1976 and is now on loan from the Science Museum. The associated hall was purchased from the Science Museum and extended in 1989 to accommodate the VSTOL Exhibition.

Designation of the Museum under the National Heritage Act 1983 was introduced in April 1986, naval personnel were replaced by civil servants and a grant was substituted for a proportion of operating costs, salaries, goods and services

In late 1991 the contents of 11 Hangar were decanted into 12 Hangar and a refurbishment programme on the former commenced with the completion date of June 1992. The construction of additional buildings for the Carrier Exhibition Hall was completed in April 1994, with the official opening of the Carrier Exhibition, by Baroness Thatcher, on 8 July 1994.

In late 1995 work began on a submission to the Heritage Lottery Fund, which resulted in a £3 7 million grant, announced in January 1998. Physical work on the construction of a preservation store, later named the Cobham Hall, began in March 1999 and was completed in April 2000. The major refurbishment of the exhibitions within Regan Hall began in November 1999 and was completed in June 2000, under the title "Leading Edge". Both developments were officially opened by the Patron HRH the Duke of York on 10 July 2000.

Major improvements to the Carner exhibition, taking advantage of new developments in audio visual technology, were implemented in late 2002. At the same time, a major rebuild of the Modern Navy Exhibition, supported by DCC(N) and DNR was carned out, under the title of "Projecting Power". The two exhibitions were opened by the Patron HRH The Duke of York on 9 December 2002.

In connection with Royal Navy's "Fly Navy 100 programme", a major new exhibition 'The Centenary of Naval Flying" was built. The exhibition was opened by HRH Prince Philip on 8 July 2009

In 2011-12, as part of the process of creating closer links with the National Museum of the Royal Navy (NMRN"), the trustees of the Trust transferred their assets and operations to the Charity. The Charity became the Sole Corporate Trustee of the Fleet Air Arm Museum trust in 2013.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Despite the continuing recession, visitor footfall closed at 107,476, 2% up on 2011/12 and 8 6% above target. The sign of the times was that visitors were often looking to use discount deals and vouchers so that income was below expectation and the financial results overall were a little disappointing.

A curatorial review of the aircraft collection identified a number of duplicate and/or poor quality items which were subsequently approved for disposal by the Disposals Committee. The exercise was prompted due to the limited space available in Cobham Hall following the recent acquisition of a number of significant high quality aircraft. The most recent of these was an Agusta Westland Lynx which had a service record including both the Falklands and First Gulf campaigns. The first aircraft to be disposed of was a WW1 German Albatros fighter, which was sold and the money dedicated to the aircraft restoration fund.

This fund will help to pay for the reconstruction of a Fairey Barracuda aircraft from the substantial collection of wreckage which the Museum has acquired over the last 40 years. Over 2,500 Barracudas were built for the FAA but none survive. The Museum has reached an agreement with the team which has rebuilt Donald Campbell's Blue Bird speedboat, using a very high proportion of the original material, developing some innovative methods of re-using damaged components. The project is expected to take five years but the end result will be unique.

The Collection continues to grow in areas other than aircraft and the Acquisitions Committee meets monthly to deal with the flow of offers, many of which contain interesting and original material. The Museum has also continued to purchase material from auctions. A notable amount of airship material came onto the market and the Museum bought two significant small items to add to the Lighter than Air collection, a carbide lamp from R9, the RNAS's second rigid airship of 1917, and a plaque from Vickers works in Barrow in Furness, marking the building of the first airship there, Mayfly. A pair of boots belonging to C R Samson, the first naval officer to gain his pilot's certificate, and a pair of decanters given to Peter Twiss to mark his Air Speed Record of 1956 were also bought.

A major exhibition was built to mark the 30th Anniversary of the Falklands Campaign. The Museum entered into partnerships with a number of local schools and one in the Falkland Islands and their work was incorporated into the exhibition. The exhibition was opened by Rear Admiral Linley Middleton CB DSO, the Captain of HMS Hermes during the Campaign, and later the Chairman of the Museum's Trustees. It was his last public appearance before his sad and sudden death a few months later.

Two exhibitions were under construction in the latter part of the year. A "Future Carrier Gallery' will show the design and construction, and intended use, of the Queen Elizabeth-class aircraft carriers and is being built with the support of the Aircraft Carrier Alliance. 2013 is the 70th Anniversary of the turning point of the Battle of the Atlantic and a major exhibition will show the part of the FAA in this protracted and difficult campaign.

The Learning team saw an increase in the number of school parties, from 247 up to 302, but the number of students per group was significantly lower, providing 8,673 pupils gaining formal learning in the Museum—Informal learning was mostly focused on family activities in school holidays, which were generally very successful and resulted in some very satisfied visitors of all ages—A second group of volunteers also offered themselves to be trained as guides to ITG Level 2, and they were successful just after the year's end

The results shown on page 10 show a full year of trading in the year ended 31 March 2013 and eight months of trading in the year ended 31 March 2012 following the transfer of assets from Fleet Air Arm Museum, the unincorporated charity previously carrying out the Museum trade

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The year 2014 sees the beginning of four years of centenaries relating to the First World War. The Museum will be mounting a series of small displays to demonstrate the part which the RNAS played in that major conflict

The Charity intends to submit a major bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund during 2013 in order to secure a funding contribution for the construction of a new gallery and visitor centre, which will house the last surviving 1917 seaplane lighter and be a significant addition to the Museum's facilities

Dependent upon financial circumstances the Corporate Plan seeks to attend to the growing load of maintenance of 20+ year old buildings. Work will continue on moving and cataloguing collections to Cobham Hall, the Museum's Reserve Store, with the aim of having the majority of the Core Collection held in optimal environmental conditions.

AUDITOR

Baker Tilly UK Audit LLP were appointed in the year A resolution to reappoint Baker Tilly UK Audit LLP as auditor will be put to the members at the annual general meeting

PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of Heritage Assets which have been included at valuation. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP') 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005 and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards. The accounting policies as disclosed have been applied consistently throughout the current and preceding year.

The statement of financial activities ('SOFA'), balance sheet and cash flow statement consolidate the financial statements of the charity and its subsidiary undertaking, Fleet Air Arm Trading Limited. The results of the subsidiary are consolidated on a line by line basis. In accordance with paragraph 397 of the SORP, no separate SOFA has been presented from the charity alone. The charity's own net outgoing incoming resources were £223,397 (2012 – net incoming resources £10,933,567) in the year

b Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee The trustees of the charities, directors of the company, are named on the officers page. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charity.

e Income recognition

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the Museum is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

d Grants

All grants are credited to income in the period to which they relate. Support grants received and related expenditure in the operating account are taken directly to the Restricted funds. Support grants received for the purchase of exhibits are allocated directly to the Restricted Support Grant exhibits reserve. Investment income received on Support Grant deposits held are credited to the Support Grants exhibits reserve.

e Donated assets and core collection

No value is attributed to donated assets within the financial statements. As the majority of these assets cannot be disposed of, it is not considered appropriate to put a value on these assets. Additions to the collection are capitalised where the purchase cost is known or can be reliably ascertained in accordance with note k below

f Resources expended and basis of allocation

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred and include irrecoverable VAT. They have been classified under headings that aggregate all costs relating to that activity. In accounts prepared on the accruals basis, liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Museum to the expenditure.

Cost of generating funds comprises costs incurred in encouraging people and organisations to contribute financially to the charity's work and to promote the Fleet Air Arm Museum as a visitor attraction

Governance costs include those costs incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements

Charitable expenditure includes expenditure associated with Galleries and Exhibitions, Curatorial Matters and Education and include costs directly attributable to each activity. Costs not directly attributable to one activity including the proportion of support costs relating to charitable expenditure have been allocated on a reasonable basis of resources used.

g Pensions

Quasi-civil servants

Specific staff of the Museum are provided pension benefits through the Civil Service pension arrangements. This is an unfunded multi-employer defined benefit scheme but The Fleet Air Arm Museum CLG Limited is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities. A full actuarial valuation was carried out at 31 March 2007. Details can be found in the resource accounts of the Cabinet Office, Civil Superannuation (www.civilservice-pensions.gov.uk).

For the year ended 31 March 2013 employer's contributions of £26,275 (2012 - £17,434) were paid to the scheme at one of four rates in the range 16 7 to 24 3 per cent of pensionable pay, based on salary bands

Employer contributions are reviewed every four years following a full scheme valuation by the government actuary. From 1 April 2013 the rates were unchanged

The contribution rates reflect the benefits as they are accrued, not when the costs are actually incurred, and reflect past experience of the scheme

Other staff

The charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme for eligible staff, which represents the majority of employees, who are not members of the Civil Service scheme

The assets of the pension scheme, which is a group cash transfer scheme, are held in an independently administered money purchase fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable by the charity to the fund and amounted to £1,060 (2012 - £2,443)

h Operating Leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the life of the lease

ı Investments

The Museum's shareholding in the subsidiary, Fleet Air Arm Museum Trading Limited is included in the balance sheet at the cost of the share capital owned

J Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are capitalised and included at cost. Heritage assets and donated assets where the cost can be reliably ascertained are capitalised at valuation. A professional valuation of the buildings was previously obtained at least every 5 years to identify any impairment to the value held in the accounts. The trustees have not obtained a valuation for this financial year, as they believe the modified historic cost value is adequate.

Following initial capitalisation at cost, fixed assets are uplifted at RPI rates to modified historical cost value Depreciation charged is also uplifted by these indices and future depreciation is calculated on the uplifted cost

k Heritage assets:

The Museum holds collections of heritage assets which are held in support of the Museum's primary objective of effective and accessible repository both now and in the future for the heritage of the Fleet Air Arm and to raise public awareness of the history of the Service, whilst encouraging scholarship and research into Fleet Air Arm history. The collections are accounted for as follows.

Aircraft

The Museum's collection of aircraft is reported in the Balance Sheet at market value. Valuations are made internally by the head of curatorial division and head of finance, these are reviewed every five years. Gains and losses on revaluation are recognised in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities.

Artwork

The Museum holds over 300 paintings which are not recognised in the Balance Sheet as cost information is not readily available and the Trustees believe the benefits of obtaining valuations for these items would not justify the cost. No item in the collection is thought to have a financial value of more than £6,000 and the total collection is estimated to be under £150,000. The vast majority of the items in the collection were acquired over ten years ago.

Medals

The Museum holds a collection of medals, of over 1,700 items. If medals were purchased using grant in aid these items are recognised in the Balance Sheet as exhibits in the fixed asset note. If donated prior to SORP 2005 these are excluded from the balance sheet because cost information is not readily available and the trustees believe the benefits of obtaining valuations for these items would not justify the cost. The majority of medals have a value of less than £10,000 each, however the collection includes a Victoria Cross, estimated by trustees to be valued at £125,000.

Documents and photographs

In additions, the Museum holds a collection of documents and photographs, of over 1 7m documents and 800,000 photographs. The majority of these items have been donated to the Museum and are not included within the balance sheet because cost information is not readily available and the trustees believe the benefits of obtaining valuations for these items would not justify the cost. Items in the documents collection are thought to have a financial value of less than £500 each and photographs are estimated to have a combined value of £1 6m.

Heritage assets maintenance and management policy

It is the Museum's policy to maintain its collection, maintenance costs are charged to the Income and Expenditure Account when incurred. The aircraft and memorabilia are deemed to have indeterminate lives and the trustees do not therefore consider it appropriate to charge depreciation for capitalised items.

Subject to the approval of the trustees, the Museum may dispose of items from the collection, although this will only happen in exceptional circumstances, for example when the item cannot be properly displayed or the disposal proceeds can be used to purchase a better example and this does not detract from the integrity of the collection

At any time approximately 15 per cent of the 3D items in the collections items are on display. The majority of the remaining items are held in the reserve collection in a Heritage Lottery funded climate-controlled building called Cobham Hall.

Cobham Hall opens to the public at least once a year when it attracts visitors from all over the UK to see its unique collection of aircraft, records and artefacts, many of which have never before been seen on public display

Within Cobham Hall there are over forty historic aircraft and some five miles of shelving accommodating many of the Museum's two million records and thirty thousand artefacts

Access to the collection

Cobham Hall also houses one of the largest collections of Westland Helicopters including a Whirlwind and a Wasp and the Gazelle helicopter in which HRH The Duke of York learnt to fly Other aircraft include a de Havilland Sea Vixen and the first swept wing jet aircraft to land on an aircraft carrier, a Supermarine 510 The aircraft housed in Cobham Hall are in various stages of preservation or repair

I Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value Provision is made for obsolete and slow moving items

m Restricted funds

These relate to income which has been received subject to specific conditions imposed by the donor and binding on the trustees. This income and any related expenditure is shown as a separate restricted fund

n Unrestricted funds

These relate to general income and expenditure of the Museum together with any non-specific donations

o Financial Instruments

The Museum's financial assets and liabilities consist of cash and cash equivalents, short term investments, trade debtors, trade creditors and accrued expenses. The fair value of these items approximates their carrying value due to their short term value. Unless otherwise noted, the Museum is not exposed to significant interest or credit risks arising from these instruments.

Term deposits of less than one year are classified as investments within current assets

The Museum has a non-interest bearing loan due from its subsidiary of which, due to the rate at which the loan will be repaid, £49,750 is repayable after more than one year

p Risk management

Cash and short term investments are with major financial institutions and therefore the Museum is not exposed to significant credit risks

Interest rate risk is managed by securing the most beneficial rate available

The Museum manages liquidity risk by ensuring it has adequate cash reserves to enable it at all times to have the funds available to continue to operate its business at a minimum level

17 RELATED PARTIES

The National Museum of the Royal Navy

The Chairman of Trustees is an ex-officio Trustee of The National Museum of the Royal Navy (NMRN) The Grant In Aid is received from the MoD by the NMRN, which in turn pays a grant to the Museum

The grant is included as a separate fund for accounting purposes and therefore the amount received from NMRN each year is disclosed separately in the Statement of Financial Activities

As the ultimate controlled parent, NMRN consolidate the assets of The Fleet Air Arm Museum CLG Limited into their financial statements and form the smallest and largest group into which the results are consolidated

The Society of Friends of The Fleet Air Arm Museum (SOFFAAM)

Although none of the trustees of the Museum are also trustees of The Society of Friends of The Fleet Air Arm Museum, the objectives of the society are to provide financial aid to the Museum and foster interest in the history of the Fleet Air Arm and its Museum

During the year the society has donated £4,500 (2012 £nil) toward the Museum's activities

The Fly Navy Heritage Trust (formerly Swordfish Heritage Trust)

Certain ex-officio trustees of the Museum are also trustees of the Fly Navy Hentage Trust This charity contains within its objectives powers to support The Fleet Air Arm Museum CLG Limited

Fleet Air Arm Museum Trading Limited

Fleet Air Arm Museum Trading Limited is a fully owned trading subsidiary of the Museum During the year £193 (2012 £1,864) was donated to the Museum Management charges of £31,000 (2012 £35,000) were charged from the Museum to the subsidiary Details of the amounts outstanding at the year end are shown under the debtors note

Fleet Air Arm Museum

Fleet Air Arm Museum was the previous unincorporated charity, through which the activities of the museum were undertaken. On 1 August 2011, the Fleet Air Arm Museum ('Trust') gifted all its trade and assets to the charitable company, The Fleet Air Arm Museum CLG Limited. The trust still operates as a vehicle for legacies, however intends to gift all donations to the charity, to further the aims and objects of the museum. The results of the Trust are consolidated into the financial statement of The Fleet Air Arm Museum CLG Limited. There were income and expenditure during the year and no balances owed to or by the Museum at the end of the year.

From 1 April 2009 the Fleet Air Arm Museum, a related party ceased to receive Grant In Aid direct from the MoD. The Grant In Aid was received from the MoD by the NMRN, which in turn paid a grant to the museum. In preparation for incorporation within NMRN, The Fleet Air Arm Museum CLG Limited was registered with Companies House in March 2011. The trustees of Fleet Air Arm Museum transferred to this charity the assets and activities of the Trust on 1 August 2011 at book value, as part of full integration with the NMRN. The income and expenditure included within the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities represents the gift of these assets and eight month of Museum trading, compared to a full trading year in 2012-13.
