TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2013

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of Arnold Academy (the academy) for the ended 31 August 2013. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the academy comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the academy's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

a CONSTITUTION

Arnold Academy was incorporated on 15 June 2011 and opened as an Academy on 1 July 2011. The academy is a company limited by guarantee and is an exempt charity. The companies Memorandum and Articles of Association are the primary governing documents of the Academy.

The Governors act as trustees for the charitable activities of the Academy and are also directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. The charitable company is known as Arnold Academy.

Details of the Governors who served during the year except as noted are included in the Reference and Administrative details on page 1

Members of the Academy Trust are appointed by the Secretary of State or from within the Governors to include the Chair of the Governors, the Vice Chair, the Principal, the Chair of the Resources Committee, the Chair of the Teaching and Learning Committee

b. MEMBERS' LIABILITY

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member

c METHOD OF RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The management of the academy is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Trust deed

The Governors are the directors of the Academy Trust

A Governors term of office shall be 4 years, but this time limit will not apply to the Head Teacher, however any Governor may be re-appointed or re-elected

d. POLICIES AND PROCEDURES ADOPTED FOR THE INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

During the year under review the Governors held four Full Governing Body meetings, in addition the Resources Committee met on four occasions and the Teaching and Learning Committee on three occasions. Various additional meetings were held by the Head Teachers performance management committee and there was an informal meeting between Governors and the SLT and Governors and the school council. There were new Governor appointments including one new Parent Governor, a new non-teaching staff Governor and a new community Governor. The Chair of Governors at the start of the year resigned and a new Chair was appointed. All new Governors will be given a tour of the Academy and the chance to meet staff and Pupils. All Governors are provided with copies of the policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents they need to undertake their role as governors. Although there are normally only one or two new Governors a year a formal induction pack has been developed which is tailored to the specific roles to be undertaken and all new Governors are required to attend a Governors Training course run by the Local Education Authority or such other provider the service to which the Academy subscribes

e MEMBERS INDEMNITIES

Each member's liability is limited by an indemnity pursuant to the provisions of the Companies Act 2006 in respect of negligence, default, breach of duty or breach of trust in relation to the affairs of the Academy Trust

f ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The management structure of the Academy has altered slightly by the introduction of two new positions providing assistance to the deputy head teachers enabling them to concentrate more time on their specific roles and providing back up and a degree of succession planning. The roles are known as standards leaders and the holders are responsible for "Teaching Learning and Enrichment" and Behaviour, Attendance and Community" respectively. The effect is to increase the number of people in the senior leadership team. The overall structure therefore still consists of three levels. The Members of the Academy, The Governors and the Senior Leadership Team. The aim of the structure is to devolve responsibility and encourage involvement in decision making at all levels and avoid undue beaurocracy or replication of works and roles.

The Members have delegated their powers to the Governors who are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring the Academy by the use of budgets and making decisions about the direction of the Academy, capital expenditure and senior staff appointments

The Senior Leadership Team are the Principal, two deputy heads, the two standards leaders and two key stage leaders. Some spending control is devolved to department heads and to the office manager but the senior managers can authorise expenditure within agreed limits and budgets but capital or other significant expenditure requires authorisation by the Resources committee of the Governors subject to the Academy's best value policy

The Senior Leadership Team is responsible for the day to day operation of the Academy, in particular organising the teaching staff, facilities and students

There are no subsidiary companies or connected organisations

g RISK MANAGEMENT

The Governors have assessed the major risks to which the Academy is exposed, in particular those relating to the specific teaching, provision of facilities and other operational areas of the Academy, and its finances. The Governors have implemented a numbers of systems to assess the risks that the school faces, especially in the operational areas (i.e. in relation to teaching, health and safety, bullying and school trips) and in relation to the control of finance. We have introduced systems including operational procedures (e.g. vetting of new staff visitors, governors, supervision of the grounds and buildings) and internal financial controls (as per below) in order to minimise risk. Where required adequate insurance cover has been arranged the Academy has a robust and effective system of internal financial controls and this is explained in more detailed in the following statement.

h. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the Academy is to advance for the public benefit education in the UK by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing a school offering a broad and balanced curriculum

Objectives and Activities

a OBJECTS AND AIMS

The principal object and activity of the Academy Trust is the operation of Arnold Academy to provide education for pupils of different abilities between the ages of 9 and 13 and to advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom

The main objectives for the Academy for the year ended 31 August 2013 are summarised below

b. STRATEGIES AND ACTIVITIES

The Academy's main strategy is encompassed in its mission statement which is "To provide a safe and nurturing environment, working in partnership with parents and children to engage all pupils in a broad range of activities and opportunities "To this end the activities include

- delivering an outstanding educational experience for all pupils through excellent teaching, inventive curricular experiences and modern facilities
- identifying and overcoming barriers to learning through early intervention enabling every child to achieve their potential
- engaging parents, carers and support networks in effective communication to enhance the holistic approach to learning
- establishing sustainable cross phase partnerships that enable schools to pool resources and raise overall standards
- Celebrating with the wider community all the achievements of Arnold Academy

The Academy has a strategy to support the local community by offering its premises and facilities to community groups for their use where possible and economic to do so

EMPLOYEE INVOLVEMENT AND EMPLOYMENT OF THE DISABLED

Equal opportunities policy

The governors recognise that equal opportunities should be an integral part of good practice within the workplace. The Academy aims to establish equal opportunity in all areas of its activities including creating a working environment in which the contribution and needs of all people are fully valued.

Disabled persons

Lifts, ramps and disabled toilets are installed and door widths are adequate to enable wheelchair access to all the main areas of the Academy It is a policy of the Academy to support recruitment and retention of the students and employees with disabilities. The Academy does this by adapting the physical environment, by making support resources available and through training and career development.

Achievements and performance

a. GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the board of trustees has a reasonable expectation that the academy has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

The second year as an Academy has been very successful, with the new senior leadership team building on a solid foundation and having an immediate positive impact. The growing reputation of Arnold has accelerated and new intake numbers at year five have been strong. Additionally, there has been significant inward mobility to all other year groups as the academy has attracted pupils from beyond its defined catchment area. Since converting to academy status, Arnold has started each new academic year with significantly more pupils on roll than were reported in the previous January census, currently the school has 542 pupils on roll, but is funded based on 521 pupils in January 2013. In September 2014 Arnold is predicted to have at least 575 on roll, but will only be funded for the 542 (approx) that will be on roll in January 2014. This shortfall creates a significant issue for Arnold as funding for the academy does not reflect the actual number of pupils it serves. This "funding lag" has meant that the school has been disadvantaged and has had to manage the budget very tightly. It appears that the "penalty" for a rising roll and being an increasingly successful school is that Arnold will be running at a deficit and therefore eating into reserves for the next academic year and, assuming the trend continues, will suffer similarly for the next three academic until the school reaches capacity.

Improvements have been made to the toilet provisions in the Academy particularly within the year 5 block. A significant investment has been made in the ICT provision to include new hardware and touch screen technology in most classrooms, as well as provision of note books for use in class.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2013

Performance management has been improved for all staff and year 5 pupils have been benchmarked at the start of the academic year so that their progress can be tracked more accurately throughout their time at Arnold

SATS results in all areas were very good across the board with the results at the end of KS2 showing both Maths and English attainments for levels 4 and 5 well above average attainments for both Central Beds and Nationally Attainment at the end of year 8 was even more striking showing strong trends and placing the Academy at the top of many categories compared to Middle Schools Nationally

The Academy still strives to ensure that standards are continually raised and particularly that the transition by pupils into and out of the school is well managed to ensure that pupils are happy and that their academic and personal development is not adversely effected. In all these respects the new targets and increased rigour of teaching and teaching assessment introduced ensure that standards and achievements keep rising.

Financial review

a FINANCIAL AND RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

Most of the Academy's income is obtained from the EFA, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes Any grants or other sources of income are shown in the statement of financial activities

During the year ended 31 August 2013, the total expenditure of £2,855,743 exceeded the grant funding from EFA and other income sources. Taking into account the brought forward surplus there is a carried forward surplus of £222,622.

On 31 August 2013 the net book value of the fixed assets was £6,071,411

b. RESERVES POLICY

The Governors review the reserve levels of the Academy termly. This review examines the income and expenditure streams against the forecasts to match commitments etc., and to identify or forecast any potential shortfall. The Governors have determined the appropriate level of reserves to provide sufficient working capital to cover the delays between spending and receipt of grants and to provide sufficient working capital to cover delays between spending and receipt of income from the applicable streams or to provide a cushion for unexpected expenditure and emergencies. The Academy will continue to keep such reserves as are required subject to constant and on-going review. The current shortfall in EFA funding will though have a significant impact on reserves and unless substantial savings on staffing costs can be achieved (which is clearly difficult due to contract terms) then there is a significant risk that reserves will be entirely consumed to pay for the funding shortfall. In the longer term the spend on resources will need to be reduced in order for the budget not to fall into deficit.

Plans for the future

a. FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Academy will continue to strive to increase pupil numbers and to improve its level of performance of its pupils at all levels and to develop and support the school ethos and values learning. The Academy will remain open to alternative routes of income generation which would aid the Academy in achieving it aims and mission statement.

The Academy continually updates its school development plan to react to changes on all levels to benefit its students and wider community

THE PURPOSE OF THE SYSTEM OF INTERNAL CONTROL

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives, it can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an ongoing process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Arnold Academy for the year 1 September 2012 to 31 August 2013 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

CAPACITY TO HANDLE RISK

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy's significant risks, that has been in place for the year 1 September 2012 to 31 August 2013 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

THE RISK AND CONTROL FRAMEWORK

The academy's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability in particular, it includes

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees,
- regular reviews by the Finance and General Purposes Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes.
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance,
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines
- delegation of authority and segregation of duties,
- identification and management of risks

The board of trustees has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided not to appoint an internal auditor. However, the Trustees have appointed Mrs S Baker as the Responsible Officer (RO)

The RO's role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the academy's financial systems. On a termly basis, the RO reports to the board of trustees on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2013

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1 1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005, the Academies Accounts Direction 2013 issued by the EFA, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006

1.2 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the academy at the discretion of the Trustees

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by Education Funding Agency where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received and include grants from Education Funding Agency

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund

1.3 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the academy has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability

Grants are included in the Statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of entitlement of receipt, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the year for which it is receivable and any unspent amount is reflected as a balance in the restricted general fund. Capital grants are recognised when receivable and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended. Unspent amounts of capital grant are reflected in the balance in the restricted fixed asset fund.

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis where there is certainty of receipt and the amount can be reliably measured

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent the goods have been provided or on completion of the service

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2013

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

14 Resources expended

All expenditure is recognised in the period in which a liability is incurred and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Costs of generating funds are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds

Charitable activities are costs incurred in the academy's educational operations

Governance costs include the costs attributable to the academy's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and Trustees' meetings and reimbursed expenses

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT

1.5 Going concern

The Trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the academy to continue as a going concern. The Trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

1 6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. The related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of financial activities and are carried forward in the Balance sheet. Depreciation on such assets is charged to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of financial activities so as to reduce the fund over the useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the academy's depreciation policy.

The premises at Arnold Academy are owned by the Academy Trust At 31 August 2012 the EFA valued the freehold buildings at £5,342,043 and the land at £871,769. The buildings will be depreciated over the remaining useful life of 25.78 years. The land will not be depreciated

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is not charged on freehold land. Depreciation on other tangible fixed assets is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of those assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases.

Freehold property

over the remaining useful life of 25 78 years

Motor vehicles

20% per annum straight line

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

15% or 20% per annum straight line

1.7 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term

Benefits received and receivable as an incentive to sign an operating lease are recognised on a straight line basis over the period until the date the rent is expected to be adjusted to the prevailing market rate

1.8 Taxation

The academy is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes Accordingly, the academy is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes

1.9 Pensions

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ("TPS") and the Local Government Pension Scheme ("LGPS") These are defined benefit schemes, are contracted out of the State Earnings-Related Pension Scheme ("SERPS"), and the assets are held separately from those of the academy

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quinquennial valuations using a prospective benefit method. As stated in note 23, the TPS is a multi-employer scheme and the academy is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the scheme on a consistent and reasonable basis. The TPS is therefore treated as a defined contribution scheme and the contributions recognised as they are paid each year.

The LGPS is a funded scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and gains and losses on the settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs. Past service costs are recognised immediately in the Statement of financial activities if the benefits have vested. If the benefits have not vested immediately, the costs are recognised over the period vesting occurs. The expected return on assets and the interest cost are shown as a net finance amount of other finance costs or credits adjacent to interest. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other gains and losses.

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows

Designated Funds

School Fund

The Academy maintains a separate school fund which includes income and expenditure relating to school trips and other fundraising activities

Contingency Fund

The governors consider that it is prudent to allocate part of the general funds to a contingency reserve A sum of £12,000 has been transferred to the contingency reserve to cover future potential increases in employer contributions to the Local Government Pension Scheme

General Funds

The Academy's general fund represents income and expenditure relating to activities undertaken by the Academy as part of its charitable activities. The Academy can use these funds for any purpose

Restricted Funds

The Academy received a number of grants during the year for the purpose of providing educational services to its pupils. These funds included grants from the EFA for the General Annual Grant (GAG) and Pupil Premium. These grants have been used for staff costs, educational resources and general costs incurred in the running of the Academy During the year the Academy undertook a planned refurbishment programme which utilised all the restricted funding received and the balance was met from reserves transferred on conversion.

Pension Reserve - As stated in note 23 the Academy is a participating employer in two defined benefit pension schemes. The liabilities relating to Arnold Academy can only be determined for one of these schemes. A separate reserve has been included to show the impact of the changes in valuation of this pension scheme.

Restricted Fixed Asset Funds

Assets which are capitalised in the accounts are represented by a separate fund within the Restricted Fixed Assets reserves

Under the funding agreement with the Secretary of State, the academy was not subject to a limit on the amount of GAG that it could carry forward at 31 August 2013

23 PENSION COMMITMENTS

The academy's employees belong to two principal pension schemes the Teacher's Pension Scheme for England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff, and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Bedford Borough Council Both are defined benefit schemes

The pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of independent qualified actuaries. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2004 and of the LGPS 31 August 2013.

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year

Teachers' Pension Scheme

Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pensions Regulations (2010). These regulations apply to teachers in schools that are maintained by local authorities and other educational establishments, including academies, in England and Wales. In addition teachers in many independent and voluntary-aided schools and teachers and lecturers in some establishments of further and higher education may be eligible for membership. Membership is automatic for full-time teachers and lecturers and from 1 January 2007 automatic too for teachers and lecturers in part-time employment following appointment or a change of contract. Teachers and lecturers are able to opt out of the TPS.

23. PENSION COMMITMENTS (continued)

The Teachers' Pension Budgeting and Valuation Account

Although members may be employed by various bodies, their retirement and other pension benefits are set out in regulations made under the Superannuation Act (1972) and are paid by public funds provided by Parliament. The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a "pay as you go" basis – these contributions along with those made by employers are credited to the Exchequer under arrangements governed by the above Act

The Teachers' Pensions Regulations require an annual account, the Teachers' Pension Budgeting and Valuation Account, to be kept of receipts and expenditure (including the cost of pensions' increases) From 1 April 2001, the Account has been credited with a real rate of return, which is equivalent to assuming that the balance in the Account is invested in notional investments that produce that real rate of return

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

At the last valuation, the contribution rate to be paid into the TPS was assessed in two parts. First, a standard contribution rate (SCR) was determined. This is the contribution, expressed as a percentage of the salaries of teachers and lecturers in service or entering service during the period over which the contribution rate applies, which if it were paid over the entire active service of these teachers and lecturers would broadly defray the cost of benefits payable in respect of that service. Secondly, a supplementary contribution is payable if, as a result of the actuarial review, it is found that accumulated liabilities of the Account for benefits to past and present teachers, are not fully covered by standard contributions to be paid in future and by the notional fund built up from past contributions. The total contribution rate payable is the sum of the SCR and the supplementary contribution rate.

The last valuation of the TPS related to the period 1 April 2001 to 31 March 2004. The Government Actuary's report of October 2006 revealed that the total liabilities of the Scheme (pensions in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) amounted to £166,500 million. The value of the assets (estimated future contributions together with the proceeds from the notional investments held at that valuation date) was £163,240 million. The assumed real rate of return was 3.5% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth was assumed to be 1.5%. The assumed gross rate of return was 6.5%. From 1 January 2007, the SCR was assessed at 19.75%, and the supplementary contribution rate was assessed to be 0.75% (to balance assets and liabilities as required by the regulations within 15 years). This resulted in a total contribution rate of 20.5%, which translated into an employee contribution rate of 6.4% and employer contribution rate of 14.1% payable.

Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, the design of benefits and many other factors. Many of these assumptions are being considered as part of the work on the reformed TPS, as set out below. Scheme valuations therefore remain suspended. The Public Service Pensions Bill, which is being debated in the House of Commons, provides for future scheme valuations to be conducted in accordance with Treasury directions. The timing for the next valuation has still to be determined, but it is likely to be before the reformed schemes are introduced in 2015.

Teachers' Pension Scheme Changes

Lord Hutton published his final report in March 2011 and made recommendations about how pensions can be made sustainable and affordable, whilst remaining fair to the workforce and the taxpayer. The Government accepted Lord Hutton's recommendations as the basis for consultation and Ministers engaged in extensive discussions with trade unions and other representative bodies on reform of the TPS. Those discussions concluded on 9 March 2012 and the Department published a Proposed Final Agreement, setting out the design for a reformed TPS to be implemented from 1 April 2015.

23. PENSION COMMITMENTS (continued)

The key provisions of the reformed scheme include a pension based on career average earnings, an accrual rate of 1/57th, and a Normal Pension Age equal to State Pension Age, but with options to enable members to retire earlier or later than their Normal Pension Age. Importantly, pension benefits built up before 1 April 2015 will be fully protected.

In addition, the Proposed Final Agreement includes a Government commitment that those within 10 years of Normal Pension Age on 1 April 2012 will see no change to the age at which they can retire, and no decrease in the amount of pension they receive when they retire. There will also be further transitional protection, tapered over a three and a half year period, for people who would fall just outside of the 10 year protection.

In his interim report of October 2010, Lord Hutton recommended that short-term savings were also required, and that the only realistic way of achieving these was to increase member contributions. At the Spending Review 2010 the Government announced an average increase of 3.2 percentage points on the contribution rates by 2014-15. The increases were to be phased in from April 2012 on a 40.80 100% basis.

Under the definitions set out in Financial Reporting Standard (FRS 17) Retirement Benefits, the TPS is a multi-employer pension scheme. The academy is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the scheme. Accordingly, the academy has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS 17 and has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit scheme, with assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2013 was £81,000, of which employer's contributions totalled £63,000 and employees' contributions totalled £18,000. The agreed contribution rates for future years are 20.5% for employers and a variable rate for employees, depending on rates of pay.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding local government pension scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.
