REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

The trustees who are also directors of the academy trust for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the academy trust for the year ended 31 August 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) and the Academies Accounts Direction issued by the Education and Skills Funding Agency.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The principal activity of the Charitable Company is the operation of the Brockhampton Academy Trust to provide education for pupils of different abilities up to the age of 11 and also the provision of nursery and pre and post school care.

The principal objectives of the Academy are:

- To ensure that every child enjoys the same high quality education in terms of resourcing, tuition and care
- To raise the standard of educational achievement of all pupils
- To improve the effectiveness of the Academy by keeping the curriculum and organisational structure under continual review
- To comply with the appropriate statutory and curriculum requirements
- To make the Academy a valued community resource
- To close the achievement gap for disadvantaged pupils and those identified as having Special Educational Needs
- To ensure all pupils are well prepared for the next phase of education academically, socially and emotionally.

To meet these aims, the Academy has developed its strategic plan outlining objectives to:

- 1. Set and achieve clear milestones of educational performance, safeguarding and personal development by:
- a. ensuring that an appropriate level of curriculum is identified, planned, and delivered with such limitations of budget and resources that prevail;
- b. defining and implementing the required educational standards at all levels, having due regard for both internal and external benchmarks;
- c. continuing the development of robust safeguarding practices throughout the Academy, considering guidelines from government and its agencies; and
- d. defining and promoting a proactive culture of collaboration and cooperation across the Academy 4.
- 2. Define and achieve requisite standards in leadership, governance and stakeholder engagement by:
- a. identifying and specifying core determinants of leadership within the Academy and provide positive encouragement to develop and embed these;
- b. specifying and accommodating the key internal and external stakeholders of the Trust; and
- c. actively promoting the health and well-being of all staff through embedding appropriate and robust support services and strategies.
- 3. Secure the future growth and sustainability of the Academy through the focused development of efficient and effective financial, operational, and shared business services and a focus on environmental sustainability across the Academy, by:
- a. creating the roadmap for embedding a suitably experienced team to lead and further develop the strategic direction of the Academy;
- b. embedding robust, effective, and transparent financial and risk management systems and procedures;
- c. developing and implementing a marketing strategy for the Academy; and
- d. developing and implementing strategies in relation to environmental sustainability.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Public benefit

In setting our objectives the trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit in exercising their powers or duties.

The primary purpose of the Academy is the advancement of education within the local area.

The Academy operates an onsite pre-school for children aged 2-5. The Academy also operates a Breakfast Club and After-School Club, which offers a safe place for pupils while parents are working.

The Academy provides facilities for recreational and other leisure time occupation for the community at large in the interest of school welfare and with the interest of improving life in the local community, for example Bromyard Scouts. The Academy as given a high priority to providing public benefit to a cross section of the community regardless of family background, but perhaps the greatest benefit the Academy can offer is the provision of an education that maximises each student's potential.

FUNDRAISING

The Academy does not use any external fundraisers. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the Trustees.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Key academic & financial performance indicators

Brockhampton Academy Trust was subject to OFSTED inspection in October 2022 and the school was deemed securely Good. Academic achievement remains in line or better than national averages in reading, writing and maths at KS1, and in reading and maths at KS2. Writing at KS2 is currently below national as is the number of children achieving a Greater Depth Standard in writing and maths at KS2. The latter are therefore a key priority of the school development plan. Performance in the Year One Phonic Screening Test is significantly above national, as are reading results at KS2 in both expected and greater depth standard. Over the last two years there has been a significant influx of children requesting in-year transfers and the Pre School is already full for 2023/24. In line with schools nationally, there has been a steady increase in the numbers of children with Special Educational Needs in school, as well as higher level needs (behaviour/personal care etc) (There are more children at Brockhampton with Educational Health Care Plans than there are nationally). The school is well over its recommended capacity and there is a significant gap between the existing schedule of accommodation and that which is recommended which does adversely affect the school's ability to fulfil its core purpose.

The school continues to experience significant challenge in maintaining financial stability and sustainability. Underfunded staff pay increases, increased supply/SLA costs, unforeseen staffing costs (maternity) and constraining classroom sizes, have resulted in in-year deficit. The school is working closely with the Local Authority, DfE and local charities to secure investment to re-develop the site into a one-form entry setting which will enable the sustainability of the school. Governors have voted formally to conduct a due diligence procedure with the Black Pear Trust, the intention being to join the trust in Summer 2024.

The Full Governing Body review regular assessments of the performance of the Academy and receive termly formal Head Teacher reports. The FGB review exam results as a key performance of the Academy's continuing success, but they also review the improvements of each year group and individuals to ensure that the Academy's teaching activities are effective and there is continuing improvement at all levels. Head Teacher reports are presented termly, scrutinised and challenged during FGB meetings. Additional Governors have been recruited to the FGB. Skills audits have been conducted and sub committees established. The FGB continue to develop their own understanding of their roles and responsibilities in holding the Head Teacher to account with a programme of training led by the school's School Improvement Partner.

Pupil attendance

Senior Leaders of the Academy are responsible for promoting good levels of attendance and ensuring interventions are put in place for persistent absentees and lateness. The Governing Body are responsible for monitoring levels of attendance and holding senior leaders to account for their monitoring of attendance levels and subsequent actions. This is done via the termly formal Head Teacher's report and annual attendance audit.

Pupils attendance 2022/23 was above the national average at 95% (National 90%). Persistent absence was below the national average at 6% (National 10%).

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial review

The Academy's main source of income is obtained from the Department for Education (DfE) via the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) in the form of recurrent General Annual Grant (GAG) funding. This funding is restricted to particular purpose. Total grants received from the DfE during the period ending August 2023 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities. The Academy also receives income from its nursery and breakfast club and after school care club facilities and holiday club.

Spending has been focused on continuing to embed improvements to the teaching and learning provision for the children as well as developing the building and grounds to meet basic educational needs, improve safeguarding and develop the grounds for potential future income generation. This includes:

- Continued training and implementation of the Thrive programme
- Additional Teaching Assistant hours to support those children identified as most at risk of underachievement following lost learning time due to school closures
- Additional 1:1 support staff to meet the need of several children now in school with higher level needs

Expenditure this year has been very tight as the school operates as a full one-form entry school of 210 pupils but the capacity of the school is limited to the PAN of 182, resulting in a shortfall of funding of approximately £125,000. The Academy is working very closely with the ESFA, Local Authority and local charities to expand the capacity of the school.

The FGB are committed to reinvesting back into the School, its facilities and resources. The School operates a Nursery, wrap around care provision and holiday club, the surpluses of which are reinvested back into School. The school has embarked on initial letting agreements for the school grounds. Perryfields Primary Pru are using the grounds once a week for their children in return for staff training by their Outreach Team. The school also hosts the local Scout group, fitness and pilates classes weekly for small rental fees.

During the year ended 31 August 2023, the deficit of income over expenditure for the year (before recognised gains and losses and excluding capital restricted funds) equated to £96,340 (2022 - deficit of £68,192).

Investment policy and objectives

The Academy's policy is to invest surplus funds in low risk short term bank deposits.

Reserves policy

The trustees review the reserve levels of the Academy annually. The review encompasses the nature of the income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves. The trustees have determined that the appropriate level of reserves should be one month's net salary costs of £48,158.

Excluding the pension scheme asset/liability and capital funds, the Academy funds surplus at 31 August 2023 was £35,242 (2022 - £85,582).

Fixed asset capital fund at 31 August 2023 was £815,488 (2022 - £824,871).

As at 31 August 2023 there are insufficient reserves to meet such liability.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Academy to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that there are material uncertainties about the Academy Trust's ability to continue as a going concern because of the level of reserves as at 31 August 2023. £925 restricted general fund (2022-£2,799), £34,317 unrestricted funds (2022-£82,783).

The Academy continues to communicate the current position with the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA). The trustees continue to monitor the Academy budget and have placed reliance on the continuing support of the ESFA in the short term. For the longer term the Academy plans to join a multi Academy Trust.

For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies note to the financial statements.

FUTURE PLANS

The FGB continues to promote the Academy within the local community with considerable success. Links have been established with several local service providers and the reputation of the school continues to grow, as evidenced by increasing in-year transfers from other schools. A new website has been developed, designed to reflect the school's ethos and vision more clearly and market the school more effectively. Governors are supporting the Head Teacher in developing a more business orientated approach to marketing, fundraising and generation of additional income streams. This strategy is currently developing along the following lines:

- re-establishment of a fund raising PTA
- developing community business links to fund projects at school
- develop the start made in lettings/hiring the grounds
- develop methods for donations to be sourced
- outsource bids/grant applications
- family/community days on site to develop/maintain grounds

The school is working closely with the Local Authority, DfE and local charities to secure investment to re-develop the site into a one-form entry setting which will enable the sustainability of the school. Governors have voted formally to conduct a due diligence procedure with the Black Pear Trust, the intention being to join the trust in Summer 2024.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Academy is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The Charitable Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association are the primary governing documents of the Academy.

The trustees of Brockhampton Academy are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. The charitable company is known as Brockhampton Primary School.

Details of the trustees who served during the year are included in the Reference and Administration Details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the Charitable Company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Charitable Company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Trustees' Indemnities

In accordance with normal commercial practice the academy has purchased insurance to protect trustees and officers from claims arising from negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring whilst on academy business. The insurance provides cover up to £10,000,000 on any one claim and the cost for the year ended 31 August 2023 is incorporated within the total insurance premium.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of trustees

Trustees are recruited from the employees of the Academy, parents (by election), community governors and Co-opted Governors appointed by the Members.

Organisational structure

The management structure of the Academy consists of three members and nine trustees (the trustees make up the FGB). The FGB is responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring the Academy by use of budgets and making major decisions about the strategic direction of the Academy, capital expenditure and the most senior staff appointments.

The Leadership Team is led by the Headteacher, Matthew Mander. He manages the Academy at an executive level, implementing the policies agreed by the FGB and reporting back to it on progress. The Headteacher and other key senior leaders are responsible for the authorisation of spending within agreed budgets and the appointment of staff.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of new trustees

The Academy carries out appropriate training for new trustees. The Governor Induction Policy was approved by the FGB on 7/7/22 to be reviewed July 2024. The Governor Visits Policy was approved 19/10/23 to be reviewed again in October 2027. Governors complete online training, safeguarding training and are offered courses and free webinars throughout the year. We work closely with Herefordshire Governors' Association.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

Teacher salaries are reviewed annually as required by the School Teachers' Pay and Conditions Document and are also determined by the annual performance management appraisals. The trust follows NJC pay scales for support staff.

The Headteacher's Pay Range, which the Governing Body is required to set for Headteachers by the School Teachers' Pay and Conditions Document, reflects the responsibilities of the job in addition to the size of the school, any other factors specified and advice issued by the Local Authority on the salaries of Headteachers at comparable size schools.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

Financial - The academy relies on continued Government funding through the ESFA. There is no assurance that Government policy or practice will remain the same, or that funding will not be reduced. The academy receives income from the provision of nursery and breakfast club and after school care club facilities. The academy helps to support other like-minded organisations through the secondment of staff, consultation and training activities.

Cash Flow - The academy closely monitors cash flow to ensure that payment is made to creditors and the payroll can be met.

Falling pupil numbers - the academy closely monitors fluctuating pupil numbers and adjusts budgets accordingly on a rolling forecast basis. Pupil numbers have increased in 2021/22.

Failure in governance and/or management - the FGB and management effectively manage the academy's financial internal controls, compliance with regulations and legislation and statutory returns. The FGB continues to review and ensure that appropriate measures are in place to minimise these risks.

The FGB has reviewed the risk register and recognised the increased risk to financial and organisational areas.

STATEMENT AS TO DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

So far as the trustees are aware, there is no relevant information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the academy trust's auditors are unaware, and each trustee has taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make them aware of any audit information and to establish that the academy trust's auditors are aware of that information.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

Scope of Responsibility

As members of the FGB, we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that Brockhampton Academy Trust has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise; however, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement of loss.

As members of the FGB, we have reviewed and taken account of the guidance in the DfE's Governance Handbook and competency framework for governance.

The FGB has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Headteacher, as accounting officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between Brockhampton Academy Trust and the Secretary of State for Education. They are also responsible for reporting any material weaknesses or breakdown in internal control.

Governance

The information on governance included here supplements that described in the Report of the Trustees and in the Trustees' Responsibilities Statement. The board of trustees has formally met 4 times during the year. Attendance during the year at meetings of the board of trustees was as follows:

Conflicts of interest and governance reviews

The Academy manages conflicts of interest by maintaining a register of interests and a record of transactions with related parties. In addition, declarations of interest are minuted as discussed at each meeting of the FGB.

The FGB has appointed new trustees this year bringing valuable skill sets to the trust. Trustees have received induction training, a skills audit was completed in April 2023 and a diversity audit in May 2023.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

Review of Value for Money

As accounting officer, the Headteacher has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the education and wider social outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where available. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

Ensuring the effective use of resources:

- resources are targeted at school improvement priorities;
- on-going review of procurement to achieve better quality and economies of scale in relation to the purchase of goods and services; and
- estate is maintained in a good state of repair and is compliant with relevant legislation to ensure suitability and safety for pupils to achieve best outcomes.

Ensuring financial effectiveness:

- sufficient expertise is available to challenge on ensuring value for money. If required consulting professional experts to advise on financial aspects;
- timely financial management information highlights significant variances to budget allowing SLT and the FGB to take remedial action; and
- focus on greater level of transparency and challenge on school budgets, using benchmarking, and other data, as a model for improvement.

Financial Governance and Oversight

The school holds regular meetings of its FGB and Finance and Audit Committee. In these meetings, financial decisions are discussed and monthly management accounts reviewed. Minutes of the meetings demonstrate that the trustees hold the school to account over financial decisions and challenge spending decisions, where appropriate. Rigorous systems are in place to ensure strong financial controls and security. The budget has been challenging this year, however, the FGB is satisfied that all reasonable cuts have been made and have consulted the ESFA for advice. The Governors are concerned that any additional cuts or restrictions on budget may put the school's teaching and children's pastoral care at risk.

Better purchasing

The trust continues to review Service Level Agreements with Herefordshire Local Authority and other independent providers, renegotiating or changing provider, when beneficial. This ensures the services provided are fit for purpose and cost effective as well as providing value for money.

Better Income Generation

Additional income is gained through the management of the pre-school, breakfast club and after school care club facilities. Demand for these services continues to grow and we informed parents there would be a price increase from September 2023.

The School Business Manager continues to actively seek additional income from grants and reduced costs accessed through DfE National Deals For Schools.

Reviewing Controls and Managing Risks

The Academy has implemented segregation of duties within financial control. The FGB challenges decision makers within the trust on the cost and effectiveness of spending proposals in order to achieve value for money.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of charitable company policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them effectively, efficiently and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Brockhampton Academy Trust during the period 1 September 2022 and 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to Handle Risk

The FGB has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The FGB is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that have been in place for the period 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. The process is regularly reviewed by the FGB.

The Risk and Control Framework

The Academy Trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees;
- regular reviews by the finance committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- delegation of authority and segregation of duties; and
- identification and management of risks.

The FGB has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided not to appoint an internal auditor; however, the FGB has appointed School Business and Leadership Services (SBLS) to carry out a programme of internal checks.

The reviewer's role includes giving advice on financial and other matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial and other systems. This was limited this year to one review, comprising a website audit, but there is an agenda item in the Finance and Audit Committee on 28/11/2023 to appoint the internal auditor and determine a schedule of three internal audits.

Recommendations were made as follows:

- A number of policies published on the academy website were overdue to be reviewed;
- Articles of Association and Funding Agreement not on website;
- No specific mention was made on the academy website of the Equality Act 2010 or the Special Educational Needs and Disability Regulations 2014; and
- Pupil premium strategy statement published on the academy website details funding for the 2021 to 2022 academic year.

Review of Effectiveness

As Accounting Officer, the Head has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

Basis for opinion

We draw attention to note 1 in the financial statements, which indicates that the Academy has insufficient reserves to meet one months net salary costs of £48,159. As stated in note 1, this condition, along with other matters as set forth in note 1, indicate that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the Academy's ability to continue as a going concern. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Other information

The trustees are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report, other than the financial statements and our Report of the Independent Auditors thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Statement of accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements of the academy trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified for certain assets held at fair value, in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2022 to 2023 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Brockhampton Academy Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Academy to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that there are material uncertainties about the Academy Trust's ability to continue as a going concern because of the level of reserves as at 31 August 2023.

£925 restricted general fund (2022-£2,799), £34,317 unrestricted funds (2022-£82,783).

The Academy continues to communicate the current position with the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA). The trustees continue to monitor the Academy budget and have placed reliance on the continuing support of the ESFA in the short term. For the longer term the Academy plans to join a multi Academy Trust.

For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the Academy has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Sponsorship income

Sponsorship income provided to the Academy which amounts to a donation is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which it is receivable (where there are no performance-related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Other income

Other income including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the Academy has provided the goods or services.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Opon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items, they are not recognised in the financial statements until they are sold. The income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

Transfer on conversion

The conversion from a state maintained school to an Academy involved the transfer of identifiable assets and liabilities and the operation of the school for nil consideration and has been accounted for under the acquisition method of accounting.

The assets and liabilities transferred on conversion from a state maintained school to an Academy have been valued att fair value being a reasonable estimate of current market value that the trustees would expect to pay in an open market for an equivalent item. Their fair value is in accordance with the accounting policies set out for Brockhampton Academy Trust. The amounts have been recognised under the appropriate balance sheet categories, with a corresponding amount recognised in voluntary income (net income/net expenditure) in the Statement of Financial Activities and analysed under unrestricted funds, restricted general funds and restricted fixed asset funds.

The Academy's land and buildings were included within the accounts on conversion on the basis of the valuation commissioned by the ESFA. The Academy has continued to hold land and buildings in the accounts at this value less any applicable depreciation.

Donated fixed assets

Where the donated good is a fixed asset it is measured at fair value, unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor should be used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the Academy's accounting policies.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on raising funds

Raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the Academy to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities, events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities are incurred on the Academy's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the Academy apportioned to charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Charitable activities

All resources are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is not charged on freehold land. Depreciation on other tangible fixed assets is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of those assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following basis:

Long term leasehold property - 2% straight line Fixtures and fittings - 15% reducing balance Computer equipment - 33% straight line

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use and reclassified to freehold or leasehold land and buildings.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 13. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank - is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 14. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

Taxation

The Academy is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the Academy is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objectives of the Academy at the discretion of the trustees.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from Education and Skills Funding Agency/Department for Education.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Academy Trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Academy Trust has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event which it is probable will result in the transfer of economic benefits and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within the interest payable and similar charges.

Leased Assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 18, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore, a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2019 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2023. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

The assumptions made reflect the circumstance existing at 31 August 2023 and, in accordance with Accounting Standards, do not include any allowance for events since that date. Any changes in assumptions after the year end date will be reflected in the provision valuation at 31 August 2024.

10. TRUSTEES' AND OFFICERS' INSURANCE

The academy trust has opted into the Department for Education's risk protection arrangement (RPA), an alternative to insurance where UK government funds cover losses that arise. This scheme protects trustees and officers from claims arising from negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring whilst on academy business, and provides cover up to £10,000,000. It is not possible to quantify the trustees and officers indemnity element from the overall cost of the RPA scheme.

Restricted funds

Restricted general fund

This fund is GAG related and is restricted to the running costs of the Academy. The Academy Trust is not subject to GAG carried forward limits.

Pension reserve

The pension reserve forms part of the restricted general fund and relates to the Academy Trust's share of the surplus/deficit of the Worcestershire County Council Local Government Pension Fund.

Fixed asset fund

These grants relate to funding received from the ESFA to carry out works of a capital nature.

Unrestricted fund

This fund relates to nursery and wrap around care and has no restrictions placed upon it.

Transfer between funds

A transfer has been made from unrestricted to restricted general funds to support the running costs of the Academy.

18. PENSION AND SIMILAR OBLIGATIONS

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Worcestershire County Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS to the period ended 31 March 2019.

Contributions amounting to £17,474 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2023 (2022 - £17,018) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' pension scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the teachers' pension scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to
 the effective date of £218,100 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the
 notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million, giving a notional past service deficit of
 £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. The assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2024.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £98,206 (2022 - £82,850).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

The 31 March 2016 TPS actuarial valuation results were implemented from 1 September 2019. The latest actuarial TPS valuation results, as at 31 March 2020, were released in October 2023. The revised employer contribution rate, arising from this valuation, is due to be implemented from 1 April 2024.

Local government pension scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2023 was £71,747 (2022 - £61,933), of which employer's contributions totalled £56,010 (2022 - £49,023). and employees' contributions totalled £15,737 (2022 - £12,910). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 18.50 per cent for employers and 6.50 per cent for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of an academy trust closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

On 21 July 2023, the Department for Education reaffirmed its commitment to the guarantee, with a parliamentary minute published on GOV.UK.
