# Report of the Trustees For The Year Ended 31 August 2020

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditor's report of the Charitable Company for the period 1 September 2019 to 31 August 2020. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report, and a directors' report under company law.

The trust operates an academy for infant school pupils up to the age of seven in the Ossett area. There were 86 children on the school roll during the year.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### **Objects and Aims**

The Academy Trust's objective is specifically restricted to the following: to advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the forgoing by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing an infant's school offering a broad and balanced curriculum.

#### **Achievements and Performance**

The Trust has continued to build on its attainment and progress. There is, however, no end of year 2019-2020 results available as end of year assessment in EYFSP, Y1 Phonics checks and Y2 SATs/TA were cancelled due to the Covid pandemic. At the last internal data point, summative data and pupil progression discussions indicated pupils were on track to achieve in line with expectations. These expectations are in line with previous years' outcomes.

#### Key financial performance indicators

The main financial performance indicator in reporting to the Board of Trustees has been monthly revenue against monthly expenditure for key budget headings / items (for example salaries, building costs, maintenance).

#### Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries the Board of Trustees has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the statement of accounting policies.

#### **Financial Review**

Most of the Academy's income is obtained from the ESFA in the form of recurrent grants the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the ESFA for the year ended 31 August 2020 and the associated expenditure are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities

During the year ended 31 August 2020 total expenditure (excluding depreciation and FRS102 adjustments, including assets purchased out of revenue funds) of £601,000 was covered by recurrent grant funding plus capital funding, other incoming resources and reserves brought forward. The excess of expenditure over income for the year was £31,000 excluding actuarial losses and adjustments on the Local Government Pension Scheme.

At 31 August 2020 the net book value of fixed assets was £949,000. The value of these fixed assets includes those which were donated by Wakefield Metropolitan District Council and Education Ossett Community Trust as part of the transfer agreement.

During the year expenditure has been incurred on the fire escape refurbishment, additional maintenance and upkeep of the premises. The assets were used exclusively for improving the educational provision and the associated support services to the pupils of the academy.

The deficit in the Local Government Pension Scheme is recognised on the balance sheet in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102. At 31 August 2020, the deficit was £500,000.

#### **Reserves Policy**

The Trustees review the level of reserves held by the Trust annually. This review encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves. At the end of the year the trust held £99,000 of unrestricted reserves and £159,000 of general restricted reserves giving a total on general reserves of £258,000. The fixed asset fund includes £949,000 which can only be realised from the sale of fixed assets. The reserves are held to ensure the academy has sufficient resources to continue to advance the education of pupils, including incurring the necessary capital expenditure.

#### **Investment Policy**

The Trustees have resolved to invest any funds available in a short term, low risk, bank deposit account.

#### Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trustees have assessed the major risks and uncertainties to which the Trust is exposed, in particular those relating specifically to teaching, provision of facilities and other operational areas of the trust and its finances.

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the academy are as follows:

- Financial the Academy has considerable reliance on continued Government funding through the ESFA. Governors and Senior Leadership Team are aware that this funding is decreasing, both in real terms and as a percentage increase against rising costs.
- Failures in governance and /or in management to effectively manage the Academy's finances, internal controls, compliance with regulations and legislation, statutory returns.
- Fraud and mismanagement of funds failure to find a suitably qualified person to conduct internal audit.
- Safeguarding and Child protection the Trustees continue to ensure the highest standards are maintained in the areas of selection and monitoring of staff, the operation of child protection policies and procedures, health and safety and discipline.

The Trustees have implemented a number of systems to assess risks that the trust faces, especially in the operational areas, including Health and Safety on academy visits, and in relation to academy finance. There are systems in place to minimise risks including operational procedures i.e. vetting new staff and internal financial controls. Where significant risk still remains the Trustees have ensured they have adequate insurance cover. The Trust has effective systems of internal control as follows:-

- 1 The Board of Trustees is responsible for ensuring that the academy:
- keeps proper accounting records during the year which will disclose, with reasonable accuracy and at any time, the financial position of the academy, which have been drawn up in accordance with the DfE guidelines, and will enable it to prepare an annual income and expenditure statement that complies with DfE guidelines
- maintains and operates an effective system of internal control to safeguard all the resources delegated, granted or otherwise entrusted to the academy and ensure they are used cost effectively

- 2 The system of internal control has been developed and is co-ordinated by the Headteacher. It aims to provide as much assurance as is reasonably possible (not absolute assurance) that assets are safeguarded, transactions are properly authorised and recorded and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or can be detected promptly.
- 3 Our review of the effectiveness of the systems of internal control is informed by:
- our regular scrutiny of financial and other performance monitoring data
- regular reports from the Headteacher and other managers to the Trustees
- our most recent self-evaluation of the internal controls undertaken

#### Financial and risk management objectives and policies

The Trustees consider the financial health six times per year and the Chair of Trustees and Accounting Officer examine this on a monthly basis, reviewing performance against budget and overall expenditure. At the period end, the Academy has no significant liabilities arising from trade creditors or debtors where there would be a significant effect on liquidity.

The Board of Trustees recognises that the defined benefit scheme (Local Government Pension Scheme) represents a significant potential liability. However as the Trustees consider that the Academy is able to meet its known annual contribution commitments for the foreseeable future, the risk from the liability is minimised. In addition parliament has undertaken to underwrite this deficit in the event of academy closure.

We continue to have a strong willingness to engage with outside partners and with new and innovative practices which will help us secure high levels of attainment and progress for all.

#### **Fundraising**

We have an organisation called Friends of South Ossett Infants' Academy, known as 'Friends'. Parents and friends are invited to join and 'Friends' raises funds for the school, through organising activities such as raffles, cake stalls, creating and making Christmas cards etc. The money raised is banked as 'School Fund' and this is used to add to our curriculum offering (for example arranging an artist to come and make clay tiles with the children) or for extras - such as our Christmas pantomime, playground benches and reading shelter.

The trust do not, normally, work with professional fundraisers or companies who carry out fundraising on its behalf.

Complaints are handled and monitored through the Trusts' complaints procedure. During the year no complaints or issues have arisen as a result of the fundraising events. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the Trustees.

#### Plans for future periods

We aim to be able to support other schools whist maintaining our own high standards. We aim to provide the highest educational opportunities for all our children as well as providing professional development for all teaching and support staff so that the academy is self-developing and self-supporting in the future.

The Governing Body meet annually with the Headteacher and School Business Manager to look at strategy for moving the academy forward, looking at educational opportunities and possible financial efficiencies with a one year, three year and five year strategic outlook.

SDP Priorities for this year are as follows:

Quality of Education; Review curriculum, intent, implementation and impact; begin to implement any changes

- Continue with and begin to embed changes to curriculum, process interrupted by changes required by Covid 19 closure to most pupils
- By end of 2020-21 all teachers and practitioners will have a shared understanding of what is taught in most subjects across all phases of school and how to build on previous learning.

Quality of Education; Strengthen focus on challenge, language and specific vocabulary in both curriculum areas and Areas of Learning (AoL)

- The long closure of school to most pupils and limited re-opening from 15th June impacted upon this being fully realised in 2019-20. There was evidence of progress made but still areas for development in AoL to fully utilise this for all children
- Use of Enquiry Based Learning (EBL) approach, introduced across KS1, leads to higher quality use of AoL by all children
- Increased evidence of high quality language use in all areas

Quality of Education; Create a digital platform to support remote learning and, with staff training, use to continue and support learning for children at home

- Current pandemic is an ongoing situation which will lead to some children missing time from school, with potential for closure of "bubbles" for two weeks+
- The platform enhances and supports the work of staff and the children's learning
- Embed references to Oak National Academy within planning for children working at home to meet the requirement for daily teaching

Leadership and Management; Ensure QFT remains strong and limit the impact of changes to staffing and staffing hours

- Changes to staffing and teams for 2020-21 (on top of changes from last year)
- Staff are given timetabled time to work together, discuss and identify any challenges and feed these back to SLT
- Governors remain aware of staffing and impact of current structures through regular updates and budget implications at standards and resources committee meetings and FGB meeting

Key Stage Leaders - FS and KS1 - have regular "Whole Team" meetings with opportunities to feed back to Headteacher and address any issues arising.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Constitution

South Ossett Infants' Academy Trust was incorporated on 17 November 2011 and opened as an academy on 1 December 2011. The Academy Trust is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The Charitable Company's Memorandum and the Articles of Association are the primary governing documents of the Academy Trust.

The Trustees of South Ossett Infants' Academy Trust are also directors of the Charitable Company for the purposes of Company Law. The Charitable Company is known as South Ossett Infants' Academy Trust.

Details of the Trustees who have served throughout the year and to the date these accounts are approved, except as noted, are included in the reference and administrative details on page 1.

#### Members' liability

Each member of the Charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Charitable Company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10 for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

#### **Trustees' Indemnities**

Trustees benefit from indemnity insurance purchased at the Academy Trust's expense to cover the liability of the Trustees which by virtue of any rule of law would otherwise attach to them in respect of negligence, default or breach of trust or breach of duty of which they may be guilty in relation to the Academy Trust, provided that any such insurance shall not extend to any claim arising from any act or omission which the Trustees knew to be in breach of trust or a breach of duty or which was committed by Trustees in reckless disregard to whether it was a breach of duty or not and provided also that any such insurance shall not extend to the costs of any unsuccessful defence to a criminal prosecution brought against the Trustees in their capacity as directors of the Academy Trust.

#### Method of Recruitment and Appointment or Election of Trustees

All Trustees are elected democratically. Each year the Chair and Vice Chair positions are voted on at the first Board of Trustees meeting of the year. Committee changes are also carried out during meetings where any changes are discussed and reasons for any change are addressed.

Parent representative appointments are carried out formally when they arise. As a small infant school the election of parent Trustees is often frequent. If they are suitable for another vacancy when their term of office ends, due to their child leaving, they may be co-opted. Parent vacancies are always advertised to all parents, be their child in full or part time schooling. Any parents who wish to be nominated for election put forward to other parents their reasons for wanting to be a Trustee. These are then shared with the other parents and an election is held.

At each Board of Trustees' meeting, during the constitution agenda item, Local Authority Professionals (LAPS) are discussed. During the year ending 31st August 2020 we had no persons on the GB who was identified as LAP. When a parent election is held there is a LAAP (Local Authority Appointed Person) restriction placed on the applications.

One of the Board of Trustees Members has responsibility as the Training Link Trustee. All Trustees attend New Trustee Training and a training record for all Trustees is kept by the Local Authority. We have maintained a Service Level Agreement with the local Authority to ensure training is available to all Trustees. We have a good record of Trustees attending governor training to increase their governance skills and knowledge.

#### Policies and Procedures Adopted for the Induction and Training of Trustees

All Trustees receive a briefing from the Headteacher and Chair of Trustees and are eligible to attend training provided by WMDC, into which the Academy contracts.

Where specific training is required or strongly recommended, as for recruitment of staff or for safeguarding purposes, the Board of Trustees agrees which members should receive training as appropriate to their role and arranges for attendance at the next available course.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Organisational Structure

The management structure consists of three levels,

- 1 The Umbrella Trust (Ossett Community Trust)
- 2 The Board of Directors (Trustees)
- 3 The Senior Leadership team

The aim of the management structure is to develop responsibility and encourage involvement in decision making at all levels. The Trustees are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring the Trust by the use of results and budgets and making major decisions about the direction of the trust, capital expenditure and senior staff appointments.

The senior leaders are the Headteacher to the Academy, teachers who hold Teaching and Learning responsibility posts (both which show incremental difference) and the School Business Manager. The senior leaders control the academy and implement policy and report to the directors. As a group they are responsible for the authorisation of spending within agreed budgets and the appointment of staff, though appointment boards for posts within the Leadership Team always contain a Trustee.

The academies/schools incorporated have developed systems of quality assurance across a range of performance indicators.

Annually, (usually early autumn term) the academy will conduct a summative evaluation of performance indicators including performance data, learning and teaching, behaviour (including attendance and exclusions) and leadership and management of South Ossett Infants' Academy data. This will be conducted by the head and at least one member. If the performance of the academy in any of these areas is of concern and represents a downward trend (based on more than one years' data) an action plan will be written by the head with an agreement for mutual support and/or advice sought from other academies or schools from the same educational phase, if identified as required. Action plans will be agreed by members and shared with the individual governing body. Action plans will identify lead personnel, will be timed and have agreed targets and procedures for monitoring and evaluating impact. The umbrella is a member of the individual academy trusts and therefore can exercise their powers as a member. If the individual Board of Trustees does not support or respond to any action plans for improvement they will be subject to a member's decision to exercise their powers of appointment to replace the Trustees.

#### Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The pay and remuneration of the Headteacher, School Business Manager, Foundation Stage Leader and Key Stage 1 Leader are determined in accordance with our Pay Policy 2019/2020. Clear criteria for receiving a TLR or increment are identified. The performance of the School Business Manager, Foundation Stage Leader, and Key Stage 1 Leader is managed by the Headteacher and thus used to determine if an increment is to be recommended for Resources and Audit Committee approval. The Headteacher's performance management is conducted by Governors, supported by an external advisor.

#### Related Parties and other Connected Charities and Organisations

There are no connected organisations or related parties. The academy participates informally where appropriate in local networks operating within the Local Education Authority area. A Memorandum of Understanding has been agreed with other schools in the Umbrella Trust. We are also an associate member of Education Ossett Community Trust and as such work collaboratively and have a common admissions policy. Other policies, ie Equality Policy and Safeguarding Policy, are agreed as common policies that run alongside our academy's own policies.

#### Scope of Responsibility

As trustees, we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that South Ossett Infants' Academy Trust has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. However such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement of loss.

As trustees, we have reviewed and taken account of the guidance in DFE's Governance Handbook and competency framework for governance.

The board of trustees has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Headteacher, as accounting officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between South Ossett Infants' Academy Trust and the Secretary of State for Education. They are also responsible for reporting to the board of trustees any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

#### Governance

The information on governance included here supplements that described in the Report of the Trustees and in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities. The board of trustees has formally met 5 times during the year. Attendance during the year at meetings of the board of trustees was as follows:

During the year we had one resignation and one new appointment to the board of trustees. As at 31 August 2020 we have two vacancies.

#### **Board Performance**

The Board's performance has fulfilled all our statutory duties. The Board has challenged effectively via specific questioning at committees and full Governing Body meetings so that these are more focussed. Questions can be sent to the Headteacher prior to full Governing Body meetings in relation to the Headteacher's report and any other documents that Governors have received that are pertinent to the meeting.

Particular challenges have included sourcing a suitable new company to replace the existing arrangements for premises compliance. The continued focus on Health and Safety and Fire Safety regulations under both the old and new compliance arrangements. The ongoing impact of the new staffing structure. The impact of the pandemic, the closure of school to most pupils on the 20 March 2020, the requirement to open to vulnerable children and children of key workers, the necessity of ensuring safety of staff and children throughout the pandemic, the wider re-opening of school in June 2020. Sourcing adequate levels of cleaning and PPE products and the additional costs of these. The impact of the pandemic on the wellbeing of staff and children. The need to balance staff workload against the requirement for schools to be open but also provide education for home learners. The implementation of the new internal audit system.

Prior to early March 2020 the governing body undertook monitoring visits to school and gave feedback. After March contact became 'virtual' and data was shared via Teams meetings and emails with committees and the wider governing body.

Due to the closure of schools to most pupils - 20 March 2020 to June 2020, monitoring visits during this time were not undertaken but the full governing body were kept informed. They were fully involved in agreeing Risk Assessments and other strategies around the partial opening to vulnerable and key worker children and the wider opening of school in June. Though the March Full Governing Body meeting was cancelled in its usual, clerked, face-to-face format, there were numerous Teams meetings and email correspondence undertaken in relation to governance over this time and throughout the whole of 2019-2020.

#### **Board Performance**

The data received by the Board is very comprehensive and supported by excellent subject knowledge of staff concerned, who also produce further evidence which underpins the data presented, when challenged.

There is a training link governor and governors have attended training to increase their skills as a Governing Body.

The Board recognises that while there has been an improvement in the level of questioning there is always room for improvement. However the understanding of information received has increased.

The board of trustees has continued to support the Headteacher throughout her seventh year of headship.

During the year Governance was reviewed in a number of ways.

The action points and the topics and subjects set from the previous annual strategy meeting were reviewed to monitor development and to assess the impact. An annual self-review has been carried out at Full Governing Body level which did not highlight any issues for concern, but this will be continually reviewed.

We had one new Trustee in this year and all Trustees attend regular training to be abreast of up-to-date information. The training link Trustee indicates pertinent training. The declarations of interest were also reviewed.

The staff presentations that would have been made at Full Governing Body meetings did not take place as during the pandemic the Governing Body met remotely and much of these meetings were taken up with discussions and decisions to ensure that school could open safely under changing government guidelines. The staff presentations would normally ensure a greater depth of understanding regarding information that comes from school so that Trustees can better assess and challenge the information where necessary.

There has been no external review this year.

The next self-evaluation will take place in Term 2 of the year 2020/2021, linked into the annual strategy meeting.

The Resources and Audit Committee is a sub-committee of the main board of trustees. Its purpose is to ensure that the academy's resources and finances are managed efficiently and effectively and in line with guidance in the Academies Financial Handbook.

The Resources and Audit Committee meets on a regular basis at least once every half term. Six meetings were scheduled. The School Business Manager joins the committee to support the financial decisions of the committee. Attendance at meetings in the year was as follows:-

#### **Review of Value for Money**

As accounting officer the Headteacher has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where applicable. The accounting officer, in liaison with the business manager, for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

- an ongoing review that staffing hours reflected the needs of the school and the capacity of the budget to provide this.
- continuing to bring repairs/maintenance in-house this will be an on-going saving.
- by making decisions, where appropriate, not to spend on certain areas of the budget.
- seeking to ensure at all times that staff feel valued and supported.

# Governance Statement For The Year Ended 31 August 2020

#### Review of Value for Money

The academy continued to receive a limited catering offer from our catering providers during the partial closure of school during the first national lock-down. We are in discussion with this provider under PPN 02/20 and 04/20 guidance around the exact amounts owed and owing. The guidance states our need to support 'at risk' providers whilst also stating an expectation that the academy will ensure these are accurate costs on an open-book basis. There will be part-payment made once all costs have been provided and checked.

#### The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in South Ossett Infants' Academy for the period 1 September 2019 to 31 August 2020 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

#### Capacity to Handle Risk

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed, together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2019 to 31 August 2020 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

#### The Risk and Control Framework

The academy trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees;
- monthly reviews by the Chair of Trustees and Accounting Officer of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- regular reviews by the Resources and Audit Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- delegation of authority and segregation of duties;
- identification and management of risks.

The trustees had previously appointed Tony Sargeant, a trustee as Responsible Officer (RO) to carry out a programme of internal checks. The RO role includes giving advice on financial and other matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial systems. The responsible officer carried out two visits to school during 2019-2020 and a planned third visit was cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions. The responsible officer reports to the board of trustees, through the resources and audit committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities and annually prepares an annual summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress. The checks carried out in the current period included:

- monitoring of cheques and all invoices and documentation relating to them
- review of registers relating to completion of health and safety checks

The Governing Body asked our External Auditors for the cost of performing additional internal audits, in line with the Academies Financial Handbook, however, this was prohibitively expensive and is no longer permitted under the revised FRC Ethical Standard for Auditors. The Governing Body then began to look for an alternative person to conduct the internal audits. This process was affected by the pandemic.

#### **Review of Effectiveness**

As Accounting Officer, the Headteacher has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- the work of the Responsible Officer;
- the work of the external auditor;
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process;
- the work of the executive managers within the Academy trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The Accounting Officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the Resources and Audit Committee and will ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

# Notes to the Financial Statements For The Year Ended 31 August 2020

#### 1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', the Academies Accounts Direction 2019 to 2020 issued by the ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

#### **Donations**

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy has provided the goods or services.

#### Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Upon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items they are not recognised in the financial statements until they are sold. This income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

#### **Donated fixed assets**

Where the donated good is a fixed asset it is measured at fair value, unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor should be used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the charity's accounting policies.

### Notes to the Financial Statements - continued For The Year Ended 31 August 2020

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **Donated fixed assets**

The academy's land and buildings were gifted by Education Ossett-Community Trust on conversion. The buildings were valued on conversion at depreciated replacement cost and are depreciated over the remainder of their life. Land was valued on a similar basis at conversion. This has not subsequently been depreciated. Other fixed assets transferred on conversion were valued at original cost less depreciation to the date of conversion.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities are incurred on the charity's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

#### Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the academy trust's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees' meetings and reimbursed expenses.

#### Intangible assets

Intangible assets are costing £500 or more are capitalised and recognised when future economic benefits are probable and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably. Intangible assets are initially recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost net of amortisation and any provision for impairment. Amortisation is provided on intangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Purchased computer software

over 5 years

#### Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £500 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. The related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on such assets is charged to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities so as to reduce the fund over the useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the academy trust's depreciation policy.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land and assets under construction, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Freehold buildings

over 29 years, being the remainder of the life of the

buildings

Furniture and equipment

over 5 years

Computer Equipment

over 3 years

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use and reclassified to freehold or leasehold land and buildings.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

### **Financial instruments**

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined by FRS102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

#### Financial instruments

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 15. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank - is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 16. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

#### **Taxation**

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by part 11, chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objectives of the academy trust at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

#### **Pension benefits**

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary based on quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. The TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employees. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income / (expenditure) are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

#### Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

#### Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

#### Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

# Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in the Pension and Similar Obligations note, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2019 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2020. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

#### 21. PENSION AND SIMILAR OBLIGATIONS

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by West Yorkshire Pension Authority. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS 31 March 2019

Contributions amounting to £8,343 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2020 (2019: £7,168) and are included within creditors.

#### Teachers' pension scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TRS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

### Valuation of the teachers' pension scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration levv)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. Assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2023.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £52,000 (2019: £42,000).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

#### Local government pension scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2020 was £29,000 (2019: £32,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £22,000 (2019: £24,000) and employees' contributions totalled £7,000 (2019: £8,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 17 per cent for employers and between 5.5 and 12.5 per cent for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of an academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

#### 22. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

Owing to the nature of the academy trust and the comparison of the board of trustees being drawn from local public and private sector organisations, transactions may take place with organisations in which the trustees have an interest. P Smales' appointment was made in open competition and Y Smith was not involved in the decision making process regarding appointment. P Smales is paid within the normal pay scale for his role and receives no special treatment as a result of his relationship to the business manager.
