Objective and activities

The objectives of Melton Vineyard are:

- To advance the Christian faith in accordance with the statement of beliefs, including but not limited to the planting of other Vineyard churches.
- To further Christian education.
- To relieve sickness and financial hardship and to promote and preserve good health by the provision of funds, goods or services of any kind, including through the provision of counselling, training in life skills and support.
- To provide or assist in the provision of facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, financial hardship or social circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life.

These objectives are to be carried out in such ways and such parts of Melton Mowbray, the United Kingdom or the world as the trustees may from time to time think fit.

Hope Centre

The central focus during this period has been the refurbishment and opening of the Hope Centre (previously, the Old Baptist Church) on Nottingham Street. As detailed in last year's report, the building was purchased in October 2018 with the help of funds donated over several years by church members and a mortgage from Reliance Bank.

Woodhead Construction began the refurbishment works in June 2019, which included a full redesign of the main downstairs space, the removal of a glazed shop-front, the installation of new central heating, electrical and security systems, the construction of a new church office, the installation of a platform lift, a new kitchen, a new shower and several new WCs.

The works took three months to complete and the building was handed over on 27 August. After this, church members carried out interior decorations and additional fittings; finally, an external contractor laid floor coverings for the front section of the building. The Mayor of Melton officially opened the Hope Centre on 1 November.

Further works on the rear section of the building (Storehouse) were held over for a second phase, which began in January 2020 with the assistance of a £42k grant from the National Lottery Community Fund and a number of smaller gifts and grants. The phase two works were due to be completed by the end of March 2020, but Covid-19 interrupted the final stages, causing delays.

Between November 2019 and mid-March, the Hope Centre hosted a range of arts and community-focused events including an album launch, a performance of *A Christmas Carol* by Charles Dickens' great-great-grandson, Gerald Dickens, a concert by folk singer and guitarist, Sam Carter and a Big Quiz Night, which raised funds for the charity Hope for Justice. The Hope Centre was also one of the venues for the Melton Folk Festival in December and served refreshments free-of-charge to the public during the Children In Need Rickshaw Challenge event in the town centre.

Other activities launched during these months were: a weekly Baby Café to support mothers with young babies, a Jigsaw Club, ESOL classes, an After-School Lego Club, a Mending Clinic, Woolly Crafters, free Christmas gift wrapping sessions, Open Hope Centre drop-in sessions, and Superstar Light and Pancake parties for parents and young children. It had been hoped to relaunch the Melton Vineyard Toddler Group in March, but the Covid-19 outbreak meant that this and other activities planned for the venue had to be suspended.

To advance the Christian faith in accordance with the statement of beliefs, including but not limited to the planting of other Vineyard churches.

Melton Vineyard continues to serve both its members and the wider community of Melton by providing opportunities for Christian worship, prayer, education and social outreach. Regular Sunday services were held throughout the year at John Ferneley College, including three All Age Services and a special Christmas service with carols and drama.

Average attendance at Sunday services for 2019-20 was 157, an increase over last year's figure of 141. However, the number of regular contacts in the Church address book remained stable at around 274 adults and children.

Prayer events included regular men's prayer breakfasts every Friday morning and once a month on Saturday, several women's prayer breakfasts and a monthly church prayer meeting. There was also a special twelve hours of prayer event for Advent in the Hope Centre and we continued to offer to pray for shoppers in Melton town centre once a month. We also provided prayer ministry training to volunteers.

Several Connect events and newcomers meals took place, extending a welcome to those new to the church, and a range of social events organised during the year included a Blue Monday Clothes Swap, family breakfasts and picnics, a fundraising curry night, team socials and a Church Weekend Away at Quinta Hall, Shropshire, in August 2019.

Melton Vineyard is a participating member of Churches Together in Melton Mowbray and took part in joint events such as Lent Lunches, a Good Friday Walk of Witness, a performance of the People's Passion during Holy Week, the Bare Tree Hope Festival, the week of prayer for Christian Unity, Pentecost Prayer in the market place, and Carols at Christmas. Regular contributions were also made to a Thought for the Day slot on local radio and prayers for the Melton Times.

Melton Vineyard has 427 followers on Facebook, up from 312 last year. There was also an increase in followers on Instagram to 227 and on Twitter to 697. On 22 March, in response to the Covid-19 lockdown, the church began posting its Sunday Service online via YouTube.

To further Christian education.

Young Vineyard continued to offer age-appropriate groups and activities for children and youth and provided support for our teens and young people to attend national youth events, including Dreaming the Impossible in May, Soul Survivor in August, and Cause To Live For in November. We include teenage musicians and singers in our Sunday worship bands and offer them additional training and experience in this area.

In 2019-20 we offered weekly Small Groups and courses for adults. Numbers remained consistent across the year with 11—12 groups running each term and average take-up ranging from 110—120.

Courses offered included How to Read the Bible, Freedom in Christ, the Marriage Course, Towards Belief, Money Management, Alpha, The Grace Course, Stop Dieting: Start Living and Mere Christianity.

We trained and released 7 new leaders and offered ongoing training and support for existing leaders, including GDPR refresher training and manual handling training. Regular meetings and training events were also provided to support leaders and their teams, in particular Pastoral Care, Young Vineyard, Storehouse and Worship. The newly formed Breathing Space team (see below) also received regular training for the community listening service they provide.

As in previous years, leaders were encouraged to attend the Vineyard National Leaders Conference, which was held in Nottingham in January, but, regrettably, the national Worship Team Conference planned for March was cancelled due to Covid-19.

To relieve sickness and financial hardship and to promote and preserve good health by the provision of funds, goods or services of any kind, including through the provision of counselling, training in life skills and support.

For most of this period Storehouse, our community food and clothes bank and drop-in centre, continued to operate from the converted Fox public house on Leicester Street, with generous support from Churches Together in Melton, local business, community groups, schools, colleges and individuals, including a regular gift of £200 per month from Aurora Rotary Club for breakfast cereals and milk. We also gratefully acknowledge the long-term support of the Hudson's and Storer's Charities, which enabled us to use the Fox rent-free. At the end of March 2020, Storehouse moved from the Fox to its new base at the Hope Centre.

This year the system for allocating bags was revised, resulting in a slightly lower total figure for bags given out: 2,481. We also received fewer referrals this year: 1,817, as opposed to the previous year's figure of 2,433. As usual, estimates of the value of goods donated to and given out from Storehouse are included in the annual accounts. Storehouse continued the popular 'reverse advent calendar' initiative, with individuals and families donating an item per day during advent.

Melton Vineyard employs a part-time paid Co-ordinator for Storehouse, working three days per week to supervise a large volunteer team made up of people from Melton Vineyard and other local churches, and non-churchgoers wishing to volunteer in the community. During much of this period the role of Storehouse Co-ordinator was fulfilled by a maternity cover replacement. The church also employs a part-time Storehouse administrator on flexible hours.

Throughout most of this period Storehouse continued to offer regular soup and bread lunches every Friday afternoon, and hot drinks and snacks on Monday and Wednesday mornings. No referrals were needed for attendance at these sessions. Storehouse food bags were distributed primarily via the Fox and we supplied local agencies with a small number of bags. The Covid-19 pandemic, which emerged in March 2020, interrupted regular operations and Storehouse switched to distributing bags directly to people's homes, in collaboration with the Melton Borough Council Crisis Team and other agencies.

Storehouse has continued to run activities such as access to IT and given help with job applications and benefits claims, working in partnership with more than 30 local agencies, organisations and businesses, including Melton Borough Council, Social Services, MADMAC (Melton and District Money Advice Centre), Family Outreach Teams, Myst Lodge and

Westbourne House, The Venue, the Furniture Project, Melton Rotary, Masterfoods, Sainsbury's, Morrisons and Tescos. Storehouse has continued to provide work experience opportunities for students from Birch Wood School and for residents from the Lodge Trust, Market Overton.

During this year the church was also delighted to be able to offer an office work placement for a young man with learning difficulties, who subsequently went on to gain regular employment in one of the town's retail outlets.

The new listening ear service in the community, Breathing Space took more referrals from Latham House Medical Practice this year, offering a confidential space for adults (18+) to talk through any concerns they have. The service helped more than 100 people over the period and has received overwhelmingly positive feedback with clients reporting stress levels going down and feelings of peace and hope returning.

Melton Vineyard maintained its support for two projects in La Ceiba, Honduras: Iglesia Cristo Te Llama, a city church which feeds some of the poorest people in that area, and the Children of the Light orphanage, which provides a home, training and education for boys. Throughout the year the Church has sent regular donations, helping to alleviate poverty and to support children through their education.

To provide or assist in the provision of facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, financial hardship or social circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life.

In 2019-20 our Small Groups undertook a variety of small-scale community-focused projects and events, which included giving out £1 tokens to shoppers for supermarket trolleys, singing carols at the Amwell Care Home and giving each resident a card and box of chocolates, sending an Easter gift and message to residents of the Amwell, and making up Christmas hampers for staff working at Latham House, Melton Police Station, Melton Fire Station, St Mary's Hospital Birthing Unit.

The church has organised or taken part in many leisure and social welfare activities, the majority of which are listed above in the Hope Centre section of this report. We also ran Stay and Play sessions for parents and children at the Cove Children's Centre in July and August.

Together with other churches, we continue to support the Melton Mowbray Child Contact Centre. This was the sixth year of operation for another Churches Together venture supported by Melton Vineyard – the Community Family Lunch – which offers a weekly free meal with activities running alongside to parents and children over the summer holidays. Families were served at both the Fairmead Sure Start Centre in the north of the town and the Edge Sure Start Centre in the south, with support and collaboration from the Sure Start Team.

For the third year running church members gave practical support to a mission to HMP Stocken run by Kairos Prison Ministry by baking cookies for inmates and staff.

Subsequent events

As across the rest of the UK, the Covid-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on church activities. As noted above, Sunday services moved online at the end of March and most have had

between 170–200 views, with numbers holding up well over time. Small Groups and other church meetings have also been held online throughout the summer months.

To date church income has not been significantly impacted, no staff have needed to be furloughed and no job cuts are currently envisaged. However, the trustees are aware that this situation could change over time and continue to monitor the finances closely.

It is hoped that some community-focused events and other church activities will resume during 2020-21, whilst, of course, taking into account all Government rules and guidelines and the need to safeguard staff, volunteers, church members and the general public.

Public Benefit

The trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the commission on public benefit.

Organisational structure

Melton Vineyard is a company limited by guarantee as well as a registered charity, in which the company directors also form the board of trustees. The day to day running of the church is delegated to the pastoral and administrative staff/volunteers led by Neal Swettenham and Eluned Owen.

Financial performance

The Charity has not been materially affected by the Covid-19 pandemic as set out in the Subsequent Events section above. The financial statements as presented show a net surplus of funds for the year of £145,418 (2019: £95,149). This unusually high surplus was due to a large amount of restricted donations for our building project - this restricted fund alone accounted for £127,413 of this surplus (2019: £64,062). All of this was spent on refurbishment of the Hope Centre during the year and so the surplus represents an increase in the value of our building and thus total assets, which we expect to facilitate our work and ministries for many years to come.

We were also pleased to see that our unrestricted surplus for the year was £18,005 (2019: £31,087).

Melton Vineyard is a member-supported church; however, those on low incomes, or who may, for any other reason, be unable or unwilling to offer this kind of support, are in no way excluded from any activities, having full access to them at all times.

Reserves policy

Total net assets as presented are £521,431. This figure includes £18,077 held as reserves to cover three months' liabilities in the event of a significant drop in income. The trustees considered this to be an appropriate level of reserves to hold consistent with policy and present activities. This figure will be reviewed in the next financial period to reflect the increased liabilities attached to owning a building.

Responsibilities of trustees under company law

The trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice). Selecting suitable accounting policies and applying them consistently.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- 1. select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- 2. observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- 3. make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- 4. state whether the applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- 5. prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

TO THE TRUSTEES OF

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

1 Statutory Information

The charity is a charitable company limited by guarantee and is incorporated in the United Kingdom. The company's registered number and registered office address can be found on the Company Information page.

2 Accounting Policies

These financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain assets, which are measured at fair value through the Statement of Financial Activities.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the "Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) ("the Charities SORP"), with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland ("FRS 102"), with the Companies Act 2006 and with the Charities Act 2011. The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity as set out in FRS 102.

The principles adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

a) Going concern

The trustees (who are the charitable company's directors for the purposes of company law) have assessed whether the use of the going concern basis is appropriate and have considered possible events or conditions that might cast significant doubt on the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern. The trustees have made this assessment for a period of at least one year from the date of approval of the financial statements. In particular the trustees have considered the charity's forecasts and projections and the possible implications should projected income and / or expenditure vary unexpectedly. The trustees have concluded that there is a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue to operate for the foreseeable future. The charity therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

In making this assessment the trustees have considered the impact of Covid-19 and have concluded that its impact on net income will not be material.

b) <u>Income</u>

Income including investment income is recognised in the period in which the charity becomes entitled to receipt, the amount receivable can be measured with reasonable certainty, and receipt is probable. For the most part, income is generally recognised when it is received. Income is only deferred when the charity has to fulfil conditions before becoming entitled to it or where the donor has specified that the income is to be expended in a future period.

Income from donations includes:

- i) Recoverable gift aid. This is recognised when the related donation is received. Gift aid that has not been recovered by the balance sheet date is included as a debtor.
- ii) Donated facilities, services and goods. Goods donated for distribution to beneficiaries are recognised as income when receivable at fair value (being an estimate of the amount it would cost to purchase those items). Facilities, services and goods donated for the charity's own use are recognised as income when receivable at their value to the charity.

The charity relies on volunteers to carry out many of its activities. However, in accordance with the SORP, the value of these services has not been included in these financial statements as they cannot be reliably measured.

When donated goods, services and facilities are distributed or consumed, an expense in respect of those items is included in the Statement of Financial Activities. At the year end any goods that have not been distributed or consumed are recognised as stock; donated fixed assets are capitalised.

Income from charitable activities represents income receivable from goods, services and facilities supplied in furtherance of the charity's charitable objects. It includes income from church trips, activities and events.

Income from other trading activities represents income receivable from activities undertaken to generate funds for the charity. It includes income from reimbursement of staff time seconded to other organisations and other sales.

Investment income represents income generated by the charity's assets and includes income from bank interest.

d) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity. Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. Restricted funds are donations which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors; they include donations received from appeals for specific activities or projects.

Property with a book value of £745,563 has been pledged as security for these loans. The first loan for £210,000 was taken out on 04/10/2018. Interest is payable at a variable rate, which at the balance sheet date was 2.7% above base rate. The loan is being repaid in monthly instalments and must be repaid in full by 2038. The second loan for £90,000 was taken out on 29/08/2019. The loan is interest free until 30/08/2021 after which interest is payable at a variable rate, which at the balance sheet date was 2.7% above base rate. The loan is being repaid in monthly instalments and must be repaid in full by 2037.
