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Directors' Report For the Year Ended 31 May 2018

The directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 May 2018.

Principal activity

The principal activity of the business is the generation and sale of electricity, gas and heat,

Business review

The Company's performance continued to improve during the year ending 31 May 2018 enabling it to record earnings before interest, tax and depreciation (EBITDA) of £1,526,021 (2017: £1,181,117). This resulted from increased turnover and continued tight cost control.

Turnover increased 7.2% to average £390,072 per month (2017: £363,905 per month). This was largely driven by increased tariffs and export prices.

The directors expect the Company to maintain its performance in future years.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 May 2018

1. General information

Merlin Renewables Limited is a limited liability company incorporated in England and Wales under the Companies Act. The registered office is 1 Kingsway, London, WC2B 6AN.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Section 1A of Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

2.2 Going concern

On 15 August 2018, the Company repaid loan capital totalling £1,387,650, included in creditors due within one year as at 31 May 2018, and entered into new loan agreements repayable in December 2036 (see Note 21). Consequently, and having made other appropriate enquiries, the directors are satisfied that the Company has adequate resources to continue trading for the foreseeable future. As a result, the directors believe that it is appropriate to continue to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

2.3 Turnover

Turnover comprises revenue recognised by the Company in respect of generation of electricity, gas and heat. Turnover is recognised on a monthly basis as output is transferred.

2.4 Other operating income

Other operating income comprises income from activities falling outside of that defined in 'Turnover' (see Note 2.3) e.g. ad hoc sales of excess feedstock.

2.5 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

The Company adds to the carrying amount of an item of fixed assets the cost of replacing part of such an item when that cost is incurred, if the replacement part is expected to provide incremental future benefits to the Company. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised. Repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 May 2018

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.5 Tangible fixed assets (continued)

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

The estimated useful lives range as follows:

Leasehold improvements

- Over 30 years

Plant and machinery

 Over 20 years for all assets other than major components with a shorter useful economic

life, as detailed below

Plant and machinery - engines - Over 120,000 running hours

- Over 4 years

Motor vehicles
Office equipment

- Over 4 years

Computer equipment

- Over 4 years

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings.

2.6 Valuation of investments

Investments in unlisted Company shares, whose market value can be reliably determined, are remeasured to market value at each balance sheet date. Gains and losses on remeasurement are recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings for the period.

2.7 Stocks

Stocks represent costs of energy crops for use as a feedstock in biogas generation, and spare parts held for plant and machinery on site. All stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

2.8 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

2.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 May 2018

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.10 Financial instruments

With the exception of immaterial investments in unlisted company shares, the Company only enters into basic financial instruments transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable within one year), including loans and other accounts receivable and payable, are initially measured at present value of the future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable within one year, typically trade debtors and creditors, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received. However, if the arrangements of a short-term instrument constitute a financing transaction, like the payment of a trade debt deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate or in case of an out-right short-term loan not at market rate, the financial asset or liability is measured, initially, at the present value of the future cash flow discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument and subsequently at amortised cost.

Investments in non-puttable ordinary and preference shares are measured at fair value with changes recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings if the shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. If a financial asset has a variable interest rate, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the current effective interest rate determined under the contract.

For financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and best estimate of the recoverable amount, which is an approximation of the amount that the Company would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the balance sheet date.

2.11 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.12 Foreign currency translation

Functional and presentation currency

The Company's functional and presentational currency is GBP.

Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the spot exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

At each period end foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate. Non-monetary items measured at historical cost are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction and non-monetary items measured at fair value are measured using the exchange rate when fair value was determined.

Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of transactions and from the translation at period-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings except when deferred in other comprehensive income as qualifying cash flow hedges.

Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of transactions and from the translation at period-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings.

2.13 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

2.14 Operating leases: the Company as lessee

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings on a straight line basis over the lease term.

2.15 Interest income

Interest income is recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings using the effective interest method.

2.16 Borrowing costs

All borrowing costs are recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings in the year in which they are incurred.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.17 Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings, except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the Balance Sheet date, except that:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

21. Post balance sheet events

On 15 August 2018, following its acquisition of 100% of the share capital of the Company (both A and B Ordinary shares), John Laing Environmental Assets Group (UK) Limited became the Company's parent undertaking and controlling party.

On 15 August 2018, the Company repaid loan capital totalling £1,387,650 (the same amount as included within 'Creditors:Amounts falling due within one year' as at 31 May 2018) which incurred interest at a rate of 6.5% per annum. On the same date, the Company entered into an agreement with its parent company whereby loan capital of up to £1,399,150 will be available at an interest rate of 9% per annum, repayable on 31 December 2036.

On 26 September 2018, under the terms of a Special Resolution, the Company cancelled:

- 5,031,528 A Ordinary Shares of £0.01 each (totalling £50,315);
- 9,893,931 B Ordinary Shares of £0.01 each (totalling £98,939); and
- its Share premium account (totalling £9,380,878).

All amounts were credited to the Profit and loss account with the remaining A Ordinary shares being renamed as Ordinary shares.

The Company declared and paid dividends of £790,000 on 26 November 2018, and £200,000 on 24 December 2018.

22. Controlling party

There was no one ultimate controlling party throughout the year. Post year end, John Laing Environmental Assets Group (UK) Limited purchased 100% of shares and became the Company's parent undertaking and controlling party, as detailed in Note 21.
