Trustees' report Year to 31 August 2021

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the audited financial statements and Auditors' Report of London Academy of Excellence Tottenham (the Academy) for the year ended 31 August 2021. The annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 31 to 37 of the attached financial statements and comply with the Academy's Memorandum and Articles of Association, applicable laws and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Trust comprises a single Academy of the same name which opened on 1 September 2017.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Academy Trust is a company limited by guarantee (registration number 08291601) and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the Academy Trust. The Trustees of London Academy of Excellence Tottenham are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law.

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Trustees' indemnities

The Academy has opted into the risk protection arrangement (RPA) for Academy Trusts, which is a mechanism through which the cost of risks that materialise will be covered by government funds. Part of this mechanism protects Trustees and officers from claims arising from the negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring whilst on Academy business. The scheme provides unlimited cover on any one claim and the cost for the period was included in the total costs paid for the risk protection arrangement (RPA) for Academy Trusts.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the Academy is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Trust deed and articles of association.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT (continued)

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

New Trustees follow an induction plan. As part of this induction, Trustees are provided with relevant information regarding the structure and performance of the Academy. Trustees also undertake a skills audit and are given relevant information about the governance structure of the Trust and given a Trustee mentor.

Organisational structure

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the appointment and appraisal of the Headteacher and is accountable to the Members of the Academy Trust and the Department for Education.

The Headteacher is responsible for all aspects of the day to day management and operations of the Academy Trust and is also the Accounting Officer.

Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Academy is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Academy, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

A remuneration committee, consisting of the Chair of Trustees and members from the Finance and Educational Standards and Performance committees, is responsible for the performance management of the Headteacher. The committee is also responsible for agreeing the Headteacher's recommendations regarding the performance management of the Senior Leadership Team. Pay for all senior leaders is set using the agreed LAE Tottenham pay scales, benchmarked against national teacher pay scales.

Trade union facility time

There were no employees who were relevant union officials during the period, so there was no time or percentage of the pay bill spent on facility time. There were no paid trade union activities during the year.

Connected organisations

The school is supported by its Principal Education Sponsor Highgate School and its Business Sponsor, Tottenham Hotspur Football Club. It also benefits from partnerships with eight further independent schools - Alleyn's, Chigwell, Haberdashers' Aske's Boys', Harrow, John Lyon, North London Collegiate, Mill Hill and St Dunstan's College.

Objects and aims

The objects of the Academy Trust are to advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing a 16 to 19 Academy offering a curriculum appropriate to the needs of its students.

London Academy of Excellence Tottenham is the place for academic rigour. The school exists to provide the very best opportunities for our students with a particular focus on developing confident learners who achieve top A Level grades thus opening the door to the best further education available to them. Beyond this, we aim to ensure that once students access the most competitive courses at top universities, they have the confidence and resilience to feel that they belong.

Activities for achieving objectives

The principal activities have been to continue to ensure a high quality of education and to ensure strong academic outcomes as evidenced by the A Level results of the third cohort. The launch of the Chrysalis East project in the Spring term was the first step on our journey working in deeper partnership with our feeder schools and beyond to provide the greatest possible transformative impact on the lives of young people in Tottenham.

Public benefit

The Trustees of the Academy have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission.

The Academy has operated in accordance with its funding agreement as a non-charging, not for profit organisation throughout the period in question.

STRATEGIC REPORT

Key achievements and performance

During the year the Trust has built upon the strong foundations of the school, with both year groups achieving highly. The third year group achieved record outcomes with 23% of grades at A* and 58%* A*-A. This put the school's attainment and progress measures within the top 3% nationally. Almost 75% of students completing their studies in 2020-21 took up places at Russell Group universities, compared to 1% of Tottenham school leavers in 2015-16.

The demographic of the student body remained stable, meeting the aims of the school, with 51% of the cohort having been eligible for free school meals whilst at secondary school. This element of the school's ethos was further strengthened by the prioritisation of students in receipt of free school meals in the school's admissions policy from 2022-23 onwards.

Applications to the school increased significantly, with over 1,500 for the 300 places on offer in September 2021 and the school's Chrysalis East partnership function launched, working initially with four secondary feeder schools. This project will grow significantly over the coming years.

The school's ongoing focus is to develop the fundraising function to further support the aims of the school.

The Academy received its first Ofsted inspection in November 2021 with the report due to be published in mid-December.

Key performance indicators

A number of KPIs are used by the Board of Trustees to monitor performance including the recruitment of students, academic progress, attendance and the examination results of the student's and students' further destinations. The Trustees also use the financial budgets as a KPI relating to the performance of leadership and management.

STRATEGIC REPORT (continued)

The main KPI for the Academy was to increase student recruitment. The Academy recruited 273 Year 12 students in 2020/21, compared to 231 in 2019/20. In 2021/22 the Academy recruited 290 students.

Student progress and attainment were well above target (although with an increase in national grades linked with the cancelling of exams). Attendance remained very strong at 96% and the retention of students was once again significantly above national average at 97%.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries and having successfully exceeded the target pupil numbers for 2021/22, the Board of Trustees has a reasonable expectation that the school will have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

In coming to this conclusion the Trustees have considered the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on the Trust. While some income streams have reduced and some costs increased, savings have been made without compromising on the provision and income from fundraising has increased significantly.

For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

Investment policy

The Academy Trust has no investments.

Financial Review

The primary sources of funding for the Academy Trust during the year was the General Annual Grant received from the ESFA and donations and capital grants both in cash and in kind.

The total income for the year was £6,221,000 (2020 – £4,776,000), of which £2,796,000 (2020 – £2,099,000) is General Annual Grant, £1,657,000 (2020 – £1,538,000) is other ESFA and Government Grants, and £17,000 (2020: £13,000) is local authority grants. In 2021, there was income of £1,533,000 (2020 – £968,000) from donations and capital grants. This includes gifts-in-kind of £761,000 (2020 – £428,000), donations of £542,000 (2020 – £515,000) and £13,000 (2020 – £25,000) of other capital grants.

The operational surplus for the period, excluding the fixed assets fund and the pension reserve was £248,000 (2020 – operational surplus of £103,000).

STRATEGIC REPORT (continued)

At 31 August 2021, the Academy had total funds of £9,351,000 (2020 - £10,051,000). This comprised of £8,989,000 (2020 - £9,937,000) of restricted funds and £362,000 (2020 - £114,000) of unrestricted general fund balances. Included within restricted funds is the pension reserve balance, relating to the Local Government defined benefit scheme for non-teaching staff, which was in deficit by £686,000 (2020 - £267,000) at 31 August 2021.

The results for the period are shown on page 27.

The financial results for the year and the year-end position are considered by the Trustees to be satisfactory. Financial projections indicate that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to deliver its educational programme in 2021/22 and beyond. The year 12 intake for 2021/22 was 290 taking the total students enrolled to 558 at Autumn Census.

A recovery plan relating to the shortfall in students in the 2017/18 academic year, the first year of operation as LAET, has been agreed between the Trust and the ESFA. The Trust repaid £236,000 to the ESFA in 2018/19, and £68,907 in 2020/21 with a balance of £43,855 repayable as at 31 August 2021. The remaining sum will be repaid in 2021/22. The Trust has sufficient reserves to meet the repayment in accordance with the agreed schedule.

Additional highly skilled teaching and operations staff were recruited to support the increased number of students and to replace a small number of staff who left at the end of the last academic year.

Income was received from Rokos Capital to fund the launch of the Chrysalis East project in Spring 2021 and a funding agreement was put in place to fully finance the programme for 5 years. A project director, administrative and teaching staff were recruited to establish the project and work began in local schools. A series of summer schools were also run for local year 7, 8 and 9 students, all fully funded from the Chrysalis East budget.

The Covid-19 pandemic has impacted trading income from lettings and catering in particular as a result of the lockdowns and additional costs have been incurred in particular in relation to cleaning but savings have been made in some key areas such as utilities and school supplies. Fundraising income has also increased substantially as a result of the part-time secondment of a Fundraising Lead from Highgate School.

The principal risks and uncertainties along with the strategy for mitigating them is covered in detail in the section below.

Reserves policy

Any reserves held will be in accordance with requirements laid down by the Department for Education. The restricted fixed assets reserves as at 31 August 2021 represents the completed build, which is leased, and furniture and equipment.

STRATEGIC REPORT (continued)

The Trustees review the cash reserve annually as part of the budget setting process. This review encompasses the nature of current and future income and expenditure streams. In normal circumstances, the Trustees have determined that the minimum level of free reserves should be equivalent to one month's gross salary expenditure (£290,888). This is to ensure sufficient working capital to cover delays between spending and receipt of funds and to provide a cushion to deal with unexpected emergencies such as urgent maintenance. In addition, reserves may be built-up to fund future capital projects such as the renewal of ICT equipment and fixtures and fittings. The Trust met its reserves target during the 2020/21 academic year.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trustees consider that the Academy Trust's financial and internal controls are in compliance with the ESFA Academies Financial Handbook 2020.

The Trustees assess the principal long-term risks and uncertainties facing the Academy as follows:

- Students: Inability to recruit a viable number of suitably qualified students in the long term. We are mitigating this risk through regular reviews of our marketing & student recruitment strategy and through regular checks on recruitment KPIs.
- Grant income: A material decrease in income affecting provision resulting from the inability to recruit a viable number of students.
- Staff recruitment: Inability to attract and retain the required specialist academic staff. We
 are mitigating this risk through benchmarking our salaries against comparator schools to
 ensure they are competitive, by utilising our networks to assist with advertising
 vacancies and through forward planning to allow sufficient time for several rounds of
 recruitment if required.
- The withdrawal or reduction in donors' financial input. This is being mitigated through the renegotiation of the funding agreement with the principal business sponsor and through ensuring continued mutual benefit coming from the partnerships with the sponsors.

The Trustees are of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying evaluating and managing the Academy Trust's significant risks that has been in place for the year ended 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the Trustees.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Future developments

The Trustees intend to continue to build upon the successful fourth year of the London Academy of Excellence Tottenham in line with plans agreed with the Department for Education.

The Chrysalis East project will continue to grow during its first full year of operation in 2021/22 and will expand to working in primary as well as secondary education.

DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

FUNDRAISING

During the 2020/21 academic year the Trust continued to be seconded a part-time Fundraising Lead by the Principal Education Sponsor, Highgate School and continued some limited direct fundraising activities itself. The majority of fundraising activities were however still carried out by Highgate School directly with the proceeds donated to the Trust.

We undertake fundraising activities via direct mail, telephone, community participation activities, fundraising events, solicitation of individuals, crowdfunding campaigns and email in line with the Fundraising Code of Practice set by the Fundraising Regulator.

Fundraising is overseen by the seconded Fundraising Lead who is also the Development Director for Highgate School. The Development Director has a detailed job description associated with their role and receives appropriate training to reinforce our fundraising ethics.

We are registered with the Fundraising Regulator and adhere to the standards of the Fundraising Code of Practice.

All our activities are open, fair, honest and legal. No formal complaints were received about fundraising activity in the year. Trustees receive regular reports regarding fundraising activity and performance.

Donations were made both in cash and kind by the Principal Education Sponsor Highgate School, the Principal Business Sponsor Tottenham Hotspur Football Club and our Partners St Dunstan's College and Mill Hill School.

The Trustees continue to work closely with the independent partner schools who have generously made donations from their own resources to support the delivery of the curriculum and co-curriculum at LAE Tottenham.

Fundraising activities may from time to time be carried out by partners to raise funds which are subsequently donated to the school. These will be carried out in line with their own policies.

Review of Value for Money

There was no material impact on value for money as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic. Financial procedures continued to be followed and where relevant competitive quotes obtained.

The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The current system of internal control has been in place at the London Academy of Excellence Tottenham for the year 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to Handle Risk

The Board of Trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the Academy is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The Board of Trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the Academy's significant risks, that has been in place for the year 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the Board of Trustees.

The Risk and Control Framework

The Academy's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- Comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the Board of Trustees;
- Regular reviews by the Accounting Officer of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- Setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- Clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- Delegation of authority and segregation of duties; and

Identification and management of risks.

During the 2020/21 academic year Kreston Reeves were appointed to carry out a programme of internal checks on the Academy Trust's financial systems and they reported their findings to the Board through the Finance, Resources and Compliance Committee. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included internal controls and payroll processes and procedures. In addition further internal scrutiny was carried out of nonfinancial controls in areas such as safeguarding and H&S.

Review of Effectiveness

As Accounting Officer, the Principal has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- the work of the external auditor;
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process;
- the work of the executive managers within the Academy who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

Statement of accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Academy Trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Academies Accounts Direction 2020 to 2021 issued by ESFA; the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

London Academy of Excellence Tottenham meets the definition of a public entity under FRS102.

The financial statements are presented in sterling and are rounded to the nearest thousand pounds.

Going concern

The Trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. The Trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements. The Trustees have made this assessment whilst considering the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on the day-to-day activities of the Academy Trust.

After making appropriate enquiries, and having successfully made the transformation from Tottenham UTC to the London Academy of Excellence Tottenham (including the successful recruitment of students for the 2021/22 academic year), the Board of Trustees has a reasonable expectation that the school will have adequate resources, to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. On this basis, they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised when the Academy Trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income (continued)

Grants

Grants are included in the statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

The General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended. Unspent amounts of capital grant are reflected in the balance in the restricted fixed asset fund.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the Academy Trust has provided the goods or services.

Donated services and gifts in kind

Where services are provided to the Academy Trust as a donation that would normally be purchased from suppliers, this contribution is included in the financial statements as both income and expenditure at its estimated fair value based on the value of the contribution to the Academy Trust.

The value of seconded staff is recognised at the value payable as salary of a similar postholder had they been directly employed in the period in which they are receivable as income, where the benefit to the Academy Trust can be reliably measured. Donated services including seconded staff are recognised as donations in the period when those services are provided.

Where the donated good is a fixed asset, it is measured at fair value, unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor should be used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the Academy's accounting policies.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity.

Expenditure on charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the Academy Trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the Academy Trust apportioned to charitable activities. All expenditure is stated net of recoverable VAT.

Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £5,000 or more, including assets which are part of a capital project which aggregate to £5,000 or more, are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. The related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on such assets is charged to the restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities so as to reduce the fund over the useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the Academy Trust's depreciation policy.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful lives, as follows:

Long-term leasehold property Over the life of the lease (35 years)

Furniture and equipment 20% straight line

Computer equipment 25% straight line

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use.

A full year of depreciation is calculated in the year of acquisition and none in the year of disposal.

Tangible fixed assets (continued)

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of financial activities.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at their settlement amount, less any provision for non-recoverability. Prepayments were valued at the amount prepaid.

The Academy's leasehold property is held on a 35 year lease, and the annual rental cost increases over the lifetime of the lease. A debtor is recognised in these financial statements, to match the creditor for the annualised rent payable as described below. This is to account for the fact that the ESFA have agreed to fund the lease for the entire lease term, in accordance with a Memorandum of Understanding dated 10 May 2016.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Academy Trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

The Academy has a leasehold property on a 35 year lease, and the annual rental cost increases over the life of the lease. A creditor is recognised in these financial statements, to annualise the rent payable over the lifetime of the lease.

Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Financial instruments

The Academy Trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the Academy Trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets – trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 13. Prepayments are not tinancial instruments.

Cash at bank – is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Principal accounting policies Year to 31 August 2021

Financial instruments (continued)

Financial liabilities – trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 14. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

Taxation

The Academy Trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Academy Trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Pension benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the Academy Trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the Academy Trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. As stated in note 21, the TPS is a multi-employer scheme and there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting. The TPS is therefore treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy Trust in separate Trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

Principal accounting policies Year to 31 August 2021

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds represent monies which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the Academy Trust at the discretion of the Trustees.

The restricted fixed assets fund is for resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes with conditions imposed by the providers.

The restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received and include grants from the DfE and the ESFA.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The Academy Trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

- The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 21, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2019 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2021. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability;
- Estimating the useful economic life of tangible fixed assets for the purpose of calculating depreciation; and
- Estimating the value of donated goods and services.

Critical areas of judgement

In taking their decision as to whether the Academy Trust is a going concern for the purposes of these financial statements, they have assumed that the major donors will continue to provide support into 2021/22. This assumption is supported by all relevant discussions to date.

Principal accounting policies Year to 31 August 2021

Agency arrangements

The Academy Trust acts as an agent in distributing 16-19 bursary funds and free school meal funding from the ESFA. Payments received from the ESFA and subsequent disbursements to students are excluded from the statement of financial activities as the Trust does not have control over the charitable application of the funds. The Trust can use a proportion of the allocation towards its own administration costs and this is recognised in the statement of financial activities. The funds received and paid and any balances held are disclosed in note 23.

21 Pension and similar obligations

The Academy Trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by the London Borough of Newham. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS 31 March 2019.

Contributions amounting to £47,425 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2021 (2020 - £38,801) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy);
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million; and
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. The assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

21 Pension and similar obligations (continued)

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2023.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £278,000 (2020 - £209,000).

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS)

The LGPS is a funded defined-benefit scheme, with the assets held in separate Trustee-administered funds. The total employer's contributions for the year ended 31 August 2021 totalled £104,000 (2020 - £73,000).

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of an Academy Trust closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

22 Related party transactions

Owing to the nature of the Academy Trust's operations and the composition of the Board of Trustees being drawn from local public and private sector organisations, transactions may take place with organisations in which a Trustee has an interest. All transactions involving such organisations are conducted at arm's length and in accordance with the Academy Trust's financial regulations and normal procurement procedures.

The following related party transactions took place in the year:

During the year, aggregate Trustee donations were £10,000 (2020 – £2,000).

During the year, donations totalling £693,500 including gift-in-kind services (2020 – £721,882) were received from sponsors, where Trustees of London Academy of Excellence Tottenham were also Trustees or senior management. Lettings income of £14,972 was also received from a sponsor in the year (2020 - £4,345).

During the year, payments to the Trust's business sponsor, Tottenham Hotspur Football Club (THFC) were £83,000 (2020 – £80,663) for its share of costs including electricity and waste collection, and security costs. Due to their nature, these were provided at cost. £nil was outstanding at the year end (2020 – £nil). The Trust has complied with the requirements of the Academies Financial Handbook in connection with these transactions.

The Academy Trust did not enter into any other related party transactions in the year (2020 – none).

23 Agency arrangements

The Academy Trust distributes 16-19 bursary funds and free school meal funding to students as an agent for the ESFA. In the accounting period ending 31 August 2021 the Academy disbursed £67,337 (2020 – £89,038). The Academy received £90,712 (2020 – £92,308) during the year and an amount of £41,913 (2020 – £26,592) is included in other creditors relating to undistributed funds that is repayable to the ESFA.
