TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

The Trustees present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of Evolve Church Academy Trust (formerly known as South Northamptonshire Church of England Multi Academy Trust) ('the Trust') for the period ending 31 August 2022.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The Trust, which was incorporated on 14 June 2013 and opened as a Multi Academy Trust on 1 September 2013, is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's Memorandum and Articles of Association are the primary governing documents of the Trust.

The Governors act as the Trustees for the charitable activities of the Trust and are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law.

The charitable company is known as Evolve Church Academy Trust.

The trustees of Evolve Church Academy Trust are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. Details of the Trustees who served during the year, and to the date these financial statements are approved, are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Trustees' indemnities

The Governors benefit from indemnity insurance purchased by the Academy to cover the liability of the Trustees arising from negligent acts, errors or commissions occurring whilst on Academy business. The limit of this indemnity is £10,000,000.

Principal activities

The principal activity of the Academy Trust is to advance for the public benefit by establishing, maintaining, carrying on managing and developing Primary Academies that offer a broad and balanced curriculum.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of trustees

On 1st September 2013, the Trustees appointed all those Governors that served the predecessor school to be Governors of the newly formed Academies. These Governors were appointed on a term of office that would end when their original term at the predecessor school would have ended, thus ensuring a staggered re-election or replacement process.

The Trust shall have the following Trustees as set out in its Articles of Association and Funding Agreement:

- · No fewer than 2 Members
- · No fewer than 5 Trustees

The Board currently includes a Chair and Vice Chair from 3 of the academies, just the chair from the remaining Academy and the Executive Headteacher. There are 3 members and 2 further trustees that have no attachment to local governing bodies.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Trustees

Trustees are appointed for a 4 year period, except that this time limit does not apply to the Executive Headteacher. Subject to remaining eligible to be a particular type of Governor, any Governors can be re-appointed or re-elected.

When appointing new Trustees, the Board of Trustees will give consideration to the skills and experience mix of existing Trustees in order to ensure the Board of Trustees has the necessary skills to contribute fully to the Academy Trust's development.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

The training and induction provided for new Trustees will depend upon their existing experience but would always include a tour of the relevant Academy or Academies and a chance to meet staff and pupils. All Trustees are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents they will need to undertake their role as Trustees. As there are normally only two or three new Trustees a year, induction tends to be done informally and is tailored specifically to the individual. Advantage is taken of specific courses offered by various other organisations as appropriate.

There is a Trustee/Governors training day organised each year which Includes training sessions to keep the Trustees/Governors updated on relevant developments impacting on their roles and responsibilities. Governors updated on relevant developments impacting on their roles and responsibilities.

Organisational Structure

The Board of Trustees normally meets four times annually. The Board of Trustees establishes an overall framework for the governance of the Academy Trust and determines membership, terms of reference and procedures of Committees of the Board of Trustees and other groups. It receives reports including policies from its Committees for ratification. It monitors the activities of the Committees through the minutes of their meetings. The Board of Trustees may from time to time establish working groups to perform specific tasks over a limited timescale.

There is one Committee of the Board of Trustees responsible for Finance and Audit. This committee has its own terms of reference discharging to it.

The following decisions are reserved to the full Board of Trustees:

- to consider any proposals for changes to the status or constitution of the Academy Trust and its committee structure;
- · to appoint or remove the Chair and/or Vice Chair; and
- to appoint and/or consider the performance management of the Executive Headteacher and Heads of School.
- · to appoint the Company Secretary.

The Trustees are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual development plan and budget, approving the annual statutory accounts, monitoring the Academy Trust by the use of budgets and other data and making the major decisions about the direction of the Academy Trust.

The Trustees have devolved the individual strategic management to each full Governing Body and day-to-day management of each Academy to the Heads of School and the Lead Teachers. The trust leadership team comprises the Executive Head teacher and Heads of School for each school. Each Full Governing Body reviews annual Academy Trust plans and budgets, monitors progress against target and OFSTED standards and oversees parent and community liaison. Representatives from each FGB also sit on the main Board of Trustees. The Accounting Officer has overall responsibility for the day to day financial management of the Academy Trust.

Risk management

The Trustees have implemented a system to assess risks that the Academy Trust faces, especially in the operational areas (such as in relation to teaching, health & safety and school trips) and in relation to the control of finances. They have introduced systems, including operational procedures and internal financial controls in order to minimise risk. Where significant financial risk still remains they have ensured they have adequate insurance cover.

The Academy Trust has an effective system of internal financial controls and this is explained in more detail in the Statement of Internal Control.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

Setting the pay and remuneration of the Academy Trusts key management personnel is made with the support of an external advisor. Pay is benchmarked against the National Standards of Pay for Teachers and Support Staff at Academy Trust level.

Trade union facility time

Facility Time is the provision of paid or unpaid time off from an employee's normal role to undertake trade union duties and activities as a trade union representative. The Trade Union (Facility Time Publication Requirements) Regulations 2017 requires the Academy Trust to publish data in relation to their employees who are trade union representative and the time spent as representatives.

During the period in question the Academy Trust had no employees who were relevant union officials and no union facility time was spent by the Academy Trust's staff.

Related parties and other connected charities and organisations

There are no related parties which either control or significantly influence the decisions and operations of the Academy Trust. There are no sponsors or formal Parent Teacher Associations associated with the Academy Trust.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The principal objects of the Academy Trust, as set out in its Articles of Association, are to:

- advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing a school, offering a broad and balanced curriculum; and
- promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of the South Northamptonshire Area and the surrounding area the
 provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such
 facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity, disablement, financial hardship or social and economic
 circumstances for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the
 condition of life of the said inhabitants.

The aims of the Academy Trust during the period ended 31 August 2022 are summarised below:

- 1. To further develop curriculum plans as a trust and ensure alignment in assessment practices
 - i. Include school and subject leads in the development of curriculum plans that are reflected in the lived curriculum.
 - ii. Ensure that all subjects are developed to bring about the desired outcomes from the above point.
 - iii. Ensure that assessment, both formative and summative, practices are accurate in indicating children's starting points, what they need to do to develop and their end points.
- 2. To develop the collaborative workings of the trust through a shared cloud facility that will achieve greater efficiency of working and higher quality through sharing of expertise and resources.
 - Develop the use of MS teams as a sharing tool and a support for developing high quality resources.
 - iv. The use of a central hub point will bring greater efficiencies in all trust working and to better outcomes for all.

Objectives, strategies and activities

The key priorities for the period are contained in the Academy Trusts Development Plan which is available from the Chair of the Trustees.

The main activities of the Academy Trust for the period ended 31 August 2022 were as follows:

Leadership and Management

- · To ensure that governance structures across the trust at board and local level are functioning well.
- To ensure that a skills based approach to the MAT board delivers a wide range of experienced directors that are able to challenge and support trust leadership;
- To challenge heads of school and other school leaders, including subject leads, through a system of appraisal that is effective and that creates common strands through the trust
- · To continue to build the effectiveness of the trust leadership team to deliver trust wide priorities
- Build upon marketing work that was carried out last year to continue to strive towards a fuller trust as it currently stands, before looking at new member schools.

Student Achievement

Where need for improvement in subject results were found, internal and external support is in place for all Academies within the MAT to achieve at least in line with National standards. The trust continues to evaluate the level of investment in external school improvement support to ensure that outcomes in education are sufficiently supported by trust funding.

Trust development planning focuses on continuing to raise standards in core subjects in line with mastery style teaching and learning in Maths and English. Standards in writing will be an area of focus, as indicated by recent outcomes and the impact of remote learning. In addition to this, further developing the wider curriculum is also a priority and to ensure that we offer as broad an experience as possible to our children and that their learning is built upon throughout their time with us.

Teaching and Learning

To continue to use existing criteria for the moderation of standards in maths, reading and writing, further developing the system of moderating outcomes by working with another trust.

Build capacity to provide rigorous internal MAT moderation of the above curriculum areas. Deliver this as a trust.

To use the expertise within the MAT staff to develop subject knowledge of all staff to ensure best quality teaching and learning, specifically linked to mastery teaching in Maths.

Work on increasing the quality of education in all subjects through improving the curriculum planning and ensuring that assessment is in place across the board and is effective.

To ensure groups of learners are making progress that is at least in line with ARE:- SEND, PP, Dis, EAL and LAC.

Behaviour and Safety

To ensure that key policies and procedures are regularly reviewed and agreed. Plumsun to carry out Health and Safety review inspections of the schools.

To ensure the Director responsible for safeguarding across the MAT has a quality overview of safeguarding practice in all schools, driven by audit work carried out through the year as part of the R and A committee function.

Public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirement in the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission general guidance on public benefit in exercising their powers or duties. They have referred to this guidance when reviewing the Academy Trusts aims and objectives and in planning its future activities.

The Academy Trust aims to advance for the public benefit education in South Northamptonshire and the surrounding area, offering a broad curriculum.

The Academy Trust also allows use of its facilities for recreational and other leisure time occupation for the community at large in the interests of social welfare and with the interest of improving the life of that community.

Strategic report

Achievements and performance

The Academy is in its ninth period of operation since conversion on 1 September 2013.

The Trust is committed to continual improvement which is achieved in a number of ways, including improvement planning, review meetings, continual professional development, lesson observations, performance management, self-evaluation, data analysis and action planning.

This year marked the return of national tests at the end of key stages and other planned points across the primary age range. Below is a table of outcomes, both national testing and teacher assessment in each of our 4 academies.

The impact of the COVID pandemic can be seen in areas of the above data. Writing is one such area that the trust has identified for a greater degree of focus, in the next academic year, in order to ensure that standards are improved. It is worth noting that in the data above, where numbers are at their lowest, cohort size is below the level of statistical significance in data. For example, St Loys had 4 and Boddington 8, children in year 6.

The resourcing and approach to the teaching of writing is something that will also be a focus for the next academic year. Trust subject leads in this area will have this development points as a central focus within they performance targets and will work closely as a team to achieve and deliver improved outcomes.

School leaders continue to work with external school improvement advisors and trust leads to support individual academies in their development priorities and in shared trust priorities. Collaborative working is one area that will be a developed next year, with a view to the support that it will give to all in delivering on priorities.

Continued focus on developing teaching strategies that support the achievement of improved pupil outcomes will also continue to be a focus. Improving pedagogical approaches is something that we aim to include within development priorities on an ongoing basis. The support of the national college and current expertise within our trust form the foundations for these pedagogical improvements and updating of classroom practice.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

Key performance indicators

Although the Academy's Funding Agreement is not subject to a specific carry forward limit on the amount of GAG funding, the main financial performance indicator is the level of reserves held at the balance sheet date and, in particular, the amount of GAG funding carried forward at the balance sheet date. At 31 August 2022, the balance of the GAG Restricted Fund was £nil, which is after a transfer of £6,704 from the Unrestricted Fund.

As the majority of the Academy's funding is based on pupil numbers, pupil numbers is also a key performance indicter. Pupil numbers at the most recent census were 280 a decrease of 12 students from the previous census.

As a result, the ratio of GAG funding per pupil was £5,573 for the period.

Staffing costs are another key performance indicator for the Academy Trust and the percentage of total staff costs to ESFA and Local Authority funding for the period was 87%, while the percentage of staff costs to total costs was 77%.

Strategic report

The Academies within the Trust have continued to work on the priorities set out in their own and in the MAT Strategic Plan, approved by the Board of Trustees.

The Academy Trust faces a number of principal risks as set out in the 'Principal Risks and Uncertainties' section.

The Academy Trust uses various financial instruments including cash and items such as trade debtors and trade creditors that arise directly from its operations.

The existence of these financial instruments exposes the school to a number of financial risks which are described in more detail below.

The main risks arising from the financial statements are cash flow, interest rate risk and credit risk. The Academy Trust seeks to manage financial risk by ensuring sufficient liquidity is available to meet foreseeable needs and to invest cash assets safely and profitably. The Academy Trust seeks to manage its cash reserves to ensure liabilities are settled as they fall due.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Board of Trustees, including all Committees, has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies note of the financial statements.

Financial review

The majority of the Academy Trust's income is received from the DfE via the ESFA in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE during the period ended 31 August 2022 and the associated expenditure of these grants are shown as Restricted Funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The Academy also receives grants for fixed assets from the DfE and other organisations and funders and these are shown as Restricted Fixed Asset Funds in the Statement of Financial Activities. The balance of the Restricted Fixed Asset fund is reduced by the depreciation charges on the assets acquired using these funds.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

During the period ended 31 August 2022, the total expenditure of £2,154,519 was covered by the recurrent grant funding from the DfE, together with other incoming resources (excluding the net assets transferred on conversion from the Local Authority). The excess of expenditure over Incoming resources for the period was £28,702.

The net book value of fixed assets at 31 August 2022 were £209,493. The fixed assets held by the Academy are used exclusively for providing education and associated support services to the pupils of the Academy.

The balance of total funds held at 31 August 2022 were in surplus by £252,030 which comprised of the following:

The key financial policies reviewed and adopted during the period included the Financial Procedures Policies and Manual, which lays out the framework for the Academy Trusts financial management, including financial responsibilities of the Governing Body, Executive Headteacher, Heads of School, managers, budget holders and other staff, as well as the delegated authorities for spending. The other financial policies reviewed and adopted during the period included Charges and Lettings, Asset Management and Insurance.

Reserves policy

The Trustees' review the reserve levels of the Academy Trust annually. This review encompasses the nature of the income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves. The Trustees also take into consideration the future plans of the Academy, the uncertainty over future income streams and other key risks identified during the risk review.

The Trustees have determined that the appropriate level of free cash reserves should be approximately 5% of total incoming resources. The reason for this is to provide sufficient working capital to cover delays between spending and receipts of grants and to provide a cushion to deal with unexpected emergencies such as urgent maintenance.

The Academy Trust's current level of reserves (defined as restricted general funds, excluding pension reserve, plus the balance on unrestricted funds) is £259,594.

The current level of reserves is below our target level of free cash reserves. Appropriate steps have been taken to increase the free cash reserves. The steps include monitoring individual academies key priority plans to ensure expenditure is detailed, reasonable and adhered to and that excess funds are being used to fully support pupil's future learning.

Investment policy

All funds surplus to immediate requirements are invested to optimal effect by the Academy with the objective of ensuring maximum return on assets invested but with minimal risk.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Financial and risk management objectives and policies

The Trustees have implemented a system to assess risks that the Academy Trust faces, especially in the operational areas (such as in relation to teaching, health & safety and school trips) and in relation to the control of finances. They have introduced systems, including operational procedures and internal financial controls in order to minimise risk. Where significant financial risk still remains they have ensured they have adequate insurance cover.

The Academy Trust has an effective system of internal financial controls and this is explained in more detail in the Statement of Internal Control.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

The Academy Trust has agreed a Risk Management Strategy, a Risk Register and a Risk Management Plan. These have been discussed by the Trustees and include the financial risks to the Academy Trust. The Risk Register and Risk Management Plan are constantly reviewed in light of any new information and formally reviewed annually.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Academy Trust is exposed, in particular those relating to its finances, teaching, facilities and other operational areas. The Trustees have implemented a number of systems to assess and minimise those risks, including internal controls. Where significant financial risk still remains. The Trustees have ensured the Academy Trust has adequate insurance cover.

There are risks to revenue funding from a falling roll as pupil numbers can vary in small schools year on year. However, the current freeze on the Governments overall education budget, changes In funding arrangements for special educational needs and the increasing employment and premises costs mean that budgets will be increasingly tight In coming years.

The Trustees examine the financial health of the Academy Trust formally every term, reviewing performance against budgets and overall expenditure by means of regular update reports at all full Governors and Finance and Resources Committee meetings.

At the balance sheet date, the Academy Trust had no significant liabilities arising from trade creditors of debtors where there would be a significant effect on the Academy's liquidity.

The Trustees recognised that the Local Government Pension Scheme deficit represents a significant potential liability to the Academy. However, as the Trustees consider the Academy Trust is able to meet its known annual contribution commitments for the foreseeable future, the risk from this liability is minimised.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the Academy Trust are as follows:

Financial

The Academy has considerable reliance on continued Government funding through the ESFA. In the period, approximately 90% of the Academy's incoming resources (excluding amounts transferred on conversion from the Local Authority) was ultimately Government funded and whilst this level Is expected to continue, there is no assurance that Government policy or practice will remain the same or that public funding will continue at the same levels or on the same terms.

Failures in governance and/or management

The risk in this area arises from the potential failure to effectively manage the Academy Trust's finances, internal controls, compliance with regulations and legislation, statutory returns etc. The Trustees continue to review and ensure appropriate measures are in place to mitigate these risks.

Reputational

The continuing success of the Academy Trust is dependent on continuing to attract applicants in sufficient numbers by maintaining the highest educational standards. To mitigate this risk, the Trustees ensure that pupil success and achievement are closely monitored and reviewed. Work has also been undertaken to mitigate the risk through greater projection of the trust and its academies into the local communities, with the intention of boosting pupil intake and related finance this way.

Safeguarding and child protection

The Trustees continue to ensure that the highest standards are maintained in the areas of selection and monitoring of staff, the operation of child protection policies and procedures, health & safety and discipline.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

Staffing

The success of the Academy Trust is reliant upon the quality of its staff, so the Governors monitor and review policies and procedures to ensure continued development and training of staff as well as ensuring there is clear succession planning. Increased levels of internal CPD and added rigour in recruitment processes are intended to further mitigate risk in this area.

Fraud and mismanagement of funds

The Academy Trust has engaged its external auditors to perform a program of work aimed at checking and reviewing the financial systems and records as required by the Academies Financial Handbook. All finance staff receive training to keep them up to date with financial practice requirements and to develop their skills in this area.

The Academy has continued to strengthen its risk management process throughout the period by improving the process and ensuring staff awareness. A Risk Register is maintained and reviewed and updated on a regular basis.

Fundraising

The Academy does not operate a regulated fundraising scheme and does not use the services of a professional fundraiser. However the Academy does work with its Parent and Teacher Association who carry out excellent work to raise funds for the school. The Academy also supports its stakeholders in raising money for local, national and international charities throughout the year. This includes cake sales, non-school uniform days, fetes and auctions.

Plans for future periods

The Academy Trust strives to continually improve levels of attainment for all pupils, equipping them with the qualifications, skills and character to follow their chosen pathway, whether it be into further and higher education or employment, as well as promoting the continued professional development of its staff.

The Academy's plans for future periods are:

- to develop shared policies across the academy trust (ongoing)
- to improve the quality of teaching and learning to achieve a higher percentage of pupils attaining greater depth (ongoing)
- to explore ways of increasing pupil intake within our current academies to increase pupil number within.
- To implement creative ways to highlight the academies as providers from an early age (tots groups)
- Look for opportunities to expand with more academies.
- Improve the quality of governance systems and the way that the trust board is constituted.
- to continue to develop leadership across the academy trust ensuring succession of leaders for the future and capacity for leaders to function effectively.
- To increase the central influence of the trust on educational input and outcomes through dedicated school improvement work.
- · to continue to ensure our Christian ethos is evident in all areas of work within the Academies
- · to maintain extended schools that provide services to children and families outside of the school day

Funds held as custodian trustee on behalf of others

The Academy Trust and its Trustees do not act as Custodian Trustees of any other charity.

Scope of responsibility

As Trustees we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that Evolve Church Academy Trust has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The board of Trustees has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Executive Head/CEOI, as accounting officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between Evolve Church Academy Trust and the Secretary of State for Education. The accounting officer is also responsible for reporting to the board of Trustees any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

Governance

The information on governance included here supplements that described in the Trustees' Report and in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities. The board of Trustees has formally met six times during the year. Attendance during the year at meetings of the board of Trustees was as follows:

The board tabled a requirement for the risk and audit committee to establish a more robust cycle for auditing and internally scrutinising trust systems and performance. The committee now works closely with the trust finance committee under the combined title of 'Trust Business Committee'. This setup was established to both utilise the skill set of individuals concerned and to also ensure greater communication and understanding of cross-over of work.

The ongoing challenge for the board is to ensure that quality governance structures are in place with a team that is small in number and where roles often double up.

Conflicts of interest

As a trust, we ensure that conflicts of interest, if they are present, are recorded and considered. They are published on our website for transparency. The day to day governance structures systems, and positions held within the board, are considered alongside any potential conflicts. At present, we have no significant conflicts but do have an awareness of the potential for chair and vice chair positions on our committees and the full board to contain some conflict if any individuals double up. The current chair of the board is also the chair of the risk and audit committee but we believe that utilising the vice chairs of both in a sensible way will minimise this risk.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

Governance reviews

As a trust, we carried out a self-assessment at the beginning of the academic year 21-22. The review indicated that there was a need to address areas of conflict that still exist, although to a far lesser extent due to previous work. There is still local governance membership of 3 of our trustees but this number is down from 7 the previous year as a result of some trustees committing solely to the trust. A further area that was highlighted by the review was the need for greater clarity of requirements locally under financial systems. The trust board delegates budget setting in academies to local governance but with strict parameters in place to meet trust board requirements. There are some inconsistencies that exist, in our academies, with this in practice. We aim to ensure that these inconsistencies are addressed to deliver a greater degree of academy to academy consistency.

Review of value for money

The accounting officer has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the academy trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of Trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where available. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

Procurement of joint training across the Academies including a greater degree of remote materials

Schools in the MAT have continued to work together for training. This has provided consistency of approach across the MAT whilst reducing cost to each Academy. New resources for remote training for all staff and governors has ensured that rates are competitive whilst not compromising on quality.

Greater degree of remote IT support

As a trust, we have moved to IT support that represents better value due to the reduction in 'on the ground' support.

Aligned use of curriculum resources

The schools have designed a curriculum that is resourced, where possible, in an aligned way with schemes and other resources that are common, can be shared and that capitalize on costs savings where possible.

Procurement of a Standards Consultant

The schools in the MAT have procured a curriculum standards consultant to provide greater rigor in the analysis of these standards. This has saved individual costs across the Academies.

Areas for improvement

Assessment procedures are continuing to be uniformed across the Trust to ensure more comparable data when moderating curriculum attainment.

Training opportunities across all schools in the MAT have been place throughout the year. The MAT expertise have also developed to offer opportunities to schools outside the Trust. The training offered includes all safeguarding, first aid training, fire and water health and safety, which are all linked on a rolling programme.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Evolve Church Academy Trust for the period 1 September 2021 to 31 August 2022 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2022

Capacity to handle risk

The Board of Trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of Trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2021 to 31 August 2022 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of Trustees.

The risk and control framework

The academy trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of Trustees;
- regular reviews by the finance committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- · setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- · clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- · identification and management of risks.

The board of Trustees has decided not to appoint an auditor for this purpose. However, the Trustees have appointed E Edmonds and G Dixon, a trustee, to carry out a programme of internal checks. These checks are presented and evaluated by the trust board R and A committee.

The internal reviewer's role includes giving advice on financial and other matters (set out in our annual cycle) and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial and other systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included:

- · Confirm that the trust has a financial procedures manual
- · Confirm the trust has submitted their Land and Buildings Collection Tool
- Approval of minutes from governors and subcommittee meetings
- · Confirm that financial report are reviewed
- Confirm that risk register is maintained and updated
- Confirm that ESFA are notified of board changes
- · Review of internal controls considered

The schedule of work this year has focused on financial management and governance systems and recommendation provided to the trust board by the reviewer have been compiled and either addressed or partially addressed.

Review of effectiveness

As accounting officer, the executive headteacher has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- · the work of the reviewer:
- · the work of the external auditor;
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process;
- the work of the executive managers within the academy trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

1 Accounting policies

Evolve Church Academy Trust is a charitable company. The address of its principal place of business is given on page 1 and the nature of its operations are set out in the Trustees' report.

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the academy trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2021 to 2022 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Evolve Church Academy Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

1.2 Going concern

The Trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, ie whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charitable company to continue as a going concern. The Trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

The Academy Trust is showing a deficit on the balance sheet, due to a significant pension fund deficit from the Local Government Pension Scheme. This does not mean that an immediate liability crystallises and a pension deficit generally only results in a cash flow effect in the form of increased employer contributions over a number of years. The pension deficit has no direct impact on the free reserves of the Academy Trust and therefore the Board of Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason the Academy Trust continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the academy trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the period for which it is receivable, and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Sponsorship income

Sponsorship income provided to the academy trust which amounts to a donation is recognised in the statement of financial activities in the period in which it is receivable (where there are no performance-related conditions), where the receipt is probable and it can be measured reliably.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Upon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items they are not recognised in the financial statements until they are sold. This income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Expenditure on raising funds

This includes all expenditure incurred by the academy trust to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the academy trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Assets costing £500 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding that require the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities and carried forward in the balance sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful life, as follows:

Improvements to property 10% straight line
Computer equipment 33% straight line
Fixtures & fittings 25% straight line

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.6 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods of services it must provide.

1.7 Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

1.8 Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows.

Financial assets

Trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities

Trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition.

Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.9 Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1.10 Pensions benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a projected unit method. The TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions are recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses and recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

1.11 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the academy trust at the discretion of the Trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Accounting estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 18, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2016 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2022. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives taking into account residual values, where appropriate. The actual lives of the asset and residual values are assessed annually and may vary depending on a number of factors. Residual value assessments consider issues such as the remaining life of the asset and projected disposal values.

It is not possible to quantify the Trustees and officers indemnity element from the overall cost of the RPA scheme.

The Trust occupied land and buildings which are owned by the Peterborough Diocesan Board of Education. The Board of Education are the providers of the Academies on the same bass as when the Academies were maintained schools. The Trust occupies the land and buildings of the Academies under the terms of Supplemental Agreements between the Peterborough Diocesan Board of Education, the land and buildings for the Academies for an infinite period, subject to a 2 year termination notice period, which amounts to a mere licence. This continuing permission of the Board of Education is pursuant to, and subject to, the Board of Education's charitable objects, and is part of the Church's continuing contribution to provide State funded education in partnership with the State. The licence delegates aspects of the management of the land and buildings to the Trust for the the time being, but does not vest any rights over the land in the Trust. The Board of Education have given an undertaking to the Secretary of State that they will not give the Trust less than two years notice to terminate the occupation of the land and buildings. Having considered the factual matric under which the Trust is occupying the land and buildings, the Directors have concluded that the value of the land and buildings occupied by the Trust will not be recognised on the balance sheet of the Trust.

Leasehold property includes the playing fields for Chacombe CEVA Primary Academy and Culworth CofE Primary Academy, which the Trust occupies under a 125 year lease from Northamptonshire County Council. Due to the restrictions contained in the lease agreement, the Trustees are of the view that the land has no value and so have not included any value for this land in the financial statements.

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows:

Restricted funds

The General Annual Grant (GAG) represents funding received from the Education & Skills Funding Agency during the period in order to fund the continuing activities of the schools. Under the funding agreement with the Secretary of State, the Academy was not subject to a limit on the amount of GAG that it could carry forward at 31 August 2022.

Other DfE/ESFA grants are used to provide additional support and resources in specific areas across the Academy's schools in line with the terms and conditions of the respective grants.

The pension reserve represents the Local Government Pension Scheme deficit.

Fixed asset funds

Fixed assets transferred on conversion represent the assets transferred to the Trust from the predecessor schools and Northamptonshire County Council.

The capital funds transferred to the Trust on conversion and the devolved formula grant received during the period were used to fund the capital expenditure during the period.

Transfers in the period represent additional contributions to the fixed asset fund during the year.

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Northamptonshire County Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of independent qualified actuaries. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016, and that of the LGPS related to the period ended 31 March 2019.

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academy trusts. All teachers have the option to opt out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary. These contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019.

The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. The assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2024.

The employer's pension costs paid to the TPS in the period amounted to £213,502 (2021: £165,668).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contributions are as noted below. The agreed contribution rates for future years are 21.6 - 23.3% for employers and 5.5 - 12.5% for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.
