Constitution

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 29 August 2013.

Organisational structure

Social Square (UK) has a board of trustees who are responsible for managing the charity and ensuring that it runs in accordance with the latest legislation. They have a broad range of backgrounds and an appropriate mix of gender, skills and expertise in running this type of service.

They are well known in the community and have hands on knowledge of what's needed. They are also committed to take part in training to ensure that they have the skills and knowledge necessary for their role as trustees.

Objectives for public benefit

The objects of the charity are the relief of poverty, advancement of education, the provision of facilities for recreation and other leisure time activities and other charitable purposes.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The trustees confirm that they have given due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities, and setting the grant making policy for the year.

Review of activities and achievements

Social Square (UK) was founded in response to local need with the aim of "Giving more to those who have less!" We step in and help when there is no one else to turn to, maintaining the dignity and respect of recipients and putting a smile on their faces.

We are pleased to present our annual report, describing another year in which we have once again been able to ease the lives of 100 socially and economically disadvantaged families. We achieved this by setting up and running the following projects:

- Discounts on Essentials: This project continued to be very successful by saving families significant sums of money on their weekly shopping and everyday essentials. A typical family saved between £1000 £2000 per year on groceries including fruit and vegetables. Local shops provided year round discounts of 12% 15% to those in need. We received consistently positive feedback from beneficiaries telling us how much the discounts had helped them, and most importantly, that they had not been treated any differently from full paying customers. 30 FAMILIES HELPED
- Discount Vouchers: Twice last year, at the change of seasons, we partnered with local shops to provide discounts on clothing and essentials saving families a total of over £7,000 each time. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive as the project had allowed families to shop in a dignified manner, as well as giving their children the exciting feeling of having new clothing, rather than having to make do with shabby used stuff in poor condition. We were delighted that we were able to expand and help even more families this year than previously. 85 FAMILIES HELPED
- Household Necessities: We continued to support people in diverse ways. We sourced funds from generous charities who specialise in the particular areas we worked in, and also from local open handed benefactors who understood the need. We used the funds thus generated to help poor and otherwise disadvantaged families in a variety of ways. These included paying families' food bills as well as dispensing grocery staples; providing furniture and appliances for families in need; plus providing a new mother with respite post-natal care after a harrowing birth and a double buggy for her twins. We partnered with In Kind Direct and bought household supplies at greatly reduced prices which enabled us to distribute them for free. 40 FAMILIES HELPED
- Emergency Hardships: Our goal is to educate and to help prevent debt before it spirals out of control. However, emergency expenses can put a wrench in any careful budgeting. Our Emergency Hardship fund provides the help and support for just these circumstances. We are pleased to report that we were able to help several families when they were faced with emergency expenses and provided education and support to them. 5 FAMILIES HELPED OUT OF CRISIS
- Wedding Grants: A wedding is a most memorable occasion. It links a couple together and is the start of a new home and family. The costs associated with setting up a new home can be prohibitive. For some, it is a necessity, not an extra. For many people who come from disadvantaged backgrounds, marriage promises hope, a fresh start. We were delighted to help out. 3 NEW COUPLES HELPED

Our approach was discreet and confidential. We know it can be extremely uncomfortable for disadvantaged people to request assistance and so we made sure that our users could retain their self-respect and dignity despite their difficult circumstances.

Our strategy is to ensure that our help is locally targeted and we aim to fill a special niche in the community both, with the range of people we help, and with our diverse and unique projects. Our objective is to assist when there is no one else.

We constantly evaluate the success of our projects, and heartily welcome feedback, suggestions and even criticism to improve outcomes and ensure our input is effective.

The trustees are delighted with the success of this third year; our aim is to help more people in the year ahead. We plan to redouble Social Square (UK)'s fundraising efforts to enable us to help even more potential beneficiaries as well as expanding the scope of our activities. Future plans include, but are not limited to: providing access to better employment and training opportunities; breakfast club for young people and more.

We are grateful to our faithful, generous and loyal funders for being our partners in enabling Social Square (UK) to support our disadvantaged service users with the resources they require so that they are able to access a better quality of life for themselves and their families.

Reserve policy

The trustees aim to retain reserves of approximately three months running costs to ensure continuation of the activities of the charity, and have begun working towards this goal. Free reserves at the year end were £4,456.

Risk review

The trustees have confirmed that there are no major risks to which the charity is exposed.

1. Accounting policies

1.1. Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102 - effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2. Income

Donations are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when received.

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

1.3. Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised in the year in which they are incurred and includes irrecoverable VAT which is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Support costs are those incurred to assist the work of the charity but are not direct charitable activities.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.4. Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
