REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS for the year ended 30 September 2016

The directors present their report with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 30 September 2016

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The principal activity of the company is to enable groups of disadvantaged people from all backgrounds to participate in horticultural projects that develop under-used land in order to improve the health and well-being of the participants, provide new skills and promote healthy life

REVIEW OF BUSINESS

Greener Growth has again expanded its activities during the year, and worked in schools, prisons and other community settings, whilst lessening its reliance on grant funds to an "all time" low of 23% of total income We can therefore see that our financial sustainability is increasing

We completed the third stage of our work at George White Junior School in Norwich, funded by a grant from Healthy Norwich. Our work at the school included creating the all new "nurture gardens" for children with special educational needs. Our next planned project at this school will be the establishment of a pizza garden with a pizza oven at its centre. We failed to receive support from Healthy Norwich this year, but will aim to progress other applications in 2017.

Our third year at Little Plumstead Church Of England Primary School, funded by The Ernest Cook Trust, has enabled us to further extend their orchard and help with garden maintenance. The school remains keen to extend our services on site

One of our most successful projects has been delivered at East Point Academy in Lowestoft. This is the first secondary school with which we have worked, and is based in an area that experiences high levels of economic and social deprivation. Our work has had a significant positive impact on the students, many of whom have special educational needs. Both Ofsted and the sponsor of the academy, the Inspiration. Trust, commented on the impact our work had on the children, on staff morale and on the visual impact at the front entrance. This has been transformed with a series of large raised beds which were planted with food producing climbing plants that covered the rather prison like security perimeter fencing. The internal allotment type gardens which were overgrown with two foot high grass and weeds were redesigned into two distinct and highly productive spaces. A "Modern Allotment Garden" and a "World War Two Allotment Garden", the latter complete with an Anderson Shelter! The scope for education when designing, creating and planting the gardens has been huge, involving the history, food technology and science departments. We will seek grant funding to continue this project which to date has been financed fully by the school

The project at Anton House in Ipswich was our first in a social housing environment, and was funded by Suffolk Housing Society. The gardens were transformed from unproductive, unsightly bark chippings, dead trees and rubbish to bio-diversity enhancing, food producing areas. There is now a sandpit, a pergola, seating and a variety of growing spaces, compost tubs and water butts. The residents begun to become a more cohesive group, but due to the lack of a communal meeting room (and toilet facilities for our team) it would only be possible to work on this site again if these facilities were provided.

The impact of the grant from the Esmee Fairbairn Suffolk Fund was vital. It enabled us to grow in ways that have made a profound difference to our entire organisation. We were able to pay for key training in health and safety, first aid and risk assessment. We were able to build a greater degree of structure into our processes, by enhancing our administration, finance and management support. We were also able to spend more time in developing new service.

We continued to develop our work on our two community kitchen and wildlife gardens in Southwold and Kessingland We created a lease agreement with Kessingland Parish Council, with help from the legal Partner at UnLtd, which we will sign when we receive the first grant fund or donation to start work on this site. The aims of the Southwold project have grown significantly from our first proposals. Regular site visits and meetings have taken place throughout the year to progress plans. We hope to receive the first grant funds to start this project in the early part of 2017.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS for the year ended 30 September 2016

Our HMP Wayland project continued to work extremely well and benefited from the feedback received from inmates and staff in year one. The gardens now include three "Back Yard Projects" backing on to the restored sheds, which have provided excellent shelter, potting sheds and a very basic greenhouse area. We extended the green willow chairs, arbours and rustic furniture courses, as the inmates really enjoy this work, and it offers resources that will enhance employability upon release. Again we noted the new group becoming a cohesive work force together, teaching the "new boys" joining the group what they had learnt, and forming a tight knit community that looked out for each other. They took huge pride in their work, culminating in a very beautiful memorial garden and service near the end of the year for those inmates, who had lost loved ones whilst inside. We again had a Christmas celebratory meal, to which governors and other staff were invited, and we were able to use some produce from the gardens. We fed 41 people for £83, and several prisoners came up to tell us it was the best meal they had eaten in years. For one person, the eight years since he had been imprisoned.

Key objectives in the year ahead include the generation of our new Corporate Partnership Projects. We began the first of these with Cambscuisine in December 2016. The aim is to increase our commercial work in order to generate greater sustainability and to reduce further our reliance on grants.

We also aim to use the EVIDE evidence measuring systems on all our new social projects to be able to demonstrate better the impact of our work. The generation of statistically analysable data will underpin our bids for funding, and will help us to improve our service delivery. What we do helps people help, themselves, as well as the natural world. It promises to be an exciting year ahead!

Greener Growth continued to further expand its activities during the year, working in new schools, prisons and other community settings. We broke new ground by working with our first secondary school, East Point Academy in Lowestoft. Their students include those with a range of special educational needs, and the school community is ethnically diverse with many young people from very deprived backgrounds. The impact of work has been noted by Ofsted & The Inspiration Trust, the sponsors of this academy. We have also started working with HMP Highpoint and have had meetings with HMP Swaleside in Kent with a view to working with them.

The benefit to the community was evidenced by

Demand for our services from three new schools, plus our continued work with Little Plumstead & Cecil Gowing Primary Schools near Norwich. Our second year at HMP Wayland, helping prisoners to extend their garden's food production, doubling the number of food, nutrition and budgeting courses and increasing willow weave and rustic furniture making sessions to enhance employability and reduce the risk of reoffending

As in our last year – our stakeholders include school communities (children, teachers, parents, carers), prison communities (serving prisoners, prison staff, families of prisoners) and wider local communities who benefit from the company's activities. HMP Wayland – Listening to feedback received from Year 1, we doubled both the capacity to grow a diverse range of produce, but also the delivery of food nutrition and budgeting courses to help prisoners practically and therapeutically, as requested by inmates and staff
