DIRECTORS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2021

The Directors present their annual report together with the accounts and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report, and a directors' report under company law.

The Trust operates an academy for pupils aged 7 to 11 servicing a catchment area in the borough of Runnymede, North-West Surrey. It has a pupil capacity of 360 and had a roll of 362 in the school census in October 2021.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The Academy Trust is a company limited by guarantee with no share capital (registration no. 08718489) and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the Academy Trust. The Directors act as the Trustees for the charitable activities of New Haw Community School and are also Directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. The charitable company is known as New Haw Community School. Details of the Directors who served throughout the period, except as noted, are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

New Haw Community School was incorporated on 4 October 2013 as a Multi Academy Trust. At the year end the Trust only consisted of one school, New Haw Community School, which obtained Academy status from 1 May 2014.

The Directors are the trustees of New Haw Community School and are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. Details of the Directors who served during the year, and to the date these accounts are approved, are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Directors

The number of Directors shall be not less than three but (unless otherwise determined by ordinary resolution) shall not be subject to any maximum. Subject to Articles 48 and 49, the Academy Trust shall have the following Directors - the chair of the Local Governing Body of New Haw Community School; two Parent Directors appointed under Articles 53 - 56; the Principal of New Haw Community School appointed under article 57; up to one Majority Director appointed under Article 57A; up to one Community Director appointed under Article 57B; and up to one SLT Director appointed under Article 57C.

Each of the persons entitled to appoint Members in Article 12 shall have the right from time to time by written notice delivered to the Office to remove any Member appointed by them and to appoint a replacement Member to fill a vacancy whether resulting from such removal or otherwise.

The Academy Trust may also have any Co-opted Governor appointed under Article 59. The first Directors shall be those person named in the statement delivered pursuant to sections 9 and 12 of the Companies Act 2006.

Future Directors shall be appointed or elected, as the case may be, under these Articles. Where it is not possible for such a Director to be appointed or elected due to the fact that an Academy has not yet been established, then the relevant Article or part thereof shall not apply.

The total number of Directors (including the Headteacher) who are employees of the Academy shall not exceed one third of the total number of Directors.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of Directors

Directors are appointed based on the skills that they will bring to the governing body or based on a proposal to the governing body by representative groups. During the period under review the Directors held 10 meetings. The training and induction provided for new Directors will depend on their existing experience. Each new Director receives induction training and is provided with access (via GovernorHub and VWV Policy Tracker) to copies of policies, procedures, minutes and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as Directors. As there are normally a maximum of one or two new Directors a period, induction tends to be done informally and is tailored specifically to the individual. During the period, the Directors were offered all necessary training.

Organisational structure

The structure consists of four levels: the Directors, Local Governing Body, Senior Leadership Team (SLT), & Year/Team Leaders. The aim of the management structure is to devolve responsibility and encourage involvement in decision making at all levels. The Directors are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring the Academy by the use of budgets and making major decisions about the direction of the Academy, capital expenditure and senior staff appointments.

The SLT are the Executive Headteacher, Head of School, Assistant Headteachers and Business Manager. These leaders control the Academy at an executive level implementing the policies laid down by the Directors and reporting back to them.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

All pay decisions for senior management staff are made in accordance with the STPCD and other relevant pay and conditions guidance. Consideration will be given to the overall role within the Academy Trust and National Support School and will be clearly linked to the performance management process. All pay decisions are taken to the Trust's Pay Committee for final consideration and approval.

Related parties and other connected charities and organisations

Marie Cahill is a National Leader of Education and New Haw Community School is a designated National Support School. The school has a well established role in the raising of standards in other schools and supports schools in difficulty, often in conjunction with the Local Authority. The school also works in conjunction with Salesian Teaching School, offering an NQT Induction Programme for Primary Teachers.

During 19/20, the academy trust had a further related party in the form of Groates Limited of who Mr G Oates, a director, is a director and shareholder. This ceased in June 2020. There are no other related parties.

Strategic report

Achievements and performance

The Academy is a three form entry junior school which is successful, popular and oversubscribed. Pupils enter the school from a wide range of social, cultural and economic backgrounds. The Academy prides itself on being an inclusive school.

Our data shows that since our last inspection in April 2009, New Haw Community School has continued to be a high achieving school. Pupils are assessed regularly to ensure any gaps in knowledge are identified and the school has an established programme of focus teaching to ensure those pupils who need more targeted teaching in smaller groups are able to make progress in line with their peers.

The disruption to education caused by COVID-19 has had a significant impact on children. The school has an ongoing process of rigorous assessment for all pupils to ensure any gaps in knowledge are identified quickly and addressed. There is an established programme of focus teaching to ensure that those pupils who need targeted teaching in smaller groups are able to make progress in line with their peers.

The school has made significant improvements to its digital provision for all pupils and this is having a positive impact in school and will prove invaluable in the event of individual or group isolation. Teachers are able to deliver class teaching to individual pupils isolating at home, ensuring that they can participate fully in the same lesson as their peers, as well as whole class lessons via Google Classroom should a whole bubble have to isolate. This will minimise the potential for further disruption to learning in the coming year.

The effectiveness of the arrangements for safeguarding pupils will always be considered under the leadership and management judgement.

At its last OfSTED inspection, New Haw was judged to be Outstanding.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the board of directors has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. However, the impact of Covid-19 on the school budget is significant with large increases in staffing costs, due to staggered timetables coupled with a large reduction in self generated income.

Additional staff have been required to ensure that the school remains a safe place for all, and additional hours have been required to ensure adequate cover at the start and finish of the day as well as during the lunch period which doubled in length. Staff absence has been at an unprecedented level due to Covid-19 and the broader effects of the pandemic and this has also impacted on staffing costs over the last year. There have also been extensive costs for cleaning and health and safety equipment, FSM and additional staff training.

COVID-19 also resulted in a significant reduction in self generated income with the loss of extended services for the majority of the year. Whilst before and after school care was able to restart, the extensive programme of extra-curricular clubs was unable to take place all year and this had a significant impact on unrestricted income levels.

In order to mitigate these pressures, there has been a continual review of costs during the year, with staffing constantly under review and savings made where possible. This included the redundancy of one support staff role, and further restructuring to both teaching and support staff on an ongoing basis to ensure cost efficiency.

For this reason, whilst the board of directors continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the accounts, it is mindful of the extra pressures the school budget is facing. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the statement of accounting policies.

DIRECTORS' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2021

Financial review

Most of the Academy's income is obtained from the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) in the form of recurrent grants, some of which are restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the ESFA during the period ended 31 August 2021 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The school has an established programme of self generated funding which has been significantly impacted by COVID-19. The restrictions imposed have resulted in reduced income for extended services both In 19/20 and 20/21. In 18/19 income from extended services was £113k. In 19/20 this was reduced to £78k due to COVID-19 restrictions in the summer term. in 20/21, this further reduced to £57k. A full programme of extended services has recommenced in September 2021 which it is hoped will see a return to more normal levels of income in 21/22.

There has also been a reduction in income from school to school support from £47k in 18/19 to £37k in 19/20 and £26k in 20/21. This is due to alterations in the way school to school support is deployed and funded. The school has retained its role in delivering the ECT Induction Programme in conjunction with Salesian Teaching School for 21/22 although further reductions to this income are anticipated.

During the period ending 31 August 2021 the school received additional funding for COVID Catch Up and emergency support of £37k. Additional funding of £7k was received for the provision of continuous free school meals (FSM) which covered periods of school closure and holiday periods.

Staffing costs increased in year due to the changes relating to COVID-19 as detailed above (2020 - £1,082k and 2021 - £1,115k).

The Academy also receives grants for fixed assets from the ESFA. In accordance with the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2019), such grants are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income in the fixed asset fund. The restricted fixed asset fund balance is reduced by annual depreciation charges over the expected useful life of the assets concerned.

During the period ended 31 August 2021, total expenditure of £1,980k (2020: £2,003k) was met by recurrent grant funding from the ESFA together with other incoming resources. The excess of expenditure over income for the period (excluding restricted fixed asset funds and transfers to restricted fixed asset funds) was £184k (2020: £146k).

As 31 August 2021 the net book value of fixed assets was £2,653k (2020: £2,634k). Movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 12 to the financial statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the pupils of the academy.

The Surrey Pension Fund, in which the Academy participates, showed a deficit of £1,615k (2020: £1,240k) at 31 August 2021.

Financial position

The Academy held fund balances at 31 August 2021 of £1,204k (2020: £1,689k) comprising £1,036k (2020: £1,413k) of restricted funds and £166k (2020: £276k) of unrestricted general funds. Of the restricted funds £2,653k (2020: £2,634k) is represented by tangible fixed assets and £nil of unspent capital funding (2020: £19k).

The pension reserve which is considered part of restricted funds was £1,615k (2020: £1,240k) in deficit.

DIRECTORS' REPORT (CONTINUED)

Reserves policy

The Directors review the reserve levels of the Academy annually. This review encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves. The Directors have determined that the appropriate level of free reserves should be equivalent to four weeks' expenditure, approximately £152k (£150k in 2020).

At 31 August 2021, the Academy held £166k (2020: £276k) of unrestricted funds. Five year budget planning has indicated in year surplus budgets for 21/22 and 22/23 but then deficit budgets from 2023/24 and therefore, these additional reserves will be necessary over these periods to cover sharp reductions expected in funding alongside increasing staff costs and overall expenditure. The Academy is also mindful of its need to retain contingency funds for staff absence (as it self-insures this area) and building improvement and maintenance costs.

Investment policy

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Academy has the power to invest funds not immediately required for its own purposes, in any way the Directors see fit. The organisation has a positive cash balance to cover eventualities and unforeseen expenses. The banking facilities are reviewed on a regular basis.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties that New Haw Community School faces are mitigated by the risk management process that the Academy Trust has in place.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Risk Management

The Directors have assessed the major risks to which the Academy is exposed, in particular those relating to the specific teaching, provision of facilities and other operational areas of the Academy, and its finances. The Directors have implemented a number of systems to assess risks that the school faces, especially in the operational areas (e.g. in relation to teaching, health and safety, bullying and school trips) and in relation to the control of finance. The Directors have introduced systems, including operational procedures and internal financial controls in order to minimise risk. Where significant financial risk still remains they have ensured they have adequate insurance cover. The Academy has an effective system of internal financial controls and this is explained in more detail in the Governance Statement on page 10.

The Trust continually assess and review the major risks to which the academy is exposed and have created an effective and robust risk review process and risk register which reflects these risks. The main risks identified are grouped as strategic, operational, health and safety and legal risks, and the major risk areas include:

- Financial risk
- Disaster recovery risk
- Governance risk
- Staffing risk
- Health & Safety risk
- Legal risk
- Objectives risk

In relation to the major risks to which the academy is exposed (particularly in relation to operational risks e.g. health & safety, finance, legal and staffing risks), trustees have introduced systems to assess and minimise these risks (e.g. robust financial controls and suitable insurance provision).

Financial and risk management objectives and policies

The main financial risks to which New Haw Community School is exposed, taking account of the mitigations in place, relate the risk of an income shortfall due to the likelihood of further government spending reductions affecting our general grant. Whilst in previous years this has been offset by the school generating a healthy income through a diverse range of extended services and significant school to school support work, the consequences of the Covid-19 pandemic have been that the school has seen a reduction in self generated income streams. This will place further strain on school resources in the year ahead. A risk also arises in relation to the defined benefit pension scheme, due to the fact that there is a deficit of £1,615 (2020: £1,240k).

DIRECTORS' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2021

Plans for future periods

The Academy will continue striving to improve the levels of performance of its pupils. The School has a very good understanding of its strengths and areas for development based on rigorous analysis of data and monitoring of teaching and learning. The School also makes good use of external validation to secure its judgement on the quality of provision and subsequent outcomes. The School Development Plan (SDP) has key areas identified for improvement and is based on regular analysis of data which is meticulously analysed by the Headteacher and the Senior Leadership Team (SLT). The SDP is regularly monitored and amended annually by the SLT and Directors. It is underpinned by appropriate budget links.

School improvement strategies are constantly under review and effectively identify underperforming areas and addresses them through a combination of rigorous monitoring, good continuing staff development, including coaching and thorough analysis of pupil performance data. The School makes good provision for personalised learning, support and intervention programmes for individual pupils and the quality of provision for inclusion is very good due to bespoke programmes aimed at raising achievement.

The strive for excellence is evident in many aspects of school life, but particularly in the strong culture of collaboration, openness and commitment to professional learning. Staff continuing professional development is good as is the way that all staff work relentlessly at sharing best practice to fulfil the School's moral imperative at improving the quality of learning for our pupils. Our fundamental approach is improving on our previous best.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

Scope of responsibility

As Directors, we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that New Haw Community School has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The board of directors has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Headteacher, as accounting officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between New Haw Community School and the Secretary of State for Education. The accounting officer is also responsible for reporting to the board of directors any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

Governance

The information on governance included here supplements that described in the Directors' Report and in the Statement of Directors' Responsibilities. The board of directors has formally met six times during the year. Attendance during the year at meetings of the board of directors was as follows:

The Finance and Risk committee met 3 times during the year. However, the responsibilities of the committee were incorporated into a programme of regular online meetings of all Governors and Trustees in the Autumn Term due to reduced numbers and Covid-19. The committee re-established separate meetings in the Spring Term with the appointment of new local governors and improved governor capacity. Management accounts, which are reviewed on a monthly basis by the Accounting Officer continued to be produced and reviewed monthly and there is a continued dialogue between the Trustees, Governors and senior staff to ensure that any issues or concerns are discussed as and when required.

The Governing Body undertake regular skills audits to ensure that they are fully aware of the range of skills, knowledge and experience of the board and also any gaps in these areas that should be addressed through training and /or recruitment. Following the recruitment of 4 new local governors in the Spring Term, a revised audit was carried out in Summer 2021 and showed a broad range of skills with no significant gaps in knowledge, skills and experience.

The Finance and Risk Committee is a sub-committee of the main Governing Body made up of Trustees and Local Governors. Its purpose is to approve the annual budget, monitor and review income and expenditure and the 5 year budget plan, and review and monitor all aspects of risk including the programme of Internal Audit.

Review of value for money

As accounting officer the Headteacher has responsibility for ensuring that the Academy Trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the Academy Trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of directors where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where available. The accounting officer for the Academy Trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

- Continuing to offer focus teaching for the weakest pupils, thus ensuring high quality teaching and learning for all, and maximising the opportunity to close the gap in educational attainment.
- Continuing the programme of extra-curricular clubs available to pupils outside of schools hours as soon as Covid quidance permitted.
- Continuing to work as a National Support School, providing support for a local federated infant and junior school, in order to improve standards and attainment.
- Working alongside Salesian Teaching School Alliance to develop and deliver a primary ECT Induction programme.
- Continuing to offer and support the SCITT (School Centred Initial Teacher Training) programme, thus ensuring a valuable source of excellent teachers for the trust.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of Academy Trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in New Haw Community School for the period 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts.

Capacity to handle risk

The board of directors has reviewed the key risks to which the Academy Trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of directors.

The risk and control framework

The Academy Trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of directors;
- regular reviews by the finance and personnel committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- · setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- · clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- · delegation of authority and segregation of duties;
- · identification and management of risks.

Review of governance and procedures.

William Giles completed their schedule of work as planned and no issues of significance were identified.

As accounting officer the Headteacher has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- · the work of the internal auditor;
- · the work of the external auditor;
- · the financial management and governance self-assessment process;
- the work of the executive managers within the Academy Trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The accounting officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the finance and personnel committee and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2021

1 Accounting policies

New Haw Community School is a charitable company. The address of its principal place of business is given on page 1 and the nature of its operations are set out in the Directors' report.

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts of the Academy Trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2020 to 2021 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Going concern

The Directors assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, ie whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charitable company to continue as a going concern. The Directors make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the accounts and have concluded that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the Academy Trust's ability to continue as a going concern. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the Academy Trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period for which it is receivable, and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the Balance Sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the Academy Trust has provided the goods or services.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2021

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Upon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items they are not recognised in the financial statements until they are sold. This income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

Donated fixed assets

Donated fixed assets are measured at fair value unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor is used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the Academy Trust's accounting policies.

Interest receivable

Interest receivable is included within the statement of financial activities on a receivable basis.

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Expenditure on raising funds

This includes all expenditure incurred by the Academy Trust to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the Academy Trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the Academy Trust apportioned to charitable activities.

(Continued)

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets acquired since the Academy was established are included in the accounts at cost. Assets costing less than £1,000 and a group of similar items costing £3,000 are written off in the period of acquisition. All other assets are capitalised.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Deprecation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, deprecation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

The property has been included at the valuation as provided by the ESFA when completing their desktop valuation.

The Academy has a 125 year lease from conversion on the land and buildings with Surrey County Council.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land and assets under construction, at rated calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight line or reducing balance basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Land and buildings	2%
Computer equipment	20%
Fixtures, fittings & equipment	10%

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.6 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Academy Trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods of services it must provide.

1.7 Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.8 Financial instruments

The Academy Trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the Academy Trust and their measurement basis are as follows.

Financial assets

Trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities

Trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition.

Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.9 Taxation

The Academy Trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the Academy Trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3, part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1.10 Pensions benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the Academy Trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the Academy Trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a projected unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions are recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy Trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

1.11 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the Academy Trust at the discretion of the Directors.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Education and Skills Funding Agency and Department for Education.

2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Accounting estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The Academy Trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 18, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2019 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2021. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Critical areas of judgement

Useful economic lives of tangible assets

The annual depreciation charge for tangible assets is sensitive to changes in the estimated useful economic lives and residual values of the assets. The useful economic lives and residual values are reassessed annually. They are amended when necessary to reflect current estimates, based on technological advancement, future investments, economic utilisation and the physical condition of the assets. See note 12 for the carrying amount of the property plant and equipment, and note 1.5 for the useful economic lives for each class of assets.

Bad debts

Debtors are regularly reviewed for recoverability, any debts which in the opinion of management are not recoverable are provided for as a specific bad debt.

There are no key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

Under the funding agreement with the Secretary of State, the academy was not subject to a limit on the amount of GAG that it could carry forward at 31 August 2021.

Pupil Premium, Teachers Pension Grants, Teachers Pay Grants: Income received from the ESFA as described.

Other DFE/ESFA grants: This includes money due for rates relief and additional funding received for free school meals.

Other government grants: This includes SEN funding.

DfE/ ESFA capital grants: This includes the devolved formula capital grant. The school has invested in equipment ahead of receiving the capital funding which is why the fund is carried forward in a deficit position.

Transfer of funds is in relation to overspend on GAG.

16 Pension and similar obligations

The Academy Trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Surrey County Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of independent qualified actuaries. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016, and that of the LGPS related to the period ended 31 March 2019.

Contributions amounting to £26k were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2021 (2020: £27k) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary. These contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019.

The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. The assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2023.

The employer's pension costs paid to the TPS in the period amounted to £157k (2020: £134k).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The Academy Trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The Academy Trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contributions are as noted below. The agreed contribution rates for future years are 25.5% for employers and 5.5% to 7.5% for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.
